## "If Health Permits I Might Run Again" Viateur Ethier Responds To Rumors

"My mind is not definitely made up. If after two months rest my health is improved I may decide to run again", declared Viateur Ethier, MP, Glengarry-Prescott-Russell, when commenting yesterday on reports he has decided to retire from the political scene.

"If my health does not improve I may not accept another nomination", stated Mr. Ethier when queried at his Glen Robertson home. "I have three large constituencies to represent," he noted, "and my health no longer permits me to go out and meet the people on their doorsteps."

The chances are slim that he will contest another election, summed up Mr. Ethier, but he added a final decision depended on his health.

Queried on the possibilities of a fall federal election the MP pointed out that the Press Gallery at Ottawa does not expect a vote until next year. Mr. Benson's was an election budget, in his opinion, but the unemployment picture is so bad it is quite possible the Government will decide to stay on until 1972. Prime Minister Trudeau will make the decision, Mr. Ethier concluded.

A report on Mr. Ethier's probable retirement carried in the Hawkesbury Carillon mentioned as possible Liberal candidates in the riding Mr. Ethier's brother, Denis Ethier of Dalkeith; Hawkesbury Reeve Philibert Proulx and Robert Cusson, a lawyer who is chairman of the Prescott and Russell Board of Education.

## Lower School Rates Make Possible Reductions In Maxville Levies

Maxville Village ratepayers will be receiving 1971 tax notices before the end of July, with instalment payments due on August 31 and December 31. Four per cent discount is being allowed on all bills when both instalments are paid by August 31.

All total tax rates are lower than those of last year, the difference varying from a decrease of 4.6 mills on residential properties supporting public schools to a drop of 9.7 mills on commercial

properties supporting separate schools. The decrease for commercial, public school ratepayers is 6.5 mills and for residential, separate school, 7.5 mills.

Reduction of school levies by crediting December, 1968, surpluses of the former school boards has made it possible to impose lower rates and at the same time have a larger amount available for general municipal activities. A small decrease in county rates since 1970 also assisted council to do this.

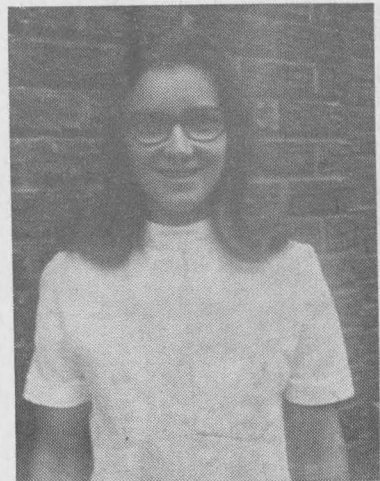
It is estimated that in 1971 approximately \$43,800 will be raised for general municipal activities, compared to \$31,500 in 1970. Purchase of a new truck for transporting extra water supply to fires and also for delivering water is the project requiring a large portion of the extra funds. An allotment for work on sidewalks, extra maintenance on the community hall and arena, and an increase in the reserve for working funds, are planned with the remainder.

Total tax rates for the four classifications of ratepayers are as follows: Residential, public schools 81.5 mills; Commercial, public schools 89.7 mills; Residential, separate schools 90.6 mills; Commercial, separate schools 99.7 mills.

Maximum residential tax reduction to be paid by the Province of Ontario is \$61.46 on public school supporting residences, and \$70.56 on separate school supporting ones. In some cases the reduction is below the maximum as it cannot be greater than 50% of the taxes levied.

## Barn Burns In Laggan Area

Loss is estimated at \$10,000 partly covered by insurance in the destruction of a barn owned by Donald E. MacMaster, Laggan, early Saturday morning. The barn was on the former farm of the late John Douglas MacMaster and was not Mr. MacMaster's home barn.

The loss included 4,000 bales of hay, not 1971 crop, and a grain combine.

The firemen were able to control flames which had spread to a well house and threatened the granary and house.

