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Low usage could jeopardize library outlets

County library strategy review looks to future

WINCHESTER — Some tough decisions may soon be made within the Stormont, Dundas, and Glengarry (SD&G) Library system.

Having recently undergone a strategic planning review — undertaken by Dysart & Jones, a Toronto-based management services company — the findings revealed the next approach could be the creation of a “chain of command” system.

This would see certain villages, such as Winchester and Morrisburg, have their branches left intact, while becoming a resource hub for neighbouring sites.

This method would be less prohibitive than the current model, the study indicates. Meanwhile, a secondary report by the Administrators of Rural and Urban Public Libraries of Ontario (ARUPLO) found that many of the region's libraries are under-staffed, and too small to survive.

As well, ARUPLO said, some facilities do not operate within enough space to offer acceptable amounts of seating or working space, while, due to depleted population, may offer restricted service, with minimal hours of operation.

Dysart & Jones, meanwhile, conducted a set of surveys — online and by phone — to gauge community response.

A final report, released in January, found that the SD&G County Library experiences notably low levels of use in comparison to other library systems serving a similar population.

WPS continues to rise in rankings

WINCHESTER — As part of a yearly tradition, the Fraser Institute released its annual — and highly controversial — ranking of Ontario's elementary schools on Sun., March 4.

In total, 2,695 schools from across the province are reviewed on the list, with a breakdown of academic performance based on the outcomes from the Grades 3 and 6 students who write the annual Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) test. The examination, which

evaluates reading, writing, and math skills, is administered in public, Catholic, and French-speaking schools each year.

“Using long-term, provincewide school performance data, our school rankings let parents monitor the performance of their child's school over time and also


help educators identify key areas for improvement in their classrooms,” said Michael Thomas, the Fraser Institute's associate director of school performance studies. “Our report card is the only objective, reliable tool that shows which schools across Ontario have improved, or fallen behind, in terms of reading, writing, and mathematics over the past five years.”

However, not all elementary schools in certain regions are included in the ranking. In some school districts that operate middle and junior high schools, the local elementary school may not enroll students in Grade 6.

As well, schools with fewer than 15 students in either grade are excluded, while private schools, and First Nations-operated, federally funded institutions are not required to administer the EQAO test, and are therefore left off of the ranking.

Schools are also excluded if they cannot generate a large enough set of student data to determine an overall rating out of 10.

As well, active cardholders, total circulation, library visits per week, and electronic visits were all lower for the local system than other libraries profiled. Meanwhile, survey numbers showed that about 80 per cent of online respondents ranked the counties library system at a four or five out of a possible mark of five. The phone survey, however, showed that just 42 per cent of residents are annual library users.

For the future, ARUPLO's report suggested that resource branches should have a minimum total square footage of 3,500, a dedicated meeting and programming area, and be open not less than 35 hours per week.

Currently, none of SD&G's branches fit that model, which could mean structural, as well as administrative, changes at some sites.

In Dundas County, sites targeted as resource branches would be Winchester and Morrisburg. The Winchester site would need to be more than doubled in size, how-

ever, but it's unlikely that could be done within the current centre. In Morrisburg, the present location, within the village's arena, is likely to become the new home of the Dundas County Food Bank. The library is expected to move into the space adjacent to the former Morrisburg High School site. Currently, the St. Lawrence Medical Clinic is in the space, but will be moving into the first floor of the redeveloped educational facility.

The remaining county sites have been divided into separate categories — ones to be retained, and others that could be closed.

Branches in South Mountain (which is a brand new facility) and Iroquois are likely to remain open well into the future, while it's unclear how much longer libraries in Chesterville, Morewood, and Williamsburg will continue to operate.

The current strategic planning is an ongoing effort, however, with no long-term decisions having been made to date.

Other local schools placing in the overall rankings include: Metcalfe Public School (2,238), Castor Valley Public School (392), Greeley Public School (1,370), St. Catherine Catholic School in Metcalfe (1,423), and St. Mary Catholic School in Chesterville (1,991).

Nationview Public School ranked 1,423 overall, with a six rating, while Iroquois Public School came in at 661, with a 7.2 rating.

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Rural transit network key to economic prosperity

WINCHESTER — Having a job often begins with a ride to work.

