Volunteers pull off '09 Dairyfest

WINCHESTER — The village's 21st annual Dairyfest celebration took over Winchester Fri., Aug. 7 to Sun., Aug. 9, and committee members say they're pleased with its success.

"I'm pleasantly surprised [about the outcome]," said Dairyfest committee chair Gina Welch. "We got what we wanted."

Welch said that the committee had geared certain activities toward specific age groups, and "it all worked out."

This year's theme was Celebrate the Country in You, and emphasis was put on local artisans and craftspeople throughout the vendor fair on Main Street on Saturday morning. Downtown shops also ran sidewalk sales with products available at reduced prices.

The weekend kicked off on Friday evening with a program run by Little Ray's Reptiles at the Winchester Lions Pavilion.

Later on that evening, the Winchester Centennial Pool offered a family swimming session for \$2 a swimmer.

The night was capped off by two separate MuchMusic Video Dances at the Winchester Curling Club. One was held for pre-teens and tweens at 6:30 pm, followed by a dance for teens at 9 pm.

Ottawa Citizen business reporter Bert Hill also gave a lecture at the Old Town Hall on Friday evening to discuss his research of the Brown family murders. Watch future editions of the Press closer to Sept. 2's 130th anniversary of the murders for more coverage.

The weekend-long three-pitch tournament — presented by the Winchester Junior "B" Hawks — started at the Morgan Field on Friday evening. Chad Valcours' team beat out Humbertos Medeiros in the

final game Sunday afternoon, claiming the \$1,000 first-place prize.

Saturday morning events began bright and early with the firefighters serving breakfast at the Winchester Fire Hall.

Throughout the remainder of the day, Dairyfest patrons enjoyed activities at the Winchester 100 Club Park, including the Parmalat playground, Vanderlaand: The Barnyard Zoo, and a car show presented by the Highway 43 Car Club and Bill Osborne Chevrolet.

Chesterville's Therien Jiu-Jitsu Dojo had the crowd on Main Street entranced during a high-energy demonstration, which was preceded by a belly-dancing performance by Winchester's Sandy Burns and Vicki Cane.

The Grenville Gremlins square-dancing troupe performed for the crowd as well outside the Royal Canadian Legion, Winchester Branch 108.

Unfortunately, two of the main staples of the annual Dairyfest event were cancelled this year.

Both the Ribfest barbecue and the Family Amazing Race sponsored by Keller Williams Realty Team Zollinger didn't run due to a lack of volunteer support, according to organizers.

Committee member Lesley Bouchard said only two teams entered a registration form and the \$25 fee necessary to participate in the race.

"Maybe next year," said Bouchard.

Legion member Larry Drew said he received an e-mail Friday evening informing him that Ribfest would not go on.

"I guess there weren't enough volunteers," he said.

Welch said that it is the "ongoing saga" of community-based events; however, she said she didn't wish to focus on the negative.

Get ready for South Mountain Fair

SOUTH MOUNTAIN — The 117th annual South Mountain Fair is scheduled to take place this coming weekend (Thurs., Aug. 13 to Sun., Aug. 16).

Crash investigated

MORRISBURG — The Special Investigations Unit (SIU) is looking into a motor-vehicle collision that occurred at a service centre on westbound Highway 401 east of Morrisburg on Wed., Aug. 5.

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) reported to the SIU that at approximately 2:30 a.m., an OPP officer was conducting radar on westbound Highway 401 when the officer saw a black Kia car travelling at a high rate of speed. The officer started to follow the Kia. A short time later, the car exited the highway at a service centre between Morrisburg and Ingleside and collided with a cement barrier.

There were four occupants in the vehicle. One woman suffered serious injuries and was taken to hospital in Montreal. Three other occupants of the car, two males and one female, have been released from Cornwall Community Hospital.

Five SIU investigators, including two forensic investigators, are probing the circumstances surrounding the collision. Investigators reported that they examined the collision scene, started to designate subject and witness officers, and located and interviewed witnesses. Driver, ATV collide

CHESTERVILLE — An investigation continues into a motor-vehicle collision which took place shortly after 8:32 a.m. on Wed., Aug. 5, on Connaught Road, just north of the Village of Chesterville.

Frances Bourgeois-Coyne, 43 (not injured), who was driving a 2005 Chevrolet Equinox, was heading westbound on Connaught Road when she and Polaris All Terrain Ve-

hicle driver Cassidy Scheepers, 13, collided. The teenager was injured and airlifted to the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario.

