Raise \$100,000 to build plant

A building fund of \$100,000 is being raised among businessmen of the town to finance erection of an industrial plant on the town's industrial park.

Martin Clement, chairman of council's industrial committee, is spearheading the drive for funds and he reports ready co-operation from the business community. Already more than \$75,000 has been pledged and Mr. Clement reports the banks and other potential subscribers have yet to be approached.

In the plans is a one-storey plant measuring from 12,000 to 15,000 square feet. It would be built on the industrial park and town council has given tentative approval to the use of some 3½ acres of land for the purpose. This would be sold at \$2,000 an acre and the syndicate would be expected to bring sewer and water services to the plant from the south east corner of the industrial park. Council will bring

the services to that point and also has plans for an 88-foot wide road allowance along the west side of the industrial park from the extension of Kincardine Street north to the CNR line.

Alexandria has not attracted a new industry since Consolidated Textile came here 10 years ago, Mr. Clement noted. Some extra attraction may be required and it is recalled the Brown Shoe Co. came to Alexandria because of the availability of a vacant plant.

It had been erected by Alexandria Industrial Building Ltd., financed by local business people, and the same charter will be used this time. Money invested will be interest free and interest will be paid only when sale of the plant is effected to a new industry.

Fluid milk shippers held annual meeting in Alexandria

If the current decline in dairy farming continues, the country will be faced with a serious milk shortage. This was the opinion of fluid milk shippers who met at Glengarry District High School on Monday of last week.

The fluid milk producers in this area who ship to Montreal belong mostly to Le Syndicat de lait de la région de St. Jean-Valleyfield, which includes about 20 members of Eastern Ontario in Zone Eight under chairman Gerard Massie. The syndicate headquarters are situated in St. Remi, about 30 miles south east of Valleyfield. This federation of milk producers was formed a few years ago and the province

of Quebec and part of Ontario are divided into different regions known as syndicates.

Rejean Labonte an official of the Montreal area spoke on milk quotas, testing, transportation, quality and the National Dairy Policy. Producers are now receiving \$9.03 for 3.4 test on Class I milk, it was reported.

Members were concerned about milk pick-ups and deliveries at the end of the month which were made late and thus included in the following month's quota, affecting the price. They felt too, that the trailer type trucks were too large for farm lanes and expressed a preference for bulk-tank trucks for pick-ups.

Mr. Labonte also reported a new type of butter fat sampling was being prepared. A sample bottle would be installed on the pump and a few drops would enter the bottle while pumping the milk into the transport tank, resulting in a more reliable test.

Dr. John Tallon of Cornwall, was officially invested as a member of the Order of Canada by Governor-General Jules Léger last Wednesday at Government House in Ottawa.

The Cornwall native left a Kingston hospital Sunday so he could be there for the occasion. "I think it's a wonderful event and I'm very proud to have been named," he said later in the company of his wife, Kathleen, and son, R. P. (Pat) Tallon of Brockville.

Born in 1891, Dr. Tallon has practised in Cornwall for more than 50 years. He was appointed to the Order of Canada last Dec. 17 but looked forward to the official investiture.

The order is an honors system designed to recognize outstanding achievement and service to the nation or humanity at large.

Perhaps the biggest thrill Dr. Tallon received, was when a photographer took his picture while he was being congratulated by Prime Minister Trudeau, who attended the state function.

Plan opening for ruins at St Raphael's

Official opening of the historic site, the ruins of old St. Raphael's Church, will take place at 11 a.m. June 22nd, it has been announced by Larry Ryan of the Heritage Foundation. The date has been approved by Charlottenburgh Township Council in whose name the site is now registered, and by St. Raphael's parish.

An ecumenical service will be held in the ruins at 11 a.m. and the parish will hold a dinner and all-day social. Arrangements for the event are now going forward.

Low bidder on Laggan school

J. R. Couture Ltd. of Cornwall, submitted the lowest tender bid for construction of a five-room addition to Laggan Public School when tenders on the work were opened last Thursday. The bid was \$177,880.

The board estimate was \$184,518.

Five other tenders for the work were received: J. Lafontaine Construction, \$192,582; Noel Couture, \$197,000; Long Sault Ltd., \$203,726; Sinclair Supply Co. Ltd., \$206,000; and Entwistle Construction \$211,950.

The bids will now be presented to the elementary panel of the S. D. and G. county board of education for action.

Extensive program of activities at local day care centre

The Town of Alexandria has been granted the official government licence to operate a day care centre here and the centre which has been operating since early last summer will now be eligible for government grants to pay 80 per cent of its operating expenses and salaries.

Housed in the curling club rooms, the centre, which averages attendance of about 20 children a day, has been existing solely on contributions from the parents of the children.

