By breaking the will Albro forfeited \$500 from the estate, but he won a full title to the farm.

Drainage Court.

(Before His Honor G. F. Henderson, Referee)

Township of Osgoode vs. Township of Mountain—An appeal from a drainage scheme that has been under construction and in the Courts for fifteen years. The appeal failed on the main points, but it was held that the defendant Council had paid an exorbitant price on re-letting a portion of the work and a reduction to the extent of \$1,900 was made, this to be charged to them. Each party to pay their own costs. George McLaurin, Ottawa for Osgoode, W. B. Lawson, K. C. Chesterville, for defendant.

Subway at Falls.

Messrs Jones and Girouard have the contract of building the bridge and subway to permit the Canadian Northern, Ottawa, Smith's Falls and Toronto line to pass under the C. P. R. tracks at Smith's Falls. The subway will be under the C. P. R. lines just beyond the north end malleable shops where the big fill has been made and will be a heavy and expensive undertaking. It will go under both the Toronto and Ottawa tracks and will be one long subway. The contractors are here now to begin work.

Examinations to be Held Earlier.

The Ontario Department of Education has made an announcement which will be received with much satisfaction throughout the province. Because of the many complaints which were made last July in connection with the matriculation examinations during that month, the department has decided that hereafter the examinations will be held a month earlier. Dr. Seath, superintendent of education for the province has notified principals of the schools that commencing next year all matriculations must be completed by the end of June. The exams. this year were held during the very hottest part of July and the failure of many to pass is attributed to that.

Sunday School Congress.

Successful Institute services were conducted in Trinity Methodist Church on Monday last by the Rev. Frank Farrell of Toronto, Field Secretary of Sunday Schools. In the afternoon the meeting was in the nature of a conference, when many of the newer methods of S. S. work were under discussion. The Secretary carries with him Charts, Books and Literature in abundance, covering points of interest and bearing upon the various stages in the life of Sunday School Scholars. Tea was served in the church at 6 o'clock, when those in attendance were entertained by some of the younger ladies of the School.

The Elgin Hotel at West Lorne was destroyed by fire.

Died at His Work.

David King, an aged quarryman dropped dead while at work shortly before noon Friday at Prescott. He was eighty-three years old.

Robbed in Brockville.

John Kelsey, an oarsman from Charleston Lake, was held up and robbed of \$97 late Thursday night at Brockville. Kelsey fell in with a gang of local characters while awaiting a train for Lansdowne and after leaving them was followed and set upon. Walter Darling and Thomas Hudson were arrested, and warrants are out for Wm. Marks and Wilbert Blair.

Inspectors Cut Off.

The services of 30 fishery inspectors appointed in Ontario by the late Dominion Government have been discontinued. It will amount to dismissal, inasmuch as there is no intention of providing further salaries for the jobs. The inspectors were appointed last spring. The average salary of each being \$500. At the time the Conservatives took the ground that it was a needless duplication of the functions of the provincial officers, and that view has led the department to take the action it has.

West End Road Races.

The following is taken from the Toronto Sunday World of the last issue. Charlie is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Huxtable of this place. The actual time was 21 min. and 30 sec. Good for Charlie; "Two good handicap road races were run off at the West End Y. M. C. A. Saturday afternoon, under West End Harrier auspices. In the walking race, the winner, C. Huxtable, had an easy win, coming in a block ahead of B. Bauckham, the second man. It was the first time Huxtable had participated in a walking race. Invitation walk, 2 1/2 miles—From Dovercourt to Queen, up Dovercourt to Bloor, and return same route."

A Distinctive Compliment.

J. Wesley Allison was the recipient last week of a compliment never before paid to a Canadian. Austin E. Evans, President of the English Hackney Society, of which the late King Edward was once President, sent Mr. Allison a notice that he had been elected a life member of the society. Mr. Allison now enjoys the distinction of being a life member of every society in the world.

The English Hackney Society is one of the most exclusive yet extensive organizations of its class in the world. King George is its patron and among its members are hundreds of titled horse breeders and fanciers. The Hackney Horse Society of England, the United States and Canada are thoroughly uncommercial organizations, which declare no dividends, but distribute all surplus revenue in prizes to encourage the breeding of fine harness and saddle horses.—Morrisburg Leader.

