

Board of Trade Meeting Suggests Possible Projects Group Might Endorse

Members of the Board of Trade, meeting last Thursday night in the courtroom, PUC building, were divided in two groups and asked to suggest possible projects the Board might adopt.

A trailer park and ball park, retail trade promotion, a clean-up campaign, better parking facilities, better street markings for all streets, were some of the suggestions brought out. There was also the thought that the lobby of the post office might be left open for a few hours on Sundays so that people could get mail.

E. C. Nokes of Toronto, representative of the Ontario and Canadian Chambers of Commerce, spoke informally on the important part a Board of Trade can play on civic improvement and he it was who later divided the meeting into two groups for discussion of possible projects.

President Laurier Lefebvre was in

the chair and he called on Mayor Simon to report on progress in the hospital plan. The chair has been received and the solicitors are now drawing up the constitution and by-laws, the mayor reported.

The housing committee reported there was still a brisk demand for good, self-contained dwellings but housing starts expected early this Spring should help alleviate the situation.

John Proulx was appointed to represent the Board at meetings of the Eastern Ontario Development Association.

Following discussion it was decided to write the Ontario Department of Highways asking that signs showing direction of Alexandria be placed at several main highway intersections which do not at present have same.

Election of officers will be held at a dinner meeting slated for the near future.

Lancaster Woman Escaped Injury

Myles McDonald Dies At 87

On April 3rd, in Cornwall's Macdonell Memorial Hospital, a highly esteemed citizen died, in the person of John Myles McDonald, at the age of 87 years. He had been in declining health for three months.

Mr. McDonald, the son of John and Mary McDonald, was born in 1873, on Lot 37-7th Lancaster.

Some years of his early life were spent in the northern mining area. About 54 years ago he moved to Glen Robertson where he resided until October last when he moved to Cornwall.

In 1918 he married Jane McDonnell, who survives. Two brothers, John Alex and Dan, also survive, with six nephews and four nieces. In Montreal are Mrs. Pelletier and Mary Catherine and Gladys. Lera McDonald resides in Niagara Falls. The six nephews are: John P. McPhee, Kirkland Lake; Jack, Fred and Dan McDonald, in Montreal, and Hugh and Archie McDonald, in Chelsea, Que.

Mr. McDonald was widely known in musical circles as a talented piper.

The esteem in which Mr. McDonald was held was evident from the attendance at his wake and funeral. He was a member of the League of the Sacred Heart.

The funeral was held from Mar-coux & Morris Funeral Home to St. Martin of Tours Church, Glen Robertson.

Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. Aime Leduc, P.P. Interment was in the parish cemetery, where Father Leduc recited the graveside prayers.

Sunday Movies This Weekend

"The Nun's Story" will be the feature film this Sunday at the Garry Theatre as Alexandria gets its introduction to Sunday movies. Regular prices will prevail, according to theatre owner Paul E. Viau, and Sunday schedules will be a single showing starting at 2 o'clock and two evening shows, the first starting at 7.15.

Town Council Tuesday passed the by-law which makes Sunday movies legal here. It followed enabling provincial legislation some weeks ago and a municipal referendum last December which overwhelmingly approved Sunday movies.

High School Seeks Four New Teachers

Salary schedules were revised upwards at a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of Glengarry-Alexandria High School when it was decided to advertise for new teachers for the new school year in September.

Resignations have come from four of the 15-member staff who have accepted posts in other schools. Lionel Poirier is going to London, Ontario; Miss Louise Pepper to Simcoe District High School; William Chambers to Hamilton and Roland Michaud to Tweed.

Members of the staff have until May 31st to tender resignations but the Board is hopeful there will be no further changes in the school staff.

The salary schedule was raised to \$200 in some categories to bring it in line with those of other schools across the province. The minimum will now be \$4,600 and the maximum \$9,200 in category four, specialists with honours standing.

Ronald J. McPherson, board chairman, reports progress on plans for the school addition are awaiting approval from one of the townships concerned.

Martintown Man To Teach Overseas

The Board of Education for the Township of Etobicoke, Toronto, has approved the loan Earl Lagroix, a teacher at West Humber Public School, to the Department of National Defence for overseas teaching service for the period of September, 1961, to June, 1963.

Mr. Lagroix learned of his new appointment after returning to Toronto from spending his holidays touring Florida and the southern United States.