A joint meeting of the town Finance Committee and the Day Care Centre Committee was held in February when the schedule of rates decided on was: Regular attendance of five days a week, \$15 a week and \$25 a week for two children from the same family; Regular attendance of half days, \$10 a week and \$15 for two children.

For irregular attendance of one day, the rate is \$5 per week and \$7 for two children; half days are \$3 per week and \$5 for two children.

Priorities for acceptance are: 1st—Residents of the Town of Alexandria and 2nd — Regular attendants.

The committee for the Garderie Alexandria Day Care Centre is composed of the Finance and Administration Committee of Council and Rene Gauthier, Nicole Nadeau, Raymond Rochon and Mrs. Theodore Desjardins.

Under the supervision of Miss Colette Rochon, the centre is open from 6.30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Other members of the staff include, Miss Rita Seguin and Mrs. Denise Menard, teachers and Mrs. Annabelle Hay, cook.

The program of activities include: Arts and Crafts; music, singing, dancing and movements; Stories, reading and pantomimes; Conversation; circles; Nature Studies; observations and experiences with plants, flowers, insects, fish, dogs, cats, jungle animals, etc.; Science: observing water freezing, snow melting, rain, vapor, popcorn popping, making jello, play dough, cook-

Membership has increased recently by 10 families, it was reported at the directors' meeting held March 24th at the home of Harry Steenbakker. The Club now boasts 80 to 90 horses and

riders. Membership dues were set at \$10 for family rate, \$5 for individuals, \$2 for non-members per ride. All registered 4-H Horse Club and Pony Club members are admitted free, and by invitation only.

An appropriate club crest is being sought and ideas and drawings of the crest should be sent to Chairman John Peters before May 1st. It was also decided the club should have a charter. Paul Rumke will look into the legal aspects of a charter as well as a waiver for individuals releasing the club and landowners of liability suits.

A negative Coggins test (for swamp fever) will be required on all participating horses. For safety reasons all members will be urged to wear a hard hat on cross country rides.

A crowd of 480 looked on Tuesday night as the Glens bounced back and whipped the visiting Brockville Tikis 8-2.

The Glens built up a 3-1 lead in the first period and were never seriously threatened from then on, enroute to the victory. The best of five series is now tied at 1-1.

Roch Lajoie, Rod Shepherd and "Flying" Brian Reasbeck all scored twice for the local club while Tom Ross and Robert Boisvenue added singles.

Brockville's goal scorers were Dan Collison and Ron Lavoie for one apiece.

Referee Aime Leblanc handed out 40 minutes in penalties with Alexandria accounting for 21 of these.

Robert Lajoie was back in goal for Alexandria for the first time in nearly three weeks after a bout with bronchitis. Lajoie

blocked 31 shots in the win that saw the Glens outshoot the Tikis 52-33.

On Sunday night, the Glens travelled to Brockville for their opening game of the O.D.H.A. playdowns against the Jr. B Tikis. The hometown Tikis were down 4-2 at the end of the 2nd period but came on strong in the final twenty to down the Glens 6-4. Peter Edwards scored twice

for Brockville while Tom Leeder, Brian Salmon, Nick Owen and Mike Green added singles.

Glens got two goals from Bob Hanson while Roch Lajoie and Rod Shepherd added singles.

The second game of the best of five series was in Alexandria on Tuesday, April 9.

The third game will be played back in Brockville on Friday night. The fourth game is scheduled for Alexandria on Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p.m.

