"I'm pleasantly surprised [about the outcome]," said Dairyfest committee chair Gina

Welch. "We got what we wanted."

Welch said that the committee had geared certain activities toward specific age groups, and "it all worked out"

This year's theme was Celebrate the Country in You, and emphasis was put on local artisans and craftspeople throughout the vendor fair on Main Street on Saturday morning. Downtown shops also ran sidewalk sales with products available at reduced prices.

The weekend kicked off on Friday evening with a program run by Little Ray's Reptiles at the Winchester Lions Pavilion.

Later on that evening, the Winchester Centennial Pool offered a family swimming session for \$2 a swimmer.

The night was capped off by two separate MuchMusic Video Dances at the Winchester Curling Club. One was held for pre-teens and tweens at 6:30 pm, followed by a dance for teens at 9 pm.

Committee member Lesley Bouchard said only two teams entered a registration form and the \$25 fee necessary to participate in the race.

"Maybe next year," said Bouchard. Legion member Larry Drew said he received an e-mail Friday evening informing him that Ribfest would not go on.

The gates open Thursday afternoon at 3:30 pm, with the midway opening a half-hour later at 4 and continuing until 11 pm. Later in the afternoon, the beer gardens will open at 5 pm, followed by opening ceremonies at 6:30 pm. The night will be capped off by the Mountain Township Agricul-

Crash investigated

MORRISBURG - The Special Investigations Unit (SIU) is looking into a motor-vehicle collision that occurred at a service centre on westbound Highway 401 east of Morrisburg on Wed., Aug. 5.

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) reported to the SIU that at approximately 2:30 am, an OPP officer was conducting radar on westbound Highway 401 when the officer saw a black Kia car travelling at a high rate of speed. The officer started to follow the Kia. A short time later, the car exited the highway at a service centre between Morrisburg and Ingleside and collided with a cement barrier.

There were four occupants in the vehicle. One woman suffered serious injuries and was taken to hospital in Montreal. Three other occupants of the car, two males and one female, have been released from Cornwall Community Hospital.

Five SIU investigators, including two forensic investigators, are probing the circumstances surrounding the collision. Investigators reported that they examined the collision scene, started to designate subject and witness officers, and located and interviewed witnesses. Frances Bourgeois-Coyne, 43 (not injured), who was driving a 2005 Chevrolet Equinox, was heading westbound on Connaught Road when she and Polaris All Terrain Ve-

hicle driver Cassidy Scheepers, 13, collided. The teenager was injured and airlifted to the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario.

SD&G (Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry) OPP Constable R. Benoit, assisted by OPP Technical Traffic Collision Investigators, continues the investigation.

Have you seen the new signs around town?

WINCHESTER - For the past several years, the local area has been plagued by a series of suspicious fires.

Now, one local insurance company has teamed up with the Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry (SD&G) OPP to raise awareness about arson prevention to new heights.

Grenville Mutual Insurance in Spencerville has been a driving force behind the development and construction of four signs, each depicting a different image related to the destruction caused by arson.

"We decided to work very closely with the OPP to shed light on the arson issue we've got," said president Ross Lincoln.

The signs are located south of Chesterville along County Road 43 east, as well as north of Chesterville along the same road.

The third sign is located south of Morewood, and the fourth sits in the field at Rideau Auctions at the intersection of County Road

31 and County Road 43 west outside of the village.

"[The signs] are a good thing," said SD&G OPP media relations officer Pete Robertson.

Lincoln said that Grenville Mutual budgeted roughly \$25,000 to support the initiative, and bring "community awareness to the community basis."

Lincoln said Grenville Mutual "quietly" partially funded the signs, as well as helped to design the images and the slogan "Arson Destroys Families and Futures.'

The posting of the signs comes after two men -Steven Seymour, 19, of Chesterville and Beau Breakey, 41, of Ottawa were arrested in connection to a Nation Valley Road arson that took place on Sun., May 24. However, SD&G OPP have not confirmed or denied if the two men are connected with any other blazes.

SOUTH DUNDAS ______ The Winchester Pre-Kennel issue resolved without much bite

WILLIAMSBURG — The Williamsburg area could soon be home to a new dog kennel.

