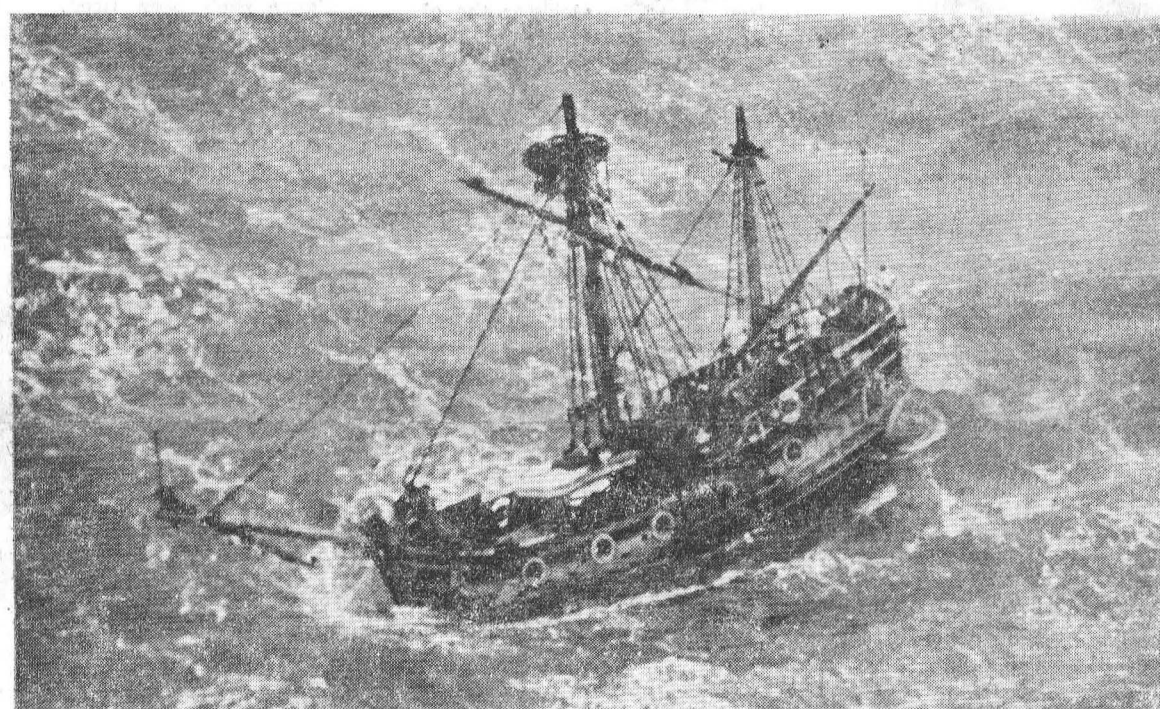

## Chosen For Research Project

Three Eastern Ontario towns have been chosen by a medical student at McGill University to conduct a summer research project for the Department of Epidemiology and Health, McGill, for the purpose of determining the prevalence of high blood pressure and the average blood pressure in women aged 40 to 54. The three communities are Iroquois, Rockland and Alexandria.

The medical student, Martin Cole, has asked The Post to inform residents of this project so that he may obtain the cooperation of villagers in that age group in completing the project.

The study for this summer con-

sists of two visits: one this week and one a month from now. Blood pressure is measured twice on each occasion and a few questions are asked about health, pregnancies, smoking and drinking habits and diet, and Mr. Cole noted that all information given is kept confidential.

Each visit takes about ten minutes and the student expressed his wish for all possible cooperation to assist him in completing his summer project.

The Post gladly endorses the young man and asks for the cooperation of the public in this project. He will be starting Friday in Iroquois.

## Slight Increase Village Tax Rate

The 1970 tax rate has been set for the Village of Iroquois and shows slight increases in almost all departments except for a slight drop of less than one mill for County purposes. Public School supporters came out faring better than their counterparts on the Separate School levy, as is shown by the itemized scale below.

Of the total amount to be col-

lected in total revenues for 1970 of \$600,800, 41% will be raised by realty and business taxes imposed for municipal and school board purposes, while the Province of Ontario's contributions will amount to 51% of the total. The remaining 8% is raised from other municipal and school board revenues.

### BREAKDOWN OF RATES

The rate for General Municip-

al Purposes, Residential, is 16.28 mills, (up 1.83 mills) and for Commercial 20.98 mills (up 2.53 mills).

The County Rate is 18.85 mills (down 0.74 mills).

The High School rate, residential, is 26.45 mills (up 1.47 mills), and commercial is 29.39 mills (up 1.64 mills).

The Public School rate, residential, is 14.59 mills, (up 2.09 mills) and commercial is 16.21 mills (up 2.21 mills).

The Separate School rate, residential, is 18.75 mills (up 4.81 mills) and commercial is 20.83 mills (up 5.36 mills).

The total rates for Public School Supporters are: Residential 76.17 mills (up 4.65 mills)

Commercial 85.43 mills (up 5.64 mills)

The total rates for Separate School Supporters are: Residential 80.33 mills (up 7.37 mills)

Commercial 90.05 mills (up 8.79 mills)

## Ontario Announces Minimum Wage Rates

The Minister of Labour today announced increases in Ontario's minimum wage rates.