However, that factor can be an impediment to the region's poor. It's not often, in today's harsh economic climate, that finding a position is easy, but getting there, in many cases, causes the most problems.

With that in mind, a local charitable group is looking to become a link in the chain of the region's growing transportation needs.

Linking Hands, a project of the House of Lazarus, has begun working on an action plan that would see

Dundas County organizations, such as the Nor-Dun Seniors' Support Centre and the Eastern Ontario Health Unit (EOHU), band together to improve transit access.

"Yes... This is a daunting task, but the wheels are definitely rolling," Nanda Wubs told the *Winchester Press*.

Wubs, whose business has been providing a Monday-to-Friday shuttle service, which begins in Chesterville and makes stops in Winchester, Vernon, Metcalfe, and Greely, before drop-offs at various stations in Ottawa, has recently been working to add a South Dundas route to the company's bur-

geoning commuter network.

However, following the Dundas County Community Forum, held in November 2011 at Williamsburg's

Christian Reformed Church, transportation became a common barrier for all aspects of rural sustainability.

"We are an advocacy group for rural poor, and transportation was a key theme in that forum," Wubs added.

Through a Linking Hands subsection committee, known as the Dundas Accessible Transportation Group (DATG), members are work-

ing toward the creation of a 10-year vision, as a means to get the planned network up and running.

As well, in order to get the idea further toward fruition, the DATG held a special session in Chesterville earlier this month, featuring Robert Dupuis and Harry Gow, two Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec transit experts.

Dupuis is the brains behind TransporAction Pontiac, a community transit network in the Pontiac region, while Gow is the founder of Transport Action (formerly Transport 2000 Canada), a non-profit organization working to cre-

ate affordable transit networks throughout Canada.

"The event was well attended, and there was some good representation of local agencies, including both municipalities," Wubs said. "The next step is to continue investigating other models of transportation networks."

As well, the committee is working on a survey to send out to local agencies to determine the amount of current transportation services, and fleet of vehicles available.

Afterward, a transportation needs assessment will be conducted in order to chart where in Dundas County the service is needed most.

WILLIAMSBURG — As promised, community participation will be a key component to shaping the Township of South Dundas' next 10 years.

Through the creation of a community strategic plan, the municipality will be working to bring together a range of interests and priorities in an integrated and balanced policy.

Ottawa-based Dillon Consulting has been hired to spearhead the project, while South Dundas has set aside \$25,000 for the strategy's creation. (Dillon secured the contract with a winning \$24,870 bid.)

The action brings the township one step closer to the fulfillment of campaign promises made by those vying for a seat at the council table during the Oc-

tober 2010 municipal election.

The issue was highly prioritized by Mayor Steven Byvelds, who has been calling for a plan's completion since his time as a councillor in the previous administration.

"It's important that we have a strategic plan made by the people of South Dundas," he said during a council meeting late last year. "I certainly hope we get as many as possible to participate. We need to get an idea of where we're going as a community."

Highlights of the plan are to include creating community interest and participation; determining strategies and action plans for required resources; and conducting various community consultations in order to stimulate the planning process.

The plan is also expected to take into account possible expansions to the mu-

nicipality's business community, as well as population increases.

In order to chart community response, a set of public consultations has been scheduled.

The first in the series of meetings is scheduled for Wed., March 21 from 2 to 4 pm at Matilda Hall in Dixons Corners. Later that evening, from 7 to 9 pm, another session is to be held at the Morrisburg Meeting Centre. On Thurs., March 22 a third meeting is planned for 2 to 4 pm at the Iroquois Civic Centre, while a final forum is to take place from 7 to 9 pm at the Williamsburg Oddfellows Hall that night.

South Dundas paring down 2012 budget

WILLIAMSBURG — This year's budget process has begun in the Township of South Dundas.

On Mon., March 5, following a day-long meeting, council members worked this year's potential tax increase down to approximately 3.27 per cent, noticeably lower than the 5.92 per cent the meeting started with.

"Nothing is final though, and there's the possibility it could go down further," Shannon Geraghty, South Dundas treasurer, told the *Winchester Press*.

Combined, approximately \$125,000 was removed from various township departmental budgets, which is a fairly low figure, Geraghty added.

