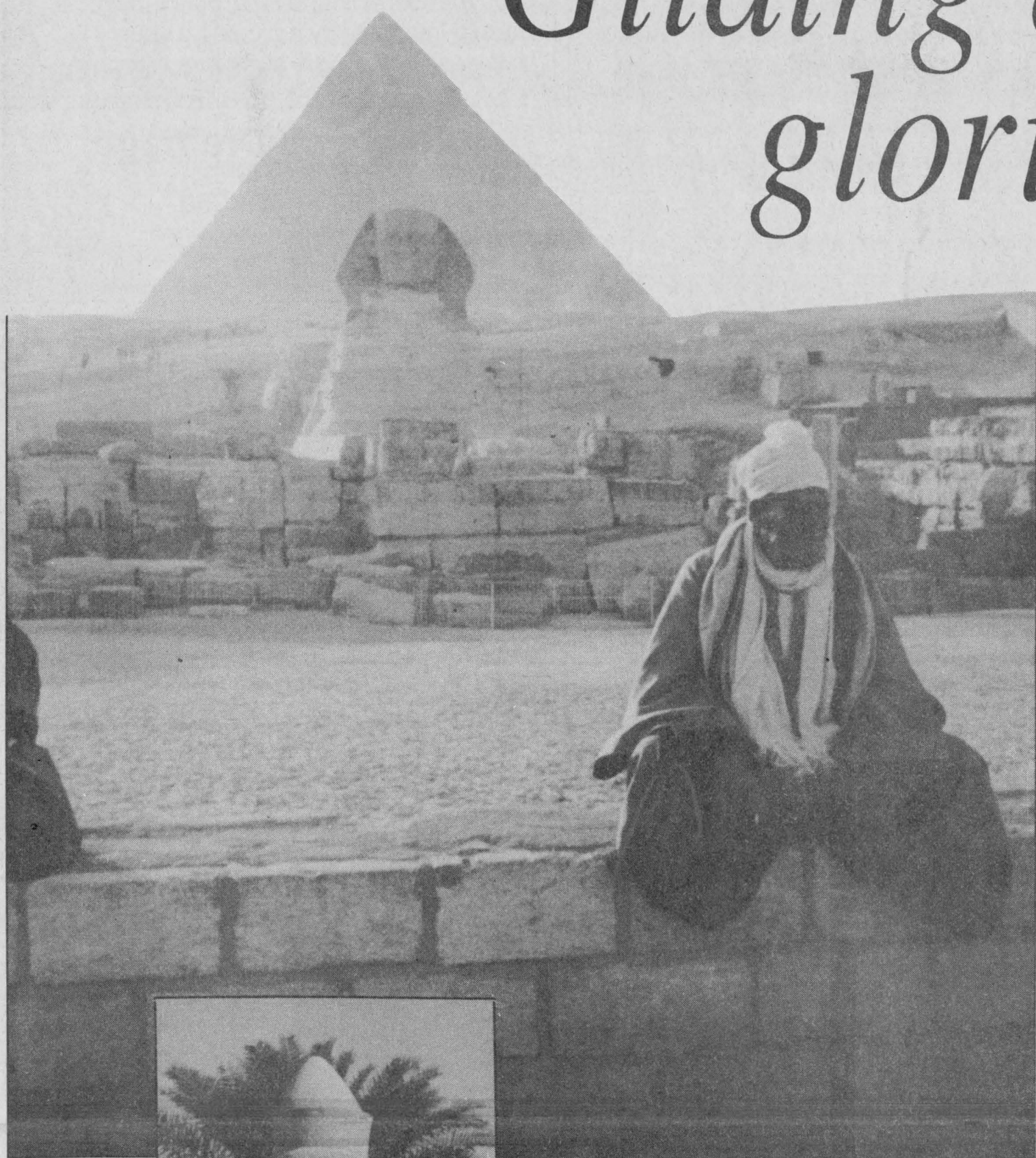


Gliding down the glorious Nile

Three weeks ago Marilyn Sullivan was admiring drifts of a different sort — sand dunes on the Egyptian desert.

Sullivan, who lives in Russell and owns Winchester Travel, decided to take an Egyptian tour down the ancient Nile River with a friend.

"We had talked of taking a Caribbean vacation but then I saw a flyer advertising this trip and I had never gone to the African continent. The timing was good, I needed a break, so I thought why not," explains Sullivan.

The 10-day odyssey flew Sullivan and her friend from Ottawa to Cairo, via Frankfurt in a 24-hour trip that Sullivan admits was a little tiring.

Once in Cairo and settled in her hotel, Sullivan visited the ancient kingdom of Memphis to see the great alabaster sphinx and the colossal granite statue of Ramses II guarding the doorway to his tomb.

