Autumn in the Country

Russell artists showcase works at weekend exhibition

RUSSELL — This village has become somewhat of an artist's sanctuary.

Jo Cannons, a four-year Russell resident, points out that 120 people living in Russell were tallied up by the Chamber of Commerce in 1986 as having velding licences — in other words, they sell their work.

And the majority of this work, in one form or another, is art.

Jo, 47, agreed that more than 100 artists making Russell their home is a large slice of the approximately 1,500 residents living in this quiet, scenic village.

"It's almost an underground business," says Jo, describing the number of residents plying their artistic abilities in areas ranging from print-making to painting, pottery to pastels.

Like Jo, however, many of Russell's artistic people hold down regular nine-to-five jobs, leaving their leisure time for creative hobbies.

"I never looked at it as a money-making endeavor," says Jo, describing the years she has spent making quilts.

She says it would take about 100 hours to make a bed quilt from scratch, with a quality finished product only fetching between \$350 to \$400.

"That's less than minimum wage. So there has to be more than a monetary reward."

"The work is intrinsic," explains Jo, who has a minor in art from the University of British Columbia to complement her degree in teaching. She said she enjoys passing along her skill to others through her quilting classes. "The rewards of teaching are great."

Jo says she was attracted to quilting because she likes working with a variety of colors and designs. The pattern ideas for Jo's quilts come straight from her head, not from books.

Her art plays a large part in the decor of her home with quilts covering the beds and hanging on the walls.

"It's pleasing to decorate your house with your own work. It has your own personality. I could never have an interior decorator take care of the house," she said.

Recently starting work as an assistant administrator with The Minto Skating Club, the mother of two has found less time to spend quilting.

But she plans to exhibit some of her work at the Autumn In The Country 1988 Art And Craft Exhibition on Oct. 1 and 2 in Russell.

Jo, one of 12 local artists planning to bring their work to the show, will display a selection of her bed and wall quilts and her jackets which have quilt embroidered patterns.

This is the second year the Russell Artist's Co-operative have brought together their local talent and showcased it during a special exhibit.

Jo says the show offers her a chance to advertise what she does.

"Showing off, if you will. There is a lot of pleasure in watching someone stand there and say they like your work," she said.

Jo helped initiate last year's show which drew about 800 visitors. The 1988 exhibit will include the work of special guest artist Joe Fleming of Toronto, who will bring a sampling of his acrylics. In all, 13 artists will exhibit in two heritage homes while in a third will be a display of artifacts and images from Russell's past.

House tours of three other distinguished homes in the village will also be offered.

Among the numerous Russell artists not in the co-operative, Jo says it is a shame some are simply too busy to participate in the exhibit.

She points to local artist Dick Sherwood as a prime example. She says Sherwood makes "wonderful" rocking chairs as well as other impressive woodwork, but she adds it is unfortunate he doesn't have sufficient time to put together enough of his work for a display.

Someone who has a large sample of his art available for next month's show is Jo's husband, Tony. He will be displaying his wood carvings of birds.

For the past four years, Tony, 49, has been working at the art of capturing in wood, the detail of this winged envy of man, waterfowl. As a boy, Tony recalls engaging in a fair amount of woodworking with his father, who would make toys for his kids.

Tony admits his interest in carving stems from his early introduction to shaping wood.

Like his wife, Tony indulges in his art for the enjoyment and not to make money.

However, since he makes between 15 and 20 pieces every year, Tony must sell some of his work to avoid a clutter of birds in his family nest.

Tony admits he can become emotionally tied to some of his carvings. "Sometimes you get enamoured with a piece and it's hard to let it go," he said.

While particularly fond of capturing loons and geese in his work, Tony ventures out to museums or a nearby pond to find his art models.

Tony describes the satisfaction of his art as "being able to take a raw hunk of wood and bring something out."

He says he tries to put some animation into his carvings in addition to paying close attention to detail, making the end result seem more alive.

As his own critic, Tony asks himself a few questions about each carving when it is completed.

"First I ask it is better than what I've done in the past? Second, I ask what is it lacking? I don't have trouble picking out the faults. It brings you down to reality."

