

Plan Golf Course At Alexandria

Start Canvass For Charter Members Of Golf And Country Club Here

Playable fairways by midsummer on a new nine-hole golf course at Alexandria is the hope of a group of local golf enthusiasts.

A charter for the Glengarry Golf and Country Club is to be applied for at once and the group hopes a fast canvass for charter members will permit work on the course to get started in early June.

The site is immediately east of Alexandria, some 50 acres of property on which a 90-day option has been secured from Frank and Stuart McCormick. Included will be the home of Stuart McCormick, well-known Glengarry artist, and this tree-shaded home at the end of a long, picturesque lane is expected to become the nucleus of the new club's quarters.

Negotiations for the property have been going on for several weeks, since a golf pro was brought in to look it over. He thought it an ideal natural setting with the Garry River winding through it and with its wealth of trees. The sandy loam is perfect for the purpose, he told the local group, and the grass will need a minimum of attention in

building fairways. "Many big city courses have been started without the natural attributes you have here," he declared.

At a meeting Monday of local golf enthusiasts a seven-man provisional committee was named to apply for a charter and organize the canvass for charter members at \$100 a share. They are: Eugene Macdonald, Ronald E. R. Macdonald, Dr. Bernard Villeneuve, Arthur Contant, Lloyd McHugh, Bruno Lemieux and Hugh A. Macdonald.

It was decided that all members of the club would have to be shareholders and the immediate goal was set at 100 charter members, with 150 as the season's quota.

Some 10 residents of Ottawa and Montreal have already signified their intention of joining, and a number of people in Maxville, Lancaster and other Glengarry points have indicated interest. A nucleus of some 30 Alexandrians now playing golf at Hawkesbury, it is expected, will be joined by many other citizens who see a golf course as a decided asset for the town.

J.D. McMaster Died Suddenly

A widely known and highly esteemed resident of North Glengarry, John Dougald McMaster died suddenly Saturday evening as the result of a heart attack. His death occurred about 7 p.m. at the home of his nephew, Doug MacGillivray, McCrimmon, with whom he had resided for the past 18 months.

He was aged 80. Mr. McMaster had been in failing health since suffering a heart attack some two years ago, but he had been able to get about and there was no hint that the end was near. Word of his death came as a shock to many relatives and friends.

Born on the home farm, 8th Concession of Kenyon, just West of Leggan, Mr. McMaster farmed successfully there until ill health forced his retirement two years ago. Widely known as a breeder of purebred Holsteins, he was honored two years ago by the Holstein Breeders Association of Canada as one of the two oldest breeders then living. A staunch Conservative he was active in his party's councils in this riding. Popular with young and old, he was good company and he will be missed.

Mr. McMaster was a son of the late Dougald McMaster and his wife, Catherine Campbell, of Leggan. One sister, Mrs. H. J. MacGillivray, Kirk Hill, survives as do several nieces and nephews.

The largely attended funeral was held from the home of Doug MacGillivray to St. Columba Church, Kirk Hill, Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Leo Hughes, student minister, conducted the service and burial was in the family plot.

The pallbearers were: Campbell McMaster, Dougald McMaster, Archie MacGillivray, Donald E. McMaster, Duncan McDougall and Arthur Franklin.

The many friends in attendance and the wealth of floral tributes evidenced the widespread regret in his passing.

Taken critically ill, March 6th, while serving in the mission field of Our Lady's Missionaries in Nigeria, Sister M. Christine, the former Penny McIntosh, of Alexandria, died at the Mother House in Toronto, Thursday, May 18th.

Hers was the first death in the young Missionary Order which originated here in 1949.

Her mother, Mrs. D. D. McIntosh, and her four sisters were with her at the end.

Sister Christine had been flown to Toronto in early April and had been a patient in St. Michael's Hospital until a few weeks ago when she was transferred to the Mother House.

The former Penny McIntosh was born in Alexandria 33 years ago, the daughter of the late Dr. D. D. McIntosh and his wife, Christine Kerr. Following her graduation as a nurse at St. Mary's Hospital, Montreal, she practised in that city until joining Our Lady's Missionaries nine years ago.

As a member of the Order she had nursed at Cornwall and St. Catharines before leaving for Nigeria four years ago. In 1959 she took a special course in obstetrics in Ireland.

A popular member of the younger set in Alexandria, Sister Christine had brought many gifts of personality and experience to Our Lady's Missionaries and her untimely illness and death will be widely regretted.

In addition to her mother she leaves four sisters: Patricia, Mrs. John Macdonald, and Miss Jean McIntosh, R.N., of Montreal; Mary, Mrs. Guy Bougie, of Ottawa, and Ann, Mrs. Bernard O'Brien, of Newmarket, Ont.