"I think the process went well... Better than I expected," he said.

However, work is far from over. A second meeting has been tentatively scheduled for Thurs., March 8. (South Dundas council members were expected to set an official date and time at the township's Tues., March 6 council meeting.)

If the remaining process runs smoothly, Geraghty said, the 2012 municipal budget may be passed at the Tues., March 20 council meeting.

In 2011, South Dundas' tax levy was increased by 3.94 per cent, which was the first rise in the township after years of zero per cent increases.

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Hockey equipment headed north

Local initiative to help Inuit women play their game

WINCHESTER — It's a quintessential Canadian story.

On a cold winter's morning, with the sun having not yet perched itself in the sky, parents are bundling up their children, and loading the equipment into the family vehicle, en route to an arena somewhere.

But suppose the key element to the hockey game — the equipment — was missing.

Unaccounted for are the stick, the shoulder, elbow, and shin pads, and the helmet, among other things.

What if you, more than anything else, wanted to play the sport alongside friends, instead of just fawning over the stars of the National Hockey League?

In Rankin Inlet, a small Inuit community in Nunavut, located on the northwestern shores of Hudson Bay, that is the case. However, in that tight-knit community, it would appear one sex wins out over the other in hockey dominance.

Ask Lisa Brunet, a one-time Winchester and District Ladies Hockey League (WDLHL) player, and you'll get a first-hand account of the experience felt by female players in Canada's north.

Brunet, who has been playing hockey since she was seven years old, has been in the region for some time now, and recently began coaching.

"Females playing hockey is quite recent, compared to the men," she said, speaking with the *Winchester Press* from Rankin Inlet. "There would be more women playing, but many don't have equipment. Some are even wearing their kids' equipment."

That's the dichotomy, she argues, where kids are given the chance to play, while the mothers don't get the same opportunity.

"Some mothers out there put their kids first, and that means they sometimes get the short end of the stick," Brunet said.

Soupfest 2012 tasty success

KEMPTVILLE — This year's Soupfest, the first held at the North Grenville Municipal Centre in Kemptville, has been deemed a success by organizers.

The Sat., March 3 event attracted more than 200 attendees, and featured entries from 16 restaurants throughout the region. Also this year, as in the past, the event was held to not only feature local restaurants, but to serve as a fundraiser for South Mountain-based TLC Ministries.

This year's winners were: Nakhon Thai Express in Kemptville, people's choice; while Salamanders in Kemptville and Nakhon Thai Express tied for the celebrity judges choice, having both been awarded first place in best overall soup, as well as most creative entry. The best presentation award, meanwhile, went to Salamanders.

"[All entries] were deserving of winning, and [I think] the public found it hard to pick the best overall soup," said Lynn Ford, lead organizer and TLC Ministries founder.

Noticing a trend, she encouraged her players to attempt a fundraiser to purchase new equipment, and at the same time reached out to former colleagues in the WDLHL.

Winchester resident Amy Fraser was one of Brunet's first contacts, and it proved to be the right choice.

"I called Amy... a week later, she tells me that she has 22 [hockey] bags full of equipment," Brunet said. "One call, and look what happens."

Fraser's efforts began in the local community, and quickly branched out to other resources.

"I wanted to help, you know? It's how I was raised," she said when speaking with the *Press*. "I love the game, and I can only imagine how much these women and girls want to play. If I can help them, why not?"

Fraser first contacted the North Dundas Minor Hockey Association, and got them onboard to donate some jerseys and other minor accessories, while the Canadian Adult Recreation Hockey Association, possibly inspired by their efforts, shipped 20 brand new hockey bags to Rankin Inlet. (One-time Winchester resident Rob Raistrick, owner of Barrhaven's Source for Sports, also donated items to the cause.)

Fraser then made contact with another resource at the Ottawa District

Hockey Association (ODHA), and was surprised by the windfall.

"The ODHA is continually collecting equipment with the intent of it going to kids who need it," Fraser said.

Not only that, but the Ottawa-based association has partnered with both the Canadian Tire Jumpstart Program and the Ottawa Senators Foundation to leverage its ability to help every child who wants to play the game.