From Memphis, it was on to Sakkara to see the step pyramid of King Zoser, which is the oldest known pyramid in the world. Although tourists could not climb the exterior of this pyramid, Sullivan says they could enter the interior to admire the wall paintings and try to decipher the hieroglyphics that covered the many chambers. Next were the pyramids of Giza and their guardian sphinx.

"I had seen pictures of the sphinx and pyramids, but until you standing right next to them you can't believe the immensity of their size," marvels Sullivan. "It is awe-inspiring to consider the technology they had to

possess 4,000 years ago to construct the pyramids."

WASHING

And right next to these testaments to human ingenuity, Egyptians still wash their clothes in the Nile as they did so many centuries ago, says Sullivan.

Although the temperatures were a pleasant 25 Celsius most days and down to a cooler 15 Celsius in the evenings, Sullivan wasn't prepared for a few of the other elements desert life offered. The sea of sand that confronted her when she visited many of the ancient landmarks and sites took getting used to.

"The sand was in huge drifts just like snow in January. It was beautiful but it also got into everything. Your hair, your teeth, your clothes...it was everywhere."

When the group moved on to Aswan, members embarked on a luxurious Nile cruise ship for five days. Sullivan says she spent hours on deck watching the blue Nile edge by. "It was better than a movie, watching the riverbanks and the people and animals that lived there."

A side trip to the Aswan High Dam and temple of Philae was offered as well as a sailing voyage by "felucca", a traditional Nile sailing boat to the Agha Khan mausoleum.

Gliding along on the felucca was one of Sullivan's most memorable experiences. The single sail vessel moved quickly and quietly across the calm Nile waters.

The cruise ship wended its way down the Nile — Kom Omo, Edfo, Esna, and finally to Luxor and the Karnak Temple before Sullivan and the tour took a train back to Cairo.

SHOPPING

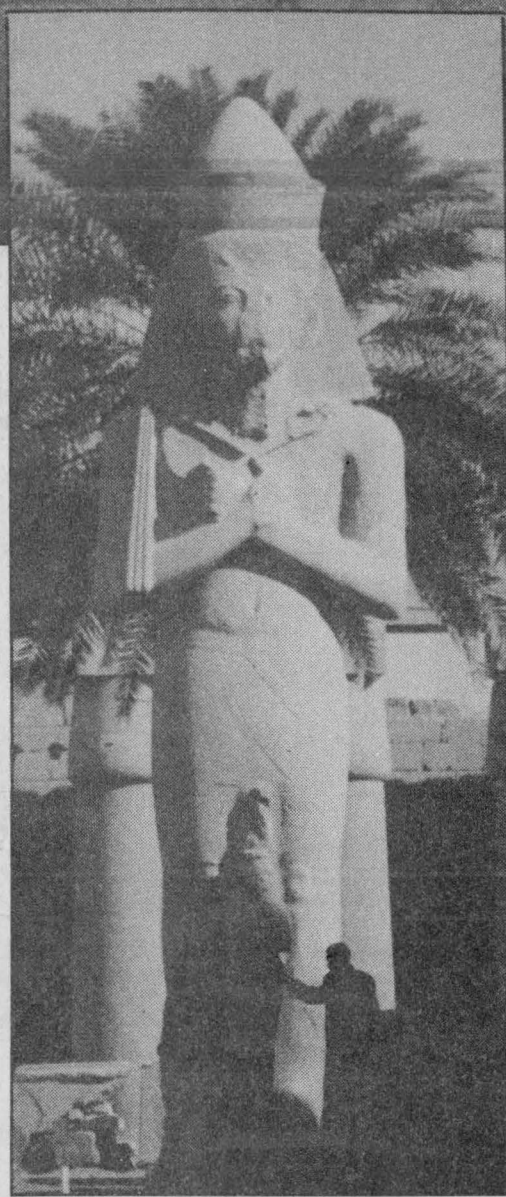
There were quick visits to the Cairo Museum. One of the favorite stops was a visit to the fabulous burial treasures of King Tutankhamon housed in the massive museum.

The tour also provided Sullivan with time to explore the wonders of the Cairo bazaar where she wandered from stall to stall, finally settling on purchasing a gold pendant bearing her name etched in hieroglyphics.