Cornwall Gets Railway Gates.

The dangerous crossing on the St. Andrew's road, about 150 yards west of the G. T. R. station at Cornwall, will hereafter be guarded. This was the order made by the Dominion Board last week. The G. T. R. is given until May 1, 1912, to establish proper gates, but in the meantime they are ordered to keep a watchman on guard. All the gates will be used continuously night and day.

Twenty per cent of the cost of constructing the gates will be paid out railway funds, and out of the balance the G. T. R. will pay 55 per cent and the town of Cornwall 20 per cent. The cost of maintenance is also divided as follows: G. T. R. 55 per cent, town 25 per cent and township 20 per cent.

Reeve W. Pollock, of Cornwall, and Reeve J. W. McLeod of Cornwall township, were present at the meeting of the Railway Board and urged the establishment of gates for the protection of human life.


The theory of a consolidation such as the Canada Cement Company is that the consolidated interests are in a position to effect economy in production and distribution.

This is further evidenced by the announcement, which was made on Nov. 1st, 1911, of a still further reduction in the price of cement. The reduction in some districts is 10c per barrel, and in

others, 5c. On the whole it will probably average 7c per barrel. This reduction—with the reduction made last year—means a very large saving to the cement consumers of Canada.

We trust that the expectations of lower cost voiced by the President of the Canada Cement Company, will be realized again next year, so that the Company may continue its policy of giving the benefit of these reductions to its customers—thereby enlarging the uses to which Cement may be put.





Death of Mrs Fenton.

The following is taken from the Norwood News, of Oct. 31st, 1911, published at Norwood, N. Y.

"Mrs Mary Cauley Fenton was born in Montreal, Aug. 22, 1844, and died in her home on North Main street, Norwood N. Y., Oct. 18, 1911.

When a small child her parents moved to Winchester, Ont. Sept. 2, 1874; she was married to David E. Fenton and continued living in the township of Winchester till nine years ago when the family moved to Madrid. The last three years were spent in Norwood in the house from which she passed to the Spirit land.

Shortly after her marriage she united with the Methodist Church in Canada, and was a member there till death summoned her home. There were six children that blessed this union, Mrs Frank Raymond, Mrs James Evans, Miss Ethel, and Roy, all of Norwood, and Mrs C. E. Carroll of Tupper Lake. A daughter died in infancy.

Her husband and all the children, except Mrs Carroll, were with her during her last hours. She seemed not to think particularly about herself in that hour, but was trying to comfort the family. She seemed ready for the change and asked each of the family to meet her in the realms of eternal day. The fear of death had gone and it was like one going on a journey to a better world.

Mrs Fenton was a quiet woman of honesty and plainness of speech and manners that were of imperishable value to her. During her last few years her health did not permit her going about much. She was slow to get acquainted, but when known she was a true friend and an obliging neighbor; her large heart was opened to show kindness and help at all times. Her greatest joy was to have the whole family about her and to be ministering to their comforts.

The sorrowing family have the heartfelt sympathy of the community. The funeral services was held from her late home on North Main street Saturday at 10 a. m., Oct. 21, conducted by her pastor W. D. Aubrey and assisted by the Rev. Isaac Steenson, pastor of the Congregational Church, who offered a touching prayer full of sympathy for the afflicted family. The hymns sung by Mr. and Mrs W. T. Leonard were the favorite of the deceased, "My Heavenly Home is Bright and Fair," and "My Jesus as Thou Wilt."

Burial was made in the Riverside cemetery where all that is mortal awaits the resurrection of the dead."

The principal speaker of the evening meeting was Karl Lehman, inter-state secretary of Christian Endeavor whose topic was "Turning the world upside down." He compared the dark ages with the present time, our own country with other lands where the people were ill-treated and suffering under superstition and fanaticism, and in conclusion asked his hearers what they were going to do to revolutionize the world. The Rev. Canon Troop spoke at some length on "The Scriptural Interpretation of Missions" He traced the missionary movement back to the days of Abraham, and in conclusion appealed to his hearers to remember that the movement must go on till the Lord came for His flock. During the afternoon and evening several mission study classes were held.



WOMEN DIVERS OF JAPAN.

A Life Which Coarsens and Ages
Femininity—Picturesque Shops.

