lounge licence for consumption on licensed premises with food available?


3. Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a lounge licence for consumption on licenced premises?

IS THIS YOUR COMMUNITY?

Every two years we have the opportunity to select our municipal representatives in this area and this December 2nd is the voting day. For the past two years the citizens have had the opportunity to complain about the problems that to them were large enough to cause them some anguish and right now they have the opportunity to do something about it.

If you don't like what is going on in your municipality, don't just complain about it, step right in and get yourself elected so that you can help bring about the changes you want.

It's a simple enough procedure to get yourself nominated and it might even be just as simple to get yourself elected. But we've also found that the job doesn't end there, it has just begun.

We're all the same when it comes to complaining about the decisions made on our behalf by the local council. We don't like some of the things they do, so we complain. Not so much to them, mind you, but to almost everyone else. It might be time we shook ourselves loose from the habits of the past and did something about it. But keep in mind one thing. Don't enter into the race for a seat as reeve, deputy or councillor unless you plan to spend some time at it...plenty of time. And be prepared to meet up with those people who, like yourself, do a lot of complaining. You're not the only one you know and once you get elected you'll find this

But if you have what it takes, then by all means get right in there. There is always room for one more worker. We've always felt that it is far better to get into these positions by election than by acclamation. At least you know where you stand and that you actually represent a certain percentage of the people of the community in which you live. There is no better satisfaction!

Many people feel they are not capable of doing the task required, but you just might be surprised at how well you do if you select to run for office for the right reasons. One of the most important of these is the belief that you can "serve" your community.

Public meetings are to be held in Iroquois this Thursday night and in Matilda on Monday afternoon. Take time to drop into these meetings. It will be a good experience.

Then I turned to Page 2 of the list and nearly fell off my chair. I came to two conclusions. Either the chap who had dictated the list had failed to proof-read it, or the secretary who had done the typing had finished Page 1 and gone out and had a large liquid lunch before tackling Page 2.

Don Quixote came out as Don Quiote. This must be an animal story about a coyote called Don. Emily Bronte must be twirling in her grave on the moors, to see her magnificent Wuthering Heights described as Withering Heights.

Thomas Hardy will be having a celestial seizure when he realizes that his great Tess of the D'Urbervilles has a new title: Tess of the D'Umbervilles. D'Umber than what?

A science fiction novel, The Chrysalids, has a new life as The Chrysslids. The Luck of Ginger Coffey has been transformed to Lack of Ginger Coffey. Probably some sort of rationing.

In 1940 there were approximately 45 homes for the aged and now there are 178, he said.


Mr. Sauve reports the course was well worth attending on behalf of the senior citizens of the area.



Recognize Needs Of Small Business

Business Development Bank Act by the federal government is following the lead taken by the former Progressive Conservative government of John Diefenbaker in recognizing the needs of small business and perhaps realizing the importance of small business to the Canadian

economy I certainly hope that such is the case, for small businesses are a unique form of enterprise. They provide a productive outlet for the energies of Canadians. Most Canadians are enterprising people who want to be indepen-dent in terms of their economic way of life. I believe they exhibit a greater efficiency when stacked, pound for pound, against large business. They have a capacity to become the specialist suppliers of large business. They add variety and service, a specialist skill, to the economic life of our country

Small businesses provide com-petition. It cannot be overemphasized that they do constitute a bulwark against monopoly in business and they provide the means for the entry into productive business of many young people. Small business employs half the labour force in Canada. They are a large and developing source of employment, They provide for new directions and new methods of doing business, and they offer an opportunity for personal initiative which, in a society such as ours, is growing less and less.

Small business is indeed in trouble in certain areas of Canada. I understand the minister and the government is looking at the regional aspect of the problems of financing Canadian small business. I am sure that the problems of Newfoundland are different from the problems of British Columbia, which in turn are different from those of the province of Ontario, and, in some aspects, those of the province of Quebec. I think it is a very healthy thing that we are recognizing the differences that exist in our

Canadian economic community, I urge the minister and the government to have the bank show a spirit of adventure when they consider each individual application for assistance. If this bill is to help small bus-iness in the way it should be helped, and indeed must be helped if it is to survive, the same risks must be taken as are taken by the thousands of small businessmen who have

made this country great.
Such a spirit of adventure on the part of the bank should not mean that loans would be given freely and haphazardly to each and all that apply, for many

The introduction of the Federal will apply that would not have a chance to survive in the everyday world of business.

However, unless such a spirit of adventure is present in the consideration of applications, many unusual but potentially successful businesses would not have a chance to become operational.

The foundation of most of the

great corporations of Canada and indeed the world, in most cases, was an unusual idea or a unique way of presenting an old idea. Many of these giant companies started out as small businesses and were made possible because someone was adventure some enough to take a chance on something untried but potentially succes sful.