Like the avid golfer who may try to mold his

swing around that of a Jack Nicklaus, Tony also emulates professionals.

Tony listed Al Bradey of London, Ontario, Pat Godin of Brantford and Brockville's Les Boszormeny as wood carvers extraordinaire, all offering him a high level of quality craftsmanship to work towards.

"All three are perfectionists," said Tony, describing the artists who are good enough to make a living from their craft. "They try to convey the whole bird. They are very intricate in their work."

Tony says artists like Bradey, who spends up to a month creating just one wood carving of a bird, consider it a form of flattery to have amateur artists look at his work as a model for their own pieces.

A military staff officer with the Department of National Defence, Tony admits he is eager to judge the reaction people will have to his wood carving exhibit at next month's show.

"We're all egotistical (artists), I suppose," Tony said he derives a great deal of satisfaction from positive feedback.

"If others say it (carving) is a likeness, I'm happy," he said.

A member of the co-operative, Tony says he

finds the artists in the group supportive of each other's work.

But he points out he wants honest comments about his work from his peers. "If another artist sees something they don't like I want them to tell me. I want to know," he said.

Tony says he has always been interested in learning the different reasons people wish to purchase his work and wood carvings of birds in general.

From the responses he has received, Tony says "a lot of people associate it (a wood carving of a bird) with Canada and its wildlife."

"Take a gull, the way they hang in the air or just sitting on a post. This is a good bird to carve."

Tony's interest in wood carving is reserved for the birds. He says he doesn't have the same interest in carving animals.

He is always trying to improve the quality of his carvings and hopes one day to reach the level he is seeking.

"I suppose we all like to reach a level where our work is valuable." That level, says Tony, would be reached if and when other artists truthfully convey they can't see anything wrong with the carving.

Farm Update

Sandy Crest best in the east

KEMPTVILLE — Sandy Crest Holstein of Arnprior came away the big winner at this year's Eastern Ontario/Western Quebec Holstein Championship Show at the Kemptville College of Agricultural Technology.

Competing amongst 80 exhibitors showing 192 Holsteins, premier exhibitor and premier breeder was awarded to Sandy Crest Holstein while Seelby Holsteins was runner-up in both categories.

The Holstein Show was held Sept. 22 at the A.M. Barr Arena, marking the second straight year the championship has been held here. Starting in Kemptville back in the early 1940s, the show moved to Ottawa after about 40 years.

Secretary/treasurer Lois Keyes says the Holstein Championship Show Committee plans to keep the event in this town of 2,400 because the location is convenient and the "facilities are excellent. The college is very accommodating."

Preparations for the show are ironed out during six or seven committee meetings leading up to the annual event. The awards committee must come up with the prizes which include trophies for first place finishes, ribbons for the top 10 in each class and prize money for the 10 best in each class.

First place prize money for senior classes is \$110 and top spot in the junior categories is worth \$55.

But the prize money is not what brings the exhibitors out to the competition. It's the opportunity to promote the goods.

Frank Nyveld of Bristol, Quebec took home top spot in the Progeny of Dam class but said no one shows for the prize money, mainly for promotion.

Nyveld, 30, said the prize money doesn't cover his personal costs to exhibit in the shows. He said expenses like trucking and labor will cost him about \$250 for the championship.

There is also a \$10 entry fee for each animal in each class. The fee is raised to \$25 for late entries.

Fred Stuyt of Richmond agrees there is no money in showing. "The profit comes down the road when you bring people back to the farm to see what you have," he said.

Stuyt said there isn't really any way to mold a Holstein into winning form. The animal has to "have it in them to begin with." Stuyt called breeding the most important stage in determining the quality of the Holstein.

Sandy Snedden, the show's

judge, listed among the important criteria in judging, size and stature, dairy character, openness and the quality of the base in the feet and legs.

Snedden, who has been judging similar shows for 20 years, said it is an honor to be chosen for a championship of this calibre.

Because of time constraints, Snedden said he must decide rather quickly which Holsteins are superior in each class.

There were 17 classes for Snedden to deal with for the overall winners.