The Honourable Dalton Bales said the general rate would be increased from the present \$1.30 hourly to \$1.50 effective next October 1st, and to \$1.65 on April 1, 1971.

### FORMER RESIDENT NAMED DUNDAS BANK MANAGER

He also said that regulations giving effect to the new rates and learner and student rates will be developed and announced during the summer.

The minimum wage was first established in Ontario in 1963 with the general rate at \$1 hourly and the construction rate at \$1.25

The general rate was increased to \$1.30 and the construction rate to \$1.55 on January 1, 1969.

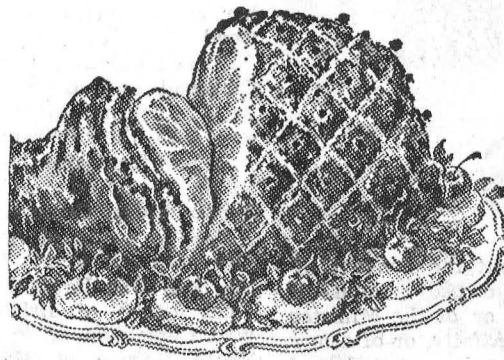

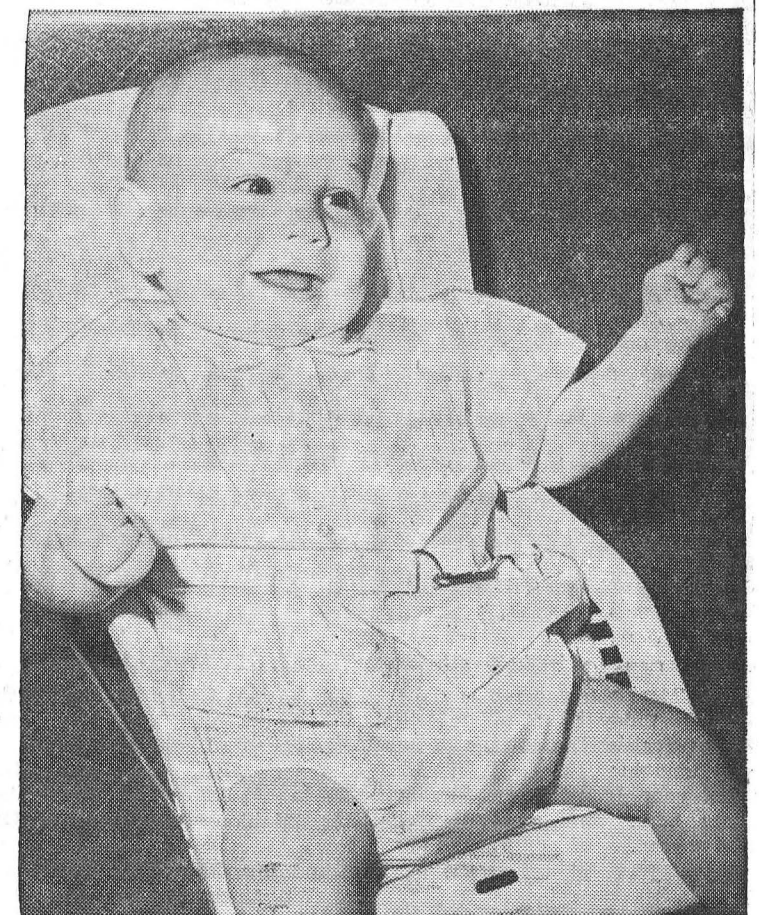

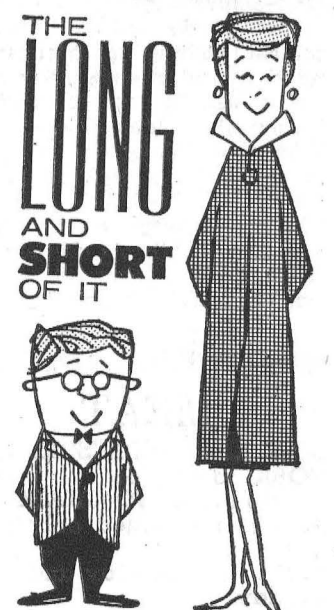

## Ontario Legislature Ends For Recess

The Ontario Legislature has risen for the summer recess to reconvene again in October in order to finish the business of the Province for this year. Over fifty Bills were given Royal Assent on the Friday to be absorbed into huge mass of laws, rules and regulations under which our society presently struggles.

The final week fore adjournment was marked by some lengthy and acrimonious debate, an extra morning sitting on the Wednesday when the House sat continuously without luncheon break from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.; and two late night sittings, on Tuesday till 1:45 a.m. and on Thursday till 2:15 a.m.

The Minister of Labour announced increases in our provincial minimum wage to be effective on October 1st, 1970 and on April 1st, 1971. While the increases are moderate to \$1.50 and \$1.65 they do mean a considerable increase in expense to many persons requiring casual unskilled help.

