Be Sure You Vote Monday

Morrisburg, like many other communities in the area will have an election day on Monday, with two men, Carlton F. McInnis, deputy reeve in the present administration and Gordon W. Thom, a former reeve contesting the reeveship. For deputy reeve, the fight will be between Paul Bankley, a councillor in the present administration, and Ed Jones, the present chairman of the local Hydro Commission.

Seven men will seek the three available council seats. They are

John Allison, Earl Baker, James Robert Bright, William Dillabough, James Langabeer, Bertrum Tipples and Bruce Tuttle.

Hydro Commission members (2 of them) will be selected from a slate comprised of Junior Cassell, Lawrence Coligan and John Thompson.

Separate School Supporters will be voting on one representative to the new area separate school board. Only one is from this immediate area. He is G. Patrick Beavers, Morrisburg lawyer.

Separate school supporters will also vote for three representatives to the new divisional Board of Education for the United Counties. The difference here between the S.S. supporters and those whose taxes go to public schools, is that their representatives will be elected at large (from across the Counties) and not from a particular area or division. Public school supporters, on the other hand, will vote in this area for one representative from a slate comprised of Doug Barclay,

and Dale Beckstead, both of Williamsburg, Clare Nugent of Riverside Heights, and Gordon Ross, of Finch.

On almost every page of this issue are appeals from those seeking election. It is in your interest to read all of them, make your own decision, and then vote for those whom you believe are best qualified to look after our municipal and school affairs. This may very well be the last municipal election, as we have known them in the past.

George E. Beavers Is Guest Speaker

George E. Beavers, Morrisburg, was guest speaker at the monthly meeting of Knox Women's Club of Knox Presbyterian Church, Monday. He spoke on his trip to Japan, presenting slides to emphasize his remarks. Women of the club were most interested because the speaker discussed various facets of life in Japan which they had studied and discussed during the past year as outlined in their "explorer".

Mr. Beavers was particularly impressed with the smallness of the area of Japan which has a population of 100 million people as compared with Canada's great area which has a population of 20 million. He spoke of the noticeable respect shown for age and wisdom as compared with the Western World.

And the outstanding love and care lavished on children was noted as a normal way of life in all strata of society.

The speaker noted that manual labour in parks, farms and on the roads is conducted by women. He also noted that industrialization is greatly speeded up and the majority of people seen on the streets wear western dress.

Mrs. Charles Farlinger, president conducted the meeting. Devotions were led by Mrs. Hal Wagner and Mrs. Alan Farlinger. A donation to the General fund of the WMS for \$50.00 will be sent to headquarters.

The next meeting will be a pot luck supper with exchange of gifts and decoration of the church for Christmas.

Final Tribute for Mrs. H. Reddick

Mrs. Herbert Reddick, the former Ella Rose Beckstead of this area, died Thursday, November 21 at Winchester Memorial Hospital. She was in her 84th year.

Born at Williamsburg, she received her education at area schools and at Morrisburg. She was a daughter of the late Wallace Beckstead and his wife Edith A. Casselman. In 1906 she married Herbert Reddick of Morrisburg and has been a village resident since that time except for two years spent in Ottawa with their son Donald when both Mr. and Mrs. Reddick were in poor health. In 1962 because of a severe heart condition, Mrs. Reddick was unable to continue keeping house. Her husband was 81 at that time.

Later the couple returned to Morrisburg where Mr. Reddick died in March of 1967. Prior to her illness Mrs. Reddick had been active in all branches of work at Lakeshore Drive United Church. She was district supervisor of a correspondence course on bible study called "Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air". She corresponded with thousands of interested persons in the Montreal Ottawa and Bay of Quinte districts. She had held that position for twelve years.