Fullerton Report Damaging To Local Government



Walter Baker M.P. Reports

Mr. Baker claimed today that the Fullerton report tabled in the House of Commons has unfortunately provided all tools necessary to effectively dismantle local government in the Ottawa area. "The transfer of functions, the power to tax, the jurisdiction to borrow, the ability to award grants, conditional or otherwise and others are proposed to be put into the hands of a body that would in effect be dominated by appointed rather than elected officials" he said.

Mr. Baker stated that the Fullerton recommendations are based on two very questionable assumptions. "The report assumes that existing structures have failed to give federal presence adequate recognition. The truth of the matter is that they have never been given a chance. The Federal Government has steadfastly resisted the appointment of region? representatives to the National Capital Commission." "Secondly" - Mr. Baker commented, "only lip service is given in the report to the maintenance of local governments. In actual fact the report indicates that the present local governments are really considered an impediment to efficiency. The impression is that Mr. Fullerton does not trust our local politicians to do the right thing" said Mr. Baker.

"The Fullerton report is an attempt to do indirectly what would be absolutely unacceptable if done directly: that is to suggest a method of government which sites on one more layer of bureaucracy in such a way that local democratic government will wither."

"I feel it is highly unlikely that the Province of Ontario would agree to undo the experiment in regional government which has been undertaken and

hich they are presently studying to make stronger. I would insist on seeing the conclusions and recommendations made by Dr. H. Mayo who is presently studying regional government in Ottawa-Carleton area, before accepting any of the Fullerton Report recommendations," said Mr. Baker.

It is an anachronism that in 1974, when people are most concerned about direct involvement in the affairs of their communities and local councils, that Mr. Fullerton would propose a form of government which represents institutions and geography rather than people, "he added.

Unilingualism

Walter Baker, Progressive Conservative Member of Parliament for Grenville Carleton, today commented on the statements made by the Honourable Jean Chretien, President of the Treasury Board, to the Richelieu Club in Quebec on November 5

"I am most concerned that Mr. Chretien's announcement may involve a loss of obs for unilingual anglophone public servants. Such a shift in the direction of our bilingualism policy must not result in any person presently holding a position to be designated unilingual French to lose that position" said Mr. Baker.

"At the same time, no positions should be closed to any Canadian who is prepared and willing to learn a second language" he added.

Mr. Baker continued: "Mr. Chretien's announcement raises many issues, but a most important principle, respect for parliament, has again been violated. Mr. Chretien's has announced a major change in our bilingualism policy outside of the House of Commons.

"It was precisely to avoid this type of announcement that the Opposition asked the government to agree to put protection for unilingual public servants into the Law of the Land" he stated, "This whole situation again points to the necessity for a bilingualism policy for the public service to be emobdied in our statutes,"

Pipe and cigar smoking can damage health, too

Cigarette smoking has been linked to lung cancer, heart disease, emphysema and a whole host of respiratory and other problems. In Canada, and elsewhere, television advertising of cigarettes is banned, and cigarette packages carry a warning that their contents are dangerous.

Pipes and cigars, on the other hand, appear to have escaped these indictments and restrictions almost completely. Does this mean that tobacco smoked in these forms is harmless?

Not at all, says Dr. Norman Delarue, a Toronto surgeon and a member of the steering committee of the recently formed Canadian Council on Smoking and Health. The cigarette smoker who switches to cigars or a pipe has established a smoking pattern, says Dr. Delarue, that makes him liable to inhale the

smoke from either. And that's just as dangerous as cigarette smoke.

Even for pipe and cigar smokers who don't inhale, some of the smoke, inevitably, is going to wind up in the bronchial and nasal passages — and even in the lungs.

Admittedly, that's not quite the same as taking in the deep breaths of concentrated smoke that the inhaling cigarette smoker takes; and it can also be said, in defence of pipes and cigars, that the smoke they produce burns at lower temperatures and comes from tobacco that is likely to be less impregnated with chemicals. Moreover, it's only tobacco that's smoked — not paper.

Against that, it must be recorded

that cigars and pipes have been clearly implicated in various cancers, notably of the throat and lip, and in a number of respiratory problems. The clear fact, as Dr. Delarue sees it, is that taking smoke into the body is obviously not going to do any good — and may well do considerable harm.

While others may argue that pipes or cigars represent an alternative for the man who must smoke something, they offer no such option to women (except in such tolerant countries as Denmark where women do smoke cigars). Perhaps this is because pipes, at least, are such noxious, messy, graceless and antisocial instruments that no self-

respecting woman would be caught dead with one.

It seems rather odd that pipe and cigar smoking continues to enjoy social respectability while cigarettes are becoming increasingly ostracized.