He said she was accompanied by Brian Sabourin, 19, of Alexandria, and was driving the Sabourin car. The vehicle was a complete loss.

Relatives of the victim said she had left school within the past month and was learning to drive the car when the accident occurred.

Dr. John F. Mutch, Maxville, was called to the scene and Dr. D. J. Dolan, Alexandria, was later called in his capacity as coroner.

A daughter of Fred Lavigne and his late wife, the former Edeline Robinson, Claudette Lavigne was born at Baltic's Corners, the family later moving to the Sixth Kenyon. She had attended the local school and St. Bernard's School in Maxville.

To mourn her tragic death are her father; three brothers and three sisters. They are: Fred, of Greenfield; Rod, Ottawa; Wilfrid, at home; Eva, Mrs. Hormidas St. John, Dominionville; Irene, of Cornwall, and Betty, Mrs. Wm. Cousineau, of Maxville. The funeral was held Wednesday from the Marcoux & Morris Funeral Home to St. Catherine's Church and cemetery, Greenfield.

Who's For Golf?

Alexandria will boast its own golf course soon if efforts of local enthusiasts for the game meet with adequate public support.

The setting will be the old Chisholm homestead just east of town, and an expert on golf courses has found it almost ideal for the purpose. He liked the soil, the grass, the rolling land, the winding Garry River and the trees. "A lot of the country's best golf courses", he declared, "lack the natural beauty you have here."

The McCormick brothers, Frank and Stuart, are making their land available and all that is needed now is the requisite number of golf enthusiasts to furnish the funds. They should not be too hard to find.

The game of golf was once a sport reserved for the rich. It remains that to some degree in the larger cities where land values have skyrocketed and golf courses are steadily being pushed further beyond the suburbs. Membership fees are beyond the reach of most, and so are the fairways. One needs a car to get to them and plenty of time must be allotted for getting through the traffic. The cities and their suburbs are replete with people who want to play golf; but most of the clubs are beyond their reach.

The inevitable result has been a burgeoning of golf courses in the rural areas and the towns. Golfers unable to find fairways near the big cities are motoring ever longer distances to get a game. And even in the smaller centres that boast golf courses, they are meeting with restrictions

as this grand sport gains in popularity among the local citizenry.

The game of golf zoomed in popularity during the reign of President Eisenhower in the White House. Ike was a devoted divot digger and the reams of publicity emanating from his frequent flights to the fairways apparently won many new enthusiasts for the sport both in the U.S. and Canada.

Ye editor is but a duffer, still far removed from worrying about the number of strokes needed to hole out. But his eye is taken by the grass, never so incomparably green as on a well-tended golf course; his feet are no good, but he forgets them in his pursuit of that elusive ball. The golf course is the perfect antidote to too much office sitting, in his opinion.

Some thirty Alexandrians who have been playing their golf in Hawkesbury are expected to form the nucleus of this new golf club. Others of our citizens have shown interest, as have sports enthusiasts in Lancaster, Maxville and many other areas of the county. City residents who spend most summer weekends in Glengarry are also potential members.

You, too, can become a charter member of the Glengarry Golf and Country Club. We highly recommend it if you would know one of the keenest satisfactions this life holds — that grand feeling one gets when one has really smacked the little white pill.

The President's Request Rates Study

Little or nothing do we know of international relations and their complexities. But President John F. Kennedy last week paid Canada the compliment of making his first outside visit to us since assuming the presidency. And his utterances left little doubt but that U.S. makers of foreign policy want the companionship of this country in the Organization of American States.

Canada has steered clear of involvement in the mixed up affairs of Latin America; and perhaps wisely so. But President Kennedy dwelt so often on the hope of "hemisphere solidarity" in his utterances at Ottawa, that there is no mistaking the feeling of urgency in Washington. Canada should lend its talents and moral support to U.S. efforts to seal off Communist encroachment on this hemisphere, as in Cuba, President Kennedy seemed to say. And he emphasized Washington's belief that Canada could play an important part in effecting that needed hemispheric solidarity.

Ottawa observers report the Kennedy appeal for Canada to join the hemisphere fell on virtually barren ground. Prime Minister Diefenbaker is said to be cool to the idea and according to reports out of Ottawa the President returned to Washington with little or no hope that the primary purpose of his visit had been accomplished. Our government at Ottawa appears to be content with its present policy on external affairs; self-satisfied might be a better term.

The handling of the Cuban problem by our Department of External Affairs leaves the thought Mr. Diefenbaker may be "chickening out" because his foreign affairs

specialists are too naive to deal with problems arising in Latin America.