The grand champion was Lochill Marleen, owned by Carmen Howes of Dalkeith. Pickland Unique Betty, owned by Roger Turner and Bev Brennan of Gananoque and Marysville, was named reserve grand champion and Melville and Wilmur McLean of Gananoque are owners of Stoneden Enhancer Rose, named honorable mention grand champion.

The junior champion was Mirabel He-Man Lise owned by Ferme Mirabel. Stadacona Starbuck Shannon, owned by Robert and Marcel St. Denis of Notre

Dame Delapais, Quebec, was the reserve junior champion. Showcase He-Man Erica, owned by Agriculture Canada Dairy Showcase, took the honorable mention champion category.

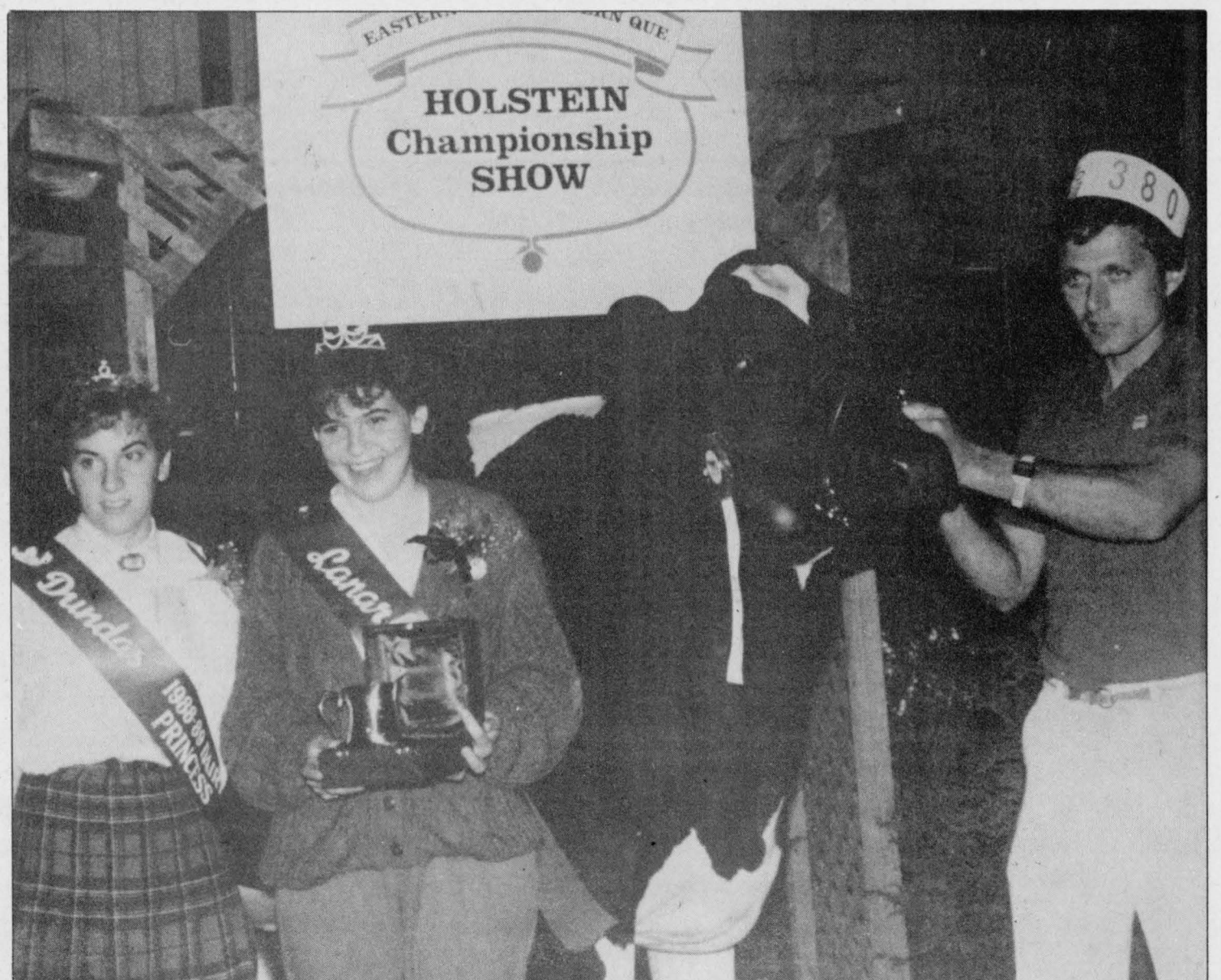

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Risk of silo gas increased: Humphries

