



Linking Hands hopes to build transit network

WINCHESTER — A local charitable group is looking to become the link in the chain of the region's growing transportation needs.

Linking Hands, a project of the House of Lazarus, has devised an action plan that would see Dundas County organizations, such as the Nor-Dun Seniors' Support Centre and the Eastern Ontario Health Unit (EOHU), join forces to improve access to transportation.

"The system could be a mix of private and public stocks that would include seats from accessible vehicles, buses, cars, and vans," said Nanda Wubs, chair of the recently formed Dundas Accessible Transportation Group and co-owner of Winchester-based Wubs Transit.

"[It would] be seamless to the end user as all co-ordination and seat prices would be negotiated and agreed upon collectively through the transportation group and providers," she explained.

Wubs, whose business has been providing a Monday-to-Friday shuttle service, which begins in Chesterville and makes stops in Winchester, Ver-

non, Metcalfe, and Greely, before drop-offs at various transit stations in Ottawa, has recently been working to add a South Dundas route to the company's commuter network.

However, following the Dundas County Community Forum, held in November 2011 at Williamsburg's Christian Reformed Church, transportation became a common barrier for all aspects of rural sustainability.

Through a transportation working group at the community forum, the possibility of creating a 10-year vision was discussed, which would see the arranging of a central dispatch co-op, with pooled transit resources.

In order to get local transportation providers on board, a survey is being developed by the accessible transit group to see if there is a desire to either offload commuter seats in the planned co-op, or to sell available seats to the transit group.

"This reduces the cost for the provider as well as the co-operative system as no one is taking on the full cost of transportation, and we are maximizing the use of seats per vehicle per route," Wubs said.

While a survey is being mapped out in order to determine available seats, Wubs and the transportation group have been working to collect data on all possible stakeholders, providers, and end users, as well as indentifying and studying other rural transportation routes currently operating successfully.

Locally, the North Grenville Accessible Transit is operating out of Kemptville, while a similar system operates in the Pontiac region of Western Quebec.

"It is possible to do this in Dundas," Wubs said.

LHIN looks to improve access to family physicians

New hire to become primary care lead for Champlain network of hospitals

WINCHESTER — The lack of family doctors in Eastern Ontario has led the Champlain Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) toward corrective action.

The first step in the process is the hiring of Dr. Jacques Lemelin, who becomes the first-ever primary care lead for the local LHIN.

Lemelin, a family physician in Ottawa and a professor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Ottawa, will be working with the Champlain LHIN to ensure primary-care services are better integrated with the work of other health sectors.

The areas of focus include:

- Establishing a primary care physician leadership table to strengthen collaboration and communication among Champlain LHIN physician leaders and primary-care providers throughout the region. Primary-care models include Community Health Centres, Family Health Teams, other types of family-physician groups, and Nurse Practitioner-led Clinics.

- Ensuring physicians and primary-care providers are members of various planning committees of the LHIN.

- Working with primary-care physicians and other clinicians on

- Engaging with the Champlain Health Professional Advisory Committee on priorities of the LHIN.

accessible health services for people of all ages across our geography."

The introduction of a primary care lead in each of the province's 14 LHINs is endorsed by both the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and the Ontario Medical Association, and is in line with the government's action plan commitment to bring planning for the full patient journey under the LHINs.

Through collaborative work, local primary-care providers can strengthen these partnerships and focus on implementing system initiatives identified locally by the LHIN through extensive community consultation to address local health-care challenges.

Many, not North Dundas, get increased provincial funding

WILLIAMSBURG — The Township of South Dundas will once again be on the receiving end of provincial funding in 2012.

Figures recently released by the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF), show that the southern municipality will receive \$1,046,000 this year, an increase of \$22,400 from 2011.

It is a sharp change from 2010, when the township saw its provincial share slashed by \$173,000.

Meanwhile, the Township of North Dundas was on the losing end of the funding system, with an allotment of \$958,700. That's down from \$962,400 in 2011.

It is now up to the townships' respective councils to determine what will be done with the funds.

OMPf assists municipalities with social program costs, includes equalization costs, addresses challenges faced by northern and rural communities, and responds to policing expenses in rural communities.

An increased number of municipal governments will be receiving assistance this year. According to the province's website, 416 municipalities will be receiving their share from \$1.8 billion this year. The total is up from 372 and \$577 million last year.