SD&G (Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry) OPP Constable R. Benoit, assisted by OPP Technical Traffic Collision Investigators, continues the investigation.

Family dispute

SOUTH MOUNTAIN — On Fri., Aug. 7 around 3 p.m., SD&G OPP officers responded to a report of a family dispute on County Road 3 in the Township of North Dundas. The investigation revealed that a 47-year-old male had assaulted a female family member.

He was arrested and faces charges of uttering threats to cause death or bodily harm, threatening to damage property, assault with a weapon, and marijuana possession. He was held in custody pending an appearance in Cornwall court.

She was arrested and faces charges of assault, breaching probation, and uttering threats to cause death or bodily harm. She is scheduled to appear in Cornwall court on Tues., Sept. 15.

MORRISBURG — On Wed., Aug. 5 around 9:52 a.m., SD&G OPP officers responded to a report of a theft on High Street. The investigation revealed that unknown suspect(s) stole a Red Super Cycle 1800 female

frame with 18 speeds and mountain bike-style handle bars from the property. The suspect(s) left behind another older mountain bike at the scene.

Have you seen the new signs around town?

WINCHESTER — For the past several years, the local area has been plagued by a series of suspicious fires.

Now, one local insurance company has teamed up with the Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry (SD&G) OPP to raise awareness about arson prevention to new heights.

Grenville Mutual Insurance in Spencerville has been a driving force behind the development and construction of four signs, each depicting a different image related to the destruction caused by arson.

"We decided to work very closely with the OPP to shed light on the arson issue we've got," said president Ross Lincoln.

The signs are located south of Chesterville along County Road 43 east, as well as north of Chesterville along the same road.

The third sign is located south of Morewood, and the fourth sits in the field at Rideau Auctions at the intersection of County Road

31 and County Road 43 west outside of the village.

"[The signs] are a good thing," said SD&G OPP media relations officer Pete Robertson.

Lincoln said that Grenville Mutual budgeted roughly \$25,000 to support the initiative, and bring "community awareness to the community basis."

Lincoln said Grenville Mutual "quietly" partially funded the signs, as well as helped to design the images and the slogan "Arson Destroys Families and Futures."

The posting of the signs comes after two men — Steven Seymour, 19, of Chesterville and Beau Breakey, 41, of Ottawa — were arrested in connection to a Nation Valley Road arson that took place on Sun., May 24. However, SD&G OPP have not confirmed or denied if the two men are connected with any other blazes.

Kennel issue resolved without much bite

WILLIAMSBURG — The Williamsburg area could soon be home to a new dog kennel.

In a special Township of South Dundas council meeting on Tues., Aug. 4, a four-to-one vote gave the green light to the proposed construction of a professional dog kennel.

