Bird Sanctuary Opens new trail, holds Spirit Walk

On Friday, July 4, at 4:30 p.m., the Friends of the Upper Canada Migratory Bird Sanctuary will be opening up their newest nature trail.

The new path, entitled the Memory Lane Trail, is built so that people of all ages and abilities will be able to enjoy it; the trail is wheelchair accessible, and four benches have been set along the length of the path so that those who are tired of hiking can take some time to rest. A new parking lot has also been constructed to accompany the trail. The path circles around two of the Bird Sanctuary's goose ponds on the north side of the St. Lawrence River.

The Memory Lane Trail was built to honour past Friends of the Sanctuary. Plaques in their honour have been placed on the four benches which accompany the trail, so that passersby and tired hikers can see to whom the path is dedicated. This year, the group of past Friends of the Sanctuary who will be honoured includes Art Buckmaster, Lennie Buckmaster, Ralph Flintoff, Rod Hummel, Ralph Hilda Norton, and Rob Saunders.

After the grand opening of the Memory Lane Trail, an informal barbecue will be held at the Sanctuary Interpretive

Centre. Following the barbecue, the Spirit Walk will be held, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

The Spirit Walk is annual guided tour that held by the Friends of the Sanctuary. Attendees are guided through a trail in which actors masquerade as the spirits of historic characters, and events from the past are re-enacted. The Spirit Walk will also be held on Saturday, July 5, at 6:30 p.m.

The Spirit Walk costs \$6 per adult, and \$1 per child under twelve years of age; however, there are a limited amount of spots available for the event, and those wishing to attend must reserve in advance. Registrations can be done by telephoning 936-2381.

The Friends of the Sanctuary are also continuing to hold their meetings on the second Thursday of every month, at 7 p.m. These meetings are free to attend for anyone, and they showcase the upcoming events and activities that the Friends have planned for the Bird Sanctuary. The next Friends meeting will be held on July 10.



Parks of the St. Lawrence attractions





UCDSB enters into Building 2020 phase

The Upper Canada District School Board (UCDSB) has started the next phase in the Boundary 2020 process called Building 2020.

The process, which cludes the closure of delementary schools between 2008-2012 and sending Grade 7 and 8 students to high school. has been ongoing since last Sept. Co-chair of

Boundary 2020 Phil Dawes says the board is currently in the process of organizing regional working teams to help make the transition smoothly.

These teams will include school principals, parents, staff and students who will work with the regional superintendents to implement the changes.

We are trying to get this up and running. The teams will be organized starts in Sept. They will make sure the students make a smooth transition and that there is a welcoming environment for them," said Dawes.

Some of the things the teams will help with are school layout and the movement of furniture. Dawes added that if a parent wanted to get involved they should let the principal know and stressed that even if they aren't part of a team they always have the opporunity to get involved through their school council.

"The school councils will have a role to play in this process," said Dawes.

Part of Building 2020 includes long-time Seaway District High School Principal Roy Lalonde taking on a new role as Principal of Transition and Implementation of Grades 7 to 12 in Sept. He will help prepare both Seaway and South Grenville District High School for this configuration in time for the 2009 school year.

"It is going to be a challenging and interesting role. I am looking forward to laying the groundwork for the implementation of Grades 7 to 12," said Lalonde.

He added that he plans to visit as many institutions in the province that already have the 7 to 12 model as possible to see how they work and what plans are in place for

them. Lalonde said that the blueprint for these schools (Seaway and South Grenville) will be used at other schools as they move to this configuration.

"One of the parents' concerns is having their Grade 7 or 8 child with high school students. We have to find out why and work to make the parents and kids feel safe in the high school environment," said Lalonde.





Antique military vehicles will also be on display. A unit of the Canadian Army Veterans Motorcycle Units is expected to attend the games as well.


New to this year's games will be a tug of war competition, featuring the Cameron Highlanders, S.D. & G Highlanders and the Brockville Rifles tug of war teams.

Wally's Café heralds new Playhouse season


The first customer to visit the diner in the summer of 1940, the day before the grand opening, is

Janet Chester (AnnaMarie Lea) on her way from Illinois to Hollywood to realize her dream of stardom. Her rendition of Red Red Robin is perhaps the funniest scene in the play, and convinces Wally and Louise that Janet would be better off as a sales girl at Woolworth's than attending auditions in Hollywood. Janet refuses to be diverted from pursuing her goal, and we see her next in Scene 2, which is set in the summer of 1958. Janet is working with Wally and Louise as a waitress in the café after her marriage to a Hollywood stuntman ends in scandal. (According to Janet, she didn't mean to fire the gun). The audience learns that Wally's Café has struggled through the past 18 years, and a number of personal secrets are hilariously revealed by the three characters.

The final Act of the play is set in the summer of 1981. Wally and Louise are packing it in and heading for life in an old folks home. Despite their strug-gles and Wally's failing memory, the love between the two is very apparent. Susan Greenfield portrays an elderly Louise with remarkable verisimilitude and Wally's faulty recall has the audience in stitch-As they pack their final boxes, Janet enters, delivered by limousine and decked out in jewels, ready to reward her two best friends for past kind-

There are many funny and touching moments in the play, and the characters grow and change over the years, revealing a few important truths about life. The set is fantastic with a realistic dessert visible through the café windows. This is a well-produced, well-acted and fast-paced comedy. A perfect choice to herald in a new season at the Playhouse.

Ask a Master Gardener

UNITED COUNTIES MASTER GARDENER

Q. I would like to plant an obedient plant my garden. What oes it look like?

Obedient Plant, Pysostigia virgiana is a late summer blooming perennial, shoots about 4 feet or more, very easy to grow and spreads like wildfire. The flowers are similar to small snapdragons.

The colours are white or purple and flowers can be repositioned at any angle that you desire.