## Open New Park Near Hawkesbury

Carillon Provincial Park was officially opened and dedicated Saturday by Lands and Forests Minister Rene Brunelle.

The park, 11 miles east of Hawkesbury near the Quebec border, consists of 17,000 acres of land purchased from Ontario Hydro at a cost of \$240,000 following completion of the Carillon power dam project.

Since that time an extensive program of landscaping has been carried out and the park includes beaches, camping grounds, a boat launching ramp and administrative buildings.

When the improvement program is completed in three years, the government will have spent \$1 million on the park.

Park officials have estimated 50,000 people will make use of the facilities this year.

## Municipalities Name Representatives To Area Planning Board

Reeve Gerard Massie has acted as chairman of the steering committee of heads of councils and clerks which has had three meetings with representatives of the Municipal Affairs Department. Two consulting firms have been asked to submit cost estimates of preparing an official plan and zoning by-laws and one is to be selected at the first meeting of the new board.

Deputy-Reeve Marcel Ranger was named chairman of council's Finance Committee. Tuesday night, after town council had accepted the resignation of Reeve Bruno Massie from that post, Mr. Ranger was also named a signing officer for the Corporation replacing Reeve Massie and Councillor Martin Clement was appointed a member of the Finance Committee to fill the vacancy.

Reeve Massie will continue as reeve but is giving up the post of chairman of finance because as he explained in his letter of resignation, of the lack of co-operation he is receiving from the clerk-treasurer, the mayor and most of the chairmen of committees since the council voted on March 30th in favor of the Massie resolution for an inquiry into the town's financial operations.

# EDITORIAL

## IT'S OUR OPINION

### At Least They'll Have Sidewalks

Residents of the Kenyon Street West area have been putting up with a double dose of dust and miserable walking conditions. Not only have they shared the sad state of Main Street during these weeks of construction; they have trod an equally treacherous course to reach the main drag and during recent weeks have had the worry of traffic to add to their disenchantment.

More than a little frustrating it has been to see the fine new sidewalks stretching south from Kenyon Street, while so little that was constructive appeared to be doing on their street. Perhaps there were drainage and other problems delaying the start of reconstruction but patience was wearing thin as the weeks of poor walking conditions went by.

That long wait is nearly ended we hear. A start on the Kenyon Street sidewalks was to be made this week and the paving of most of Main and Kenyon Streets is to get underway next Monday. Almost inevitably the resurfacing program will start

on Main Street and we doubt the paving operation can encompass the Kenyon Street stretch in one short week.

Would that it could, for next weekend brings Games' day at Maxville and thousands of strangers may be getting a very poor impression of Alexandria as they eat dust down Main and ease their way west on Kenyon. If it is humanly possible to resurface most of south Main and Kenyon by next Saturday and do away with detours the passing throng will carry with them a more progressive picture of our town. If the paving program is limited, it is to be hoped the water truck will be in use frequently over that busy weekend to keep the dust down.

We may, or may not, have a smooth road surface to speed Games' goers on their way. It will be some consolation to residents of Kenyon Street if the new sidewalks are in and the kiddies no longer have to brave a heavily travelled street.

### Cheating Ourselves

We cheat ourselves every summer. By sticking to an outmoded work week and outmoded work hours, we rob ourselves of much of the pleasure and relaxation that should be a part of summer.

Friday afternoons, we end our week's work at approximately the same time. A good percentage take to the highways to head for favorite country retreats. The resultant driving ordeal provides more tension than most of us experience at any time at work.

Sunday afternoons we repeat the rush in the opposite direction. Those who do not leave the urban area but seek an outdoor experience in parks and conservation areas find them so jammed as to be hardly enjoyable.

Even when we start a holiday trip outside Canada, probably by charter flight, we find the airport unbelievably congested—because we have to start our flight on a weekend; that is when vacations traditionally begin and end.

### One Voice Against Welfare

Charlottenburgh Township's Reeve Adrian Gadbois continues to inveigh against welfare policies and their overly-generous application. In his latest statement on the subject Mr. Gadbois is reported as planning to recommend to his township council that it refrain from paying its share of welfare costs until the system is changed.