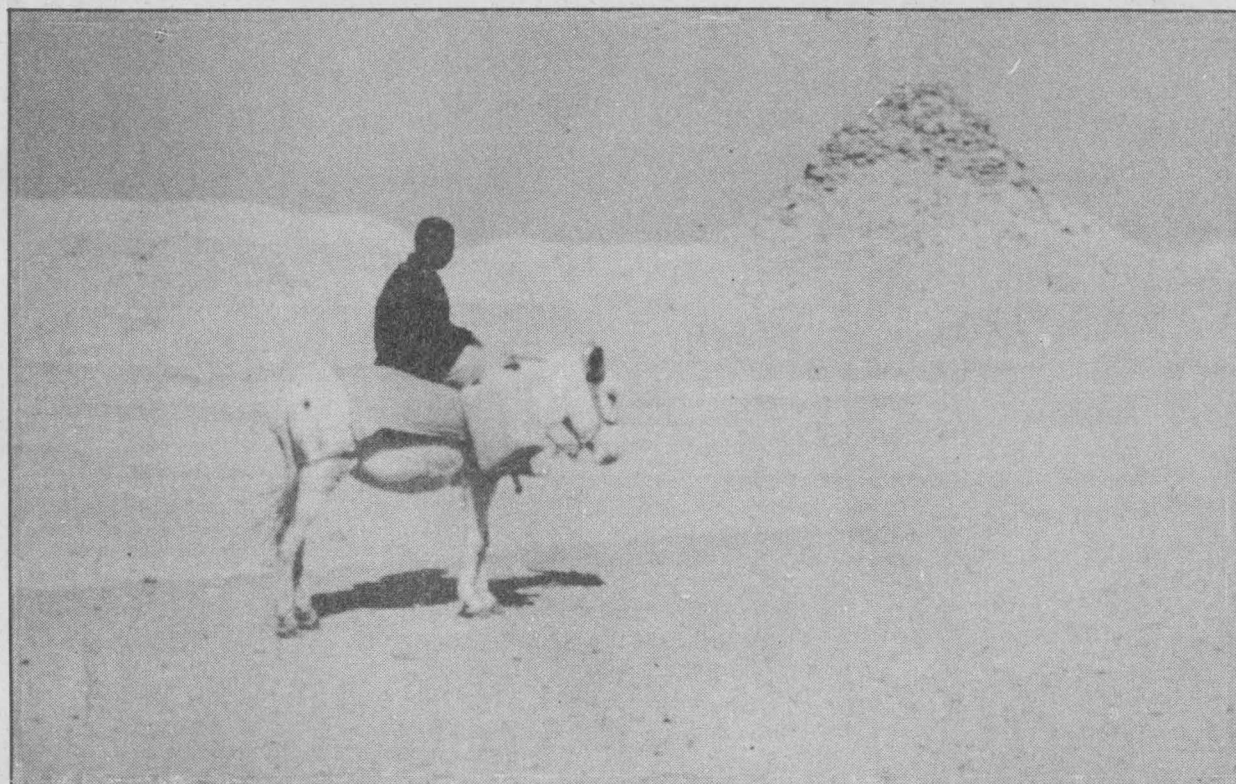
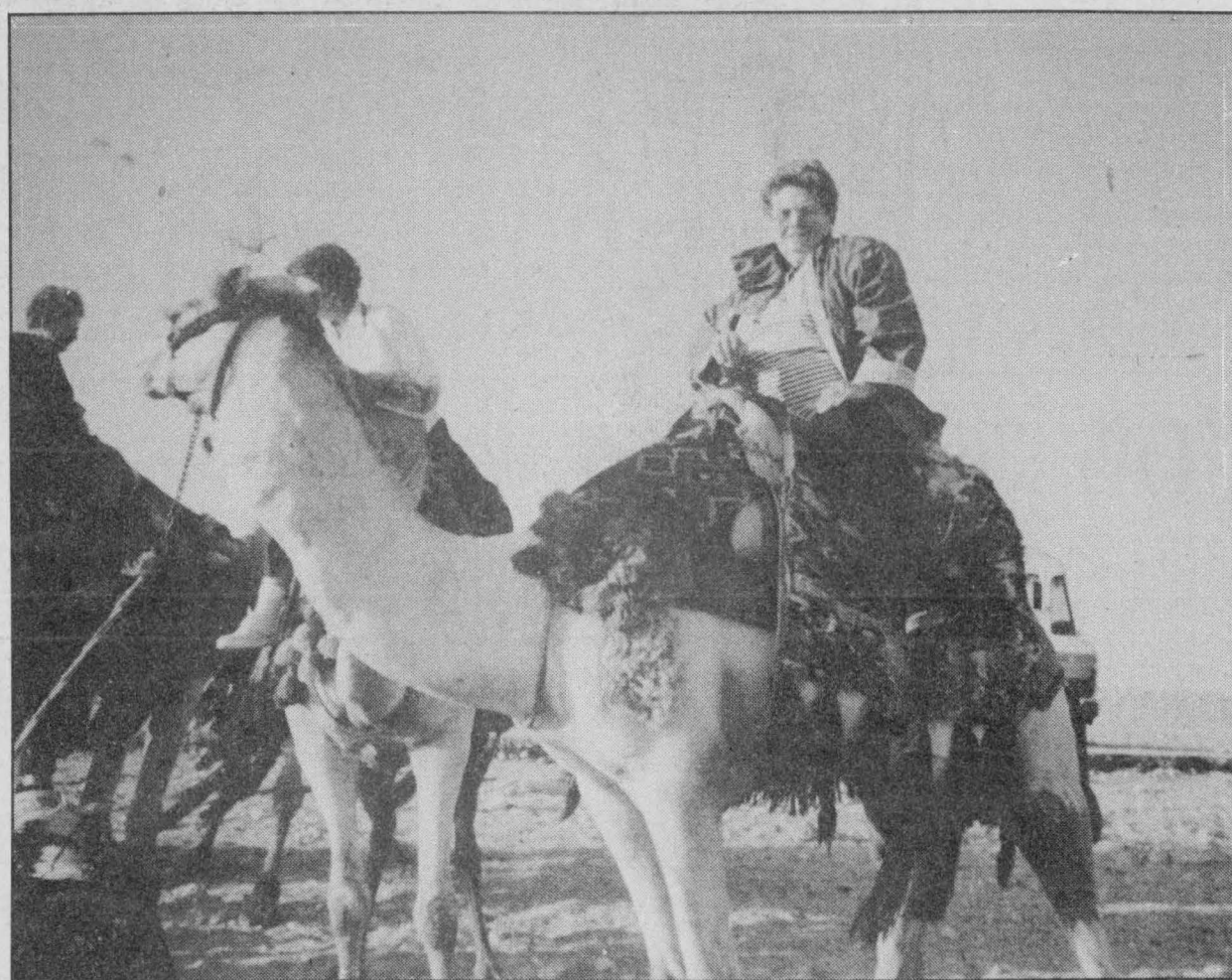
"And then the haggling began...they expected you to do it...I'm not very good at it. I did get them to come down in price quite a bit, but my heart wasn't in it," laughs Sullivan.