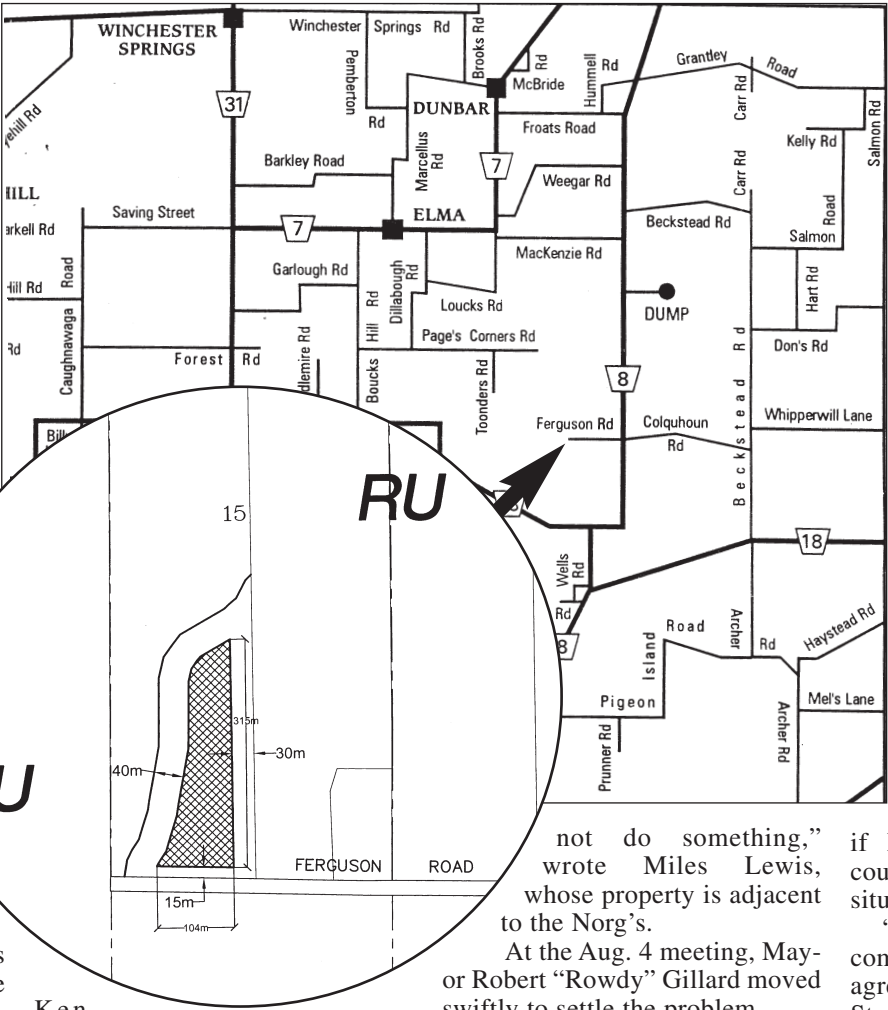
At two previous meetings, council deferred the issue of the Ferguson Road project because it was clear there were two separate issues that required attention. Councillors said the township doesn't have the resources to enforce late-night noise violations by barking dogs, and a bylaw amendment was needed to build the kennel.

Kathy Norg, a resident of Ferguson Road northeast of Williamsburg, has plans to erect the professional dog kennel on her property. She initially expressed her wishes to do so at a council meeting on Tues., June 23. However, neighbour Janet Findlay-Schoones and her family have opposed the project.

Neither the dog kennel proprietor nor the opposing neighbour were present in council chambers for the decision on Aug. 4.

E-mails sent to the township suggest Findlay-Schoones and her family might be the only neighbours who say the kennel would be a nuisance.

"This service is badly needed in our community," wrote Ann



Kenward, a Ferguson Road resident. "The proposed facility has been researched for several years, and I will recommend it to others who are looking for such a place."

"Being of the mindset that as neighbours and fellow citizens of this township, I believe we should always work towards a way to do something, rather than a way to

not do something," wrote Miles Lewis, whose property is adjacent to the Norg's.

At the Aug. 4 meeting, Mayor Robert "Rowdy" Gillard moved swiftly to settle the problem.

"I think after discussing it this long, it's time to make a decision," said Gillard.

However, Councillor Delbert Jones expressed his displeasure that no progressive changes were made since the Tues., July 21 council meeting when Gillard gave South Dundas manager of planning and enforcement Donald J.W. Lewis two more weeks to de-

vised a solution that would suit both parties involved.

Jones has repeatedly said a new bylaw should be developed to deal with an issue such as this in the future.

"That [a new bylaw] did not happen," said Jones.

But Lewis said the township had no "legal means" to issue a zoning agreement with added stipulations, such as hours of operation or a noise curfew.

"I don't want to hold things up," said Jones. "But I don't think it's unreasonable to expect someone to come back with [rules]."

"I think it's unfortunate to have those [proposed rules] brought up now," said Gillard. "The noise bylaw, as far as I'm concerned, has nothing to do with the current [zoning] bylaw."

However, Gillard said he understood that the point of a two-week delay was to see if Norg and Findlay-Schoones could find a compromise for the situation.

"We were hoping the two could come to some sort of physical agreement," said Deputy-Mayor Steven Byvels. "That was the hope of this council."

After the passing of the bylaw amendment, Findlay-Schoones had 21 days to launch an appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board.

Gillard said he expected Findlay-Schoones to submit an appeal. "It doesn't matter what we do here," said Gillard. "It's going to go to the [Ontario Municipal Board]."