Reeve Gadbois would like to see welfare limited to those with no alternative. If able-bodied men must be included on the rolls he feels they should be required to do reasonable work for the amounts paid. He sees the modest makework program instituted this year by the Ontario Government for local improvements as something that could be expanded to embrace employable people on welfare and others out of work.

Those of us who live in small towns or rural areas are in a position to see the widespread waste of public funds that encourages sloth and breeds new generations conditioned to living out their lives on the dole. Some among us, we realize, are actually unemployable and should have some measure of public assistance. When welfare comes in such generous doses and in so many guises as to put these indigents in a state of comparative affluence and total indolence one is left wondering how long the workers in society will continue to subsidize

the shirkers.

We see some among us living an effortless life of ease even to the third generation and we hear beneficent government is treating them so generously they enjoy many amenities the average taxpayer cannot afford. Many are living high from the public trough, we know, but the extent of their bounty is a zealously guarded secret we can only guess at.

Municipal officials are in a better position to assess the waste in welfare and Reeve Gadbois is to be commended for airing his views. His township council may not find it possible to make a dent in the bureaucratic tangle that is responsible for today's welfare mess. His voice may be as one crying in the wilderness, but its message may reach other Reeves, other municipal and counties councils that are in a position to express the frustration of the taxpayer.

Government give-away of the taxpayers' dollars must some day be controlled and Reeve Gadbois is pointing up one of the drains on the public treasury that is draining the initiative of those still willing to work for the better life. His voice should be amplified by many others who see the indolence being bred by present welfare weaknesses.

### Questionable Privilege

Canada has always been a great country for monopolies. It started back in the earliest years of settlement. An outstanding example was the charter granted to the Company of Gentlemen Trading into Hudson's Bay, by which a privileged group of Englishmen were granted sole trading rights in an area which later proved to be about half of the North American continent.

We have never dropped the practice of letting one company or commission operate in a given territory with a solid guarantee against competition notes an editorial in the Wingham Advance-Times. Though the basic reason for such monopolies or franchises has always been the comparatively small population to be served in a big country, we wonder whether that reasoning is still valid in some instances.

The Bell Telephone Company is one case in point. With a legal guarantee of no competition in the areas it serves, Mother Bell can pretty well name her own prices. True, rate increases must be sanctioned by a federal commission supposedly representing the citizens of the land, but in the long

