## Maxville's Reeve, J. N. Fitzgerald New Warden Of United Counties

After election by acclamation, James N. Fitzgerald, reeve of Maxville, was installed warden of the United Counties, Monday afternoon. Distinguished visitors at the opening session of Counties Council included Hon. Fred Cass, the provincial minister of highways; Peter Manley, M.L.A., Stormont; Fern Guindon, M.L.A., Glengarry, and Osie Villeneuve, M.P., Glengarry-Prescott.

Following the installation ceremony, council went into a closed committee meeting to elect chairmen of nine standing committees.

Robert Smith, reeve of Finch Village, was elected chairman of the finance committee; Mahlon Zeron, reeve of Matilda, became chairman of the roads and bridges committee.

Presiding until the warden was elected, Clerk - Treasurer L. C. Kennedy welcomed three new members to council. They were Ovella Massie, reeve of Lochiel; John Thompson, deputy-reeve of Matilda, and Norman M. MacLeod, deputy-reeve of Kenyon. The first two were councillors before; this is the first session for Mr. MacLeod.

Mr. Kennedy announced that Stewart McGillis had been delegated acting-reeve of Lancaster Village during the illness of elected reeve, T. Scott Fraser.

After being elected, Warden Fitzgerald was led to the front of the council chambers by his sponsors, Lloyd McHugh, reeve of Alexandria, and John Lawrence McDonald, reeve of Cornwall Township.

He was sworn in by Mr. Kennedy. Then out - going warden, J. M. Fader, reeve of Winchester, invested him with the warden's chain of office. Reeve reviewed the symbolic meaning of the various medallions on the chain of office and then

assisted Warden Fitzgerald to his chair.

Rev. Iver MacIver of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Maxville, conducted the invocation.

**First Since 1931**  
Warden Fitzgerald expressed his "sincere thanks for the honor you have conferred on me today". He recalled that he was the first warden from Maxville since Dr. J. Howard Munro was warden in 1931. He said he would uphold the fine tradition established by Dr. Munro and preceding wardens. He thanked the Maxville electors for making it possible for him to become warden.

He said the year ahead seemed normal, "with one bright spot", the fact that there would be some extra money to spend on the county roads.

### Alexandria Reeve Education Chairman

Reeve Lloyd McHugh was elected chairman of the Education committee of Counties Council at Monday's meeting. The Education portfolio is usually considered the first step on a three-year approach to the warden's chair.

Nine reeves were elected chairmen of standing committees: Finance, Robert Smith (Finch Village); Roads and Bridges, Mahlon Zeron (Matilda); Equalization of Assessment, Donald Kyle (Williamsburg Township); County Property, Gerard Brunet (Charlottenburgh); Agriculture, Charles E. Blair (Roxborough); Public Welfare, Kenzie MacGillivray (Finch Township); Forestry, C. Gerald Sangster (Lancaster Township); Education, Lloyd McHugh (Alexandria); Resolutions and Memorials, L. C. Davis (Iroquois).

## Monckland Man Killed Friday When Car Hit Tree Near Bonville

A 29-year-old Monckland man, Fred Lapierre was killed late last Friday night when his car left the road about a mile north of Bonville and struck a tree.

Rushed to Cornwall General Hospital by Exclusive Ambulance, he died about 40 minutes after arrival from a fractured skull and multiple injuries.

Lapierre was travelling south on County Road 16 about 9:55 last night when he lost control of his car, careened off the road and slammed into the tree on the east side of the road.

The 1954 model automobile was demolished.

Cst. L. P. Fitzsimmons of Ontario Provincial Police, District 11 head-

quarters at Cornwall, investigated. It has not been decided whether an inquest will be held.

Mr. Lapierre was not married. He had boarded with Mr. and Mrs. William Jackson in Monckland and was employed at Campbell's General Store in Monckland for a number of years.

His father Peter Lapierre, Monckland, died about two years ago, and his mother, Mrs. Rita Lapierre has been a patient at MacDonell Memorial Hospital for some time.