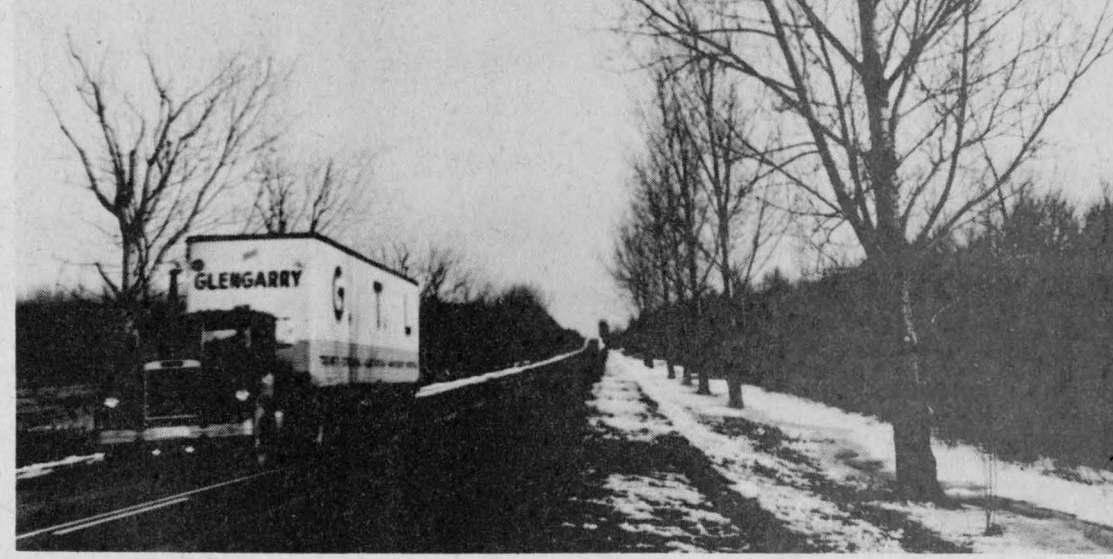

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Government plans rigid control terrain vehicles

Latest word from Queen's Park indicates the government plans to review present regulations, concerning such vehicles as snowmobiles, dune buggies and trail bikes.

If the Ontario legislature has its way there could be drastic changes in force in 1975. Controls were recommended by the legislature's select commit-

tee on motorized snow vehicles and all-terrain vehicles, and the future could see the government prosecuting trespassers, banning machines from most roads, and drivers being licensed.

The committee urged immediate strengthening of snowmobile controls expressing the viewpoint that the machines should be kept off roads. The high accident and

death rate was viewed with alarm and it was also noted that a conflict exists between those who use the machines and those who do not.

The committee made the following recommendations:

1. Only all-terrain vehicles specifically licensed for road use by the Ontario ministry of transportation and communications should be permitted on roads. 2. All-terrain vehicles not permitted on roads should have to carry new license plates costing \$8 on top of their current motor vehicle licence fee for their plates.

3. Anyone who operates an all-terrain vehicle on land used by the public should need a driver's licence or pass a special competency test. The test would be open to anyone aged 14 years or over.

4. No one should be permitted to drive an all-terrain vehicle on private property "without prior written consent of the owner, lessee or occupant"—and where there are complaints by landowners, the Crown should be responsible for investigating and prosecuting.

5. On public lands, all-terrain vehicles be barred from designated wilderness, wildlife and other natural areas, areas where they could damage soil or plants, and from trails, campsites, and picnic grounds where they would be "incompatible" with other recreational activities.

6. All-terrain vehicles drivers should not be permitted to chase or harass animals or birds with their vehicles, or carry a loaded firearm in their vehicle — to bar hunting from the vehicles in motion.

7. All-terrain vehicle drivers be specifically barred from littering and be "encouraged" to wear safety helmets. The committee suggested safety helmets be compulsory for snowmobile drivers and passengers.

Such controls would not apply to tractors and other farm machinery.

Dr Pollock was veteran doctor in Avonmore area

Dr. J.M. Pollock, widely known and highly respected as the family doctor to hundreds of families in rural Stormont County for nearly 60 years, passed away Sunday morning at the Macdonell Memorial Hospital, Cornwall, where he had been a patient for more than two years.

He was in his 87th year. In January, 1972, he suffered a serious fall as he went about his duties as family doctor in the village of Avonmore, a fall from which he never recovered.

Born at Berwick in the Township of Finch, 86 years ago last Nov. 27th, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James A. Pollock, his mother's name being Janet MacEwen. Educated locally, he taught school for a number of years before beginning his studies at McGill University in Montreal.

In 1914 Dr. "John" graduated

from McGill's celebrated medical School. Upon graduation he set up his first practice in Osnaburk Centre and there he labored for five years. It was there he met the young lady, Miss Fern Margaret Rupert, who was to be his wife and helpmate for many years. They were married on May 20, 1919.

Later that year Dr. and Mrs. Pollock moved to Moose Creek in the Township of Roxborough and there the doctor established his second practice.

In 1928 the doctor opened the doors for his practice in Avonmore. In November 1953 the citizens of the Avonmore community singularly honored the good doctor and his wife on the occasion of their 25th year in Avonmore and the surrounding countryside. In 1964 another important milestone was reached as the doctor attended a reunion of the Class of 1914 at the end of a half-century of dedicated service.

In his active role of service to his fellow man as doctor, counsellor and friend, Dr. Pollock, in spite of his advanced years, never turned aside from doing what he could for the sick and distressed at any hour of the day or the night. He knew the community that he served as probably no one else could possibly know it. In a lifetime of service he knew families through three and four generations.

His death came less than one week after the passing of Dr. J.G. MacLeod, who was doctor in the neighboring community of Finch for a half-century.

Dr. Pollock was a member of St. James United Church in Avonmore, and a member of the Session.

Mrs. Pollock passed away on

May 5, 1964. A son, James Arthur, died in Feb. 1923.