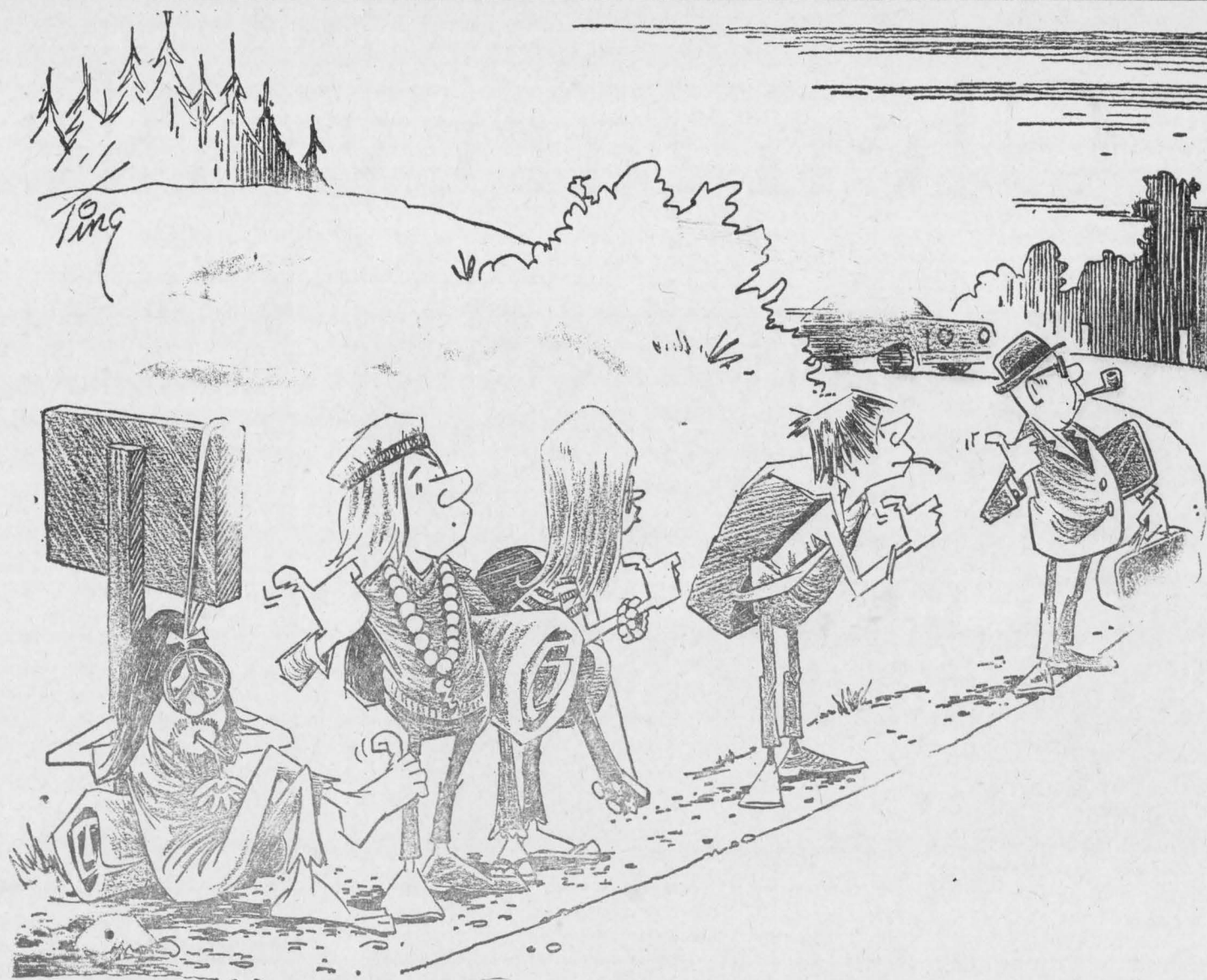
run the company can bring such arguments to bear that it usually gets its own way.

For many years the CBC had sole control of what we were to hear and see over the airwaves and surrendered, with apparent reluctance, to the demand for a second network in Canada.

Recently Air Canada went into a meeting in Montreal to seek the right to lower its trans-Atlantic group fares in the face of competition from the charter flight companies. It appeared a bit ridiculous, however, when only a few days later a minister of the Crown publicly criticized Air Canada for sharp increases in its domestic fares.

In other words, in the fly-to-Europe field, where competition is keen, our national airline was ready to get prices down and keep the business — but within Canada, where competition is sharply limited by government regulation, the screws were turned for stiffly higher rates.

Perhaps we should have non-government airlines where the most efficient operators survive and the rest get out of the business. Competition is still the life of trade.

The provincial election in Saskatchewan may have a message for Nova Scotia.

The Liberals in that province were going along with the federal authorities to phase out the uneconomic small family farm. Candidates of the New Democratic Party campaigned against this move.

It's all very well for economists and accountants in Ottawa and Halifax to say the small family farm is not economic. But is there any sense in pushing these people into the already overcrowded cities?

O.K. So the farmer on a hundred acres is not making a good living. But he does have a place for his family to live and breathe. He can grow much of his own food. The family can have fresh eggs and vegetables. And, more important, the man of the house has a job to go to every day.

There are already far too many families living in poverty in the cities. The worst unemployment problems are in the slum areas of the cities.

Rather than add to the welfare rolls in the cities, it might be advisable to offer a little help to those families who wish to remain and work on their little farms.