Two brothers and a sister survive: Gaston, in Chesterville; Paul and Mrs. Euclid Quenneville (Betty) of Cornwall.

The funeral was held Tuesday at St. Anthony's Church, Apple Hill.

## New Warden Has Had Varied Experience

James Norman Fitzgerald, reeve of Maxville, and new warden of the United Counties, has had many years of varied experience in business and industry.

Born in Plantagenet in 1896, he was raised on a farm. He worked for E. B. Eddy Co. in Hull for 30 years, 24 of them as works superintendent.

After retiring because of ill health, he rested for six months. Then, in 1946, he bought a garage in Maxville. He operated a service station and sold farm machinery in addition to running the garage.

In 1949, he sold the garage and bought the general store which he still owns and operates in Maxville.

He is married to the former Stella Graham of Pembroke. They have three children, Mrs. Keith Franklin, married to a farmer east of St. Elmo; Barry, who works for Dupont in Kingston, and Sheila, 18, who lives at home and attends Maxville High School.

A Maxville Village councillor for the last 10 years, the warden has been reeve for five years. He is a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church; the Maxville Chamber of Commerce; Maxville Masonic Lodge 418, AF & AM, and the Glengarry Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, 143.

As a hobby, he and his wife collect Canadian antiques. "We like scraping ten layers of paint off them, and doing them over", he said. He collects furniture, old dishes, and antique domestic utensils.

### Opposes Move

Warden Fitzgerald opposed the movement to abolish county councils. "I definitely don't agree with it at all", he said. "County council is the government department closest to the people. We are the people. When we are here a delegation can come from any part of the counties and get a quick ruling. If there was no county council it would mean a long, expensive trip to Toronto."

The warden called attention to the distinguished work of Dr. J. Howard Munro during 20 years as a county councillor.

Representing Maxville in 1931, Dr. Munro was the last warden from the village until Warden Fitzgerald was elected by acclamation Monday. "He was a man who did a lot for his municipality and the counties", the warden said. "He was the backbone of council for many years."

The warden said he would like to see more stop and direction signs at county road corners. He also thought school buses should be forced by law to come to a dead stop before crossing railroads. "I don't think if a bus stopped, a train would ever hit it", he said.

Four generations gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Fournay, Lancaster, on New Year's day to celebrate the 99th birthday of Mrs. J. J. Munroe. The near-centenarian received many gifts and cards to mark the event.

In a letter to a friend, here, Mrs. Munroe tells of her birthday celebration and adds, "I am writing a book on Lancaster and Glengarry, or trying to do it".

Delegates to the Ontario Conference at Guelph, February 7 and 8 will be Mrs. J. Daniel MacDonald, W. D. MacLeod, president, and Charles Osborne, Bainsville, with a second lady yet to be appointed. Mr. MacLeod will also act as official delegate to the Ontario Farm Safety Council annual to be held at the same time as the Conference.

Organized by the Glengarry Federation of Agriculture, the Glengarry Farm Safety Council re-elected its same officers as last year, with W. D. MacLeod, Dalkeith, president; John McBain, Lancaster, vice-president, and J. Y. Humphries, sec.-treas.

### Died Yesterday

A lifelong, respected resident of Dalkeith, Miss Mary MacLeod died Wednesday in hospital at Ottawa. She was a sister of Alex N. MacLeod, postmaster at Dalkeith.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

An improved afternoon mail and passenger service from Ottawa was instituted by the CNR, Monday, when the fast inter-city train stopped here at 5.21 p.m. It will stop daily here for mail and passengers, the only stop between Ottawa and Montreal.

The morning service from Ottawa is not being changed but local officials have been assured by the CNR that any time the transcontinental is more than 2½ hours late in reaching Ottawa, a special train will be run to provide local service between the two cities.

Announcement of the new policy came last Thursday from Divisional Superintendent E. P. Burns, following a visit to Alexandria to confer with Mayor Simon, who had been seeking better service. Mr. Burns was accompanied by G. N. Allen, district engineer, also of Ottawa, and by J. M. Langlois, local CNR agent.