In a special Township of South Dundas council meeting on Tues., Aug. 4, a four-to-one vote gave the green light to the proposed construction of a professional dog kennel.


At two previous meetings, council deferred the issue of the Ferguson Road project because it was clear there were two separate issues that required attention. Councillors said the township doesn't have the resources to enforce latenight noise violations by barking dogs, and a bylaw amendment was needed to build the kennel.

Kathy Norg, a resident of Ferguson Road northeast of Williamsburg, has plans to erect the professional dog kennel on her property. She initially expressed her wishes to do so at a council meeting on Tues., June 23. However, neighbour Janet Findlay-Schoones and her family have opposed the project.

Neither the dog kennel proprietor nor the opposing neighbour were present in council chambers for the decision on Aug. 4.

E-mails sent to the township suggest Findlay-Schoones and her family might be the only neighbours who say the kennel would be a nuisance.

"This service is badly needed in our community," wrote Ann



wrote Miles Lewis, whose property is adjacent to the Norg's. At the Aug 4 meeting May-

At the Aug. 4 meeting, Mayor Robert "Rowdy" Gillard moved swiftly to settle the problem.

"I think after discussing it this long, it's time to make a decision," said Gillard.

However, Councillor Delbert Jones expressed his displeasure that no progressive changes were made since the Tues., July 21 council meeting when Gillard gave South Dundas manager of planning and enforcement Donald J.W. Lewis two more weeks to devise a solution that would suit both parties involved.

Jones has repeatedly said a new bylaw should be developed to deal with an issue such as this in the future.

"That [a new bylaw] did not happen," said Jones.

But Lewis said the township had no "legal means" to issue a zoning agreement with added stipulations, such as hours of operation or a noise curfew.

"I don't want to hold things up," said Jones. "But I don't think it's unreasonable to expect someone to come back with [rules]."

"I think it's unfortunate to have those [proposed rules] brought up now," said Gillard. "The noise bylaw, as far as I'm concerned, has nothing to do with the current [zoning] bylaw."

However, Gillard said he understood that the point of a two-week delay was to see if Norg and Findlay-Schoones could find a compromise for the situation.

"We were hoping the two could come to some sort of physical agreement," said Deputy-Mayor Steven Byvelds. "That was the hope of this council."

After the passing of the bylaw amendment, Findlay-Schoones had 21 days to launch an appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board.

Gillard said he expected Findlay-Schoones to submit an appeal.

"It doesn't matter what we do here," said Gillard. "It's going to go to the [Ontario Municipal Board]."

"The stuff [sand] right now is clay-based," said Johnston.



"I just like to make people's dreams come true," Meevis boasted.

No application, no money, no surprises North Dundas Township not among recipients of National Trails Coalition grant

WINCHESTER — Across Canada this August, construction crews are breaking out the asphalt to build new pathways using grant money from the National Trails Coalition.

However, a North Dundas trail wasn't among the 500 projects approved in late July — because the township didn't apply.

Volunteer and trail supporter Murray Inch said he actually prepared an application so the township could take advantage of a \$25-million federal grant announced earlier this year. The government partnered with the National Trails Coalition to create a stimulus program offering 50 per cent funding for

ATVs, off-road motorcycling, hiking, walking, running, cycling, or horseback riding trails, just to name a few examples. The applicant would have been responsible for covering the remaining 50 per cent of the costs.

However, Inch said he never submitted the application because he needed approval from North Dundas council first — and it wasn't worth the headache.

A few years ago, the North Dundas Trail Committee (which was part of council) started work on what became a controversial plan to build a Gypsy Lane recreational trail. But numerous landowners shot down the project, citing concerns with vandalism, noise, and other problems.

Council ultimately decid-

trail in a 3-2 vote on October 28, 2008.

Inch said the National Trails Coalition's June 26 deadline was swiftly approaching, so even though his paperwork was finished, he still didn't appear before North Dundas politicians to ask if the township would support the application and — if it was approved — pay for 50 per cent of the project. "I needed an endorsement

[from] council," said Inch. If the councillors had

turned down the Gypsy Lane trail before, he said, they would likely do it again. "How often do you knock

your head against the wall?" asked Inch.