Japan certainly controverts some of the Occidental ideas as to women's sphere, for in the province of Shima, on the south coast of the island empire, women are the sterner sex and not only do most of the field work but are also employed as divers.

They enter the water at all seasons except during the coldest months of the winter, remaining under water sometimes for over a minute, and gather shellfish and tenguusa, a kind of seaweed, which they place in a small net carried by each diver at the girdle.

These female divers are extremely hardy. The life is, however, trying and the constant exposure causes those engaged in it to become very coarse in appearance and to age quickly.

The shops and booths of Japan are of unfailing interest. Here the green grocer and fruit seller has arranged his wares until it seems as though one looked upon a great bouquet. There the flower shop blazes in brilliance and the lantern maker squats at his multi-colored task.

At the next entrance we perhaps see a man severing chicken meat from the bone, and he performs the operation as skillfully as the surgeon with his dissecting knife. Two or three paces further on one is confronted with a typical Japanese shoe store.

The newcomer is at once startled at the immense quantity of this simple footwear and the many places where it is sold, but he soon finds a solution to his query when he hears that a Japanese man annually makes away with from eight to ten pairs a year. But curious things are not found in shops alone. The green vegetable peddler carries loads heavy enough for a horse, but still has enough energy to call his wares as he goes.

High Heels and Wit.

If anything could be higher than the Parisienne's hat it is her heels. The low English heel has once or twice enjoyed a brief season's favor in Paris, but at heart the Parisienne dearly loves to add a cubit or so to her stature and she achieves it of course with her beloved Louis XV. heel. Perched thus on stilts with the foot at an impossible angle 'le footing' becomes impossible and madame seats herself in a cab every time she starts out for a walk. That is why her boots and shoes are always new.

Some one has discovered that there is a close relation between the heels and the wit. The conversation of the walker in low heels is trite and flat—bromide, so to speak—but she who trips in high ones will soar to unexpected altitudes of epigram and paradox. We know that great wit and insanity are near neighbors and the Germans putting the principle in practice are treating madness with a bare-foot regime. The contact of the bare flat foot with Mother Earth is expected to bring back wandering minds to an every day plane and the experiment is naturally interesting.

A Useful Woman.

The Sting Ray.

Of the many dangers which beset navigators of the tropical rivers of South America perhaps the natives fear the sting ray most. It is poisonous and is to be found in very large numbers when the river is low. That is the time when boatmen have to get in the water to push their canoes over the shallows. They are often stung by the tail of the ray and usually die unless medical assistance is promptly given. The ray cannot be seen, as it is of the same color as the sand on which it coils itself. The stab of its sharp knifelike tail is the unwary navigator's first intimation of its presence.

Stuffed Beef Heart.

Boil the heart three hours. When done have just enough water for gravy. Make a dressing of one-half cupful of breadcrumbs, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter teaspoonful of pepper, one-half teaspoonful of sage, one-half small onion, chopped fine; one tablespoonful of butter and hot water enough to moisten and mix thoroughly. Cut out the tough muscles and stuff the heart. Sew up and put in oven with liquor. Thicken the gravy. Serve hot or cold.

Apple Grunt.

Peel and slice thin six large ripe apples and put in deep pan for baking. Add one cupful sugar, one-half cupful water and nutmeg and stir thoroughly. Make thick batter of one large cupful flour, one heaping teaspoonful lard and one tablespoonful butter. Then pour the batter over apples and bake until done and nice and brown on top. Serve with milk and cream.

NATION VALLEY.

Manufacture of Peat Taken up in Earnest.

A demonstration of the success that has attended the late Government's efforts to interest Canadian manufacturers in the production of peat is contained in an announcement by the Mines Department that Mr. J. M. Shuttleworth of Brantford and associate manufacturers have contracted with the Government to continue the work at Alfred, and will spend over \$500,000 in trying an improved Anrep peat machine. The machine will have a capacity of sixty to eighty tons per day, as compared with the thirty tons the Government machine turned out. It will be in operation next spring, working double shifts of twenty hours for 110 days. The power for driving the machinery and for lighting the field at night will all be derived from peat, hence the plant will be self-contained.

Peat as Fuel.