She was a life member of the Ottawa Auxiliary Bible Society and

of the Women's Missionary Society of Lakeshore Drive United Church. She is survived by two sons William H. Reddick of Theresa, N.Y., Donald Reddick of Calgary and one daughter Ruth (Mrs. Walter Langabeer) of Chesterville. A son Carman was killed overseas in 1944. She also leaves eight grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren, one brother Rev. Charles McCammon Beckstead of Pulaski, N.Y., and a sister Mrs. Lester Newton (Alice) of Oswego, N.Y.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday November 23, 1968 at Fairbairn Funeral Home at 2 p.m. with Rev. Garfield Bruce of Lakeshore Drive United Church, officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery, Morrisburg.

Pall bearers were six grandsons: Gary Reddick, Glen Reddick, Donald Reddick, Carman Langabeer, William Langabeer and Edward Langabeer.

Many floral tributes, messages of sympathy and donations to the Heart Foundation were received by the family.

W. O. Coulthart Died at Morewood

The death occurred on Saturday last of William Orval Coulthart, well and favourably known retired farmer, of Morewood, at the age of 81 years. Mr. Coulthart, a lifelong resident of Morewood, had been ill for only a short time.

Born at Morewood on May 24th, 1887, he was a son of the late David Coulthart and his wife, Ida Arundale. He attended schools at Morewood and North Winchester, and on March 16th, 1909, was united in marriage at Chesterville, to Ethel Matilda Edgerton, who survives.

Also surviving are two daughters Mrs. Harry Lapierre (Donelda), of Brockville, and Mrs. Clifford Kelley (Jean) of Ottawa; three sons: Donald, of Toronto; Harold, of Ottawa, and Ralph of Morrisburg; one sister, Mrs. Minnie McMartin of London, and two grandsons, Bill and Gary Coulthart of Morrisburg. He was predeceased by a

sister, Mrs. Jack Clark (Gertie) of London.

The late Mr. Coulthart was an ardent sports fan having participated in hockey and baseball, and also played lacrosse on a six-man team, when the team travelled with a team of horses hitched to a double seated buggy.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday, November 26th at 2 p.m. at Morewood Presbyterian Church, of which he was a member. Services were in charge of Rev. Eaton, assisted by Rev. D. L. Gordon. Interment followed at Morewood Presbyterian cemetery.

A large number of friends attended the service from Alexandria, Brockville, Morrisburg, Ottawa, Cornwall, Morewood, Russell, Cryssler and Smiths Falls.

Service Saturday For Miss Patrick

The funeral of Miss Beverley Joan Patrick will take place on Saturday November 30th at Trinity Anglican Church in Cornwall at 10 a.m. Interment will be at Maple Grove Cemetery.

Beverley died as the result of a collision between a small car, in which she was a passenger, and a West Berlin city double-decker bus. She was injured on September 23, and passed away on November 3rd.

She grew up in the Cornwall district, where her father, Patrick is District Field Secretary for the CNIB, attending public and high schools in Cornwall and Teachers' College in Ottawa. For the past two years she taught young Eskimo children to speak English before beginning their formal education. After two years of this work, she de-

cided to take a holiday in Europe, and she had visited Ireland, England, Scotland and Denmark, and was visiting West Berlin at the time of the accident.

The incidence of tuberculosis is very high at Eskimo Point. At one time, four children from Beverley's class of about thirty, were in Canada in the south. She was deeply affected by this situation, and for that reason her parents have asked people, who might otherwise send flowers, to send a donation instead, in memory of Beverley, to the St. Lawrence Tuberculosis and Health Association, c/o the Bank of Nova Scotia, Cornwall, Ontario.

Beverley is survived by her parents, George and Rosa Patrick, of Cornwall, and a brother, Christopher, of Cornwall and Richmond, Ont.

November 22, at Riverdale Hospital Toronto, following a lengthy illness. She was in her 87th year. Mrs. Casselman had spent the major portion of her life at Morrisburg and in the area until 8 years ago, when she went to Toronto.

She is survived by one daughter, Lois (Mrs. Neil Currie) of Toronto, one brother, Harry Barkley of Prescott, five grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Seaway District Juniors won their first game 15-9 with Osgoode, dropped to 6-15 on the second and broke the tie with a 15-13 win to bring home a consolation after having first been defeated (first by Osnabruk).