WINCHESTER — Unusually dry weather conditions this summer has increased potential for production of deadly gases after corn is ensiled, making fatal accidents a very real possibility.

Nitrogen dioxide is a by-product of the fermentation process that occurs after plant material is put into a silo. The potential for toxic gas formation increases dramatically when crops are stressed as is the case in 1988.

"I've warned farmers," said agricultural representative Bob Humphries of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food office in Winchester. "During dry weather the instances of nitrogen dioxide,

which comes from the stems of the plant, increases dramatically."

Humphries said the number of fatalities across the province each year attributed to silo gas is staggering and each year there is potential danger for farmers.

"The ultimate precaution is to use a self-contained breathing apparatus like fire departments have," said Humphries. "But farmers don't find that very practical."

"If farmers have to go into a silo for any reason, they should run the silo blower for at least 10 to 15 minutes before hand. The gas is heavier than air and the blower could disperse the gas."

A second precaution is to post a

sign near the silo, within the period of corn fermentation, advising visitors and workers of the danger of silo gas.

"The best bit of advice is to stay away from the silo for at least two weeks," said Humphries. "In a couple of weeks there won't be a hazard. There is always the possibility of silo gas whether there is a drought or not but you only make that mistake once."

To reduce potential for silo gas buildup, the Farm Safety Association suggests farmers try to avoid harvesting immediately after a rainfall. But crops that are damaged by hail or frost should be harvested as quickly as possible because of the

danger of nitrate buildup in plant tissues.

The deadly gas may be visible as a yellowish-brown haze within a few hours of silo filling. A bleach-like odor is a definite indicator of silo gas danger. Dead flies and birds at the base of the silo also point to the presence of toxic gas.

Depending upon the concentration of nitrogen dioxide, the presence of silo gas may be recognized by a burning sensation in the nose, throat and chest. More often than not, exposure to heavy concentration will lead to instantaneous death. Lower silo gas concentrations can produce extensive lung damage and death can still result hours after exposure.

Area farmers to question official on international trade

WINCHESTER — It's a small world. You hear the expression time and time again, but few may realize just how small it is. Farmers know. Domestic issues and international issues are inextricably linked.

Events in Europe and across the world bring serious consequences for every farmer in Dundas County, few more important than the current round of talks on the General Agreement on Trade and Tariffs.

On Oct. 5, the Dundas Federation of Agriculture will meet at the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food office in Winchester to discuss possible repercussions from GATT negotiations.

Dr. Jim Martin, executive director of planning and co-ordination at the federal Department of Agriculture will speak to and answer questions on GATT Article 11 and decoupling.

"Many farmers don't understand fully what is going on and these are important issues," said DFA president Max Sabey.

The subjects are bound to arise at the Ontario Federation of Agriculture convention in November when policy is set, added Sabey.

Decoupling is an attempt to reduce incentives for over-production, presently common in Europe. The over-production results in

dumping and a strain on the global economy.

"Some people view it as being one possible way of redesigning agricultural programs around the world," said Martin.

He said decoupling is closely related to designs of safety net programs and the Agricultural Stabilization Act.

Article 11 of GATT permits nations to allow reduced access to markets and nations such as Canada to retain marketing boards which may reduce access to markets.

Martin said the Canadian position at GATT is to get rid of trade distortions.

It would seem decoupling and Article 11 run contrary to each other. Martin says no. He said Canadian supply management works well within the international sphere.

"You look at Canadian supply management and the European way of doing business and it becomes very clear who's causing trade problems. We don't provide incentives which lead to dumping. We don't overshoot the mark."