A report from your  
Glengarry Agricultural Office

Auguste Beauchesne recently joined the local staff of the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture and Food, as Associate Agricultural Representative. He will be making his headquarters at the Alexandria office but will be working on farm

management, crop and livestock programs in both Stormont and Glengarry Counties. Gus, as he prefers to be called, previously served as Agricultural Representative at Matheson in the district of Cochrane South, for 15

years where he developed many successful crop production programs and is particularly adept in his ability to counsel individually with farm families right out on their farms.

Mr. Beauchesne is looking forward to new challenges in the area, where it will be possible to work with a larger number of commercial farmers than in his previous position. The introduction of several new farm programs in the last few years has precluded the Agricultural Representative and Assistant providing as much on the farm service as would seem desirable. We hope that with this addition to our staff, it will be possible to better serve the individual needs of farm families.

Mr. Beauchesne is fully bilingual and will be able to provide a more adequate help to those whose first language is French.

## LADY MEETS COMPUTER, LOSES JOB

Here's a sad story about a country lass who lost her job:

The object of our attention is Gay, who has been fired from the farm where she worked for the past two years. The reason for her dismissal: Poor productive performance.

Gay worked with Gail, Bonita,

Gem and Gwen, turning out a product of high quality. She seemed to be performing satisfactorily, according to her boss. At least that was until her supervisor started analyzing information produced by his newly installed computer. From the computer records, the supervisor knew how much she was producing and compared her work quality to her wages.

The computer also told about her health, eating habits, love life and romantic activity of her suitors.

The clever supervisor also knew the lady's age and the number of days she has been off the job. Her performance had been slipping badly during the past two months, he detected from the computer forms.

But what actually placed Gay's job in doubt was when the computer predicted her future performance and found it would be half that of her working associates — Gail, Bonita, Gwen and Gem. With this information, the supervisor could see that Gay must be shown the gate since she was losing money for the farm. "She sure had me fooled — I thought she was better than average," the supervisor observed.

Our Gay is no former slave to the factory whistle. She is a Holstein dairy cow in an Eastern Ontario herd. Had she been an industrial worker, union rules

might have made her firing more difficult.

Dairy Herd Improvement (DHI) records were the computerized information that led to Gay's demise. Her production was computed in pounds of milk and butterfat percentages, while her salary was the cost of feed she ate. These records showed that Gay's production was the lowest in the herd. She was costing rather than making money for the producer after feed cost, taxes, interest, insurance, depreciation and other items were paid.

Modern business firms use computerized records to keep account of all operations in an attempt to find strong and weak points in their operations. Likewise, dairy farmers need production records on their cows to locate weak and strong producers and eliminate the money losers.

Dairy Herd Improvement members can realize up to \$20 return for every dollar invested in this program. The supervised program is available to dairy farmers for an annual cost of \$3.00 per cow. 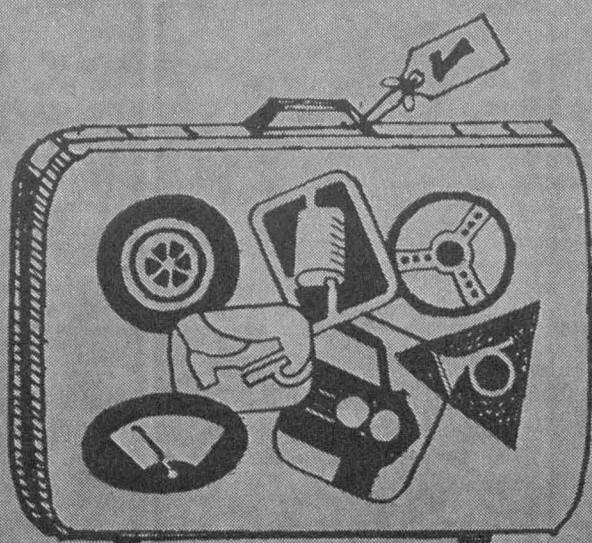
