WINCHESTER — During the regular season the Smiths Falls Rideaus handed the North Dundas No. Two Demons two losses.

It wasn't even close in the Upper Canada Minor Hockey League's (East/West) Bantam "C" championship series. The shoe was on the other foot as Bill Brannen's crew trimmed the West Division champs 10-2 in game one (March 24) and finished them off with a 6-1 shellacking on Saturday (March 28).

North Dundas had defeated Kemptville in the East Division final to qualify for a shot at the overall championship.

The Demons finished first in regular season standings, earned the East Division and UCMHL championship banners. It has been a season the entire team and especially coach Brannen is extremely proud of.

The coach notes his team composed a perfect record in the playoffs winning six and tying one of seven games and outscored the opposition 46-23 in the process.

"We actually lost just one game after Christmas," he added.

The coach retraced his team's road to the championship. They defeated North Dundas No. One (6-8-6) in two games. They then eliminated Kemptville No. One Panthers (7-4, 6-6, 4-3) in the Eastern Division final, setting the stage for the sweep over Smiths Falls in the league final.

"We played as a team during the entire playoffs, resulting in the league championship. Part of the team's success was staying out of the penalty box. We finished a close second to Brockville (Eastern Enterprises) for the Most Sportsmanlike Team award," the coach explained.

While his team didn't serve many penalties, they were able to capitalize on the other team's trips to the box. North Dundas scored three powerplay goals against North Dundas No. One; three against Kemptville and six against Smiths Falls.

FINAL SERIES

Coach Brannen reported his squad gave a solid team effort in both games. He noted Smiths Falls had won both regular season meetings but added his team had improved a lot since Christmas.

"Aaron Kelly had two four-point games, including four goals in game two. The team would like to thank Kris Blais playing up from the Pee Wee "Cs". He was a force, scoring four goals and three assists in two games."

Goaltender Robert Lacelle and his defensive crew were strong allowing only two goals in game one (10-2) and one in the last encounter (6-1):

North Dundas led the Rideaus 5-1 after a period of game one and 7-1 after two. UCMHL Atom "C" championship claimed by No. One Demons

CHESTERVILLE — Driven by the offensive talents of Parker Boyd and Justin VantFoort, the North Dundas No. One Demons have rumbled through the opposition and on to the 1997-98 Upper Canada Minor Hockey League's Atom "C" (East/West) championship.

Boyd cracked in a goal 0:59 before the final game of the season here on March 24. The tally gave his team its fifth goal in a 5-1 victory. The win, over the South Grenville No. Two Rangers clinched the UCMHL overall championship. A series the Demons won four points to two.

Boyd's goal was also significant for two other reasons. It was scored on his 12th birthday... and it was his 100th of the season. Boyd recorded 100 goals in 55 league, exhibition, tournament and playoff games.

But North Dundas wasn't blessed with just one scoring wizard. Jason VantFoort also racked up an impressive number of goals. The Demons' team captain, whose birthday is one day after Boyd's netted two goals in that final match and finished the season with 96.

Powered by Boyd and VantFoort the North Dundas No. One Demons first claimed the East Division's regular season championship. They then added the Eastern Division playoff crown and concluded a successful year's work winning the UCMHL's overall (East/West) championship.

The Demons, coached by Jeff Derue and Dave Hutt, outscored their post-season opposition 32-14, registering a record of 6-1-1. In four tournaments they were "A" finalists in two... the North Dundas Mega Tournament and the South Stormont event. They also picked up the "B" Division award in Westport and the "A" Division trophy in Finch (NGS).

ROUND ONE

North Dundas knocked the Kemptville No. Two Panthers out of the picture in round one of the Eastern Division series, whitewashing them twice, 6-0 and tying them 3-3 in a four-point showdown.

Justin VantFoort led the Demons to a 6-0 win in game three, netting three shots. Parker Boyd slapping in two and Brian Hillis snapped in a single. Felix Casa (2), Matt Van-Gurp, Sefton Brown, Zarley Hutt and Sara Volks set up the goals. Mark Fawcett and Chris LaPrade were the winning goaltenders.

Kemptville tied game two (3-3) with a goal by S. Grenville-Woods 3:00 before the final buzzer to remain alive in the series. Brown, Hillis and VantFoort canned the North Dundas goals. Boyd and