The Senior players were defeated in four games vs. Osgoode and Osnabruk. Both Juniors and Seniors failed to meet up with North Dundas. Volley Ball is now finished for the season.

On Sunday a car rally was held from Morrisburg Shopping Plaza over a 60-mile course through Williamsburg and Matilda Townships. To the high school at Iroquois The course which was set out through co-ordination of teachers and students had a number of check points where drivers signed in and were given penalties for various errors such as getting there too soon, getting lost, going too slowly, etc.

Sutherland, Mr. Ross White of the district. Judges will make a decision shortly as to holders of first and second place in the competition.

First Sentence of its Kind Given in Morrisburg Court

In the first sentence of this kind in Ontario, Magistrate J. B. Hunter on November 21st, handed out an intermittent licence suspension to Gary L. Kirkwood of Winchester Springs, who was found guilty of impaired driving.

Asking for an intermittent suspension, defence counsel G. Pat Beavers, of Morrisburg, said that the accused living some 8 miles from work, needed some way to get to and from his work at the Winchester Memorial Hospital. He asked

the court to prohibit the accused from driving, except during the restricted hours of 7 a.m. to 8 a.m., and 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. for the sole purpose of travelling from his home to work. In this way, counsel said, the intent of the legislation would be carried out, without causing the injustice of the accused losing his job and means of employment.

Defence counsel pointed out that he relied on the precedent set in Windsor recently in the case of Regina vs. Gray.

Annual Meeting Cancer Society

Among organizations finalizing business for the current year was the Morrisburg and District Branch of the Canadian Cancer Society which held its Annual meeting at the Civic Building on Monday night November 25th, 1968. Mr. Gordon Thom, President, was in the chair and welcomed the gathering of interested and dedicated persons. He welcomed particularly, two newcomers to our area, who have agreed to serve with the Morrisburg Branch on the new executive, Mrs. J. W. MacDonald, who comes to us from Montreal where she has been for a number of years, the Executive Director of the Canadian Save the Children Fund. Mr. Bruno Barovskis here from Ottawa where he was a recent graduate of Carleton University with his degree in Mechanical Engineering. An outstanding student, he is employed as Plant Engineer with Ekel Industries of Canada, Ltd. in Morrisburg.

Mr. Thom summarized the work of the Branch over the past year and spoke particularly of the manner in which the Cancer Society and Red Cross work so closely together in this area — especially in the area dedicated to the Loan Cup board service. Many volunteers in

this Community and surrounding district work hundreds of hours in the interest of both Societies, and the thousands of dressings, together with Patient Services and the great success of the campaign conducted annually are tributes to the dedication of these people. Speaking especially of the outstanding work done by the Chairman of Women's Services, Mrs. Parker Locke, who over the past nine years in her role as Chairman of this very active committee, has served diligently and kindly, and given unstintingly of her time and energy. Supervising the making of hundreds of thousands of dressings during her term of office, she has not only served the Society well, but was a source of inspiration to the many women who have worked with her.

Reports of Committees were brought to the meeting by Mrs. Locke, Mrs. Kema Beckstead, Dressings Chairman, from Mr. Thom as Campaign Chairman, and on behalf of Mrs. Miriam Salmon, Welfare Convenor.

A highlight of the meeting was a report given by Mrs. J. W. MacDonald who had attended a Services convention in Windsor on Oc-

tober 30 and 31st. She brought back not only much information of note, but an enthusiasm which proved a delight.

Dr. Graham Houze, of Morrisburg, was guests speaker for the evening, and spoke at length on the many advances being made in research and treatment of cancer, within the medical fields. With ease and great depth of knowledge, he brought his audience abreast of many changes in treatment and new methods of medication, and surgical approaches to this dread disease. He recommended highly the need for annual chest X-rays among the adult population stressing the need for the early detection of lung cancer, which when discovered in its early stages has a high ratio of remission when treated in time. A question and answer period followed Dr. Houze's formal address and this proved a source of great interest as he easily brought explanations and answers to the many questions asked.