She also sampled some delicious sweet potatoes or yams that street vendors sold roasted at their small carts. For the most part, though, she stuck to eating at regular restaurants where she dined on meals of lamb and goat dishes, topped off with desserts of strong coffee and fresh oranges and tangerines.

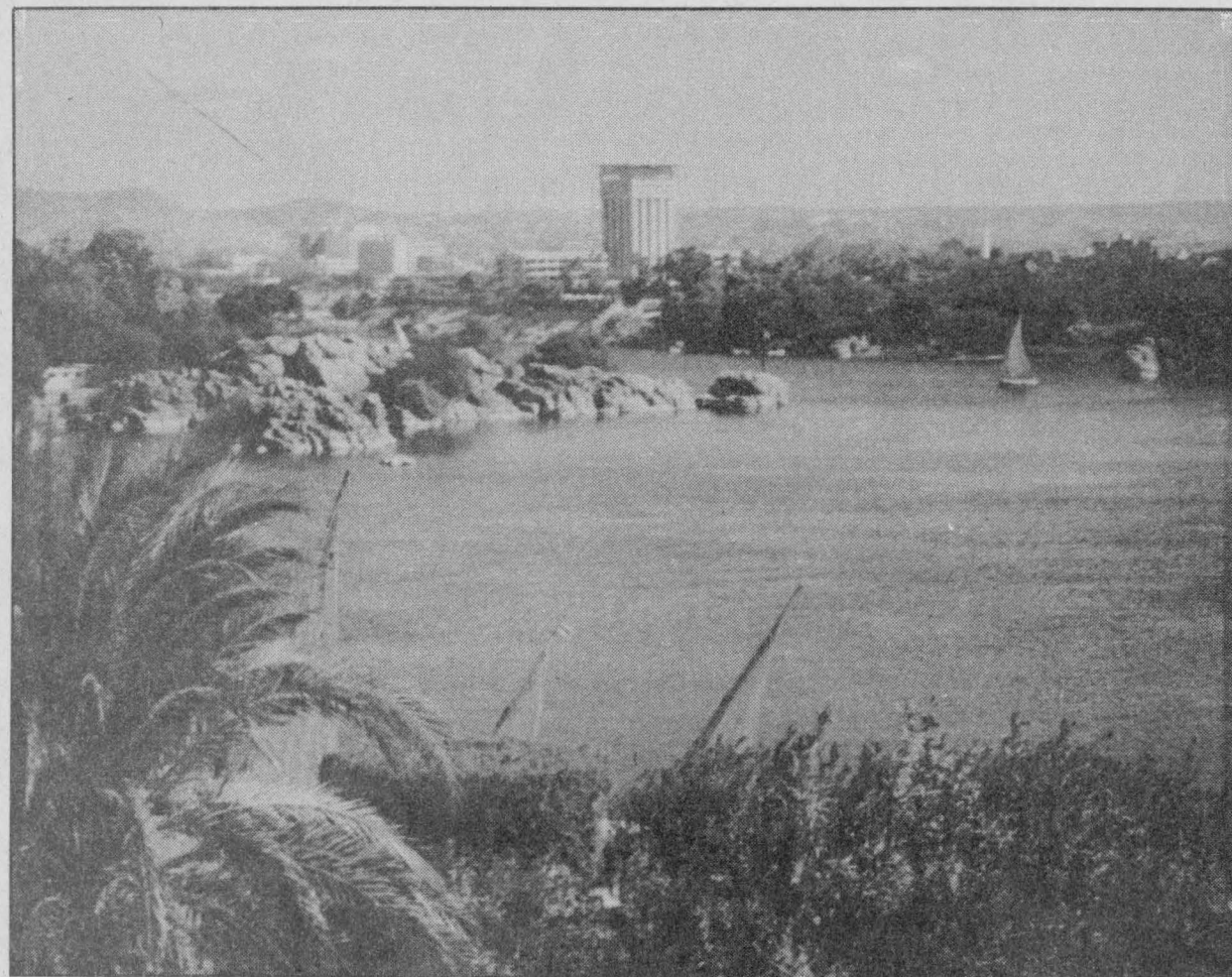
Sullivan's trip including airfare, meals, entrance fees to sightseeing venues and accommodations cost \$2,195 Canadian, double occupancy.