Ottawa, Ont. Nov. 10—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company has opened negotiations with the Mines Branch of the Government to purchase its entire peat plant at Alfred, Ontario. The company desires to continue the industry on commercial lines, and supply the City of Montreal in particular with peat fuel. It regards the success of the Government experiments as incontrovertible proof that peat production in Canada has now become a commercial enterprise of much importance.

Amputated Without Pain.

The other day an operation was performed by a local surgeon at the General Hospital, which will be of great interest to the general public. A patient from Napanee who was suffering from cancer of the foot had his leg amputated at the knee without taking any chloroform or other drugs and was conscious throughout and suffered no pain. The surgeon injected a fluid (known in medical circles as stovaine) into the patient's spine which deadened the nerves of the lower part of the body. The patient sat up when the operation was being performed and was so interested in the event that he not only talked all the time during the operation but wanted to remove the curtain which closed out his sight of the lower part of his limb which was being amputated, but the surgeon did not consider this advisable.

The patient did not suffer from the nausea which follows chloroform and ether and was well enough to eat a hearty supper and slept all night. He is now on the road to recovery.

The science of amputating without rendering the patient insensible has been practised for some years in Europe, but the operation the other day was the first one of the kind ever performed in Kingston.—Kingston Standard.

Dr. Ouimet Committed.

Ottawa, Nov. 11—After a hearing of over two hours yesterday, Magistrate O'Keefe, sent Dr. J. Alexander Ouimet, of Hull, for trial, upon a charge of performing an illegal operation in this city, in the house of Mrs. Annie Balcomb. The latter was charged with aiding and abetting and also sent for trial.

Divorces in Canada.

Ottawa, Nov. 10—Seventeen divorce applications are already in for consideration at the coming session of Parliament. The majority of the applications are from Ontario. The latest application is from David G. Robertson, of Barrie, who seeks divorce from his wife, whose present address is unknown.

Will Raise \$200,000 for Masonic Temple.

The raising of \$200,000 for the erection of a central meeting place for the Freemasons of Toronto was decided upon at a meeting of the Masonic Past Masters of the Toronto district.

M. W. Bro. J. Ross Robertson, Past Grand Master, and Chairman of the Masonic Hall Trust, will be the President of the new company to be formed to push forward the project. It was also decided to hold a conference with the promoters at the new Masonic Hall for Yonge street, north of Bloor street.

M. W. Bro. Aubrey White, Grand Master, and R. W. Bro. W. D. McPherson, K. C. were present and endorsed the proposal. President K. J. Dunstan was in the chair.

Special Dies for Canadian Stamps.

Canadian stamps bearing the effigy of King George will be put on sale by the Post Office Department within a short time.

The Dominion postal authorities were not satisfied with the portrait of the King which was adopted for the British stamps, and which has since been so severely criticized. It was decided to obtain a new design for Canada and this has been done.

The new stamp series is said to be an especially one. The designs were submitted to King George, who is the largest stamp collector in the world and he has sent a cable to Canada approving of the new Canadian series. With this message the last formality has been accomplished, and the stamps will now issue as soon as dies can be cut.

Kelly a Judge.

Points for Mothers

The Onion Cure.

"Do my kiddies smell like little onion patches?" asked one young matron of another, and on being told in a very positive manner she said, "Well, then, I'll shoo them away, but I'll tell you why they are thus perfumed, and you can profit by the knowledge if you are so minded."

"Three years ago my youngsters were the average town bred children, nervous, wakeful at night and on the go the livelong day. The country didn't help them, and when we went back to town they grew so much worse that I finally called in a child specialist, who asked all sorts of profound questions, arranged all their lessons and play with a view to their improvement and prescribed various tonics. Next spring he said, 'Go to the mountains,' and we did, but it didn't agree with the children, and they longed for the sea, so after a little we changed to a quaint little seaside village. There they were happy, but were a sad contrast to the native children, who had the most wonderful health and vitality and seemed not to have a nerve in their bodies. But here one day we found a remedy for all our ills quite by accident. We went for a picnic in the motor, which promptly broke down and forced us to find shelter from the sun in the nearest farmhouse. Nine children came and gazed at us and then fled, but not before I noticed how well and sturdy they looked. I asked who their doctor was. 'Doctor nothing,' was the mother's answer. 'One of my young ones was puny like yours, and I just gave him all the onions he wanted with dry crusts of bread between meals.'