The new slate of officers for the 1969 season was brought forward by Mr. Thom and those serving will be: President, Mrs. Arthur Edgerton; 1st Vice, Mrs. Kemp Beckstead; 2nd Vice, Miss Irene Ryan; Secre-

tary, Mrs. Gordon Walroth; Treasurer, Mr. T. E. McDermott; Campaign Chairman, Mr. Bruno Barovskis; Women's Services, Mrs. J. W. MacDonald; Co-Chairman, Mrs. Donald Magee; Small Dressings, Mrs. Kemp Beckstead; Welfare Chairman, Mrs. Miriam Salmon; Education Chairman, Mrs. Esther Locke.

Before retiring from the chair, Mr. Thom who has served as president of the local Branch for nine years, and is the Charter president, thanked the executive and all volunteers in every phase of the work of the Branch, for their excellent co-operation and efforts and expressed his best wishes for the continued success of the local Society. He will continue to serve with the Society in other capacities.

Mrs. Edgerton, in assuming the chair, asked for the support of all area people in assisting with and working on all projects in the future. Ladies are asked to note particularly that there will be a work meeting for small dressings, to be held during the second week in December — notice of which will appear in the local paper, giving time and date.

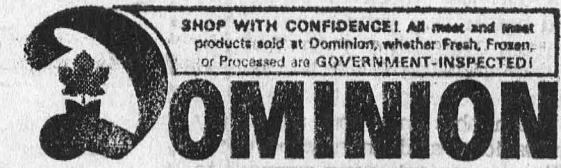

Report from the Ontario Legislature

The Second Session of Ontario's 28th Legislature was opened in the traditional manner on Tuesday, November 19th, by the new Lieutenant-Governor, the Honourable Ross Macdonald.

It will be my hope to bring you, as in the past through the courtesy of the Editor, a weekly report on events and proceedings at Queen's Park. And also as in the past, I shall endeavour to be objective and brief enough not to discourage either the Editor or you who read.

In the usual manner the program of the Government, named the "Speech from the Throne", was read by the Lieutenant-Governor and the House began its debate on the motion in return which will probably consume most of the time of the House till the Christmas recess. The address in reply to the speech from the Throne was moved by Albert Belanger, the P.C. Member for Prescott and Russell, a newly elected member in the last election who spoke both in English and French, the official languages of the House.

Organization of the House by creation of its Sessional Standing Committees, by authorization for Hansard (the printed daily report of proceedings) and the so many other necessary matters occupied the members during the first week. However, by the second week the

Government should have begun the introduction of legislation, and we will then all know what new laws, fees, licences, rights and responsibilities lie ahead of us. And when the budget is brought down after the new year, we will then all know also what new or different taxes, if any, will face us here in Ontario.

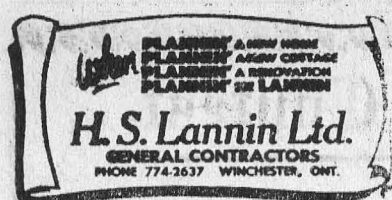

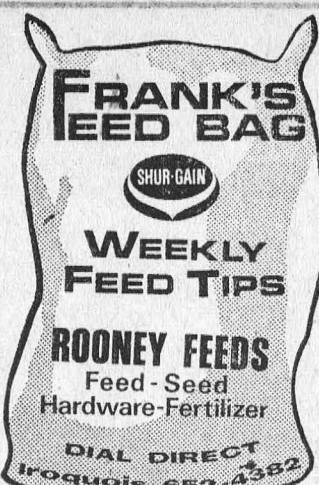

They do remember

Recently I wrote a column about Remembrance Day. It may have had a touch of bitterness in it. But so many things have come up since then that I thought you might be interested.