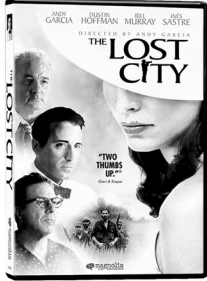

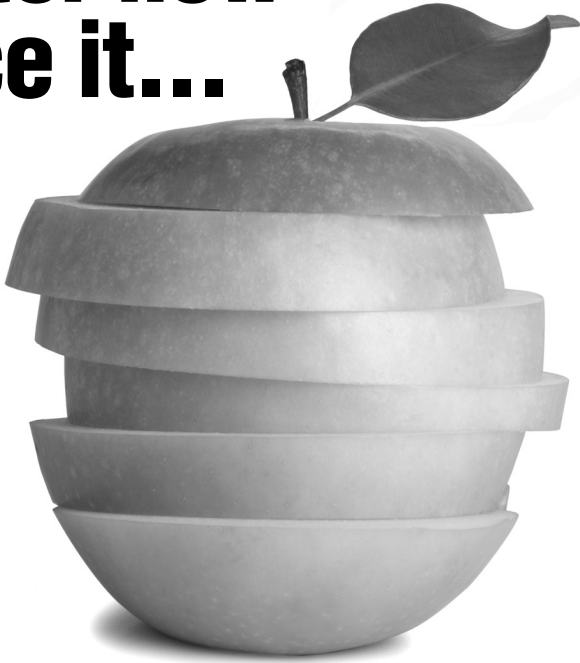

SOUTH MOUNTAIN — Plenty of work was being done on Main Street in South Mountain last week.

From construction of the new South Mountain Resource Centre to the installation of playground equipment next door, construction crews were hard at work when the *Winchester Press* dropped by Fri., Aug. 7.

Friend Construction, the company hired to build the resource centre, was painting the walls and hanging trim inside the new building, which will also house the library.

Chris Vriend said he's happy the weather is finally co-operating.

"We've had some days," said Vriend with a laugh. "The only days we've stopped [doing work] is if something stopped us."

Vriend also said he was happy a hydro pole was finally erected in the front of the building.

"We've been doing the work all along with generators," he said.

Meanwhile, the new playground will be located between the resource centre and the tennis courts. Township of North Dundas facili-

ties manager Les Johnston spent the majority of the morning on Aug. 7 levelling the ground and preparing to bring new sand in.

"The stuff [sand] right now is clay-based," said Johnston.

Johnston also said he expects the contracted labour-

ers who were working to put up the play structure last week to finish up by the end of this week. At that time, the park will be fully operational for children.

Both projects were included in the 2009 Township of North Dundas capital budget.

No application, no money, no surprises

North Dundas Township not among recipients of National Trails Coalition grant

WINCHESTER — Across Canada this August, construction crews are breaking out the asphalt to build new pathways using grant money from the National Trails Coalition.

However, a North Dundas trail wasn't among the 500 projects approved in late July — because the township didn't apply.

Volunteer and trail supporter Murray Inch said he actually prepared an application so the township could take advantage of a \$25-million federal grant announced earlier this year. The government partnered with the National Trails Coalition to create a stimulus program offering 50 per cent funding for new trails for snowmobiles,

ATVs, off-road motorcycling, hiking, walking, running, cycling, or horseback riding trails, just to name a few examples. The applicant would have been responsible for covering the remaining 50 per cent of the costs.

However, Inch said he never submitted the application because he needed approval from North Dundas council first — and it wasn't worth the headache.

A few years ago, the North Dundas Trail Committee (which was part of council) started work on what became a controversial plan to build a Gypsy Lane recreational trail. But numerous landowners shot down the project, citing concerns with vandalism, noise, and other problems.

Council ultimately decided against the Gypsy Lane

trail in a 3-2 vote on October 28, 2008.

Inch said the National Trails Coalition's June 26 deadline was swiftly approaching, so even though his paperwork was finished, he still didn't appear before North Dundas politicians to ask if the township would support the application and — if it was approved — pay for 50 per cent of the project.

"I needed an endorsement [from] council," said Inch.

If the councillors had turned down the Gypsy Lane trail before, he said, they would likely do it again.

"How often do you knock your head against the wall?" asked Inch.

Inch said he initially planned to bring the National Trails Coalition issue before council during a Tues., June 23 meeting. But Inch

said he wasn't keen on doing it that day because Ryan Williams was to receive the North Dundas Community Builder Award, recognizing the young man's charity work. Inch said he didn't want to take away from the big day by raising the controversial Gypsy Lane issue (although the formal council meeting that night began after the presentation had wrapped up and the Williams supporters had filed out the door).

