Stampville Centre building sold New life for old schools

WILLIAMSBURG — Declining enrolment has forced the closure of several schools in Dundas County, but some of the buildings are getting a new lease on life.

The most recent is the former Stampville school property on County Road 16 west of Morrisburg. The building was closed as an educational facility some years ago, but continued to serve as a community centre until this past June. At that time, Township of South Dundas council declared the municipally owned structure to be surplus.

The new proprietor wants to redevelop the Stampville site to allow for a living unit, carpentry shop, and accessory apartment. There are also plans in the works to convert the former gymnasium into a daycare. Nothing is official yet, however.

Old schools, new beginnings

The Stampville site is just one of many former school buildings that

have been, or might be, converted into a different type of facility.

The former Dixons Corners school sat abandoned for a number of years. It was purchased by a group of local entrepreneurs this year. It is now home to a community centre.

Inkerman's Hendricks Seeds purchased the hamlet's former school building, with the aim of establishing a research facility inside.

Morewood-area resident Jacques Thibault scooped up that village's former school. Thibault plans to develop a 10-unit apartment complex, and possibly a daycare facility in the future. (The plans are tentative at this point, with a public meeting to discuss the proposal expected to be scheduled for some time in the near future.)

A fifth school being considered for redevelopment is the old Morrisburg High School. Discussions between South Dundas personnel and staff at the St. Lawrence Medical Clinic are ongoing.

Deputy warden to be named in January

CORNWALL — The next deputy-warden for the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry (SD&G) council is expected to be named in January.

At this time, only Ian MacLeod, deputy-mayor for the Township of South Glengarry, and Bill McGimpsey, deputyMayor Robert Gillard, who served as the counties' deputywarden for the past year-long term. Gillard was defeated by Jim Locke in his bid for re-election as South Dundas' deputymayor during the Mon., Oct. 25 municipal election.

Each mayor and deputymayor from the six townships within SD&G form the upper level of local government.

Each councillor serving on counties council will receive \$10,000 annually, up from the previous rate of \$8,515.

(The same rate will also be paid to North Dundas' counties council representatives — Eric Duncan and Gerry Boyce.) The initial bylaw for the changes was passed by counties council in October, but was revisited at the Dec. 20 meeting.

Cocaine, marijuana seized

EMBRUN - On Thurs., Dec. 23, members of the Organized Crime Enforcement Bureau - Drug Enforcement Unit, Project Paradigm, OPP Emergency Response Team, OPP Canine Unit, and the Russell County OPP pulled over a vehicle on Highway 417 in Nation Township.

The stop resulted in the seizure of a significant amount of cocaine. In total, police seized approximately 18 ounces of cocaine, as well as marijuana, cash, and weigh scales.

The projected street value of the drugs is estimated at approximately \$40,000.

Ottawa residents Mohammed Abdulla Ismail, 27, and Faisal Abdi Mahamud, 28, are charged with one count each of possession of cocaine for the purpose of trafficking and possession of marijuana.

They were both later released on a promise to appear and undertaking given to an officer in charge. They are scheduled to appear in L'Original court on Wed., Feb. 16.

Spit and pee, to court for me

MARIONVILLE — On Thurs., Dec. 23 at about 6 pm, Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry (SD&G) OPP officers responded to a report of a disturbance at a residence on Marionville Road.

The investigation revealed a man had attended the residence requesting assistance in getting his vehicle out of a nearby ditch. While speaking to the residents of the home, he brandished a pocket knife and uttered threats to cause bodily harm. Police arrived and arrested the man. No injuries resulted. While en route to the detachment for processing, the accused spat towards the officers, according to police. Once at the detachment, he urinated on the cell floor.

James Farren, 46, of Metcalfe has been charged with possession of a weapon for dangerous purpose, carrying a concealed weapon, mischief, uttering threats, and failing to comply with conditions of a recognizance.

He was held in custody, pending a court appearance in Cornwall.

Tobacco bust

KEMPTVILLE — On Thurs., Dec. 23, members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police's Customs and Excise Section along with officers from the Leeds-Grenville OPP --- intercepted a pickup truck on County Road 43.

Inside, officers found approximately 250,000 contraband cigarettes, a total that carries a \$27,500 value.

A 40-year-old male from Kemptville was arrested and will appear in Brockville court on Fri., Jan. 14.