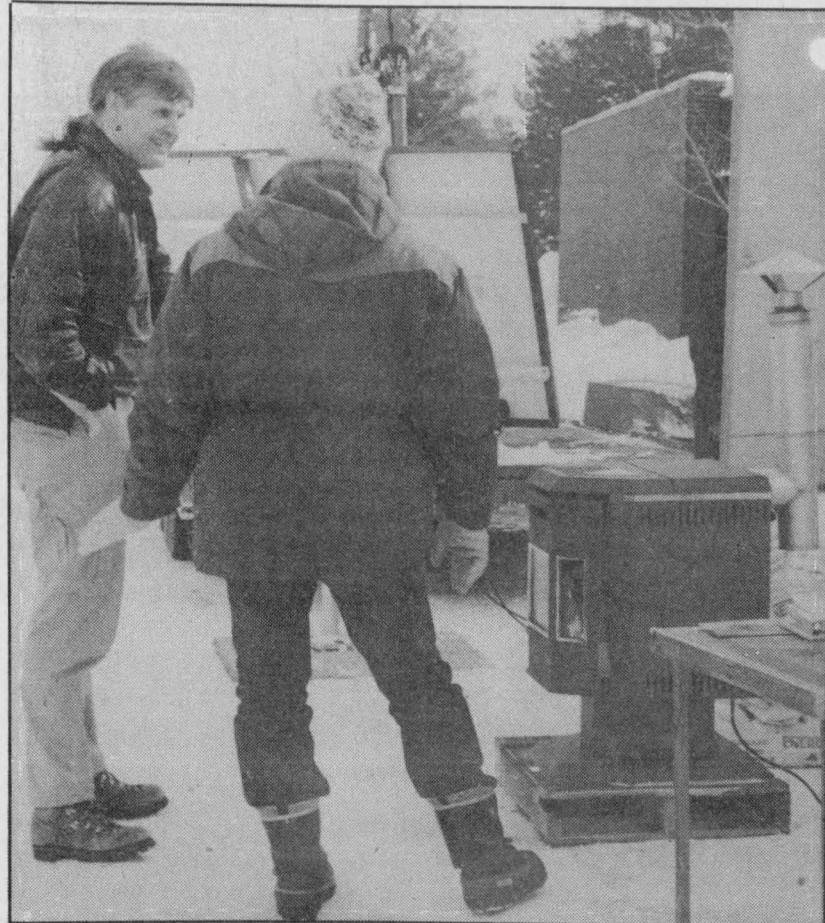

Farm update

Public to judge farm inventions

CRYSLER — A new competition held at this year's Chrysler Farm Show should appeal to the creative minded individuals of Stormont Dundas & Glengarry's farming community.

The Innovation '93 Competition gives an innovative idea with their fellow farmers by displaying the invention during the farm show March 3-4 at the Chrysler Community Centre.

Sponsored by the Soil and Crop Improvement Associations of SD&G, Innovations '93 can have anything to do with environmental protection, field machinery, feed systems, live-

stock handling, barn equipment or seed and forage.

Competition entries must be accompanied by a sheet of paper describing the name, function, operation, and estimated cost and/or time to build the innovation.

The innovation must be made on the farm and in cases where it is too large to bring to the show, a photo (approximately eight by 10 inches) with a description of working parts will be accepted.

Entries may be brought to the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food county office by March 1 or the Chrysler Community Centre by noon,

March 2. Judging will be done by public ballot with prizes for first place, \$100; second, \$75; third, \$50; fourth, \$25 and fifth, \$10.