Suddenly, Fraser said, hundreds of pieces of equipment were being dropped off at the Winchester Fire Hall. "Elbow pads, gloves, skates, lots of helmets, there was just so much stuff," she said.

Soon the sorting began, as Fraser, with the help of her husband, Township of North Dundas Councillor Tony Fraser, and others, worked to separate the quality items from those having reached the end of their lifespan.

Those pieces that did pass the needs test were cleaned up, thanks to the fire department's heavy-duty washer and dryer, and packed away, patiently awaiting the trip north.

Now, after many false starts, the equipment will finally be shipped to Nunavut.

"I finally made arrangements to

get the equipment out of my garage," Fraser said.

Help has come in the form of First Air, an Ottawa-based airline exclusively serving Canada's north, and its director of sales for the eastern region, Ed Picco. (Picco is a former education minister and government house leader in Nunavut's government.)

"He said they could take care of it for free, no problem," Fraser said. "I'm just over the moon about this."

For Brunet, she told the *Press* the equipment will help to make a big difference in a land that has gone through so much change in the past 30 years.

"Nunavut... It's a magical place. The landscape is beautiful," she said. "But times have changed for them [the Inuit] so much. It will be a matter of patience and time to see them truly be on their own feet again. What I've noticed is the big gap between the elders and the children... It seems some children don't really know who to be — white or Inuk."

However, it's the game of hockey that may be able to play a small part in strengthening the ties that will forever bind the community.

"This hockey equipment is being shipped here so that a few mothers can have fun out there on the ice," she said. "What an opportunity."

Lions Clubs re-kick start Rutters fund

WINCHESTER — With a new year in full gear, local Lions clubs have re-initiated their Hailey Rutter's Fund project.

The young Finch resident has a large birthmark that covers her left eye. It has required several surgeries already, and more are on the horizon. The unusual skin problem is more than a cosmetic issue, and has obscured the child's vision in the past.

The Winchester Lions Club launched the fund about three years ago, as Rutter's grandfather, Al McRoberts, is a member of the village's group. Money was raised to assist with expenses related to the surgeries and treatment not covered by health insurance or OHIP, as well as drugs, transportation, parking, and other ancillary expenses.

To date, approximately \$30,000 has been raised and handed over to the young girl's family, while of late, the fund had depleted to about \$800.

"This is certainly an important project we have in place," said Phil Carkner, a Winchester member.

To get the fund underway again, the Finch and District Lions Club recently handed over \$1,500.

Carkner added that the money would help to tackle mounting costs.

"One bottle of ointment, which she needs to put on daily, costs \$125," he said. "It's a new year, so hopefully we can help a lot more."

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There will be a fundraiser dance at

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to raise money for Emily Wicks and Jenna Boyce's volunteer trip to the Third World country Costa Rica. They will be travelling with the NGO IVHQ, where they will be working in a health clinic and an orphanage to provide medical care and teach children English and basic sanitation methods in small, rural communities. 101 years of battling for women's rights

For many of today's female generation, the suffragist movement means nothing.

It means nothing to many that women the world over joined forces decades ago to battle against what they felt to be severe injustice.

United, they were beacons of a worldwide movement toward gender equality.

Thurs., March 8 marks the 101st annual International Women's Day, and in 2012, it still serves as a day for women of all stripes to come together.

In 1900's Canada, females from coast to coast, led by the likes of Nellie McClung and Louise McKinney, and the remaining members of the "Famous Five," rose up in an effort to have their collective voices heard.

Other women, including British suffragist Emmeline Pankhurst, declared the cause to be a "real war" to claim women's rights.

These women in Britain resorted to what today would be considered modest protest — marching in the street, blocking traffic, scuffling with police, and hurling stones at shop windows.

Hundreds were arrested, and sent to court, but the fighting spirit lived on, as many vowed to trash the prisons they were sent to.

It took some years, a but a key part of the fight was finally won. Women in Canada were given the right to vote. First on the Prairies in 1916, then in Ontario the next year.

By 1951, women in all provinces and territories were free to cast a ballot in the democratic state. Some of the first suffragist women also went on to become MPs.

Today, Canada boasts successful female athletes who compete on the world's stage, enterprising women in business, politicians in both the House of Commons and Queen's Park, and many more making a difference at home and abroad.