Further legislation introducing more stringent controls on the operation and noise of snowmobiles on provincial roads and giving similar powers to local municipalities over their roads was introduced so that operators and dealers alike could have the opportunity of complying with them before the next season.

A Bill of much interest in many areas, particularly rural townships, enacted last week will bring under subdivision control all lands in Ontario. This, of course, means, no one may sell off any part, large or small, of

his land without the consent of a Committee of Adjustments if such there be or of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, or of a new local body to be created and known as a Land Division Committee. While in principle the idea and law is sound and most needed in many parts of Ontario, there are many rural areas where it would appear not yet necessary although the law, of course, applies to the whole province.

The announcement by Donald C. MacDonald, Leader of the New Democratic Party in Ontario, that he was stepping down from that position at the 1970 Party Convention this Fall will bring out the many disagreements and animosities among the Legislative Caucus of this Party which observers have seen smoldering for some time. Mr. MacDonald entered the Legislature in 1955 at the same time as your Member. Then the Party was represented in the Legislature by only three members, now, as he announces retirement from leadership, the Party counts twenty-one members which cannot but reflect great success over these fifteen years by Mr. MacDonald in his leadership role. Many observers believe he will change his decision and again contest the leadership this year — only the coming of the Party Convention will settle this.

When the Legislature reconvenes in the Fall, I would hope again to report briefly each week on events at Queens Park. May I express my appreciation to the Editor for his courtesy in

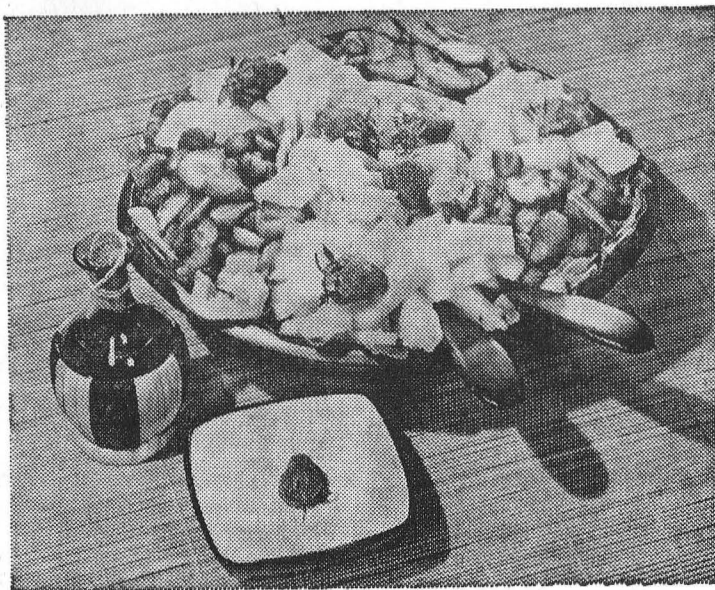
# Church School Picnic

### FORESTRY FIELD DAY

Last Saturday, June 20th, Kempsville District's first forestry field day and tour was held for persons holding agreements under the Woodlands Improvement Act.

The purpose of the field day was to acquaint the owners with their forest protection obligations and to offer them an opportunity to discuss plantation management problems with forestry officials.

Approximately 100 people attended the tour as well as members of the Kempsville District Staff. The group met at the Kempsville College of Agricultural Technology for registration and a brief slide presentation on forest plantation protection problems. Buses were then boarded for a tour around the G. Howard Ferguson Tree Nursery. Following the nursery tour, Mr. Q.F. Hess, Supervisor of Reforestation operations introduced Mr. A. J. Herridge, Timber Branch Chief from Toronto who spoke to the group on the Woodlands Improvement Act programme. Mr. Herridge then planted a ceremonial hard maple with the assistance of a couple of eager young tree planters.

The group then journeyed to Rideau Provincial Park for lunch. After lunch two privately owned plantations were visited. At both properties successful plantations were seen.

Limerick Forest Headquarters near Robuck was the last stop and plantation owners viewed and discussed a 34 year old stand of red pine. Some common insects and disease problems were discussed and samples of each were shown.

The tour finished around 5 p.m. back at the Kempsville College of Agricultural Technology. Since most felt that the tour was a worthwhile venture it is hoped that another will be held next year.

### INSECT NOTES by Mike Millar Management Forester Jack Pine Sawfly

The Jack pine sawfly is now out in full force in various parts of the Kempsville District. This small caterpillar has a black head and usually just attacks the Jack pine. The sawfly feed in colonies on the old needles only and thus the new needles are able to sustain the tree provided the tree is not attacked year after year. Spray with malathion or methoxychlor as soon as larvae appear. Follow instructions on the manufacturer's label.

**Yellow-headed Spruce Sawfly**  
The yellow-headed spruce sawfly is also present at this time of year. The caterpillars feed during June at first only on new foliage until they are half-grown and then on both new and old foliage. Repeated feeding year after year can kill the tree. For control use the same treatment as for the Jack pine sawfly.