"From that day I started an onion diet in my family, not quite as it was prescribed, but the children have onions once a day anyway, and I give them lots of buttermilk besides. I eat them myself, too, but not when company is coming, although I do not see why a natural odor like that should be so cried down and out of society when the stale, unhealthy one of cocktails is considered permissible. When I am apprehensive of a restless night I take a glass of very hot milk just before I go to bed and an hour before that a little salad of onions grated on crisp lettuce, with French dressing, in which is chopped hard boiled egg. You have no idea how delicious this tastes with very thin bread and butter. I do not care who is here when I feel I must order this repast, and I have made many converts and cures by telling both these tales of onion power that I am telling you."

Milady's Mirror

To Keep Straight Hair in Curl.

On damp days the girl whose hair is curly by reason of the hot iron rather than the permanent band of obliging nature is in grave danger of losing all the effect of bygone fluffiness. Her friends, accustomed as they are to seeing her face framed in waves, are at a loss to explain the straggly appearance of her crowning glory.

Hot irons sooner or later are fatal to the hair. No matter how careful one may be in applying them, the day will come when the temperature will be forgotten because of haste or forgetfulness, and a dead, lusterless strand of hair will mar the beauty of the entire mass. In the days of cumbersome curl papers there was some excuse for the use of hot irons, but in these times of up to date and convenient devices for curling the hair curling irons should have no place on the dressing table, being left entirely to the professional hairdressers.

A few harmless preparations for keeping the hair in curl are given:

For dark hair dissolve twelve grains of carbonate of potash in half a pint of rather strong black tea. Moisten the hair with this mixture before putting it up in curlers.

For blond hair a mixture of one ounce of borax, one dram of gum arabic and eight ounces of hot water is best. Dissolve the borax and gum arabic in the hot water and bottle for use. Use the same as the preparation for dark hair.

Hints For Insomnia.

First of all it is necessary to lie correctly in bed. Do not curl up, but place the limbs straight, so as to induce the best circulation. Lie on the right side. If you are on your back you invite dreams, if on the stomach you press the lungs and if on the left side you cramp the heart and digestive organs. Insomnia often comes from hunger. If you have been long without eating take a glass of milk and a biscuit or many times a glass of water will be sufficient. A hot drink before retiring is conducive to sleep, and the greatest necessity of all is to have warm feet. As for the mental part of it, the idea is to make the brain run in as monotonous a strain as possible, and that is why the old plan of counting imaginary sheep jumping over a stile is usually successful. As the brain becomes fagged the sheep go more and more languidly, and sleep soon follows. One of the best plans for going to sleep is to make up one's mind to be reconciled to staying awake. If you lie quietly and think out some plan for the next day or say to yourself you will just lie quietly till sleep overtakes you you will find yourself "dropping off" almost before you know it. It is all nonsense to say, "Oh, I should go mad if I were to lie awake for a long time." It is merely that we have grown into the habit of thinking that when we go to bed we must sleep, but most of us sleep as well as eat more than we need, and if we regard the fact of being snugly tucked in bed as sufficiently restful the horror of lying awake will pass. If too much notice of insomnia is not taken it will usually cure itself.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency, or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months, residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn the homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot take a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

A Stretching Exercise.

It imparts elasticity. And it is good for one. It will lift the vital organs. It gives strength and poise to the body.

The clothing must be loose and comfortable.

To begin any exercise one must stand erect.

The chest should be high, the head up and the chin in.

The body should rest on the balls of the feet, not on the heels.

At first it may be enough to breathe deeply and slowly (mouth closed) standing thus.

This alone is a fine thing if practiced in the open air or before a window open top and bottom for five or ten minutes twice a day.

Now for the stretching. Sweep the arms slowly outward and upward until they touch above the head, lifting the chest walls and stretching the arms.

Lower the arms with the same sweep, stretching them all the time. Five times will be enough at first, breathing deeply and slowly all the time.

New Powder Puff.