The stopping of No. 50 here, will provide better service between Ottawa and Alexandria, and between this town and Montreal. Leaving Ottawa at 4:30, the train will take just 51 minutes to reach Alexandria at 5.21 p.m. The regular local will also stop here at 6.18, but the Ottawa papers and the mail are now travelling on the fast train.

Miss Grace Cameron, postmistress, declares her staff is highly pleased with the new service which permits sorting of all Ottawa mail by 6 p.m.

At the inaugural meeting of Town Council last week, Mayor Simon reported Osie Villeneuve, M.P., had approached officials of the Department of Transport regarding the unsatisfactory service out of Ottawa. He was advised that Mayor Simon should contact the Divisional Superintendent of the CNR and Thursday's meeting followed Mayor Simon's approach for such a discussion.

## Lancaster Loses Estimable Citizen Rev. J. U. Tanner, In His 91st Year

South Lancaster mourns the death of one of its oldest and most esteemed citizens, Rev. J. U. Tanner, D.D., who died at his waterfront home last Thursday. Dr. Tanner was in his 91st year, the last 60 of which had been spent in South Lancaster.

His death came seven weeks after he had taken ill in St. Andrew's Church on November 27th. Up to that time he had been most active despite his advanced age. His life was full, long after his retirement in 1941. Dr. Tanner had developed many hobbies through the years and he continued to preach and lecture. Photography was one of his hobbies and he learned how to make his own slides with which he illustrated many talks.

Dr. Tanner served as Superintendent of Missions in the Ottawa and Montreal Conference from 1912 to 1941 and his fluency in the French language served him in good stead. At one time he preached in three area churches, St. Andrew's, in South Lancaster; St. Andrew's, in the Second Concession, and at Curry Hill United Church, now closed.

Many friends throughout Glengarry Presbytery and over a much wider area learned of his death with sincere regret.

Rev. John Ulrich Tanner was born at Sherbrooke, Que., the eldest son of Rev. Charles A. Tanner and his wife, Jane Shaw. He graduated from Morrin College, Quebec City, in 1893 and was ordained that year. Dr. Tanner filled a charge at Omelee, Ont., until 1900 when he came to South Lancaster, serving in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church until 1912 when he went into mission

work in the Conference. He received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from McGill University in 1926.

Dr. Tanner was twice married. To Janet Rayside, in 1906, and following her death in 1933 to Mrs. D. A. Fraser, of Lancaster, in 1946. She survives, as do two brothers and two sisters: Dr. Louis Tanner, D.D.S., Toronto; Laurie Tanner, of Montreal; Mrs. Heber Budden, now 94, who had been residing in the Tanner home for more than a decade, and Mrs. D. R. MacCrimmon, of Dorval.

The largely attended funeral was held Monday at 1.30 p.m. from his late home at Knox United Church, where the service was conducted by Rev. W. E. Black, assisted by Rev. Mr. Hurst, of Kirk Hill, and Rev. Kenneth MacMillan, of St. Lambert, who is now Superintendent of Missions for the Montreal-Ottawa Conference. Many other clergymen were in attendance.

Interment was in Mount Royal Cemetery, in Montreal.

A wealth of lovely floral tributes evidenced the regret and sympathy in Dr. Tanner's death.

## Have It Done Now, If Possible

Unemployment rolls are at a new high this winter across Canada and it is probably safe to say more people will find this a distressingly long winter than has been the case in recent years. So many are without a regular income this winter, the cumulative effect will be felt by business, too.

Doubly important this winter, then, is the measure of success met with by the Do It Now campaign, fostered by government in order to create as many jobs as possible in the winter months. National in scope, the Do It Now movement can be of benefit only according to the degree of support it receives at the community level. It can have a direct bearing on the livelihood of your friend down the street; if enough of us find it possible to get a wide variety of improvements done now, rather than waiting till Spring, the cumulative effect could come as a shot in the arm to the entire community.

Not all of us may be in a position to have it done now. But among those planning redecoration, renovation, repairs, the installation of a modern kitchen, a rumpus room, there must be some who would find it beneficial to give their plans the green light now.

