Dr. J.M. Pollock, widely known from McGill's celebrated med-

In 1928 the doctor opened the doors for his practice in Avonmore. In November 1953 the citizens of the Avonmore community singularly honored the good doctor and his wife on the occasion of their 25th year in Avonmore and the surrounding countryside. In 1964 another important milestone was reached as the doctor attended a reunion of the Class of 1914 at the end of a half-century of dedicated service.

In his active role of service to his fellow man as doctor, counsellor and friend, Dr. Pollock, in spite of his advanced years, never turned aside from doing what he could for the sick and distressed at any hour of the day or the night. He knew the community that he served as probably no one else could possibly know it. In a lifetime of service he knew families through three and four gen-

erations. His death came less than one week after the passing of Dr. J.G. MacLeod, who was doctor in the neighboring community of Finch for a half-



The Journal, official publication of the Addiction Research Foundation, notes: In Metropolitan Toronto in 1970, be-

fore the age was reduced from 21 to 18, 48 charges of impaired driving were laid against drivers aged 10 to 20. In only the second half of 1971, after the change, this had soared to 259, and in 1972 it had almost doubled to 457.

The same picture focuses for personal injury accidents in which the driver was

Lowering the drinking age in Ontario 18 to 20. There were 179 in 1970, 272 in the last half of 1971, and 425 in 1972.

While there isn't much hard data, there is lots of empirical observation about the changes brought about by the lowered age. These are consistent coast to coast, border to Aretic.

Drinking-driving offences among the young are increasing. Other alcohol offences like minor consuming and illegal possession are decreasing.

The public has accepted the new laws. Since in most cases the lowered drinking age coincided with a lowered voting age, it would be "political suicide" for politicians to back any movement for a return

People are getting into trouble with alcohol, and seeking help for it, at a young-

The data available is disturbing. Perhaps the government never realized what a Pandora's Box it opened when it passed legislation to lower the drinking

It is becoming increasingly clear no effort was made to project the social consequences of the legislation. As a result, no

one knows what to do about it.

Dairy products price supports found disappointing by OMMB

Members of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board expressed extreme disappointment concerning the dairy product price support and industrial milk subsidy increases, announced by Agric-ulture Minister Eugene Whelan on March 29.

As spokesman for the Board, its Chairman, George R. Mc-Laughlin said that the price support and subsidy increases were quite inadequate to encourage producers of industrial milk to stay in business. In addition, the Board feels that the new level of returns will not be high enough to bring forth the milk supplies which will be needed to meet the nations demand for milk and

"If the price is not right to producers of milk". he said, "consumers may be faced with shortages of certain dairy

Dairy Farmers of Canada, the national milk producer organization, maintained that industrial milk producers needed an overall increase in their returns of \$2.00 per hundredweight, based on cost-price relationships at the turn of the year.

"What has been provided", Mr. McLaughlin said, "is an increase of a little more than half this amount. This, after producers experienced an additional three months of cost increases."

The Board was also disturbed and disappointed that Federal authorities failed to take action to increase the price support on cheddar cheese.

"There is nothing now in national dairy policy", Mr. Mc-Laughlin said, "to prevent cheese prices from plummeting, and for milk prices and producer returns to go tumbling down with them, if cheddar supplies get into even a very small surplus position. Failure to raise the cheese price support is inconsistent with the Government's avowed aim to provide increasing confidence in the dairy industry at this time." On the brighter side, certain other features of the new dairy policy were welcomed by the Board. One, in particular, was that the Federal authorities saw

which has been in effect for several years, on the shelf. "This move", Mr. McLaughlin stated, "greatly simplifies the national milk supply management program, and makes it a much more workable, equitable and responsive one.

"In addition", he said, "this step also recognizes the growing importance of fluid milk producers in the production of milk for use in manufactured dairy products, especially when it is combined with an expected reduction in the exclusion factor for such producers. We expect an announcement of this step to be made by the Canadian Dairy Commission in the very near future."

Two other new developments welcomed by the Board were: (1) the Government's commitment to enter into discussions immediately with producer repremen's returns to the industry's basic costs.

"The Government's willingness to work out a long range dairy policy with producer organiza-Mr. McLaughlin concluded, "along with its decision to incorporate that portion of the subsidy which had been designated previously as temporary into the regular subsidy rate, and to raise the rate, should in some way restore producer confidence in their industry."