Martin said decoupling is related to implementing a proper way to set up incentives, but adds, "a lot of things aren't well understood; what this beast decoupling is and how it relates to Canadian agriculture."

He hopes to answer some of those questions Oct. 5.

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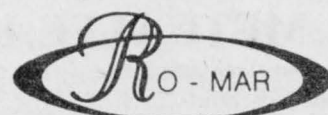
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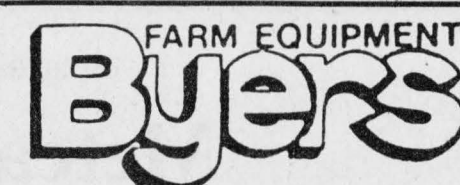


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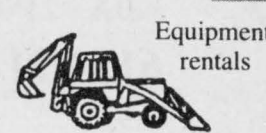
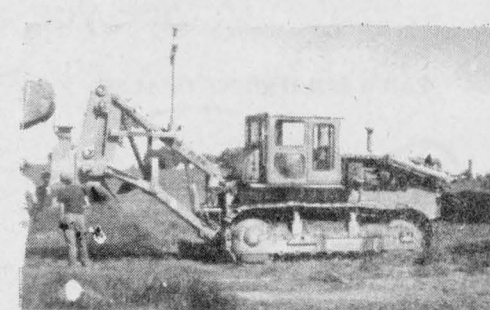

Food prices higher

OTTAWA — Retail food prices rose by .3 per cent in August according to Agriculture Canada economists. Compared to 1987, the food index is up 3.8 per cent.

The largest price increase was for sugar but consumers also paid more for poultry, up three per cent and 2.9 per cent more for eggs.

Orange juice graded

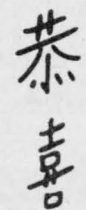
OTTAWA — As of next January, consumers will be able to buy frozen concentrated orange juice based on quality, not just price.

Grading will come into effect Jan. 1, 1989. Agriculture Canada has adopted the A-B-C grading system with grade A indicating top quality. The juice will be graded on acidity, flavor and color.

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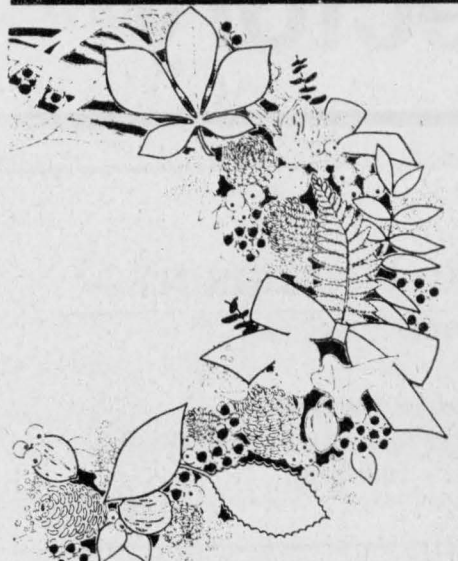


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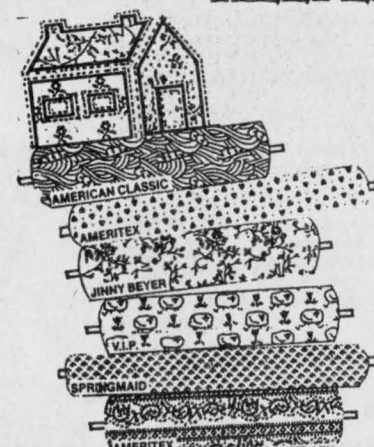
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

Metcalfe Fair opens Thursday

METCALFE — Organizers are hoping for fair weather as the 132nd Metcalfe Fair prepares for its opening Sept. 29.

Fair secretary Ida Craig said that despite rain during the past few years, attendance has been at a respectable level but organizers are hoping more favorable conditions will increase the number of visitors.

"It's been very good considering the bad weather. We're certainly looking forward to a good crowd," she said.

The fair, to be held Sept. 29 to Oct. 2, has experienced rain since moving from mid-September to late September and early October. The move was made to accommodate the Carleton County 4-H Championship Shows.