Other local municipalities receiving provincial input include: the Township of South Stormont (\$999,200), the Township of North Stormont (\$1,230,600), the Township of North Grenville (\$1,768,100), and the Township of Russell (\$665,000).



Dundas Manor moving forward after recent change of ownership

WINCHESTER — The campus of Winchester District Memorial Hospital is continuing its growth.

Late last month, Dundas Manor's operation came under the official control of Rural Healthcare Innovations (RHI), a non-profit corporation supported by the local hospital.

This change will soon be complemented by the to-be-constructed Centre of Excellence for Rural Health and Education. (According to WDMH CEO Cholly Boland, the facility is expected to be completed by November.)

The hospital's business case to the province regarding the new centre was the provision that it will not be taxpayer funded. As well, whatever money is borrowed will be paid back through the rent collected by the four agencies — the Ontario Early Years Centre, Jobzone d'emploi, the Champlain Community Care Access Centre, and the Eastern Ontario Health Unit — located in the building.

The expected price tag of the office building project is \$1 million.

For now, Karl Samuelson, who was hired in August 2011 as WDMH's vice-president of seniors' services, will be taking on the manor's administrator position.

"I am honoured to join the Dundas Manor team," he said in a press release. "To work with the excellent, dedicated

staff that puts forth extra effort to help care for the residents... Together, we will build on the family-focused legacy of the Alguire family."

It was Jack Alguire who opened Dundas Manor some 30 years ago, and until recently, his children kept the family tradition going.

"Our goal was to ensure that the chosen purchaser would continue to deliver the same high quality of care to our residents," said Ross. "We are confident that we have achieved this goal."

At present, RHI's board of directors

has taken over operations of Dundas Manor, while a purchased management agreement between the corporation and WDMH has been finalized.

Meanwhile, the new board is working in co-operation with the Champlain Local Health Integration Network, the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care, as well as the local hospital to re-develop the existing nursing home beds throughout the next several years.

Hospital staff has said the manor's current operating space may be expanded in the future.

Worm hotels coming to local institutions and county schools

MOUNTAIN — The All Things Food Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry (SD&G) Community Food Network is hoping community members want to give worms a place to stay.

With that in mind, the local organization is giving away grants to build habitats for the insects.

Known as a worm hotel, the stackable, wooden bin is not only home for worms, but also makes composting easy and convenient for anyone to do. It can be used both inside and outside to divert organic waste from the landfill and create nutrient-rich compost for gardens or houseplants.

The project is part of All

Things Food's overall efforts to promote sustainable food systems in SD&G. The network received a grant from TD Friends of the Environment Foundation to fund the project, and will begin disbursing funds this month.

Shelter from the storm...

Naomi's Family Resource Centre celebrates 25 years

WINCHESTER — Its legal name is Naomi's Family Resource Centre, but in Winchester and the surrounding area, the St. Lawrence Street shelter is known simply as "Naomi's House."

The facility has been a long-standing refuge for vulnerable women and kids in the area. In 2012, Naomi's is celebrating its 25th anniversary.

Today, the shelter is larger (having undergone two additions) and more services are offered. However, Naomi's, chiefly, continues to provide a safe space for abused and threatened women and youth to turn in their darkest hours.

"Overall, the core programs and services are still there," said Verna Léger, who has served as Naomi's executive director since 1998.

Besides the shelter itself, Naomi's also runs support groups, a 24-hour crisis line, and more.

In addition, Naomi's increases public awareness about violence toward women and children.

"We frequently get calls from the community, asking what resources are available," Léger said.

Christmas Room, Open Heart Campaign update

Each Christmas, Naomi's solicits gift donations from the community and runs a Christmas Room program. Typically, women who have accessed the shelter's services within the last year are able to pick out Christmas presents for their kids. (A separate room allows children to select presents for their mothers.)

In Christmas 2011, a donations drive called the Open Heart Campaign collected an estimated 700 donations. The campaign accounted for

about half of all contributions provided to Naomi's in 2011, Léger noted.

Butch Oldford and Elaine Tararu of Royal LePage co-ordinated gift collection drives in partnership with various local organizations and several volunteers. The community could leave gifts at drop-off points (including Leitrim Home Hardware, the Live & Learn Resource Centre and the Main Bar & Grill in Metcalfe, the Royal Bank of Canada in Winchester, TD Canada Trust in Chesterville, Winchester BMR, and Scotiabank in South Mountain).