We recall with sobering after-thoughts the great goodwill our Minister of External Affairs showed Castro's trade delegation. They were the salt of the earth, Mr. Green gushed when completing a trade agreement after the U.S. had placed an embargo on Cuban exports.

We thought at the time Mr. Green was going out of his way to be unneighborly to our good neighbors to the South. And if we interpret the news reports from Ottawa correctly, our Prime Minister has proven anything but a good neighbor in his cool reception of President Kennedy's plea for Canada to join the OAS.

We in Canada may have our misgivings as to the efficiency of Washington's specialists in the State Department. Their mis-handling of the Cuban invasion may have but cemented our feeling that the U.S. has a lot to learn about foreign affairs; and that under Washington's present set-up diplomacy will never come to full flower.

We know nothing of the intricacies of diplomatic relations, we started out by saying. But we have an inkling of what a good neighbor should be; and we have read reams concerning our undefended border and our good neighborly relations with our neighbors to the South.

We prize these relations. When a neighborly President comes to Ottawa asking for help in mending fences that may keep Communism out of Canada, too, the least the Diefenbaker government should be is hospitable to his ideas.

Now Its Farm Equipment They Would License

It may once have been true that one of the big attractions of farm life was the freedom of action the farmer knew. He was his own boss, free to make his own decisions as to hours he labored, acreage he planted, produce he raised and marketed.

But the freedoms the farmer once knew are steadily being encroached upon; as are the freedoms of all of us. The planners in government have moved onto the farm scene until today they are already writing off as a total loss the fringe farmer.

The fringe farmer must go, our bureaucrats decree; and they will be replaced by reforestation. They envision vast acreages of timber to feed the paper mills and they apparently have written off not only the fringe farmer but the small towns and villages that feed off these farmers.

We cannot see this socialist trend of the planners in government to return what they term marginal farms to timber. So help with ideas of centralization of power, we see them, that they would sacrifice the small farm, the villages and towns, to the continued growth of the big cities.

In this era of the atom bomb the planners in government appear intent on concentrating the great majority of our people in a few target areas, the big cities. If we see this type of socialism akin to Russian Communism it may be because government policy is forcing what it terms the fringe

farmer to give up his individuality for the security the Welfare State offers the city dweller. And that is a specious thing.

In Communist Russia and China the collective farm is reportedly proving unproductive. And yet economic pressure is being put on the less successful farmer in Canada, in terms of annual income, to turn over his acreage to his neighbor who may be better at business and so may become a collective farmer in his own right.

This is a sad state of affairs to a small businessman who would not trade his small town for all the culture and grime the big cities proffer.

Next freedom of the farmer to go may be his use of the highways. Legislation now in the planning stage, we read, would force farmers to purchase licence plates for their tractors and farm wagons which at times are forced to use the Queen's highways. Today's super-highways already make it difficult for many farmers to move equipment from one field to another, from one farm to another. We see no useful purpose in forcing them to buy licenses for this equipment.

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture has already protested against such licensing and individual farmers should be protesting loud and often to their representatives at Queen's Park. Too many planners in government appear too prone to the use of licensing to control every segment of society.

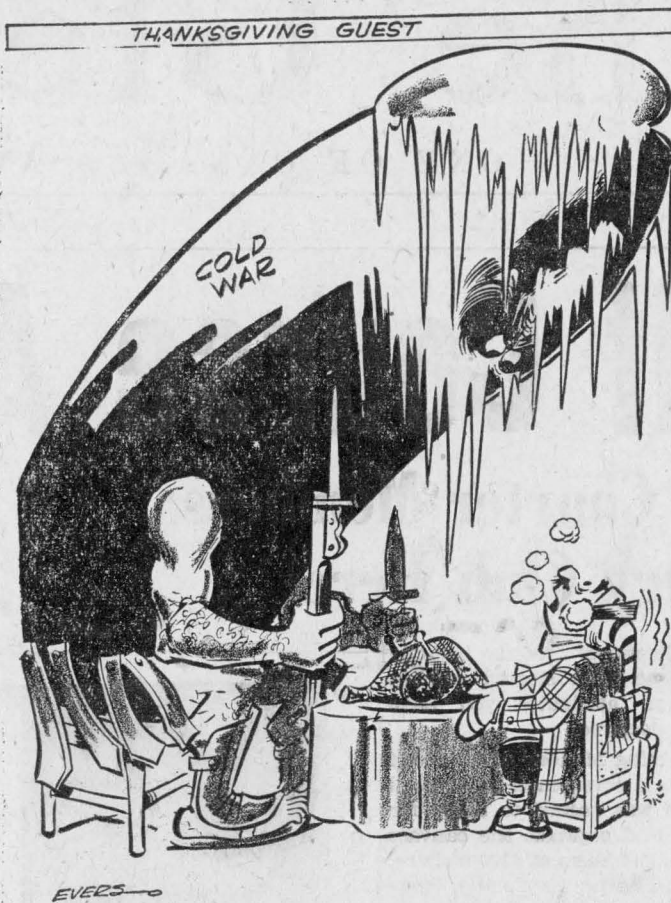

Let's Find Out If The Mafia Is Here

(From the Toronto Star)