The highlight of his tour was a day deep sea fishing in the Gulf of Mexico and witnessing the students' activities at Fort Lauderdale. He also found St. Augustine, the oldest North American settlement north of Mexico, fascinating, as well as Washington, the U.S. Capital.

Mr. Lagroix is a son of Alex Lagroix, Martintown.

Story Tells Of Highland Games

The Glengarry Highland Games held annually at Maxville, is featured in an article appearing in the May issue of The Instructor magazine, a publication widely used by Canadian teachers.

Mrs. Gladys Kerr Charlton of 354 Cottessmore street, Cobourg, and formerly a resident of Maxville, is the author of the story which will be read by nearly 600,000 teachers and educators and their pupils in Canada and the United States, according to an editorial estimate.

Mrs. Charlton, who is a first grade teacher at the Charles R. Gummow School in Cobourg, traced the games from their start in 1842 to the present and described many of the activities which go on during the event.

The commissioners are now busy lining up census takers in various parts of their areas and next week they will go to Ottawa for a briefing on the work expected of them.

Council Limits Rural Fire Aid To 'Reasonable Distance'

Town Council will send its fire trucks, when asked, six or seven miles out of town; but its primary task must be the protection of Alexandria property. This was the decision reached at Tuesday's meeting when Reeve Orla Massie and Councillor William N. Fraser, of Lochiel, approached Council seeking an agreement on fire protection.

Alexandria will send its brigade as far as Glen Robertson, but it hesitates to answer a call to so distant a point as Dalkeith in case a flash fire broke out in town when no protection was available. We will lend every assistance possible, the Lochiel officials were told, but our primary concern must be the protection of our own municipality.

Reeve Massie declared the township was already making plans to provide better fire protection at Dalkeith.

There was no discussion on methods of speeding help to the adjacent rural areas and, presum-

ably, township officials will still have to request assistance before the brigade is authorized to leave town.

Sunday movies were given the go-ahead when a by-law was passed to provide for exhibiting of motion pictures, theatrical performances, concerts and lectures on the Lord's day. A referendum on the question last December found 862 voting in favor of Sunday movies; 152 against.

A construction by-law to proceed with work on the extension to the south-end sewer was passed. It has still to be approved by the Municipal Board before tenders can be called.

Agreement was reached with Kenyon Township Council for rebuilding the bridge over the Garry River on Lochiel street west, the Island survey. Kenyon will replace the bridge with a three-culvert type crossing and Alexandria will share in the township's costs.

Area Merchant Gets Bogus \$10.

Another counterfeit \$10 bill was passed in this area, Tuesday night, the victim being Duncan Tingle, merchant at Fassfern.

Mr. Tingle reported to police that an old-model Cadillac bearing Quebec license plates stopped at his gas tanks about 9.30 p.m. The driver purchased \$4.00 worth of gas and Mr. Tingle made the change on the \$10 bill out of his pocket.

As soon as he got into the store he checked the serial number of the bill and confirmed the fact it was bogus. The car had proceeded north on Highway 34 and he immediately notified police to that effect. They now have the bill and Mr. Tingle is out \$6 in good cash and \$4.00 worth of gas.

Litter Cans In Place

Alexandria litter cans were placed in position on Main street this week and civic authorities hope the public will become litter conscious enough to keep them well filled.

House Interior Badly Damaged

Alexandria fire brigade was called out twice during Sunday night; the second time for a serious fight against flames.

At 9 p.m. Sunday, an open furnace door at Maria Goretti Academy gave the impression of flickering flames and a neighbor sounded the alarm.

Firemen were soon back home but they were again summoned at 4 a.m. to the duplex on Kenyon street west owned by Jim Laparle, and also occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Lucien Laparle.

No one was home at the time but a transport driver saw smoke swirling across the road and awakened neighbors who turned in the alarm.

Thought to have started from a short circuit in the electric switch, the blaze caused heavy damage in the upstairs of the Laparle home and the roof was also extensively burned. Smoke and water damage was caused downstairs and the brigade was on the scene for an hour and a half before the fire was finally extinguished.

Quebec Company Fined Here For Selling Colored Spread To Stores

A Quebec firm convicted of selling a colored spread to two district merchants was fined a total of \$200 and costs in Magistrate's Court, here, Tuesday. The 96 pounds of spread were forfeited to the Crown and another 1,100 pounds carried in its truck was seized pending action by the Minister of Agriculture.