SEED SHOW

The 36th Annual Seed and Forage Show is held in conjunction with the Chrysler Farm Show as well.

Also sponsored by the Soil and Crop Improvement Associations of SD&G, the competition is open to members of the associations with exhibitors restricted to one entry per class, except when showing two distinct varieties in the cob corn or dry shelled corn classes.

All exhibits must have been grown

in 1992 by the exhibitor and entries will be accepted up to 10:30am March 2. Exhibits must be displayed in plastic bags available at the show or from the OMAF office.

Up to two exhibits per class per county will be eligible for exhibition at the Ottawa Valley Farm Show, March 30-31 and April 1. To be eligible for the OVFS all exhibits must have been judged at the Chrysler Farm Show, with exception of classes not offered there.

The Chrysler Farm Show features a variety of exhibits and displays of farm equipment and machinery both indoors and out.

Farm equity your pension?

As we approach the end of another RRSP promotion season, some farmers are making capital investment decisions. The decisions you make this week will affect your retirement income regardless of the amounts you might contribute to Registered Retirement Savings Plans!

Over the years, many farmers have considered their equity in farm assets to be equivalent to a pension plan. Ideally the equity in farm assets, when sold on retirement, should be adequate to ensure a reasonable standard of living. And there's the rub: sometimes the ideals are not reached. During times of relative economic stability, farm families routinely built the farm business and then sold the assets to a son or daughter, or outright to a stranger, and retired on the proceeds.

More recently we have seen situations develop where the total farm business investment exceeds the value that a new owner is willing or able to pay. Recently farm real estate sales have slowed, and few on-going businesses have been sold. Large scale farms are more difficult to sell, as very few buyers have the capital, labor and management necessary to continue the business.

Retirement planning is an important part of farm business management. The investment of surplus funds in RRSPs should be carefully weighed against other farm capital investments which may carry both more risk and potentially higher returns. Before making your farm capital investment decisions, it is essential to review and understand your present financial position. The farm management staff of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food are available to help you analyse your present situation and outline the costs and benefits of various investment alternatives.

Quality ecosystem ensured with model forest agreement

KEMPTVILLE — Forestry Canada has concluded a five-year, \$5 million agreement with the partners of the Eastern Ontario Model Forest involving an area extending from the western boundary of Leeds and Lanark counties, east to the Quebec-Ontario border, including the lands of Akwesasne.

The agreement on the Eastern Ontario Model Forest was formally announced by Federal Minister of Forestry, Frank Oberle and Supply and Services Minister Paul Dick during an official signing ceremony held last Thursday afternoon at the

Kemptville College of Agricultural Technology.

"The Eastern Ontario region, with its long history in both forestry and land use management, is ideally suited to be a showcase of sustainable forestry in practice and of the advances made in Canadian forest management," Oberle told a large crowd.

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources is a key partner in the Eastern Ontario Model Forest, which has a strong interest in various aspects of forest management of both private and public lands.

Besides the provincial govern-

ment, about 23 partners and supporters are involved in the model forest, including Domtar, the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne, professional forestry associations, local conservation authorities, recreational groups, consultants, municipal and county governments, educational institutions and land-owner associations.



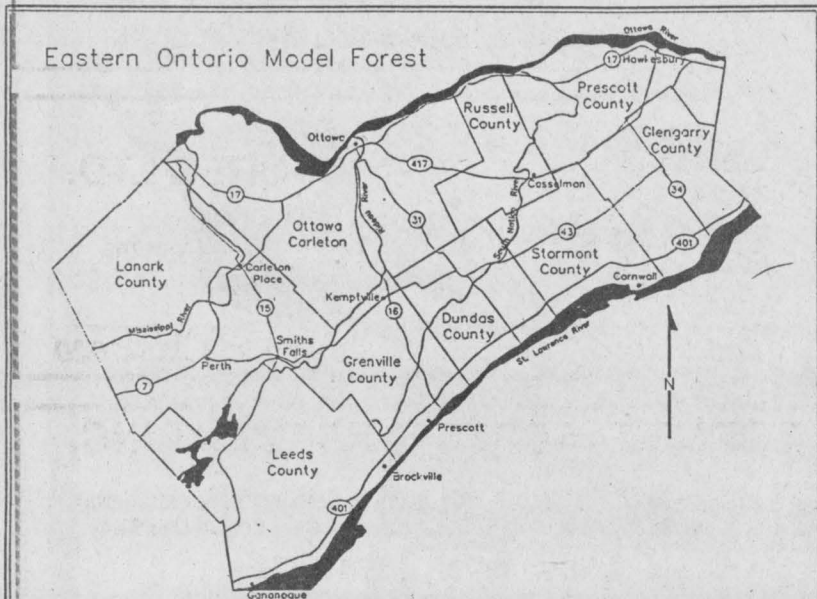

forest management. In addition to furthering forest research and development, the project will also bring significant economic benefits to the region in the years to come," said Dick.