The 1994 GMC Sierra truck he was driving was also seized in accordance with the Excise Act and is valued at approximately \$1,000. Under the provisions of the Excise Act, if convicted, the man faces a minimum fine of \$42,500.

WILLIAMSBURG — Residents may soon no longer need to Engineers ready worry about torrential rains flooding their basements.

At the first meeting of the newly elected Township of South Dundas council of Tues., Dec. 21, solutions to remedy the problem were brought to the table.

This is an important issue for us," said CAO Stephen Mc-Donald. "It has not been forgotten.'

Heavy rainfall in September caused many homes in Morrisburg, Iroquois, and Williamsburg to be overcome by excess water. For some homeowners, this was not the first time.

Since then, township staff have been working to determine what remedies may be available to assist with the problem, McDonald said.

monitored, and may be improved if necessary, while funding for any work might be made available through the province's Ontario Small Waterworks Assistance Program.

Habitat house delayed

Although it was planned for 2010, the Habitat for Humanitv Seaway Valley chapter's home in Williamsburg will not be constructed until the spring of 2011.

Slow home builds in neighbouring municipalities are Geraghty, South Dundas treasurer. the cause for the delay, according to Habitat representatives.

The township donated land in the Schell Street subdivision, which is scheduled to become the home of the White family (Troy, Amy, Jacob, Savannah, and Sophia).

Also, South Dundas will cover the costs of the \$430 building permit for the home.

Fire chief coming soon?

According to Byvelds, the hiring of a new full-time fire chief to oversee the amalgamated Township of South Dundas Fire Department is "closer than many may think."

Those were his comments during the annual reports provided by the current chiefs of the municipality's three fire detachments — Morrisburg, Williamsburg, and Iroquois.

Each chief came with an update for the year, as well as requests for the purchase of new equipment.

Council stopped short of earmarking any financial support for either station because the new chief will be expected to standardize equipment between the three, and decide what is needed.

Meanwhile, Bill Ewing was appointed as the new deputychief of the Iroquois detachment, replacing Jay Merkley, who died of a heart attack in April.

Construction of the new Iroquois Wastewater Treatment Plant will soon be underway following the naming of AECOM Canada as the project's engineer.

The firm will work in tandem with the Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA), the company selected as project manager.

The cost of the addition is \$18 million, which is being paid for by two \$9-million funding grants — one from the Ontario government, and the other from the feds.

Moving money

As well, council passed \$54,934 in budget amendments for the year. This money went toward projects not slotted into the 2010 budget, such as refurbishment of Earl Baker Park, parking curbs at the Iroquois Plaza, and more.

Both parties are working toward repurposing the former educational facility. The three-storey building would allow for a larger, more accessible space than the medical facility currently occupies. As well, it is possible that the municipality would move its headquarters to one floor of the redeveloped facility.

Redevelopment pending

During the most recent South Dundas council meeting on Tues., Dec. 21, a public meeting was held to discuss the proposed rezoning of the Stampville site. Currently, the building and its property are considered institutional, but would need a zoning classification as a residential hamlet to proceed with plans.

Many neighbours have applauded the redevelopment of the old building, but are raising concerns about one of the planned additions. The owner hopes to heat the old school with an outdoor furnace, an idea that doesn't sit well with nearby residents. (As part of the rezoning, the purchaser would like to position the furnace 60 metres from the building, instead of the usual 100 metres typically required in South Dundas. The closer it is, the lower the cost would be to pipe heat into the facility.)

In a letter forwarded to township councillors, a number of residents noted that the smoke from the outdoor furnace is of significant concern, rather than simply a nuisance. Young children and seniors live in the area. Some have acute allergies and asthma, the letter reads

At the moment, council has planned to return to the issue at its next meeting on Tues., Jan. 18.

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

Many secrets buried in Hill 70's mysteries

The Editor:

In the past weeks, we have witnessed the death of another of our fine young overseas soldiers, just two days short of his birthday and days short of Christmas. Not that his passing will ever be forgotten by his loved ones; however, the holidays, a time of joy for most, will be forever filled with grief for this family.

His family can take some comfort in the fact that his remains have been repatriated. This was not the case in the first two world wars, when transportation methods and the sheer numbers of dead made it impossible for loved ones to say goodbye in the way that they were accustomed to. The last goodbye that they would carry in their hearts and remember forever would have taken place at a train siding or on their doorstep as that young son and often husband set off to preserve King/Queen and Country. Some would spend their lives hoping that their loved one would once more step down from a train.