Yet, the situation is far from perfect, and injustice still reigns in some corners of the world. However, with an attitude of "justice for all," and the mobilized efforts of many, changes can be made in this world. Changes that will mean the world to millions.

More than a century later, though, it is still important to honour the suffragist spirit, identify with their courage, and be inspired by their tenacity.

1922

According to this week's *Winchester Press*, Mormonism in Canada was centered around the town of Cardston, Alta., where a large temple was being constructed by people of the faith. Alberta had been the greatest gathering place for the immigrants from Utah, with \$1 million being spent to erect the worship space.

On Friday night, about 900 hockey fans, the largest crowd of the season, packed the arena for the final game.

1952

An interesting meal idea is this week's *Press*: If you wish a delectable luncheon treat, prepare a three-decker sandwich for each person. Make plain ham sandwiches, and then start the third layer with a thick slice of loaf cheese on top of each. Place a slice of canned pineapple over this with a spoonful of mint

1962

The North Dundas District High School board had all but signed on the dotted line for the construction of a new composite school to serve not only the district, but also the entire region of Eastern Ontario. It was announced this week that the new school would be located on the Fulton property, immediately east of Maple Ridge Cemetery, on County Road 43 between Winchester and Chesterville.

1972

97, more than just a number to newest Sen

Matt Gilroy laid in his bed, crying, the night his brother died. Earlier in that August 1993 day, Timmy Gilroy, just eight years old, died from a brain injury.

A few days earlier, Timmy had been in a bicycle accident while rushing to join his neighbourhood friends in a game. Matt sobbed as he vowed to do something to pay tribute to the little brother who was 13 months younger than he was. He vowed that, for the rest of his life, he would wear number 97 — Timmy's number on their minor hockey team — every time he played hockey.

Timmy and Matt Gilroy were among the eight children of Frank and Peggy Ann Gilroy. Frank was a college basketball player, starring at St. John's University in New York, and was drafted by the Philadelphia 76ers. Frank Jr., one of Matt's brothers, ended up playing college basketball. Matt jokes and says that's why he's his dad's favourite. But for Matt and Timmy, hockey was their true passion.

While their father grew up in a time when basketball was the game of choice on the playgrounds, Matt and their friends loved hockey. They lived and breathed it. They grew up on the coattails of the New York Islanders' dynasty in Manhasset, New York, a town of about 8,000 people in Nassau County on Long Island. Although all of the kids had dreams and aspirations of playing for their beloved New York Islanders, Matt

and Timmy were huge fans of the Great One, Wayne Gretzky. To pay tribute to Gretzky on their minor hockey team, Timmy wore number 97, and Matt wore number 98.

Being hockey parents was new to their basketball-playing father and their mother, who once put their shin pads and protective cups on the outside of their uniforms — the first time she ever helped them put their equipment and uniforms on. Matt says that the incident is a family legend. But Peggy Ann Gilroy grew into the role of hockey mom that so many moms in Eastern Ontario are familiar with. She drove here, there, and everywhere and spent hours nursing a hot coffee in a cold arena so that her kids could play hockey.

But after that night in August 1993, Matt Gilroy would never wear number 98 again.

As the years went on, one of the problems with Gilroy's unusual number request was that there wasn't always a jersey number 97 available. On those occasions, he would wear either number 7 or number 9, and his mother would sew a patch with number 97 to the inside of his jersey. Driven to honour his little brother, Matt would star in hockey and lacrosse at St. Mary High School, and he would play for the Walpole Jr. Stars in the Eastern Junior Hockey League.

As an 18-year-old, the year most NHL prospects are drafted, Matt Gilroy stood just 5'7" and weighed 145 pounds. Although he was discouraged from trying out for the Boston University Terriers — he would switch positions from forward to defence for a shot at making the team — he went out anyway and tried out as a walk on. He was so good in scrimmages that he earned the final roster spot on the team.

Once he made the team, he wanted to wear number 97. Boston University's coach, Jack Parker, was an old school guy who did not believe in showcase or hotdog numbers. There would be no Gretzky 99s, Lindros 88s, Jagr 68s, or Lemieux 66s on his team. In fact, the highest number worn with the Terriers was 35, worn by a goalie. Parker came from the school where a hotdog number was a sign of a player putting himself ahead of the team.

