

St. Lawrence Parks to get \$2.24M upgrades

Minister Fonseca calls region a 'tourist's paradise' of important attractions

On Friday, Aug. 8, Ontario's Minister of Tourism, Peter Fonseca, announced a \$2.24 million investment in the St. Lawrence Parks Commission during a presentation at the Ontario Power Generation Community Pavilion.

The presentation feathree key speakers: Peter Fonseca, Jim Brownell and Pat Macdonald. Peter Watson, the chair of the St. Lawrence Parks Commission, was also present to introduce and thank each of the speakers.

The Honourable Peter Fonseca was the first speaker at the event. He talked about the importance of the attractions along the St. Lawrence River, including Upper Canada Village, Fort Henry, and the Crysler Park Marina, for the tourism industry in Ontario - even going so far as to call the region "a tourist's paradise".

He also touched upon the region's world-wide recognition, especially regarding the recent designation of Fort Henry, the Rideau Canal, and the Kingston Fortifications as **UNESCO** World Heritage Sites. He then announced a \$2.24 million investment in the SLPC, and went into detail about how the money will be spent: repairing the heritage buildings at Upper Canada Village, updating Fort Henry, and fixing up parks along the St. Lawrence River were just a few of the projects mentioned of his ties to the Minister of Tourism, and discussed in length the Minister's visit to the riding, which

The next speaker was Jim Brownell, the MPP for Stormont-Dundas-South Glengarry and the parliamentary assistant to Peter Fonseca. Brownell spoke

included a stroll through Upper Canada Village, a night at the Nightingale House, and some theatre at the Upper Canada Playhouse. He also talked about his responsibility to attract visitors to the riding, and about his visits to Upper Canada Village. His thoughts on the Parks of the St. Lawrence were summed up with an encouraging phrase: "This is a jewel in the crown of our history, our heritage, and our tourism opportunities."

The third speaker was Pat Macdonald, the general manager of the SLPC. Macdonald first talked about the accomplishments of the Parks of the St. Lawrence - including the astounding turnout at the Medieval Festival, the construction of the OPG Community Pavilion and the Marker 72 Dockside Patio, and the 1.6 per cent increase in revenues and

over five per cent increase in visitors at the Parks of the St. Lawrence as of July.

She also spoke of the challenges that the Parks had to face this season, including the rainy weather, the unstable economy and the price of gas. Finally, she presented some ideas for improving tourism in the Parks, such as targeting visitors from Ottawa and Quebec and getting a VIA Rail station near the attractions.

To cap off the presentation, Bruce Fitzgibbons and Tim Robbins, who helped build the OPG Community Pavilion, presented Jim Brownell with a plaque to thank him for his contributions to the Parks of the St. Lawrence.

the derby cars are finished smashing each other up, the Tycoons will be providing entertainment under the big tent from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.



From 9 a.m. until 6 p.m., the "Kids Mountain of Fun" will be providing entertainment to children at the fair - attractions will include crafts, a petting zoo, Little Ray's Reptile Zoo and pony rides. From 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., a blank screen karaoke contest will be held, with \$1,500 in prize

The popular greasy pig contest will take place at 3 p.m., along with the lawn tractor races. Shane Yellowbird will be providing entertainment under the big tent from 8 to 9:30 p.m., and DW James will be performing for the Saturday night dance from 10 p.m. until 1 a.m.

On Sunday, the exhibit gates will open at 6 a.m. once again, followed by the other gates at 9 a.m. At 10 a.m., the poultry barn, exhibit hall, and Kids Mountain of Fun will re-open, and Western and heavy horse shows will be held. At 11 a.m., there will be ATV mud bog events and a lawn tractor pull. The midway and beer garden will open at noon. From 1 to 3:30 p.m., Gail Gavan and the Ryan Brothers Party Band will be entertaining under the big tent, followed by Gene Watson and his Farewell Party Band from 4:30 to 6 p.m. An ATV pull will be held at 1:30 p.m. At 5 p.m., the midway and exhibit hall will close. To finish the weekend off, a grand draw with \$3,700 worth of prizes will be held under the big tent at 6 p.m.

The bright side of the rain

On Thursday, July 24, the rain in the city of Toronto set a new record for the summer - 273 millimetres since the beginning of June. The previous record for June and July rain in Toronto was 271.3 millimetres, set in

This sort of rampant precipitation is happening all over Ontario, with record or near-record levels of rain in Peterborough, Collingwood, Picton, Thunder Bay, Sarnia, and many other parts of our province. They are certainly dampening the fields, gardens, and roads, but the constant downpours and lack of sun may very well be dampening the spirits of many people here in South Dundas too. However, there are some positive things coming out of

all of the rain. One group that is happy about the rain in Ontario is Ducks Unlimited Canada. While precipitation has diminished in the West of Canada this year, the rain in Ontario, mixed in with the warm temperatures, has created a lush and enticing habitat for waterfowl. The water level in wetlands is very much above the norm, so the birds have much bigger and higher quality habitats than usual for brood


rearing and molting. The constant rain is also delaying the harvesting of hay in southern Ontario, which benefits the waterfowl. According to a survey from Ducks Unlimited Canada, Ontario is by far the best place this summer for waterfowl to thrive.