In addition, a few months ago, the Township of North Dundas was working on several funding applications, trying to score multiple stimulus opportunities. Inch remarked that he didn't want the funding application to compete with other projects.

So Inch decided to let the issue slide.

Last year, the three councillors who turned down the project stated they weren't against a trail — they just didn't think Gypsy Lane was the right location.

However, the trail issue has more or less remained at a standstill since the confrontational October meeting.

When contacted by the *Winchester Press*, township recreation director Mark Guy confirmed he was aware of Inch's abandoned application. He agreed the politicians likely wouldn't have approved Inch's paperwork, especially after council decided to pay for one-third of several other stimulus projects approved by senior levels of government, including the reconstruction of Belmeade and Boyne Road.

"Were they going to shell out another 50 per cent for something they already turned down? Probably not," said Guy.

When asked if anyone has come forward with a feasible, cost-effective alternative trail location to Gypsy Lane, Guy said nobody had.

"No one has really come up with any better ideas for a trail," he said.

Guy added he wasn't sure where else a trail could go, either.

"I can't think of another spot," he said.

But the recreation director agreed it was unlikely the township would be able to apply for such a large grant in the near future.

"I don't see money coming around for a while," said Guy.

Remember when...

1939

Dwaine Froats, 19, of Chesterville was knocked unconscious when a bolt of lightning struck a barn that he and two others were working on nearby. His two companions were stunned but were able to get up and call a doctor, who revived the man. Froats was expected to make a complete recovery.

1949

The United Counties were dealing with two new cases of polio. In Glengarry Township, the first known case had been reported, while Cornwall was dealing with 13 cases. There were two cases in Dundas Township, and one victim had died. All of the infected were children.

1959

Telephone service was to improve in the Winchester area, as per an announcement made by Bell Canada manager George Thompson. Three new telephone circuits were to be put into service between Winchester and Chesterville, bringing the

total number of circuits to 10. There were two more circuits in the works as well, which were to come on-line in the following months.

1969

The Winchester Community Centre board of directors was pleading for more money despite a \$17,000 fundraising blitz held in the village. All that was

needed to get construction underway was approval from the Ontario Municipal Board, and to raise another \$50,000.

1979

A severe summer storm dumped 1.35 inches of rain on the area, and high winds associated with the storm knocked down power lines and tore down trees. A tree at the corner of St. Lawrence and

Victoria Streets was toppled by the gusting winds and many branches were blown to the ground.

1989

Philadelphia Flyers hockey player Terry Carkner — a Winchester resident — was getting ready to start his fourth season in the National Hockey League. However, for the first time, he was going back to the same team for a second year. "This will be the first year I can just go in and shake hands with the guys and know who they are," said Carkner.

1999

Local paramedics said they were feeling short-changed when it came to training. Winchester-based paramedic Dennis McMahon admitted that the frustration was growing due to the lack of training for rural paramedics, classified as Primary Care Paramedics. McMahon said the provincial taxes are being spent to train urban paramedics to a higher level. The training was not being made available to rural Ontario paramedics.

Reader asks, what should go in my front lawn?

Question: I have built a very nice interlocking path from my driveway to the front door of my house. I haven't got anything growing in the front yard, and I haven't a clue what to do or what to plant. Where do I get advice?

Ask a
Master Gardener

Answer: Many questions here. Would you like a lawn? What style is your house? Do you like to grow vegetables? Are you a collector of plants? Where does the sun rise and set? And, most important, what is your budget?

Here are three options: 1. Visit your neighbourhood and see what you like, as you might become inspired to do your own landscaping; 2. A local horticultural society usually has a garden tour sometime during the summer, and you would probably see four or five gardens on the pro-

gram. All the gardens would be quite different, and some could give you ideas that might inspire you or overwhelm you; 3. Finally, having not seen your yard and not being a garden designer, you should visit a private nursery in your area and chat with a garden designer on staff. It might be worth your while. I am sure you would be happy with the result, with fewer disappointments in the long-run.

Question: I have so many holes in my Hosta, what is wrong with them?

Answer: Your Hosta may be being eaten by slugs. In March, I start saving all my egg shells — drying them and grinding them up to a very

fine mealy-like mixture using a rolling pin. When the Hosta shoots start to show, I sprinkle a mixture of ground-up egg shell and Diatomaceous earth (DE) around the shoots. DE is a non-chemical insecticide used to control pests in crops and gardens. Its sharp edges cut the slimy-slippery coating of the slug to control them somewhat, but will not cure the problem. I have heard of tuna cans filled with beer set just below the soil line. The slugs will drown in the beer.