Other organizations, such as churches, collected gifts for Naomi's independently of the Open Heart Campaign.

"We were able to assist about 51 women and 57 children," said Léger. She noted that, in addition, the level of community generosity was so strong that gifts were provided to other regional organizations that help people in need, such as the Dundas County Food Bank, Ye Olde Bargain Shoppe in Chesterville, Victim Services of Stormont, Dundas, Glengarry & Akwesasne, and the York Centre (which has supervised access centres in Cornwall and Hawkesbury where families experiencing difficulties can meet safely, without children witnessing conflicts between parties).

"There was tremendous contribution," said Léger of the Christmas Room effort.

Women's Day effort

Every year, Naomi's Family Resource Centre hosts a guest speaker and luncheon in honour of International Women's Day.

While details are still being worked out, at this point, it appears the Thurs., March 8 event will involve another luncheon celebration this year.

Break out the sewing machines and revive 'home ec'

When older generations accuse youth of being useless these days, it's not fair.

Not entirely, anyway.

Thanks to their high comfort levels with technology, young people have all sorts of wonderful skills on hand.

Often, they can fix the family computer.

Or hook up a cable TV.

Or explain the function of a cell phone's seemingly frivolous bells and whistles.

However, tech savviness aside, there's no denying that today's young people, as a demographic, are collectively deficient when it comes to home improvement skills, sewing, and cooking.

It's not totally their fault, though.

Decades ago, when home economics courses were deemed to be politically incorrect – and subsequently disappeared from high-school curriculums – schools stopped teaching many essential skills to male and female students alike. (How progressive!) The responsibility fell to Mom (or Dad) to teach their kids how to sew on buttons and hem pants; to cook a nutritious dinner and cleverly incorporate the leftovers into the next day's lunch; to shop intelligently on a budget; to wash windows and get the laundry done and vacuum and fold clothes neatly and clean the bathroom – without spending all day doing these chores, too. At the risk of romanticizing the effectiveness of home economics classes (as many people will tell you, some courses were nearly useless), it bears mentioning that the

subject itself had merit.

Similarly, today, woodworking and auto tech class remain optional courses – if schools offer the programs at all. North Dundas District High School offers excellent tech programs. However, they are not mandatory. In addition, many students who need to take math and science credits to pursue specific university or college programs find it difficult (or impossible) to find a spot in their high-school schedules for woodworking.

An educated young person's income advantage will disappear if he outsources too many tasks.

who graduate without the skills to take full control of their own food, clothing, and shelter. Once university, college, or full-time careers kick in, life gets busy. These folks (mostly young women) will unhappily buy piles of clothes and get frustrated – confused about why the one-shape-fits-all cut fails to flatter – rather than tailoring their own garments.

Both genders will be prone to ordering pizza, rather than cooking at home. They'll call a plumber

to fix a toilet when the chain has simply come loose. They'll buy a succession of cheap furniture pieces and replace them every few years as they get damaged, rather than finding sturdy-but-scratched dressers and dinner tables at the local thrift store and lovingly restoring them.

In other words, money will be dripping out their pockets like water from a leaky tap. Youth may be flocking to universities and colleges nowadays, but a generation's income advantage can quickly disappear if everyday tasks are constantly outsourced.

Of course, these young people can look up the information they need on the Internet. But there's a big difference between Googling a recipe and learning how to cook from scratch. That's why today's youth would rather order chicken wings than make their own at home, despite the expense. Many of these basic skills are intimidating to acquire.

In fact, young people probably feel like skittish seniors learning to use computers for the first time.

According to the Bank of Canada's January 2012 report, household spending is getting out of control and is projected to grow steadily into 2013. It's time for the Ontario curriculum to include at least one full-year mandatory credit in home economics and home maintenance. With electricity, oil, and food costs skyrocketing, families of the future must have as much control as possible over their budgets to maintain their financial independence and steer clear of avoidable debt.

1962



The wrong place at the wrong time with the wrong people

Every now and then, you have one of those moments. It's a snapshot that sticks with you in time. It's a frozen image.

It was just one of those moments that happened. You don't realize, when it happens, that it is one that will stick with you and etch itself into your memory bank.