From the bottom of the stem they can be positioned at any angle and will stay as you put them. Hence the name obedient plant. This plant is related to mint and if you know how it spreads you know what mean by running. The excess roots can be sliced and thrown away. Like mint, obedient plant will do well along the banks of a stream or a pond. It has wandering ways so be careful. It is easily pulled.

Q How can you tell a female winterberry from a male winterber-

A. This is difficult unless you are an expert. Male and female flowers appear on separate plants and both must be present for the female to set fruit. One male plant can adequately pollinate 2-3 female plants. If placed within an acre this is an adequate distance for successful pollination. Always buy a male and female to ensure pollination. Winterberry -ILEX bears fruit in




November and can be seen along wet ditches and country roads. This is a fabulous plant for late winter decorations. Outside, the berries do not last longer than Christmas. Late autumn last year I picked a small branch for the house and it lasted the winter. I did not add water. The berries will fall, if you move the branch. My arrangement of ILEX

lasted until Easter. Q. Are cotoneaster berries poisonous? I have young children and I am afraid they will eat the berries.

A. The berries are not poisonous, but one could have a stomach upset if too many berries are consumed. The leaves are toxic

Q I would like to grow Joe-Pye Weed in my garden. Is it pos-sible? I have very dry

A Joe-Pye Weed, EUPATORIUM is extremely hardy and grows in boggy soil alongside water. It is a hefty plant growing 6 feet or more. It is very hardy in this area and you will see it along ditches and boggy areas. The butterflies love it and the flowers are smoky pink, lilac and bloom in August





Those that knew Joyce will always remember her grace and generosity, her cheerful smile and sense of humour, her marmalade and her shortbread, and her love. Joyce's final legacy is her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren who brought her great joy, and whose hearts will always carry the joy she brought them.





Iroquois fire fighters train for Saturday's games

The 12 fire fighting member team has been practicing as hard as they could last week.

Their goal is to win the Iroquois Fire Department Memortal Trophy on Saturday.

The weekend will be a special one as the Eastern Ontario Fire Fighters Association comes to town bringing with them firefighters from Cardinal, Prescott, Kemptville, Augusta, Athens, Mississippi Mills, Carleton Place and Spencerville.

The Iroquois fire department was in line to host the annual event this year and they would like to take top honours if they could.

The event features the firefighter races, which is am opportunity for firefighters from fire departments in the association to claim bragging rights for the most efficient firefighting team.

The games get under way in front of the Iroquois Fire Deopartment on Dundas Street at 9 a.m. The daylong sporting event features exciting games but also entertainmkent food and refreshments. The Iroquois—Matilda Lions Club steak barbecue as well as breakfast and brunch courtesy of Scouts Canada and the appearance of an as yet unannounced special firefighter team from the United States.

Each and every team has one goal in mind and that is to capture the Iroquois Fire Department Memorial trophy. The trophy dates back to 1986. The Iroquois Team members are: Trevor Riopelle, Jay Merkley, Shawn Markell, Rick Gogdale, Jamie Vanderspank, Brad Thompson, Chris Craig McDermid, Hodgson, Scott Speer, Andy Major, Wayne Mason and Andre Paquette.

Fire fighter Trevor Riopelle is helping with the organizing of the events on game day. "it is very interesting to watch," he says as he describes each of the events. Riopelle points out that the events are not all about endurance as are some at other firefighter contests. These games, he says are about how efficient a team is and how quickly they can complete the various tasks they are given. Each event, in many ways, mirrors real life situations that fire fighters have to be prepared to excel at when they are at their job. "All of the team members train so that they can take each other place," said Riopelle adding that from the beginning, the team selection was based on what each team members was best at.

The Iroquois Fire Department has a long and proud record of coming away with the title. Over the past twenty-two years the team put together by Iroquois has won the cup nineteen times. A remarkable feat considering that all of those wins were consecutive. Their last victory was in 1997. Kemptville took the top spot in 2006 and in 2005. Last year the Augusta Fire Department took the honors.

The winning tradition has not been the result of luck. The Iroquois team has been practicing for each of the various competitions for the past few months. Twice a week Iroquois firefighters block off a section on Dundas Street in front of their fire house and run through the drills that they have to do very well in

The events are broken down into wet and dry competitions. There is an 8 man dry completion involving how fast a team can uncouple and then couple up a length of hose. The same event is also held but this time with wet hoses.

There are four man wet and dry hose replacement events and an eight man event that involves preparing the hose, hooking it up to a fire hydrant and then hitting a target with the water. There are a host of other times events including a three man and five man ladder toss. One popular event is the bucket brigade. Teams of firefighters use cloth buckets to fill a 40 gallon drum at he end of a ladder. Speed, precision and staying calm while transferring bucket after bucket to a firefighter at the top of a ladder is the key in this event. There are boot races featuring the deputy chiefs from each competing fire station and bunker races where teams have to dress up in firefighter gears then strip down at the other end of the track.

Iroquois fire chief Philip Thompson says that the races are truly a community event. "The next two weeks will be hard for us," he said. He points out that fire fighters from all of he participating communities do an awful lot for their neighbours. Because of that he is expecting a great turnout of fans on race day.

After the races a finished and a winner declared the firefighters will take a few hours off and then take part in a parade. The parade is planned for around 7 p.m. and will start in front of the Iroquois United Church, work its way down and along Elizabeth Drive, turning right on Bay Street and then turning right a final time on Dundas Street ending up at the Iroquois Civic Centre. The Ottawa Fire Department Band will be in the parade as well as the Iroquois Legion's colour guard. Iroquois fire chief philp Thompson hopes that the entire South Dundas community will want to come by and support them. In the case of a fire call the Morrisburg and Willimaburg fire department have offered to cover