Novelty counters have lately exhibited one charming bit of silverware that, while it fascinates the beholder, inspires at the same time the question, "What can it be good for?" This exquisite frivolity is termed "a body puff." In a large silver bowl for powder is an equally large puff, to which is attached a long silver handle, rather like the handle of a carriage parasol. Its length is its strong point, or, one might say, its long suit, since it enables the user to reach shoulder and heel with equal ease, but the appearance of this useful handle as it projects from the side of the silver bowl is somewhat surprising. This novelty is found in the empire pattern, a fine tracery of lines forming a background that suggests brocade, with square decorations superimposed on the lines. At present the prices run up to \$50, but there is little doubt that long handled powder puffs will prove so convenient that they will soon be reproduced in less costly style.

Concerning Women.




It is a delicate matter to keep calling attention to failings in a big boy of sixteen, and I found our good fellowship was becoming seriously strained.

Sold Horse that was Not His Own.

On Wednesday afternoon of last week a young man representing himself to be Geo. S. Markle of Osnabruck township, drove in town and in a short time met Mr. Lawrence Jordan, whom he spoke to and stated that he knew him, but Mr. Jordan did not remember of ever meeting him. He told a good plausible story saying that his father, Geo. S. Markle had seven horses, and that they were through with their plowing and had no use for so many and intended selling the one he had with him. On questioning why he came here to sell he stated that there was no market for horses in his district, and that he knew Chesterville was always a good market for horses. Mr. Jordan stated that he had plenty now and anyway that it was a bad season of the year to buy, but being pressed to buy he made an offer \$125, but the young gent went away disgusted, but returned in a short time, and finally disposed of the horse to Mr. Jordan for the amount offered. He gave him \$5.00 in cash and a check for \$120. The seller tried all over town to get the check cashed that evening, but could not and while he had tried to make arrangements with Mr. James McAvoy to drive him to Wales that evening, he was also disappointed. Further business was laid over until the next morning, as the payment of the check had been stopped at the banks, and in the meantime Mr. Jordan secured the check he had given him and placed \$120 in Mr. McAvoy's hand, who was to pay the said amount to the seller, if everything was found to be correct when he was driven to Wales. Mr. Jordan became somewhat suspicious and he telephoned to the station agent at Wales enquiring if the credit of Geo. S. Markle was good, the reply convincing him that everything was alright. Then McAvoy was instructed to pay over the money. Jordan then sold the horse to Mr. Thos. Ellis, and during the afternoon the man, whose proper name is Charles McMannan, had the buggy, harness, etc. sent to the station, but did not give any orders for shipment, and started out of town on the tramp, where he secured the services of Amariah Froats to drive him to Winchester Springs and from there another man to drive him to Morrisburg. During the evening when Mr. Jordan ascertained the fact that the rig was still at the station and no orders given for shipment, he became suspicious and started on the detective force. He drove to Morrisburg and on the way secured a warrant from Jas. Clement, J. P., arriving there about 2 a. m., and made his wants known to Constable Stone, and together they went to the G. T. R. depot and got busy. Early in the morning Ogdensburg's detective force was communicated with with the result that the slippery young gent was captured just as he was stepping into an automobile to take a whirl to Madrid, or some other place. Although he was called by the names he had been travelling under, he was quite unconcerned until his proper name was presented, when he collapsed and was willing to go any place with his captors. Constable Stone and Jordan went to Ogdensburg and brought him here, arriving Saturday morning, and during the day he was given a hearing before James Clement, J. P., who after hearing the evidence, committed the prisoner to Cornwall for trial. The prisoner's home is said to be in Paisley, Ont., and the way this information was secured was by the prisoner telephoning to that place while in Morrisburg. Mr. Markle, from whom the horse was secured, was not aware of any particular wrong-doing until after the arrest of the prisoner.

The cause of this trouble arose out of the fact that the prisoner visited Mr. Markle's place and purchased his farm, making all necessary arrangements but the payment of the money, and wanted to go to Finch to see his father about the money, when Markle kindly consented to give him a horse and helped him hitch up, with the result as above stated.

New York, Nov. 10—Andrew Carnegie turned over \$25,000,000 this afternoon to the Carnegie Corporation of New York, the body which was incorporated by the Legislature on June 9 of the present year for the purpose practically of taking over Mr. Carnegie's work in connection with educational institutions, libraries, and hero funds.

The gift was in the form of 5 per cent, first mortgage bonds of the United States Steel Corporation the value of the bonds being taken at par. The bonds closed to-day at 102½; so the gift was worth about \$656,250 more than the face value of the bonds.

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
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