But it did.

It was the end of January 2000. I can't remember which day. I was standing in front of the Hilton in downtown Atlanta with a friend who worked at a company called Playoff, which has now evolved into Panini USA.

We ran into each other in the lobby and were both trying to get to the NFL Experience, a FanFest held for two weeks before the Super Bowl.

There was an ice storm, and Atlanta was at a standstill. They don't have salt trucks and plows and dirt and the army of workers to go out and deal with weather and conditions that are routine to us.

Buses weren't running. Taxis were few and far between. Then, with music blaring, a white stretch hummer limo came bouncing and booming by. A few minutes later, it came by again. The doorman shook his head. "There he goes again," he said.

"I wonder who that is," I said.

"Ray Lewis," the doorman said. "He's been on the town with his posse in that limo all week."

Hours after Kurt Warner led the Rams to the Super Bowl, Ray Lewis, the young linebacker of the Baltimore Ravens, was charged with murder. He and his friends ended up, in their limo, in the section of Atlanta known as Buckhead. They were out clubbing, and a brawl erupted in the parking lot. Two men were left dead, stabbed to death.

Ray Lewis, the best defensive player in the NFL, was in an Atlanta jail.

That was the news we all awoke to on Monday morning.

All I could think of was the bouncing limo and the words every coach tells every player. Nothing good ever happens after 1 am.

Lewis' big problems began when he lied to the police when he was first questioned. He said he didn't know his two buddies, Reginald Oakley and Joseph Sweeting, who had been with him in the bouncing limo.

Their limo driver, Duane Fassett, had told police that he saw Lewis throw a punch and that he struck the guy from the mid-chest up. Fassett also said that he heard Oakley and Sweeting talking and one said, "I stabbed mine." Fassett also said that Lewis ordered the other cab drivers to keep quiet.

The incident brought the two sides of Ray Lewis' life to the forefront. Many people rushed to defend his character. No one in football could believe the charges. Ray

Lewis was kind hearted and intelligent, and hard working. He used the money he made to make the life of his mother better.

He talked to kids about the dangers of involvement in drugs. Players Inc., the marketing arm of the NFLPA, considered him a model citizen to represent NFL players.

But there was also a dark side of Ray Lewis' past.

His mother, Buffy Jenkins, was just 15 when he was born. He grew up in a single family home after his father abandoned the family when Ray was a child. He was born Ray Jenkins, then his father, Ray Jackson, changed his son's name to Jackson.

When he entered Lakeland (Florida) High School, he changed his last name to Lewis, the name of the man his mother was dating at the time. In high school, he left home to live with his grandparents and became a football star and the state wrestling champion. But while that was happening, two of his closest friends were murdered in separate incidents.

He became one of the University of Miami's best players in school history, but ran into trouble when he was twice accused of striking women. He was never charged.

He also had to endure the personal loss of one of his closest friends on the Miami team, as Marlin Barnes and his girlfriend were bludgeoned to death.

Lewis was so distraught he could not attend the funeral service, and instead paced around the outside of the church during the service.

Eventually, Ray Lewis' case went to court. Charges against Lewis were dropped in exchange for testimony against his friends. The limo driver backed off on his story, claiming he never actually saw Lewis throw a punch. Lewis was charged with obstructing justice, and was given a one-year probation sentence. Oakley and Sweeting were later acquitted.

"All I'm guilty of is being in the wrong place at the wrong time with the wrong people," Lewis would say. "But I feel like what I'm most guilty of is being successful."

That quote always stuck with me. I saw Ray Lewis, in his bouncing limo with his buddies and with Duane Fassett driving, before they would arrive at the wrong place at the wrong time.

The following year, in Tampa, I didn't see Ray Lewis and his limo bouncing around town. He was getting ready to play in the Super Bowl.

Ray Lewis, less than a year after sitting in an Atlanta jail charged with murder, was the NFL Defensive Player of the Year and led his Baltimore Ravens to a convincing 34-7 win over the New York Giants in the Super Bowl.

And that day, all he was guilty of was being in the right place at the right time.

Want to know where your tax dollars go?

OTTAWA — Many constituents have asked me, "Where does the government spend all the taxes it receives?" Now, that is a great question. I am sure many of you have asked yourself the same question.