Right now skilled tradesmen are ready to start on most of the jobs that we traditionally put off till spring. You will appreciate the saving in time and usually have the job done better if you DO IT NOW. And you will be providing work for a neighbor at a time when he needs it most.

If you wait till spring you undoubtedly will be part of the long line-up of customers that each year put off many of the jobs that can better be done in winter.

It sounds like good sense, and good citizenship, to Do It Now, rather than wait for spring.

## Now It's A Health Scheme

The platform that was put together at last week's Liberal rally in Ottawa left us shuddering; especially that plank that called for a national health scheme that would add another \$400 million to federal welfare costs.

At a time when the economy is sick and deficit financing is already required to meet the many commitments of the Welfare State, one of our major parties is promising another big step into socialism. And at the same time it is promising a reduction in income taxes.

Our reaction was sheer disgust; and we still think it a shame that political platforms must be put together with so much of deceit and dishonesty. But it seems we are not seeing things from the viewpoint of practical politics; we are sadly lacking in political savvy.

This Liberal rally was successful far beyond the hopes of those who master-minded it, we hear. The timing was perfect for a good press. Nothing too newsworthy came along to steal the headlines and the Liberal party got reams of good publicity right across the nation. Mr. Pearson was in fine fettle and he received enthusiastic endorsement of his leadership from a rank and file which turned out in surprisingly good numbers.

The rally was timed, it seems, to grab the spotlight before the New Party could come along and manoeuvre the Liberals into a position where they might be squeezed out of the picture; between the New Party on the left, and the Conservatives on the right. That national health scheme plank

has presumably put the Liberals far enough on the left as to leave little room for the New Party to squeeze in at all.

Smooth practical politics, and most successful, this Liberal rally may have been. But how closely attuned, we thought it, to the Mackenzie King tradition of winning elections by stealing the other party's thunder.

The promise of a national health scheme undoubtedly is practical politics. The New Party is certainly going to plump for it and the Conservatives, now so progressive, will probably think up added gimmicks to demonstrate their solicitude for the voter.

All these political promises may be practical politics. But who can honestly say that it is practical for government, no matter the party label, to take on huge added welfare commitments at a time when it is already finding it impossible to pay its way? And when they pledge a reduction of taxes, too, one knows they are again out to make fools of a very gullible electorate.

We the people surely know by now we get nothing from government we do not pay for in taxes. But still we lap up these promises of pie in the sky.

Don't think for a minute that this criticism of a Liberal platform means that we hold them in lower esteem than the politicians of the other parties. Rather do we deplore the fact that there is no party left that in conscience we can support. All of them are more dedicated to winning elections through give-away programs than to slowing the drift to socialism.

## Don't Send - Take Him To The Arena

Minor Hockey Week opens across Canada Saturday and the parents of more than one hundred thousand youngsters who participate in organized minor hockey are being urged to show special interest in their hockey activities this week.

"Don't Send — Take your boy to the Arena" is the theme of minor hockey week and this can apply equally well to the parents of youths not yet participating. Their interest in the program can be whetted in direct proportion to the interest their parents evidence in minor association play.

The big night in Glengarry Gardens will be Saturday, January 28th, when a full program of minor league games will be played. All interested in the future of hockey should make it a point to put in an appearance that night at the Gardens to encourage the youngsters.

Minor hockey on an organized basis is in its eighth year in Alexandria and the proof that it has paid off is seen in the success being met by our Junior Glens, a team made up almost wholly of town and district youths who learned their hockey in the Alexandria minor association. Our Glens have stayed right up near the top and they possess some of the top scoring aces such as Gilles Joannette of Glen Robertson.

Observers will tell you the youngsters are playing heads up hockey and that it is more than likely some of them will step up into yet higher company in the foreseeable future. Their biggest lack so far has been box-office support, but surely that will materialize now that the distractions of the holiday season are past.

Fifteen teams in five categories ranging from sprites to juveniles, are playing in this year's local minor association. That takes in some 300 young hopefuls from town, Lochiel, Glen Robertson and Green Valley. Maxville has its minor hockey, too, and the picture of some 500 Glengarry youngsters playing organized hockey holds promise for

the future of Canada's national game in this area.