One of the largest model forests, and one in a series of 10 forming the Model Forest Network, the Eastern Ontario Model Forest involves some 1,534,000 hectares.

The Model Forest program is part of the federal government's \$100 million Partners in Sustainable Development in Forestry Program launched by Forestry Canada as part of the government's Green Plan.

"There is an unparalleled opportunity to develop strong partnerships within the Eastern Ontario com-

munity," stated John Kerr-Wilson, president of the Eastern Ontario Forest Group. "The partners will apply their collective strengths to ensure that diverse cultural, social and economic benefits will continue to be realized from our forests."

The Model Forest Network represents six of Canada's eight major forest regions and the forest values such as wildlife, habitat conservation, recreation and culture, in addition to timber and fibre supply. It is designed to demonstrate, on a realistic scale, how forest ecosystems can be managed in accordance with the principles of sustainable development.

Each model forest is designed to be a large-scale working operation

where innovative solutions as well as sound management strategies can be applied to real life problems.

The locations of the 10 proposed forest sites for the Model Forest Network were originally announced last June. Besides the Eastern Ontario area, another site in Ontario, as well as one in Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Quebec, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and two in British Columbia were also chosen.

Work is also under way to extend the model forest network internationally. According to Oberle, Canada is currently inviting proposals from developing countries to establish three model forest projects abroad as the first step in the creation of the international network.

Bovine embryos sold to Japanese

OTTAWA — The Canadian livestock industry will be the first to export bovine embryos to Japan, thanks to the joint efforts of Agriculture Canada, External Affairs and the Canadian Embryo Exporters Association.

The Hon. Michael Wilson, Minister of Industry, Science and Technology and Minister for International Trade Canada, and Agriculture Minister Charles Mayer, recently announced Canada and Japan have signed the first ever quality certification protocol granting Canadian bovine embryos access to the profitable Japanese market.

Estimated sales of Canadian bovine embryos to Japan could surpass \$1 million in 1993. Total bovine embryo export sales for 1991 were \$2.6 million.

"This decision follows careful negotiations with both the industry and the Japanese government," Wilson said. "The Japanese market offers excellent trade opportunities for our agri-food industry. Last year's agri-food sales are estimated at \$1.5 billion, accounting for 20 per cent of Canada's exports to Japan. We look forward to further trade initiatives in the future."

The Canadian Embryo Exporters Association has been designated and approved by the Japanese government as the agency for ensuring the embryos meet genetic quality standards. Agriculture Canada is responsible for ensuring the embryos comply with the health conditions prescribed by the Japanese Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries.

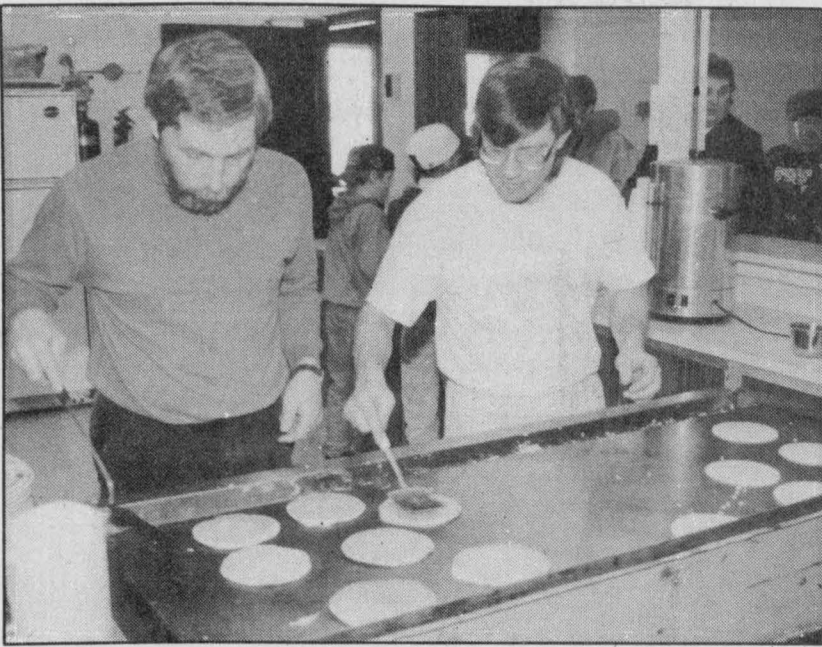

Eager competitors try to get the hang of racing down the ice during the Metcalfe Winter Carnival bicycle race Friday evening at McKendry Park.