Since we are fast approaching tax time, I thought the following information explaining where your tax dollars go might ease the pain of doing your taxes, just a bit.

This is a breakdown of how your tax dollar is spent:

- Public Safety - three cents
- Canada Revenue Agency - three cents
- Crown Corporations - four cents
- Canada Social Transfer - four cents
- Children's Benefits - five cents
- Other major transfers to other levels of government - six cents
- Employment Insurance - seven cents
- Defence - eight cents
- Canada Health Transfers - 10 cents
- Public Debt Charges - 11 cents
- Other Operations - 12 cents
- Other Transfer Payments - 14 cents
- Support to Elderly - 13 cents

Now that you know where the money is spent, you should also know where it comes from.

During 2010-2011, the federal government received \$237.1 billion in revenues.

These revenues came from:

- Personal income tax - \$113.5 billion, or almost 48 cents of every dollar raised in revenues.
- Corporate income tax - \$30 billion, close to 13 cents of every dollar.
- Goods and Services Tax - \$28.4 billion, or 12 cents of every dollar.
- A number of other taxes —



such as non-resident withholding taxes, customs import duties, energy taxes and excise taxes, and duties on alcohol and tobacco — made up \$19.7 billion, or more than eight cents of each dollar in revenues.

• Employment Insurance premiums contributed \$17.5 billion, or almost seven cents of every

dollar in revenues.

• Other revenues such as earnings by Crown Corporations and revenues from sales and services provided the remaining \$28.1 billion or 12 cents of every tax dollar.

As you can see, running a country involves a lot of expenses. Our challenge in crafting the upcoming budget will be to maintain revenues while finding ways to reduce the expenses. I am confident that, under the direction of Prime Minister Stephen Harper and Finance Minister Jim Flaherty, we are up to the challenge.

Stormont County possible destination for 2015 IPM

FINCH — A pitch to bring the 2015 International Plowing Match (IPM) to Stormont County has received praise from the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry (SD&G).

Finch-area farmer Jeff Waldroff is leading the charge to bring the decades-old agricultural event to the region.

Having received not only support, but an in-principle loan of \$100,000 from the counties, a pitch will soon be made to the Ontario Plowmen's Association (OPA), the governing body of all IPM events.

Waldroff, who is the director of the Stormont chapter of the OPA, has told local media he is confident the bid will be successful.

If approved, it will mark the first time since 1958 that the event will be held in Stormont County.

The 2012 IPM event will be held in Roseville, Ont., near Kitchener, in September.

Cottontail line won't be culled: farmer

HALLVILLE — It appears Bruce Straby's cottontail cows won't be heading to the slaughterhouse after all.

The Greely resident — whose farm is located on French Settlement Road — said he has received about 10 offers to purchase his 23-head herd of unusual, fluffy-tailed critters.

The now-jubilant amateur farmer said his phone has been "ringing off the hook" following a Wed., Jan. 25 news article in the *Winchester Press* and subsequent coverage from other media outlets.

Straby has spent almost two decades dabbling in experimental genetic engineering. In 1993, one of his animals was born with a puffy, white tail, which Straby dismissed as a bizarre mutation.

Through selective breeding, it appears Straby has been able to make the appendage a stable genetic trait in his Red Angus beef cows. However, with retirement on the horizon, and his farmland in the process of being sold, Straby was unsure if he could physically continue to farm. Ideally, he aimed to find a family (preferably with kids in 4-H)

who would promise to continue developing the cottontail line.

During a telephone call last week to the *Press*, a relieved-sounding Straby agreed that due to the recent public interest, the animals are unlikely to be culled like normal beef cows.

However, the herd hasn't been sold yet. "I'm still in command; it's still my baby," Straby said.

He noted that Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has also contacted him and expressed an interest in studying the cottontails to learn more about the line.


Hairless heroes**Locks lost, \$6,200 gained in Metcalfe fundraiser**

The South Nation Delta chapter pays for youth aged 12 to 15 years of age to get their apprentice hunting licenses after they have been put through a multi-faceted training course.

SNC general manager Dennis O'Grady said the partnership with Delta Waterfowl has proved to be rewarding for both parties.

"Essentially, both organizations are dedicated to the same cause: environmental protection and habitat enhancement," O'Grady said. "Hunting is going to happen, so it's best to ensure hunters become responsible and environmentally aware at a young age."