Conserves Ste Anne Limitée of Ste Anne des Plaines, Terrebonne County, pleaded guilty to the offences which included—

Tint or shade contained more than 1/10 degrees of yellow or

yellow and red.

Wrapper or label did not list ingredients.

Less than 80% refined oils by weight.

More than 16% by weight of water.

James G. Harrison of Downsview, Ont., an inspector under The Oleomargarine Act, made the seizure on January 26th.

Duncan J. Macdonald, Assistant Crown Attorney, prosecuted, while G. G. Aubrey appeared for the defendants.

Must We Have Unsightly Sidewalks?

Is Alexandria doomed to have unsightly sidewalks? Has Town Council committed itself irrevocably to a policy of asphalt walks rather than the more attractive concrete type we once knew? Or are our elected councillors simply ignoring the whole problem, letting things drift until it will be too late to make a decision between asphalt paving and concrete?

That deadline will come this summer when Ottawa Gas begins to replace the walks it has torn up with permanent sidewalks. It is responsible for restoring these sidewalks to as good or better condition than they were before their drills started hammering holes in vast stretches of sidewalk. The sidewalks they tore up were almost all concrete ones and in the ordinary course of events the Gas company would be planning on replacing them with brand new concrete walks.

But is it possible unsightly asphalt walks will be built instead? Town Council has the decision and we know at least some members of council favor asphalt over concrete because, as they argue, asphalt is impervious to road salt.

So is well-laid concrete, we have heard from people who should be better informed on the qualities of concrete than even our town fathers. They recall how concrete walks were laid on Kenyon Street West a few years ago and they didn't stand up. They argue these walks were poured in cold weather, or were otherwise poorly laid so that the concrete never "jelled". And when they crumbled in the following Spring the blame was laid on the road salt used by the Highways department through the winter. As proof that the road salt was not the cause they point to Main Street sidewalks that have never been affected by salt.

If every foot of sidewalk in town was topped with asphalt we would still maintain it was unsightly and much less to be desired than concrete walks. As it is we have a hodge-podge of concrete and asphalt as town council continues to make needed repairs with the latter material. The result is an unsightly mess that will grow worse if council doesn't soon adopt a definite policy on sidewalks.

We trust it will be a concrete policy.

Is Our Welfare Bill The Biggest?

Rather dismaying it was to read in the weekend papers that the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry have one of the highest per capita Welfare costs in the entire province. The statistics were not complete and it may be that ours top all others in the province.

We are left wondering if Glengarry's picture is a bit better, or worse, than those of Stormont or Dundas. The news report doesn't say.

Dated Toronto, it deals primarily with the Welfare picture in Carleton County where the per capita cost of public welfare in the fiscal year ended March 31st, 1960, was \$14.24. As a comparison the report notes the cost in Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry in 1959-60 was \$24.78 and the provincial average is \$14.29 per capita.

Covered by these figures are expenditures by the three levels of government — Federal, provincial and municipal — as well as spending by private sources. Included are: relief (which is given the less pointed name of general welfare assistance in the official records), old age assistance, mothers' allowances, child welfare, disabled persons' allowances, homes for the aged maintenance, blind persons' allowances, day nurseries and capital construction.

The City of Cornwall, now in a depressed condition, apparently is responsible in large measure for this area's high per capita welfare bill. It spent \$1,230,736 on welfare in that fiscal year, a per capita average of \$29.12, more than double the provincial average.

This high welfare cost reflects poor economic conditions in this area, according to Public Welfare Minister Louis P. Cecil, who adds differences in the types of services provided also partly account for the wide variations in per capita cost across the province.

Surely economic conditions in Glengarry are not as bad as these statistics would indicate. Rather do we believe that the explanation is to be found "in the types of services provided", as well as in local administration that may be too liberal with welfare funds.

There is a class of people in town and district who have never had it so good since the provincial government largely took out of the hands of the local municipality the control of welfare payments. If the head of a family can get himself declared "unemployable" he and his family are in clover. Some of the larger of these families are reportedly taking in as much as \$350 a month in various forms of welfare from the three levels of government. They have all the conveniences their tax-paying neighbors can afford, and sometimes more.