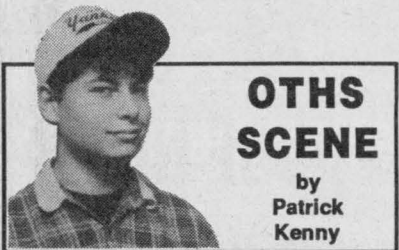

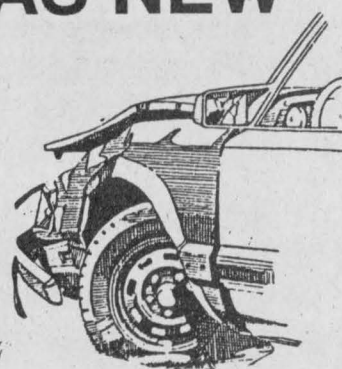
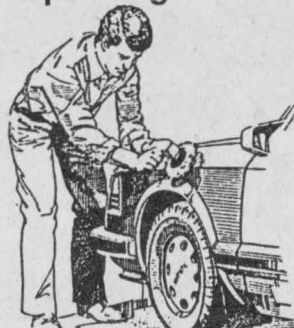

Winchester business bucks the trend

MORRISBURG — The recently-ended recession has meant layoffs or closures for many businesses in SD&G.

But at least one is forging ahead.

After 10 years of service just outside Winchester, Bob and Jannie vanNoppen have expanded their repair shop Winchester Automotive, opening a second service outlet in Morrisburg.

Morrisburg Autopro was officially opened Fri., Feb. 12 in a ribbon cutting ceremony.

The new premises, a former Seaway Gas Bar, is located on Hwy. 2, across from the Morrisburg Shopping Centre. The new facility will have four service bays and computer diagnostic equipment to handle its services which will include computerized tune-ups, front end align-

ment, brake repair, exhaust work, and lubrication on domestic or import vehicles.

The family's background in business was extremely helpful in the expansion, says Terry O'Reilly, Director of the United Counties Economic Development office who assisted the vanNoppens with the enterprise. Part of the office's mandate is to assist existing business to expand their services.

"These people know business. They wanted (to do), and did a lot of this themselves," he says.

The expanded business will still be family-run. David Puccini, the vanNoppen's son-in-law and a resident of Iroquois, will manage the outlet while the vanNoppens continue to run the Winchester location.

Part of the reason for opening the

outlet now was to provide a future for his family and to get a jump on the post-recession recovery, says Bob vanNoppen.

"I have both a son and a son-in-law who are at the start of their careers," he says.

"If I can give them my expertise and lend them a hand financially then I'm developing my own business."

Expanding the business has been under the vanNoppens' consideration for a couple of years.

The vanNoppens chose the village of Morrisburg because he says it is a progressive, attractive community.

"We had done quite a bit of market research and I believe that the South Dundas area is in the process of developing," says vanNoppen. "In our research we saw the signs and we'd just like to be a part of that."

Lose that long-distance feeling

WINCHESTER — Some area residents expect to enjoy significant savings if Bell Canada's recent rate increase proposal is approved.

Bell wants to increase basic rates for customers in the Ottawa-Hull, Toronto and Montreal areas and, in exchange, expand the toll-free calling areas.

It would mean that people in Chesterville and Winchester, for example, could call any location within a 65-kilometre radius of downtown Ottawa without paying long-distance charges. And that, said Doris Lariviere, could mean a savings of up to \$200 a month.

The Winchester resident has a handicapped child and makes frequent calls to Ottawa hospitals, doctors and therapists — always during peak calling hours.

"I think there's a lot of us out there

who think it's a good idea," Lariviere said of Bell's proposal.

Residential customers in Winchester would see their basic local rates rise from \$7.10 a month to \$8.50 in April and \$18.85 in September, should the "Community Calling Plan" proposal be approved by the Canadian Radio-television Telecommunications Commission. Without the expanded toll-free region, basic monthly rates would rise to \$11.30 in September.

Rates for business customers would increase in similar proportions.

Chesterville resident Doris Cross, who has family and friends in the Ottawa area, said she's been waiting for years to see a change.

"There are a lot of friends I'd like to be able to talk to more often, but I can't because it's too expensive."

Cross said she could save \$40 or \$50 a month with an expanded toll-free calling area.

The Ottawa-Hull toll-free area would extend north to Low, Que., west to Arnprior and Almonte, and east to the Quebec communities of Papineauville, Plantagenet, and St. Isidore de Prescott. The southern limits of the area are Chesterville, Winchester, South Mountain, Kemptville and Merrickville.

Depending on where they live, residential customers outside the calling plan area would receive increases of between \$1.40 and \$4.90 a month in September, and single-line business customers would be hit with monthly increases of between \$3.25 and \$13.25.

Bell hopes to raise an additional \$210 million in 1993 and \$450 million in 1994. The company, which has not raised its basic local rates in 10 years, says the increases are necessary to offset falling long-distance revenues.

The CRTC will hold public hearings on Bell's proposal in May.