First of all, a light note. A lady in Ontario remembers something from away back there. "During the First World War, my husband came home on furlow from Belgium. Although his pass said he was clean and free from lice, while we were riding on the underground in London, I watched the lice crawling up and down on his coat collar. So I had to scorch all the seams of his clothes as soon as I got him home, and shave all his hair off him everywhere to get rid of them."

Next, at our school we had the usual Remembrance Day service. But it wasn't the usual one. This year, we let the students plan it. They threw out the draggins and a lot of other

Instead of just a background of songs from both world wars, a student read a commentary he had written himself. It began with, "In Flanders fields, the poppies blow..." It was simple, and moving and honest. Then everybody sang that haunting folk song, "Where have all the flowers gone?" They went to young girls, and the young girls went to soldiers, and the soldiers went to the graveyards, and the graveyards went to flowers.

Then the Roll of Honor from our school. Some of the older teachers can't take this. They went to school with the boys on the list. Last Post, silence, Reveille. Over. The students were silent and solemn and involved.

Afterwards, in the classrooms, we discussed the service and the day. I'd brought along some photos and souvenirs. They were fascinated. After an incredulous look at the cocky young black-haired fighter pilot, and then one at the harassed, gray-haired teacher, they pelted me with questions.

Then came that magnificent CBC documentary on World War I, with Raymond Massey,

old soldier, wounded on those fields, narrating. It was spell-binding and horrible. I kept looking for one of my five uncles who were there, driving mules, dragging through mud.

Finally, came the following letter. Because it's personal, no names, no address.

"Dear Mr. Smiley: I have just read your article entitled 'I Shall Never Forget', and... I must write to you."

"I am 33 years old and I do not consider Remembrance day 'a drag, a sentimental journey for old and middle-aged squares.' My father fought through many of the worst battles in World War I. He was a machine-gunner. He never talked about his experiences, except for once, when he told me of a little village that he had seen far below him in a valley in France... He said only that he wished he could have died and been buried there. He never said anything about the War, but he drank."

"Life was hell for him and for all of us. Mamma said he was terribly changed when he came home from overseas. He died when he was 61, and he had a military funeral and he was as much a casualty of the War as if he'd died at Verdun. He just took longer to die."

"I was 18 when he died and up until I was 16, I almost hated him for the drinking and the trouble. But I began to understand him and by the time he died, we knew and liked each other."

"Since then I've learned more about the War, and I've made certain that my children know about it too. So, on Remembrance Day, we go to the parade, and pray at the Cenotaph with the veterans, and the kids know that it is not just for a Grandpa they never knew, but for all the people who fought and suffered in all wars... And even the youngest boy, four, understands a little bit of it all."

"It will be a long time before everyone forgets. Thank you so much for a very touching article."

On Monday, December 2nd, for the first time in six years, the citizens of Morrisburg will have the opportunity to choose and elect their Reeve for the coming year.

It has been my pleasure to have served you as Reeve for the years 1958 to 1962 inclusive. During my term of office, the Morrisburg and District Horticultural Society, the Ontario Seaway Valley Industrial Committee, the new Community Centre, the Public Library and the Water Safety Programme at our local Beach under the sponsorship of the Morrisburg Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society, and the Morrisburg and District Branch of the Canadian Cancer Society were all organized for the benefit of both old and young in this Village. Public interest ran high because of the leadership which the Council and I were giving to the activities in the area.

The Morrisburg and District Chamber of Commerce flourished and through their efforts Morrisburg had a medium — the Summer Theatre — to keep tourists who came to visit Upper Canada Village overnight so that some of the many tourist dollars were left in our stores. The Shopping Centre was ablaze all summer with flags to attract and bring to our Shopping Centre the tourists and those who travelled in our area. The difficulties that existed as a result of the Seaway Development in the area were given intelligent consideration and most of the problems were overcome to the satisfaction of those who lived within our borders.