Economic conditions in these United Counties, in our opinion, are not so bad as to earn us the dubious title of highest welfare spenders in the province. The fault, rather, lies in too liberal interpretation of the welfare laws. Too many freeloaders are living high off the hog, at the taxpayers' expense.

Long overdue is a thorough examination of Ontario's welfare spending, especially in this neck of the province.

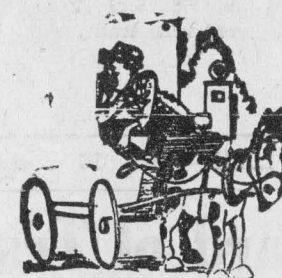
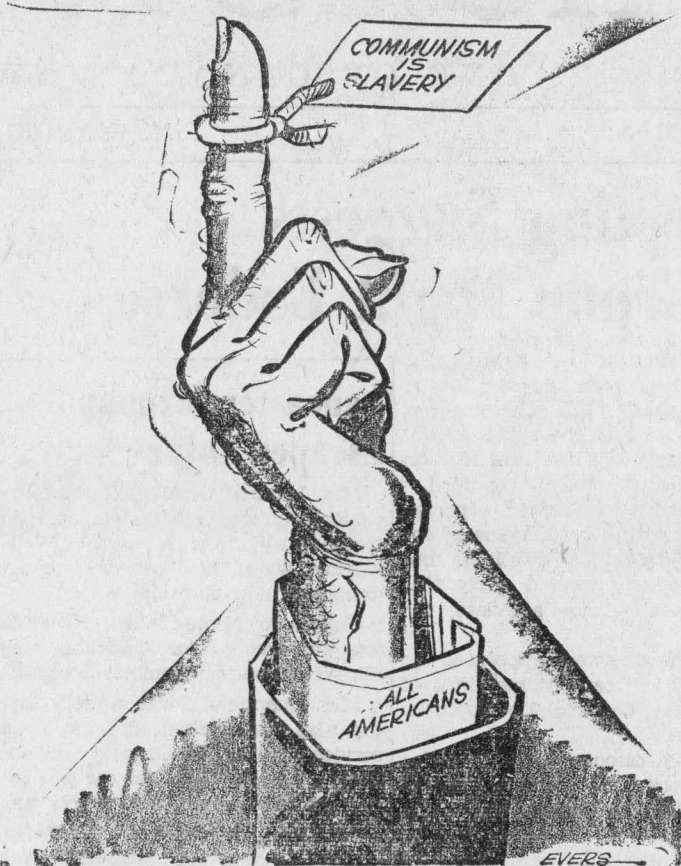
I cannot see any comparison between Apartheid and the case of the Chinese woman who was refused permission to remain in Canada. In the case of Apartheid, a relatively small minority of citizens not only dominates the great majority of citizens, but they also deny them all rights, in fact, they treat them more shabbily than we treat our animals. No person with any sense of justice could support such a policy. In the case of the Chinese woman, she obtained permission to visit Canada and was granted all the privileges of a visitor. After she had given birth to a child, she sought permission to remain in Canada with her child, and was refused, but only after long deliberations and study on the part of the officials involved. For economic reasons, besides many others, every country has to place restrictions on immigration, and these require rules and regulations. What would be the sense of having regulations if they are not observed? You cited the regulations so they do not need repeating.

Is it just to say that she was forcibly separated from her young daughter when she has every right to bring back the child to China with her? Was it any more heart-rending for her to leave her daughter in Canada than it was for her to voluntarily abandon the rest of her family in China? She was quite evidently prepared to do that.

I consider myself about as far from being a segregationist as one can be, but I am strongly in favor of the regulations that restrict immigration to this country, provided it is done in a just way. It is superfluous to even mention that there are different standards of living in the different countries of the world, and we in Canada are so fortunate as to enjoy one of the

Former Resident Writes Of Life On A Sheep Farm In New Zealand

Dear Sir:

I have just received several copies of the Glengarry News, and though they tend to make me homesick, it doesn't stop me from perusing them from front to back.

Though I have been in New Zealand fifteen years, I have not forgotten my Glengarry. I have never really felt a foreigner in this lovely district of Gimmerburn. It is settled by Scots and Irish, and their customs do not differ greatly from those of Glengarrians. We have our Burns' Nights and St. Patrick's concerts.