Matt, though, had the nerve, the audacity, to approach coach Parker and request the number.

Absolutely no way. But then, Boston University assistant coach Mike Bavis intervened and talked to Parker. Bavis understood where the young freshman was coming from. After all, Bavis' twin brother, Mike, who was a teammate with him at Boston University during their

playing days and had become a scout with the Los Angeles Kings, had been killed on United Flight 175 from Boston to Los Angeles that was hijacked on Sept. 11, 2001, and flown into the World Trade Centre.

Bavis pled Gilroy's case, and the young walk-on would be given the jersey number 97.

By the time he graduated, he was a 6'2", 205-pound defenceman who was only the third player in NCAA history to be named an NCAA All-American three times. In 2009, he won the Hobey Baker Award as the top college hockey player in the United States.

Gilroy had opportunities to leave school early and sign an NHL contract. In fact, he had offers from 23 different teams. Coach Parker even encouraged the best player in college hockey to leave school and turn pro. But he didn't. He stayed one last year, won a national championship, and graduated with his classmates.

The following year, Gilroy found himself playing in the NHL for the New York Rangers. He later joined the Tampa Bay Lightning. At the NHL Trade Deadline last week, Matt Gilroy was traded to the Ottawa Senators.

And if you happen to be watching the Senators on television or at Scotiabank Place, and you are wondering who is wearing number 97, it's Matt Gilroy. But to him, who is wearing number 97 isn't nearly as important as why he is wearing number 97.

Drummond Report stirs up Queen's Park

TORONTO — I just finished my second week back at Queen's Park, and the pace seems to have been cranked up a notch as the three parties returned from the Christmas break.

The auditor general's report had been issued just a few days before the break, with very little time available to debate its long list of concerns over the province's spending. It was quickly forgotten about with the attention turning toward two new events: the Drummond Report, and the ORNGE air ambulance scandal. Add in delegations from the combined conference for the Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) and the Ontario Good Roads Association (OGRA), and it was a busy week.

The Drummond report was commissioned by the McGuinty government to develop a plan of spending cuts that would eliminate the huge Ontario deficit by 2017-2018. With program spending increased by more than 60 per cent since Dalton McGuinty took over as premier, Don Drummond, an economist with the Toronto Dominion Bank, cautioned that Ontario is on track for a \$30 billion deficit, and a

tripling of its debt to \$411 billion by 2018. His report identified 362 cuts that included such things as the elimination of full-day Kindergarten, raising caps on class sizes, and numerous changes to healthcare spending in which he estimates that 28 per cent of current spending is wasted, and has no impact on results.

Drummond also provided a clear message that it was up to the government to determine which cuts it would make, but for each one it chooses not to implement, there must be an equivalent cut elsewhere to achieve the deficit elimination target.

The ORNGE air ambulance scandal hit a new high this week with opposition parties calling for Minister of Health Deb Matthews to resign,

in light of new allegations that employees are being threatened with dismissal and prosecution, if they are caught revealing any details of wrong doing.

Liberal insiders were also identified as having benefited from the Ontario-funded corporation, where the CAO salary was in excess of \$1 million. Opposition parties are calling for an all-party committee to investigate

ORNGE so that employees are provided full whistle-blower protection.

This issue was first brought up more than a year ago, only for the government to reassure the legislature that they had reviewed the file. Not happy with the answers he was receiving, PC member Frank Klees requested the auditor general to investigate the issue last April, but the auditor was blocked from information until after the election. Add to this the allegations of kickbacks in the purchase of new helicopters, expensive helicopter interior designs which will not allow paramedics to perform CPR on patients, and now this week, news that these new helicopters are not approved to land in the U.S. Matthews is now under extreme pressure to support the all-party investigation, accept responsibility, and resign.

The ORNGE issue and the Drummond report will surely continue to dominate the legislature in the weeks to come.

There's never a dull moment, and with a report out this week that Ontario's hydro rates will be the second highest in North America by the end of 2013, I don't expect things to change. Until next time.


I take much comfort in the fact that the residents of SD&SG can now depend on a world-class emergency service in their time of need.

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