Henry Johnson Carson (Harry to his friends) grew up in Mountain. The son of Henry E. and Mary Hoy, he was the fifth child of eight children.

Following in his father's footsteps, he was a blacksmith by trade, and the two worked side by side in his father's shop. On March 18, 1916, Carson stepped into the recruiting office in Kemptville and joined the Canadian Over-Seas Expeditionary Force, and was sent to train at Barriefield that following summer. He then left for England and was consequently shipped to France on May 25 of 1917.

A member of the 38th Battalion Ottawa Royal Regiment, by August 25 1917, just four months and two days past his 25th birthday, Carson — like so many other young men - was dead.

Harry, along with his parents, brothers, and sisters, left behind his wife, Jessie M. Carson, and three daughters — the oldest, four years; the youngest, six months. The news was received by his sister, Mrs. Moorehead, who at the time was working in the

Editor's backgrounder: Hill 70

This week, we have two letters regarding a controversial restoration project.

The Mountain and District Lions Club has designed a state-of-the-art monument to upgrade the existing Battle of Hill 70 memorial, located in the village's park. The World War One memorial was created in the 1920s. Mystery shrouds the site. Today, little is known about why Mountain-area residents of the day chose to honour casualties of that particular battle --- or what motivated them to design it as they did.

The Lions have collected about \$30,000 in cash and fundraising pledges. They are pursuing a Veterans Affairs Canada grant to subsidize the initiative, too.


The Lions' design is controversial partly because it will alter an existing memorial. The new monument will be built directly on top of the Hill 70 mound, although the existing elements

(two stones and a German machine gun) will be incorporated. Some opposing residents wish for the new structure to be built to the side. The North Dundas History Stewards, for one, have expressed concerns about altering the existing historical site.

Despite the lack of consensus, the Township of North Dundas council approved the Lions' plans at a Tues., Dec. 14 meeting. The letters this week are from two people who sat in the audience that night. The first is Kim McInnis, a member of the North Dundas History Stewards (it should be noted that she wrote the letter independently, not on behalf of her organization). The second submission is from Peter Breaks, who has written in as chair of the Concerned Citizens' Community Committee (4Cs), which he defines as a group seeking community vision in North Dundas.



Over the next year in 1918, the Carson family would bury a daughter, Orpha, aged 19 years, and a son Eylmor at age 23 years. Spanish flu or tuberculosis? Both were rampant at the time. Mrs. Mary Hoy Carson would pass on a short time later in 1922.

This human story is just one of many of why it is so important to maintain the historical integrity of the Hill 70 memorial. It was raised out of blood and sacrifice and heartbreak. The people of Mountain poured what money they had (Mr. L. Simzer was paid \$7 for hauling sand) to build what they thought was a fitting monument to their lost sons - money that most probably they didn't have. What they lacked in funds, they





• The Township of North Dundas received a \$9,490 grant from Wal-Mart Canada. The money would be put into action by purchasing trees to be planted throughout the village.

• Bryan Helmer, captain of the Hershey Bears, helped his team to a second consecutive American Hockey League (AHL) Calder Cup victory. The win was the first time since 1991 that an AHL team won back-to-back league championships.






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October

Property tax relief coming

The City of Ottawa and other municipalities in Ontario are beginning to feel property tax relief. Presently in the City of Ottawa, homeowners pay nearly \$600 per year in property taxes for provincial services. "Uploading" (i.e. province takes back payment responsibility) as it is called, began in 2008 and will continue for a number of years.

Here are three examples. Effective 2010, three per cent of the city portion of benefits in the Ontario Works Program will be uploaded for a net savings of \$902,000. On a cumulative basis, each year thereafter, a portion of benefits will be uploaded until 100 per cent of the income and the employment assistance benefits to recipients are covered by the province for a cumulative net savings of \$30,082,000. Starting in 2012, the province will upload the costs of court security (including offender transportation) over seven years by providing to municipalities a maximum of \$125 million annually at maturity.

Organics collection successful

City of Ottawa staff have just released the 2010 totals for the Organics Collection Program, showing that 53,000 tonnes were actually collected in the first year of operation. In January 2010, single-family homes were the first to have organic collection, with multi-residential properties being added to the program in the summer. Apartment buildings are in the process of being added to the City of Ottawa Organics Collection. City staff have been working with the local school boards to implement pilot organic programs in city schools. St. Mark High School is the first local



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