The Horse and Calf Shows will be held Oct. 1. The 4-H Junior Agriculture Show, the East Carleton 4-H Horse Show and the 4-H Sheep Show will be held Sept. 30.

Along with the weather, the fair board is also looking for help from the community. The Metcalfe Agricultural Society is hoping for support in its aim to build an extension to its barn. The barn is now used for the sheep show.

"We're in the process now of deciding to add a 60x60 ft. addition," said Craig.

The extension will help make the barn a more viable second ring for livestock judging and eliminate use of the arena.

"Maybe down the road we won't have to put earth in the centre," she said. The centre would be used for other shows and help attract a larger crowd to the fair's dances.

New at this year's fair will be a polo game Sept. 29. The match will help open the Metcalfe Fair and is replacing the farmers' bonanza.

"Although the bonanza was well received, we thought people might be getting tired of the same program," said Craig.

CJET's Hal Botham will start the game at 7 p.m. Admission to the game is \$2.50 for adults and \$1 for children 12 years of age and under.

Drawing as much attention as the musical shows, will be the fall fashion show Oct. 2. Craig said the show, put on by CountryBoy, CountryGirl of Winchester, is usually packed with area residents viewing the new fashions modelled by local people.

The 132nd Metcalfe Fair officially opens Sept. 29 with a number of notable guests. The fair board is hoping MPP Norm Sterling, MP Bill Tupper, mayor Albert Bowers and Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton chairman Andy Hayden will be among the guests attending the opening.

The meeting was then turned over to Jean Reaney who gave a paper on citizenship and also a note on George Hees who is stepping out of politics at the age of 80.

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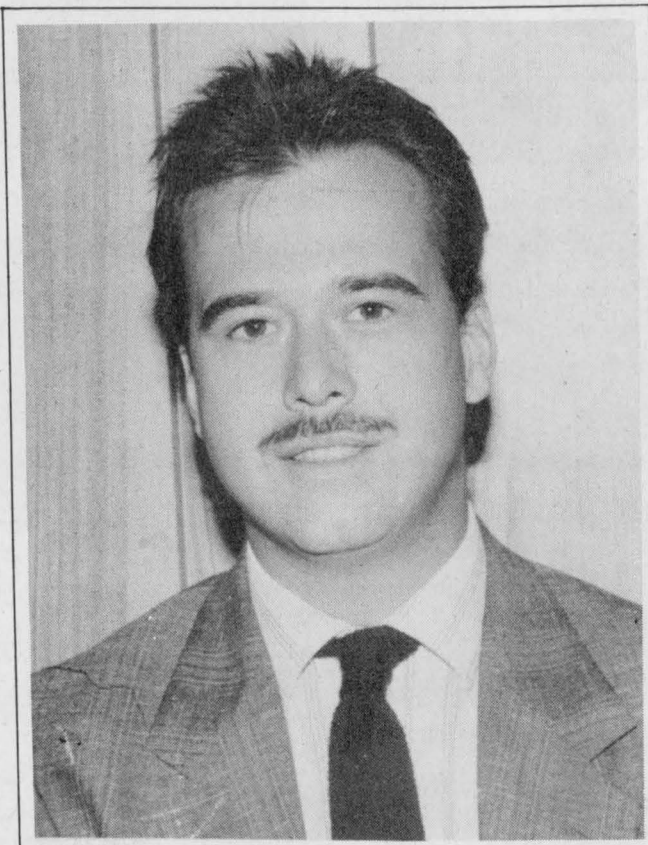
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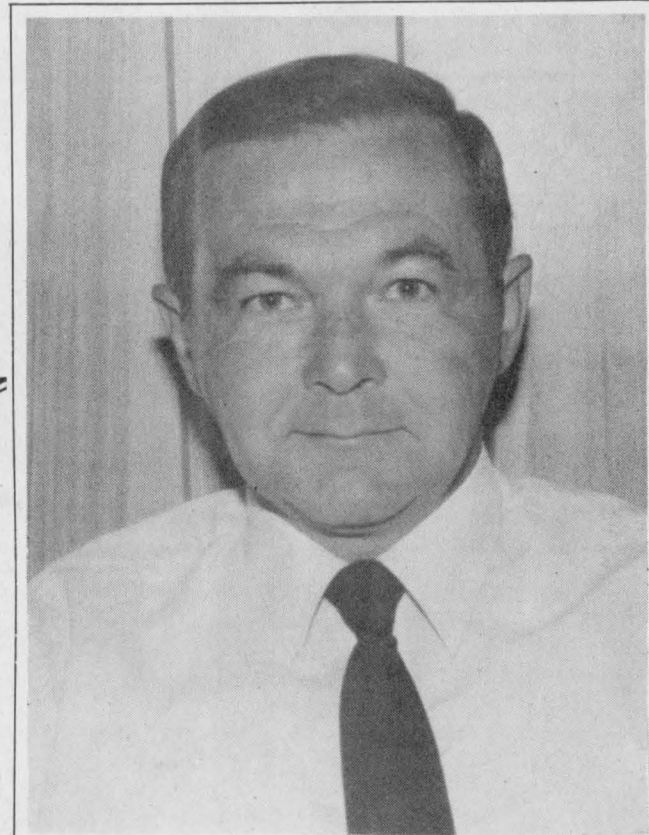
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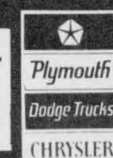