New Zealanders are always so interested in Canada, that I wondered if your readers would like to hear something of this land "Down Under", especially the farming side of it.

The farms in this part of the country, known as the Maniototo

Plains, are mostly sheep and of about 1,000 acres.

Alfalfa, turnips and English grasses are grown for feed. The sheep graze all year round, but the farmers supplement their feed in the winter by loading a trailer with hay and driving it around the paddocks with the tractor, throwing out quarters of baled hay, here and there.

Lambing is in September (spring here) and shearing from August to January. The sheep also have to be dipped and eye-clipped once a year.

The income of the farmers depends on the price of the wool sold in the Fall at an auction of World Wool Buyers, and also from small seeds harvested in season such as Alfalfa, White Clover, Brown-top, Ryegrass and Fescue.

When the sheep are shorn, we get a team of approximately three shearers, who shear about 160 sheep a day each, and shift from farm to farm with their own shed hands who lift, roll and prepare the fleece

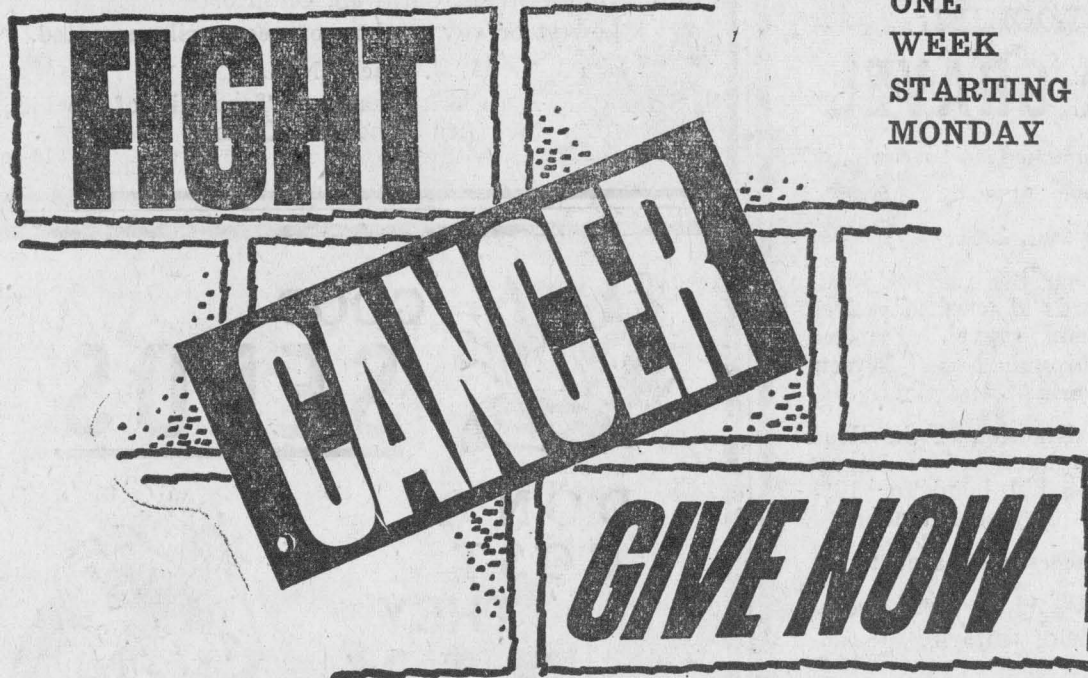

for forwarding to the wool store to await the sale.

The team have to be served morning and afternoon teas, a real institution here, as well as their three main meals a day. The teas consist of sandwiches, scones and cakes, not to mention their hot cup of tea no matter how much sweating they are doing. Mostly an outside cook comes to take over the catering, but if none are available then the farmer's wife takes over.

Merino sheep, mostly for wool, Corriedales for wool and meat, Romneys and Southdowns are the most predominant breeds.

There is always plenty of work available all over New Zealand and farmers, especially, find it hard to get labour.

The scenery is just beautiful all over New Zealand. From my front door, I face Mt. Ida, 5,500 ft., of which our Sheep Run covers about 10 miles square. We actually live about thirteen miles away from it on a small 400-acre farm. This farm is used for growing the feed and small seeds, while Idaburn (the Run) holds the sheep.

I am interested to know, and so

are some New Zealand friends, if Flora MacDonald has any descendants in Glengarry?