Whether or not Glengarry ever produces players of NHL calibre is unimportant. Minor hockey should have our support, rather, because of the benefits it confers on our men of tomorrow.

"Keep a boy on ice and you'll keep him out of hot water" is an apt way of expressing what minor association hockey can do for our youths. That objective, surely, is one all will want to support.

## That Ounce Of Prevention

That old saw, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure", was dramatically proven in this area last fall in the polio picture. A dread disease which had stricken more than fifty and had killed five one year earlier, claimed not one victim in Glengarry during 1960.

It was that ounce of prevention, the adult clinics where Salk vaccine was widely distributed, which undoubtedly wiped the local slate clean of polio.

There are some diseases which can now almost be omitted as causes of death. Preventive measures such as vaccination and immunization are now available to guard against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and tuberculosis. Polio is now apparently under control, too.

The big killers, today, are heart diseases, cancer and strokes. In Montreal last year almost 70 percent of all deaths were due to these. Medical science cannot yet prevent them, although in many cases recovery is possible.

Early diagnosis and continuing research into the causes of these diseases can be expected to reduce their toll. Meanwhile there can be no excuse for death from those diseases for which that vital ounce of prevention is available.

### HALF-WAY THERE

Why do people bother going South, we wondered as we rambled the streets of Toronto last weekend? Nary a bit of snow or ice was there underfoot and we had cached our rubbers in our hotel room for the duration. The topcoat was called for, but it wasn't what you'd call cold — and this was mid-January.

Our winters must be getting warmer. Seems to us January was a bitter month to get through no more than two or three decades ago. We used to look forward to those days of the January thaw. Today you're never sure which of the mild January days constitute the thaw.

Listen to people on the street and ponder. "Grand day, isn't it", one will comment. "Cold enough, but nice and bright", might be the come-back. That isn't the way we remember January years ago. Then it was a month to struggle through and people were more apt to be cursing the weatherman than paying him compliments.

Here we are, practically half way through the winter. The days are getting noticeably longer and we are content to let the sun come to us rather than head for Florida with all those other sun worshippers.

There's still plenty of winter weather ahead, though, and that mention of Florida reminds us we haven't seen too much sand on our sidewalks this winter. That crossing at the Post Office has been particularly icy after a snowfall and someone is due for a nasty fall if our streets' department doesn't come up with some sanding soon.

Perish the thought of a fall now, just when our minds are centred on Spring.

Sometimes a man tries to pull the wool over his wife's eyes with the wrong yarn.

### PITFALLS IN PACKAGING

Seems to us we can recall the day when there was a weights and measures act, or something like that, in force. Inspectors used to go round testing scales and such to make sure the customer was getting every ounce he was entitled to in every pound of what he purchased.

If those inspectors are still on the job maybe they should take the scales from their eyes and take a real sharp look at the packaging industry. A lot of foodstuffs on the store shelves, today, are wrapped up in false pretences, it seems to this Rambling Reporter.

Like that half-pound package of bacon that looks so meaty in its cardboard and cellophane wrappings. Open it up and you find that lean look might have been painted on a half pound of lard. The meat consists of a thin line along the top of each slice, but so cunningly has that bacon been packaged the customer can't tell she's being taken until she gets it home and starts cooking. A pan full of grease is what she gets for her money.

Mind you, not every brand of bacon is that bad. But some are; and so cunningly is that packaging contrived the customer cannot be certain she's getting a quality product. That cellophane that does such a fine job of dressing up eatables can also serve a less worthy purpose. It prevents the bacon buyer from getting a good look at what she is buying.

Seems to us that package for bacon was specially contrived to fool the public and it should be as susceptible to the law as was that red gauze on a basket of peaches.

And while we're on the subject, could we wonder out loud why the cereal and soap people are permitted to put out a "giant size" that's only two-thirds full? Or why the makers of candy bars are allowed to put that long card under a chocolate bar so that the wrapping leads our kiddies to believe they're buying seven inches of candy bar instead of the four or five actually in the big wrapper?