Ontario needs something like a "Kefauver committee" to dig into its underworld and ascertain whether organized crime and gambling are entrenched here. Otherwise, law-abiding citizens will be sadly perplexed by the following contradictory evidence:

Attorney-General Kelso Roberts scoffs at reports that the Syndicate (or Mafia) is in our midst. He said Sunday that the police chiefs of 10 Ontario centres — including Metro Toronto, have told him no organized crime or gambling exists in their fair cities.

Massachusetts Attorney-General Edward J. McCormack has said that Toronto and Montreal representatives attended a "little Apalachin" summit conference in Worcester, in late 1959, of 150 U.S. Syndicate chiefs.

The New York state commission of investigation reported in February that Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph and Montreal are linked to New York's organized gambling network. "Gambling is the very heart beat of organized crime on a local and national scale", the report said.

Who is right? Mr. Roberts, or the American informants? Mr. Roberts fails to reassure us. Too much evidence seems to substantiate the contrary information. The most alarming examples were Toronto's gangland execution last fall of ex-convict Lorne Gibson — never solved — and the public beating of gambler Max Bluestein March in the Town Tavern lobby.

Liberal Leader John Wintermeyer has sensibly proposed that a royal commission be set up to probe into the matter.

A commission, examining witnesses and records, could decide whether the Syndicate is among us, menacing Canadians with extortion, murder and eventual widespread corruption, as in some American cities and states.

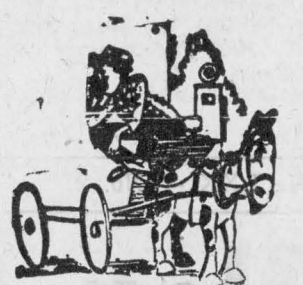

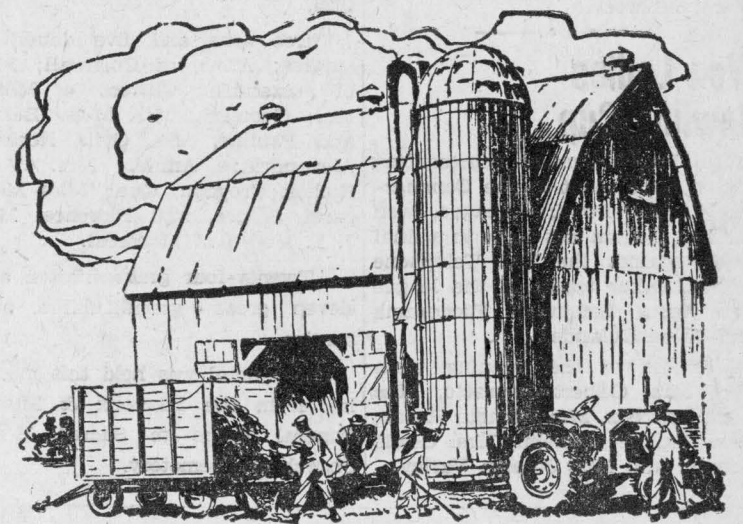

Warns Against Seed Corn Maggot

Seed Corn Maggot, an insect pest which was relatively unknown in this area until a few years ago, has become quite prevalent with the result that a large number of farmers in 1959 and 1960 lost their corn crop partially or entirely. This pest could be prevalent in 1961. The Seed Corn Maggot is a small almost colourless maggot about 1/4" long which attacks the germ end of the corn seed shortly after planting or when it starts to germinate and devours the inside of the corn kernel. Infestations are more likely in cold wet springs when germination and growth are slow. It also seems to prefer late plowed soils or fields which have been heavily manured.

I would suggest that seed dealers advise farmers when purchasing seed corn to treat their seed for the control of this insect. A number of commercial seed treatments are available and a few companies are now treating their seed before it is packaged. We should, however, avoid confusing insecticides and fungicides as practically all corn is now treated with a fungicide. If no insecticide has been used in the seed treatment, the following treatment is recommended—to treat one bushel of seed—add 1/2 ounce of Lindane to 1/2 pint of water, stir and pour mixture over seed. Mix the seed until it is thoroughly coated.

Would you bring this matter to the attention of your seed corn customers? They can avoid the possible loss of a valuable crop for a few cents as a preventative measure.