The giant Great Lakes are also benefiting from the large amount of precipitation this summer, according to information from the U.S.

Army Corps of Engineers in Detroit. After hitting an all-time record low water level last year, the water level in Lake Huron has risen 7 inches already this summer. and is expected to rise another 10 to 15 inches before autumn. The water levels of Lakes Erie, Ontario, and Michigan have also risen over 7 inches each. Lake Superior's water level has even

risen 16 inches! The high water levels in these lakes can drastically help avoid situations where dredging must be done so that boats can pass through certain areas. Dredging is an excition operating during which sediment is removed from the bottom of an area in a lake and moved to another location, so that there will be more room between the bottom of the lake and the surface in that area. These operations can harm aquatic ecosystems, and they are very costly.

So, next time it rains, think about the positive aspects of all the water pouring down - you might just feel a bit better.







Heat or eat this winter?

To the editor,

This looks like it will be heat or eat for many Canadians this winter as the federal government sticks by its two per cent GST cut.

Last fall's price on oil was 84.9 and as of July 2008 heating oil sits at 9. That is an increase of 41 cents per litre in the last 10 months.

Six years ago heating oil was 45 to 49 cents per

On Sept. 2, 2005, MP Scott Reid sent me a letter while in opposition stating the time has come to cut Canadians a tax break, Stephen Harper had proposed the Liberal government to reduce its surcharge on gasoline which was introduced in the 1990s to reduce the federal deficit and for the government to end its practice of charging GST on top of provincial taxes which amounts to double taxing the consumer at the pumps and stop charging GST on gas at 85 cents per litre. So I questioned him on this and his reply on July 14, 2008 is that was the Conservative platform for the 2004 election that called for an end to the tax on tax by capping GST at 85 cents per litre. He failed to mention why they had not reducded the surcharge on gas, so it must be for the same reason, I guess.

So now I am left wondering why he sent me the letter on Sept. 2, 2005 if that was no longer his

party's policy.

He now states that an election was on the horizon and called a couple of months later and they took office in early 2006. He says the new policy was to cut the GST by two per cent and Canadians see this relief not only on gasoline prices, but on virtually all goods and services.

(Do you see the relief as I do not see it.)

The Prime Minister's Office responded to me on July 18, 2008 by stating by cutting the GST from seven to five per cent has reduced the gasoline tax burden on Canadians.

Then the letter says the government of Canada fully appreciates the negative effects that the rising fuel and energy prices have on Canadians, but fails to say what or if they are doing anything so Canadians can heat their homes this winter.

Jack Layton leader of the NDP, responded on July 2, 2008.

In 2007 a study released shows 15-27 cents per litre of gas is being pumped right into the pockets of big oil and gas companies.

Then he says he wants you and your family to benefit from their efforts and there is no GST on home heating fuel, reduce tuition fees, reduce the high cost of prescription drugs, eliminate ATM fees, and remove the GST from sales of books or pamphlets.



The Accidental Farmwife

on't Be A Chicken

Before bringing our 50 turkeys and 50 chicks home from Rooney's in May, the Farmer carefully prepared the coop. He swept out the cobwebs, removed any dangerous objects from the floor. and built a little circular enclosure, about the size of a toddler's swimming pool. He divided this structure in half with a long board, and placed food and water and a heat lamp in each section. Then he hung heavy blankets over the windows, to eliminate drafts. I had never seen him being so

careful before. Just how delicate are these creatures, anyway?

When he brought the beasties home, he put the chicks on one side of the divider and the turkeys on the other. They immediately rushed the circle of heat created by the hanging red lamp, piling on top of each other. The birds on the bottom of the heap were smothering. The Farmer frowned. He raised the heat lamp a few inches, to increase the surface area of the heat circle. Suddenly everyone had room. He looked at

"We're going to come in here every morning and every night to check on them, but make sure you don't let in a draft. If they get chilled, they pile on each other and die.

He told me we might lose half our chicks. I couldn't believe how weak and wimpy they were.

This is really my first experience with poultry - unless, of course, you count Taiwan (and I don't). Walking to the subway in Taipei every morning, I had to pass by a street vendor who took

great delight in beheading a chicken just as I was walking past. I looked straight ahead, never gratifying her antics with my attention. I didn't want to see if the chicken-with-its-

Those Taiwanese chickens always seemed to be monstrous, huge and fierce, in my memory: nothing like these wimpy chicks on our farm.

I must admit I wasn't as interested in the baby chicks as I was in the baby lambs that I bottle-fed last February. They just don't have the same endearing personalities. They're soft, and fluffy, to be sure. But they are just too tiny and terrified to be cute. For the most part, I have let the Farmer look after the birds.