During my term of office as Reeve, Seaway Chemicals were assisted in locating their fine plant in this area and Eckel Industries of Canada were induced to locate their plant on Allison Avenue. If elected as Reeve, I am confident that my experience and influence will locate more industries we so urgently need and I will do all in my power to industrialize this area to give more and better jobs to keep our young people in our community. It is impossible for me to accept the fact that the present Council has done enough to interest industries in our Village. It has been very evident to everyone that our Village and this area has been missing out on the opportunities for industry that have been available in this rich Province of Ontario. Although I have not been Reeve these past four years, my interest in this Village and area has never been lost and I have worked constantly in as many areas as possible to continue the good image of this Village.

I have been honoured by having been elected Director of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce, and, as a Member of the Provincial-Municipal Affairs Committee, I have had the opportunity to study and become completely familiar with the new Regional Government

Plans for this Province. It is important that this Village has strong leadership during the next two years to ensure that Morrisburg is not short-shipped, as many have felt was the case during the Seaway Development.

I have been a member of the Board of Governors of the Cornwall General Hospital these past ten years and was elected President and Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Cornwall General Hospital a year ago. It is well to note that this Hospital is presently engaged in a four and a quarter million dollar expansion programme which will include the addition of a psychiatric ward for the benefit of those who require such treatment in this area. I was again honoured by the Governors of the Cornwall General Hospital to have been appointed three years ago to the Steering Committee to consider the need and, if necessary, to build a regional School of Nursing which would allow the training of a larger number of nurses in the three United Counties. This new Regional School of Nursing was officially opened in September 1968 and I have been elected a Governor of this School enabling me to perform a useful role in its training programme.

I have been well aware these past ten years of the situation in which older people find themselves without some one to care for them and to attend to their wants and needs and I have been endeavouring to establish what is known as a Home Care Programme Centre where the aged and infirm can receive the treatment they deserve. This Home Care Programme is presently under study for immediate action and the establishment of a Home Care Centre is now in the process of being worked out. I have represented this Community, on behalf of the Red Cross Society, on this Steering Committee.

Within the past three years, the Mentally Retarded have become of much concern to all of us. I was approached to give the required leadership for the establishment of a School for the Mentally Retarded in Dundas County. Sunnybright School, located just north of Williamsburg, was established upon the formation of the Dundas County Association for the Mentally Retarded of which I was elected President. This School is open and has operated successfully the past two years, and, in September 1968, an additional School was established in the United Church in Iroquois to take care of the increased number of children who require this special attention. This School has been operated under what is called the Township of Williamsburg Education Authority for the Mentally Retarded of which I am Chairman.

I am eager to become Reeve of this Village and I am confident that as Reeve I can give the leadership our citizens deserve. My efforts, throughout the years, are evidence of my interest and capacity to cooperate with the Council and bring Morrisburg into a new era of progress and development.

May I have your support at the polls on Monday when you exercise your franchise to choose your Reeve for the next term of office.

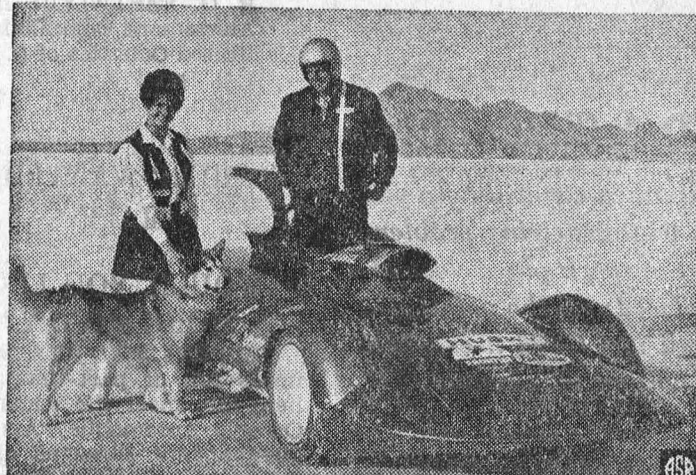

Using the same engine modified to a displacement of 369-cubic inches, Lufkin in another two-way run set a new Bonneville Class C record of 237.154 mph.