Seems to us packaging has become a billion dollar industry at the expense of the business ethics we once knew. The packaging people seem adept at designing packaging calculated to fool we the people.

Apparently the government inspectors are being fooled, too. Or are they asleep?

Mrs. M. Hall read an article entitled "A Happy New Year", and quoted several Bible verses for our guidance during this new year; followed by prayer.

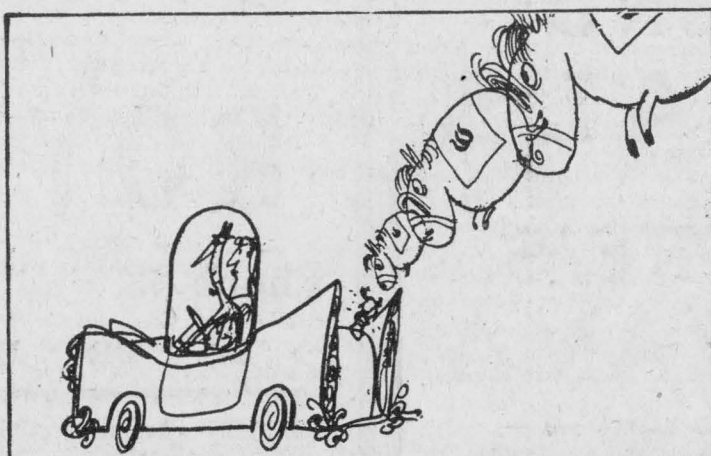

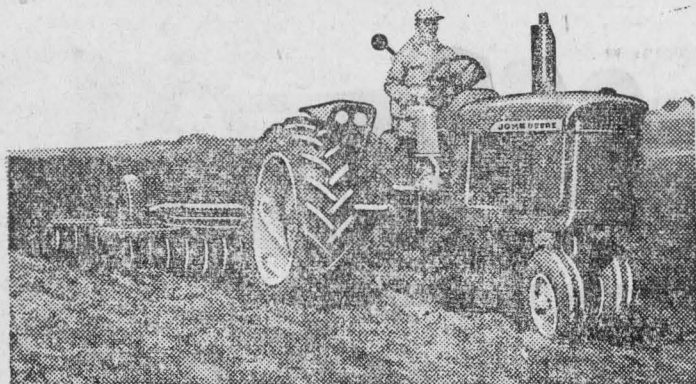

## St. Regis Indians To License Hunters

The Mohawk Band council at St. Regis has served notice non-Indian sportsmen will have to take out Band licenses after March 31 if they intend to hunt or fish on Reserve islands or in surrounding waters.

Explaining the action, Ralph Whitebean, Band secretary, said the council hopes to set up a preserve in order to build up dwindling stocks of game and fish. The council is also striving to end abuses which have existed now for some time. These include trespassing, damage to property owned by Mohawk residents, and raiding of Indian fishing equipment.

Fees have not been established yet, but they will go towards arranging patrols and maintaining the preserve area.

Those with leases for cottages on Band islands will have to examine the fine print on their contracts. Some may have hunting and fishing rights, but it is expected others will require the new licenses.

"Many of the details of our program have still to be worked out. But they are designed to improve fishing and hunting grounds and protect Reserve residents", Mr. Whitebean said.

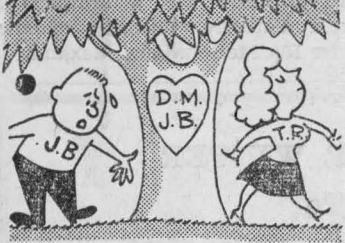

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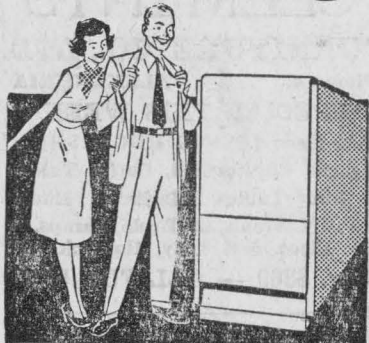