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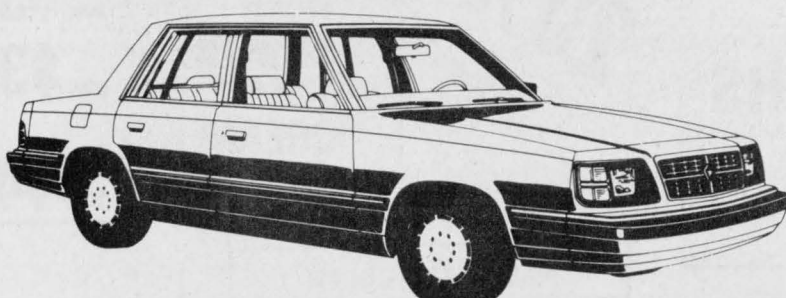
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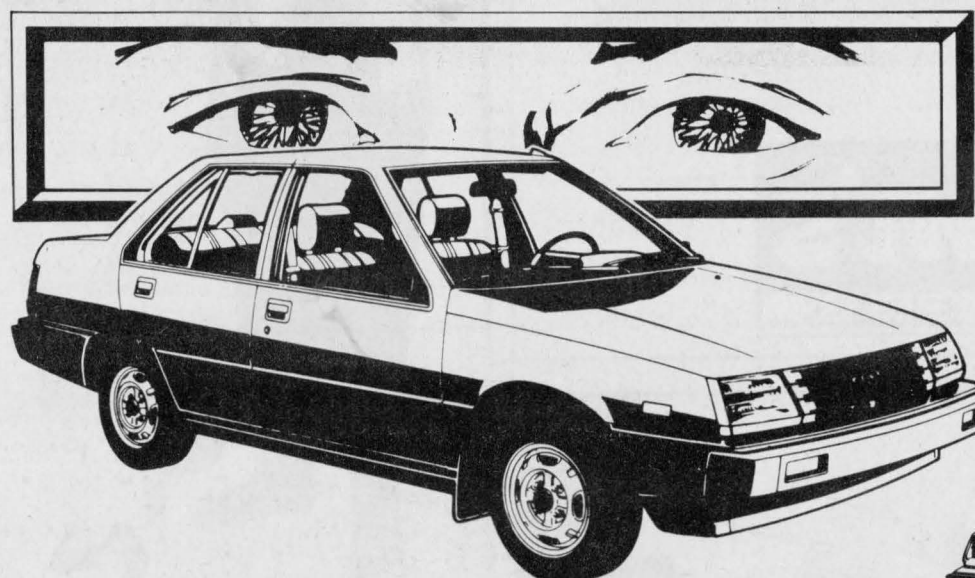
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