After a week or two, Farmer Fisher lifted the enclosure and set the chicks free to roam about the coop. Finally. he moved them to a room at the back of the barn that was open to outside for fresh air. They could escape fairly easily if they tried, but only the turkeys have been roosting on the wall and they don't seem to have the motivation to flee. They are quite content at this resort, where food and water are provided daily.

We only lost four birds in the early coop stages, when they were clustering for warmth.

We lost one more during a group attack (don't ask - it isn't pretty).

The one chicken death that I found the most interesting was the one

who died of a heart attack. My husband said he just went into the coop area, perhaps a bit too abruptly, and the movement startled the chicken so much that he had a heart attack and died.

This, to me, is ridiculous. But apparently it happens, a lot.

The chickens are nearly ten pounds each, and the time is approaching when they must meet their

We carefully and qui entered the coop the other night in order to spread fresh hay over the floor. As I hauled myself over the half-wall into the coop, the chickens skittered sideways en masse, muttering to themselves in a highpitched, gurgling whine the whole time: "ohh.... what's she doing....she's coming closer And then every once in a while there would be an intermittent squawk from one who just couldn't hold in the anxiety anymore. But none of them had heart attacks, thankfully. Not even when I accidentally dropped my pitchfork in their midst.

The Farmer has rented cages for transporting the chickens to the processing plant.

I can't say I will be sad to see them go, but I can at least rest easy that they had a good life while they were on the Fisher Farm Chicken Resort.

'Out of Order' is great fun and a must see for fans of fast-paced farcical humour.





Be sun safe this summer

With summer here, many of us will spend more time outside enjoying the warm weather and outdoor activities, providing us with many health benefits. And while natural sunlight is important to maintain good health, too much exposure to the sun's rays can cause skin cancer and eye problems.

Here are some tips on how to be sun safe this summer:

REDUCE YOUR EXPOSURE

Reduce your exposure to the sun between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. when the sun's rays are at their strongest, or any time of the day when the UV Index is three or more. Ultraviolet rays (UVA and UVB) cause skin damage and can get through clouds, fog and haze. As well, water, sand and concrete can reflect, and even increase the sun's burning rays.

COVER UP

If you want or need to stay outside, seek shade or create your own. For instee, why not make a personal fashion statement by using an attractive umbrella! A wide-brimmed hat (in your favourite colour, of course) will also go a long way in protecting your head, face, neck and ears.

Carry your fashion statement a little further with clothing that covers your bare skin. It will be most effective if it is loose, tightly woven and lightweight.

Sunscreen should have a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or higher, and an SPF of 30 if you work outdoors or if you will be outside for most of the day. To

protect yourself against both UVA and UVB rays, look for "broad spectrum" on the label. Apply sunscreen generously, at least 20 minutes before going outdoors. Use a waterproof sunscreen if you'll be in or near water.

And don't forget the most stylish of fashion items, your sunglasses. They can help prevent damage to your eyes by blocking a large amount of UV rays. Choose sunglasses with even shading, medium to dark lenses and both UVA and UVB protection.

PROTECTING BABIES AND YOUNG CHILDREN

It's best to keep babies and young children out of direct sunlight. Use clothing that covers their arms and legs, add a hat and apply a little sunscreen (if over six months). Put the stroller, playpen or carriage in the shade - under trees or an umbrella

CHECK YOUR SKIN REGULARLY

You can never be completely safe from the sun. Over time, exposure to UV rays may cause skin cancer. Report any changes to your skin to your doctor.

AVOID TANNING BEDS

Just like the sun, tanning beds and sun lamps release UV rays that can cause sunburn, damage skin and increase the risk of skin cancer.

IJC to debate water levels

The Commissioners of the International Joint Commission (IJC) of Canada and the United States wish to thank the public, elected officials and the state and provincial governments for their participation in the IJC's comment period, which ended on July 11, 2008. Commissioners believe that the comment period was productive in clarifying the views of the different stakeholders in the

The IJC will meet in mid August to consider these comments and deliberate on the future regulation of Lake Ontario and St. Lawrence River water levels and flows.

The August meeting will also include a session with representatives of the federal governments of Canada and the United States to discuss the process for consulting with them, and through them, with the provinces of Ontario and Quebec and the state of New York.

The IJC will seek the concurrence of the two federal governments before making a final deci-

sion.

The IJC held 10 information meetings in communities around Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River in April and May, followed by 10 public hearings in June. All six Commissioners attended the public hearings.

Over 1,200 written submissions were received and over 200 organizations and individuals provided comments at the public hearings. More than 1450 people attended the public hearings.

The record of comments is available on the IJC's website at www.ijc.

org.

The information meetings and public hearings were held to provide information and receive comment on a proposed new Order of Approval and regulation plan, released on March 28, 2008, for regulating the outflows from Lake Ontario through the Moses-Saunders Dam in the St. Lawrence River between Cornwall, Ontario and Massena, New York.

The Order of Approval provides the legal framework and the regulation plan provides the operational framework for regulating the outflows.