The heavy-leaved Hosta will withstand the munching of slugs more than the thin, soft-leaved Hosta.

However, be very careful using DE. The fine dust can be inhaled very easily, so cover your nose and mouth, and use only when the winds are low.

Ottawa Mayor Larry O'Brien returns

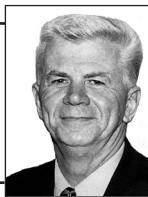

Fifty years strong at Donevelyn Farms

KENMORE — Fifty years at the same job could be taxing for some people; however, for Vera Mitchell and her family, five decades at Donevelyn Farms has become a family legacy.

It was 1959 when Vera and her late husband, Don, decided to pull up their roots in Brant County and haul their Jersey cattle herd across the province to settle on a plot of land in eastern Ontario.

"The land prices were much less [in eastern Ontario] at that time," said Vera.

The Mitchells' journey ended at a property on Yorks Corners Road south of Kenmore. It was on

that land that Donevelyn Farms, as it is known today, was born.

The name is derived from the combination of Don's first name and Vera's middle name, Evelyn.

"We had been using the name for seven years before we moved here," said Vera.

By 1972, Vera said, they "started expanding the land base" on the farm, and brought in the first herd of Holstein cattle.

In 1975, the cattle herd largely consisted of Holsteins. The farm required the construction of a free-stall barn to house the growing collective.

"We also acquired more land," said Vera.

That same year, Vera's two sons, Robert and Ross, became

partners within the family business. The name of the farm was then changed to Donald Mitchell and Sons. In 1979, the third son, Ralph, joined the partnership as well.

Matriarch celebrates milestone with family

The farming land grew to more than 700 acres by 1982, and Vera said they were milking 300 cows three times a day.

However, with the farm running at the highest calibre it ever had, the family received the worst news possible.

At only 52 years of age, Don developed brain cancer, and as Vera said, "in less than nine months he was gone."

The family business pushed on

despite the heavy loss. By 1984, the farm had acquired the licence to operate a grain elevator, as well as expand the storage capacity to 10,000 tons.

"We would buy and store others' grain and corn," said Vera.

Throughout the '80s and early '90s, the family farm continued to operate with Vera's three sons in control, as well as the help of area high-school students, who would come in on the weekends to help milk.

In 1998, however, Robert left to pursue a "new adventure," Vera said — developing SunTec Toma-to Greenhouses in Manotick.

Vera's other son, Ralph, left the operation in 2003 to "pursue other interests," she added.

Today, the farm is operated by Vera's son, Ross, with the continued help of high school students.

Throughout it all, Vera said the family has remained active within the agricultural community. Aside from performing administration duties on the farm, she spent six years as councillor of Osgoode Township prior to amalgamation and sat on the boards of the Osgoode Home Support Program, the Farm Debt Review, and the Winchester District Memorial Hospital, where she once worked as a nurse.

Vera didn't talk much about her past achievements, choosing instead to focus on the farm.

"Eastern Ontario has been very good to us," she said.

Plan now for 2010 tree planting

FINCH — South Nation Conversation (SNC) is beginning to remind area residents that they should be preparing for spring 2010 tree planting.

Tree seedlings will be made available to residents of the SNC watershed on a "first-come, first-served" basis, according to senior forestry technician Ed Kupczyk.

"Right now, there's a great mixture of coniferous and deciduous seedlings available," said Kupczyk.

For nearly 25 years, SNC has helped with the reforestation efforts

in eastern Ontario and has planted more than two million trees, as well as helping property owners with planning and the number of trees required for sustainability.

Funding for the projects has come from the Ontario government's 50 Million Tree initiative and the City of Ottawa's Green Acres program.

Available tree species include: black walnut; butternut; red oak; tamarack; white, red and jack pine; and white spruce. Shrub species available include high bush cranberry, nannyberry, red

osier, dogwood, and elderberry.

Prices range from 45 cents to 85 cents per seedling. As well, a \$20 administration fee will be applied to landowners in the SNC watershed, or \$30 to those outside the watershed.

Provincial funding of up to \$1.25 per tree will help defray costs for owners of two hectares or more.

A minimum of 100 seedlings is required, or 50 per species.