Perhaps, in considering the dangers of smoking, we should be less kind to the pipe and the cigar, considering them, as King James I did, "a custom loathsome to the eye, hateful to the nose, harmful to the brain, dangerous to the lungs, and in the black stinking fume thereof, nearest resembling the horrible Stygian smoke of the pit that is bottomless".

Now if we'd put that warning on tobacco packaging . . .

orestry Crews Climb

A new era is gradually unfold-ing in the field of tree seed procurement. In the past, seed in each ministry of natural resources district was collected from the most convenient sources such as logging slash, residual trees from past logging, scattered open grown trees along country roads, etc. This was not necessarily the best seed and increased efforts have been made to collect from permanent sources of good quality, fast growing trees. Many of Ontario's best quality trees, however, are too tall for collecting seed from the ground or even from ladders. New developments require new techniques.

Recently, crews from the ministry's forest research branch and the Canadian Forestry Service have been climbing selected white spruce trees across the province to collect cones. The seedlings from their seed are grown and measured to determine relative growth rates. Results of such studies will be used to indicate the best sources of seed of fast growing strains for the provincial regeneration program.

Research and management staff have worked together in several districts to collect cones by climbing and cutting cone-bearing foliage from the crown of the trees to meet both research and management needs. The techniques used by research may well have application as permanent seed sources are established, developed and improved. If the problem of accessibility to the crowns of tall trees of each of our major species can be solved the program of selecting and improving top quality permanent sources for seed production should receive new impetus.

Morrisburg And District Canadian Club Meeting

which remembers its heritage and is conscious of its past is a nation that will endure", said Dr. John Lunn at a recent meeting of the Morrisburg and District Canadian Club. Dr. Lunn, park superintendant, Fortress of Louisbourg National Historic Park, gave an interest-ing and enlightening address which he accompanied with a slide presentation on the history and restoration associated with the fortress. This is Canada's largest national historic park and covers 20 square miles in Cape Breton.

Commenting on the thought that the basic philosophy of any historic site development must be to make the public aware of the significance that the past holds and to add a new dimension to the study of history, Dr. Lunn said "Lousibourg needs to be talked about as the marvelous sites are here,"

"This pro ect in Cape Breton which is the most ambitious reconstruction pro ect going on in the world to-day was begun in 1961," stated Dr. Lunn noted historian, who is also a graduate in engineering and archaelogy. Comparing the reconstruction to the development at Upper Canada Village he said that Lousibourg was a mixture of civilian and military and the project is five times as

difficult as the artifacts of 250 years ago have gone and are not even available in museums.

"Louisbourg was unique in being not once, but twice, the scene of epic struggle between two of the great founding nations of the Americas. This great fortress had a life span of only forty years", he commented. Dr. Lunn pointed out that the fort was built by the French to stop the British from sailing down the St. Lawrence, to protect French fishing interests on the Grand Banks and to act as a port of transshipment for goods on their way to France from Quebec and West Indies. "The fort which was first settled in 1713 had a brief history but it was illuminating. "

Dr. Lunn described the result of the restoration project as "trying to bring back a moment in time prior to 1745, the date of the first seige". He said that the project was started as an "economic exercise" to combat the unemployment of displaced coal miners in Cape Breton. Visitors to the site have brought many thousands of tourist dollars to the area comparable to the situation in

the area of Upper Canada Village.
Approximately a quarter of
of the original town and its
nearby defenses are being recreated in their entirety in order
that visitors might experience
an eightenth- century environ-

ment in depth. Completely restored to date is the Citadel which includes the Kings Bastion and the Chateau St. Louis. During the past month there has been both fire and hurricane loses to this area amounting to over one hundred thousand dollars. Over '00 artifacts have been ruined as well as buildings extensively damages.

Among the interesting slides shown were pictures of artifacts found in the excavation. Included in these artifacts, which in many cases show the trade routes of the time were building hardware, glassware, dinnerware, a porringer, toy boat, baby shoe with tied lace, wooden chair slat, pieces of cloth, etc.

In conclusion Dr. Lunn stressed that he has a didicated staff of specialists in many fields who are being successful in depicting the period realistically, and not in the "antiseptic version". Many skills are being utlizied and the results are for all mankind. "This makes one feel truly a Canadian and that is what it's all about".

tion program has helped many Indian craftsmen over the last few years by supplying them with raw materials for their craft .- the manufacture of mitts, mukluks, jackets and slippers. Last year 5,000 hides were turned in but more are needed to meet the demand. It's always a problem for hunters to know what to do with their leftover deer and moose hides but they can be rewarded by contacting the nearest nat-ural office. After receipt, the hides are tanned and delivered to Indian Bands.