His passing is mourned by one son, Rupert, of Avonmore; two grandchildren, John, Winchester, on the staff of Nationview Public School; and Jane (Mrs. G.A. Pollard), Orillia, Ont.; and four sisters, Mrs. George Caruthers, Kelowna, B.C., Mrs. Hugh MacMillan, Chesterville, Mrs. Silas Farrell, Brantford, and Mrs. Blake Nephew, Finch.

The body rested at the Brownlee Funeral Home, Finch, where the funeral service was held Wednesday afternoon, April 10th, at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. H.A. Funge, minister of St. James United Church, Avonmore.

Interment was made in the family plot in Hillcrest Cemetery, Lunenburg.

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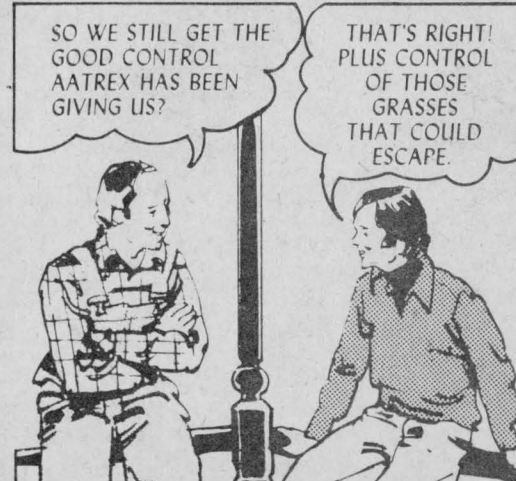

Dairy products price supports found disappointing by OMMB

Members of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board expressed extreme disappointment concerning the dairy product price support and industrial milk subsidy increases, announced by Agriculture Minister Eugene Whelan on March 29.

As spokesman for the Board, its Chairman, George R. McLaughlin said that the price support and subsidy increases were quite inadequate to encourage producers of industrial milk to stay in business. In addition, the Board feels that the new level of returns will not be high enough to bring forth the milk supplies which will be needed to meet the nation's demand for milk and

milk products, or to take advantage of export market opportunities that exist.

"If the price is not right to producers of milk", he said, "consumers may be faced with shortages of certain dairy products."

Dairy Farmers of Canada, the national milk producer organization, maintained that industrial milk producers needed an overall increase in their returns of \$2.00 per hundredweight, based on cost-price relationships at the turn of the year.

"What has been provided", Mr. McLaughlin said, "is an increase of a little more than half this amount. This, after producers experienced an additional three months of cost increases."

The Board was also disturbed and disappointed that Federal authorities failed to take action to increase the price support on cheddar cheese.

"There is nothing now in national dairy policy", Mr. McLaughlin said, "to prevent cheese prices from plummeting, and for milk prices and producer returns to go tumbling down with them, if cheddar supplies get into even a very small surplus position. Failure to raise the cheese price support is inconsistent with the Government's avowed aim to provide increasing confidence in the dairy industry at this time."

On the brighter side, certain other features of the new dairy policy were welcomed by the Board. One, in particular, was that the Federal authorities saw

But when the department gouges people for more than a 100% mark-up on two year-old stamps, that is a rip-off of the worst sort.

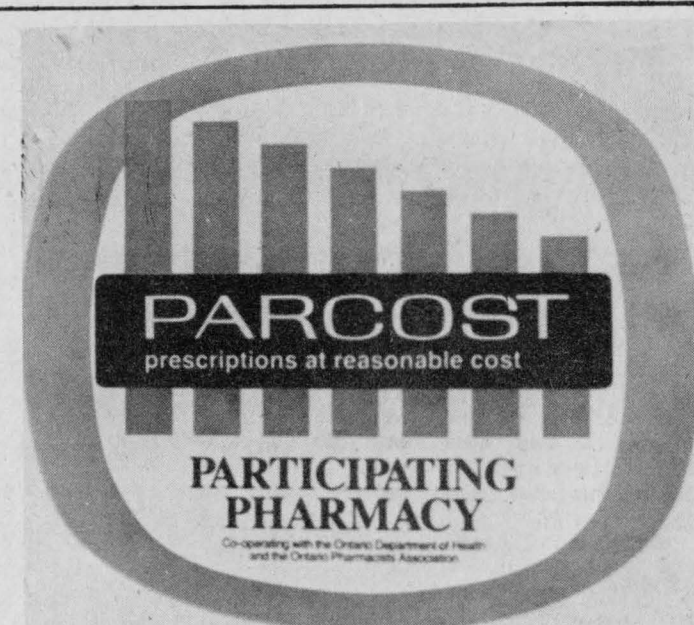