Inch said he initially planned to bring the National Trails Coalition issue before council during a Tues., new trails for snowmobiles, ed against the Gypsy Lane June 23 meeting. But Inch issue slide.

said he wasn't keen on doing it that day because Ryan Williams was to receive the North Dundas Community Builder Award, recognizing the young man's charity work. Inch said he didn't want to take away from the big day by raising the controversial Gypsy Lane issue (although the formal council meeting that night began after the presentation had wrapped up and the Williams supporters had filed out the door).

In addition, a few months ago, the Township of North Dundas was working on several funding applications, trying to score multiple stimulus opportunities. Inch remarked that he didn't want the funding application to compete with other projects.

So Inch decided to let the

Last year, the three councillors who turned down the project stated they weren't against a trail — they just didn't think Gypsy Lane was the right location.

However, the trail issue has more or less remained at a standstill since the confrontational October meeting

When contacted by the Winchester Press, township recreation director Mark Guy confirmed he was aware of Inch's abandoned application. He agreed the politicians likely wouldn't have approved Inch's paperwork, especially after council decided to pay for onethird of several other stimulus projects approved by senior levels of government, including the reconstruction of Belmeade and Boyne Road.

"Were they going to shell out another 50 per cent for something they already turned down? Probably not," said Guy.

When asked if anyone has come forward with a feasible, cost-effective alternative trail location to Gypsy Lane, Guy said nobody had.

"No one has really come up with any better ideas for a trail," he said.

Guy added he wasn't sure where else a trail could go, either.

"I can't think of another spot," he said.

But the recreation director agreed it was unlikely the township would be able to apply for such a large grant in the near future.

"I don't see money coming around for a while," said Guy.





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

The best news is, these people have agreed to organize Dairyfest again next year. And after taking a little break, they plan to get back together in a month or so to start preparing.

We'd just like to point out that not everyone has to be as dedicated and organized as Welch to help with Dairyfest. Yes, the committee requires some new official members (actually, they're in desperate need of a treasurer and secretary, if anyone's interested). But for the most part, they just need volunteers to help with small jobs. Someone to sell tickets. Another person to work the door at the teen dance. Someone else to run the cotton-candy machine. It's a great way for high-school students to complete their mandatory 40 hours of community service.

"We had a couple teens help out, and they were phenomenal," said Welch. The committee doesn't need you to let Dairyfest take over your life — they

just require volunteers for a two or three-hour period. In addition, the committee needs people to take on small projects. For example, Chesterville's Therien Jiu-Jitsu and Kickboxing - who are on our front page this week — organized a demonstration. The Royal Canadian Legion Winchester Branch 108 took care of the square dancing. Township staff and volunteer Bert Hill scheduled a Friday-night lecture about the 130th anniversary of the Brown family murders. Many other groups helped, simply by lending their own expertise.

"It was one less thing I had to worry about," said Welch.

Reader asks, what should go in my front lawn?

Question: I have built a very nice interlocking path from my driveway to the front door of my house. I haven't got anything growing in the front yard, and I haven't a clue what to do or what to plant. Where do I get advice?


Answer: Many questions here. Would you like a lawn? What style is your house? Do you like to grow vegetables? Are you a collector of

plants? Where does the sun rise and set? And, most important, what is your budget? Here are three op-

tions: 1. Visit your neighbourhood and see what you like, as you might become in-

spired to do your own landscaping; 2. A local horticultural society usually has a garden tour sometime during the summer, and you would probably see four or five gardens on the pro-

pointments in the long-run.

Question: I have so many holes in my Hosta, what is wrong with them?

Answer: Your Hosta may be being eaten by slugs. In March, I start saving all my egg shells - drying them and grinding them up to a very fine mealy-like mixture using a rolling pin. When the Hosta shoots start to show, I sprinkle a mixture of ground-up egg shell and Diatomaceous earth (DE) around the shoots. DE is a non-chemical insecticide used to control pests in crops and gardens. Its sharp edges cut the slimy-slippery coating of the slug to control them somewhat, but will not cure the problem. I have heard of tuna cans filled with beer set just below the soil line. The slugs will drown in the beer.

The heavy-leaved Hosta will withstand the munching of slugs more than the thin, softleaved Hosta.

However, be very careful using DE. The fine dust can be inhaled very easily, so cover your nose and mouth, and use only when the winds are low.
