

Elderly Farmer Fatally Injured Monday When Dragged Half Mile Under Hay Rake

Allen Cardinal, 71, a lifelong resident of the Alexandria area, died Monday en route to hospital in Cornwall from injuries received when his horse bolted and dragged him for almost half a mile under this hay rake.

Mr. Cardinal resided in the 1st Lochiel, a half-mile east of Alexandria, with a brother and two sisters.

According to the report of Lancaster OPP he had been using a horse-drawn dump rake in one of his fields Monday afternoon and was leaving the field when the rake caught in the gate post. The horse bolted and Mr. Cardinal was thrown beneath the rake and dragged down the road some 2,000 feet.

He was taken home and then re-

moved to Glengarry Memorial Hospital. When doctors discovered the hospital did not have a supply of his blood type Mr. Cardinal was transferred to Hotel Dieu in Cornwall but was dead on arrival.

The late Allen Cardinal was born on the family farm which had been in the family for three generations. He was a son of Allen and Naida Cardinal and with his brother had earned a reputation for fine syrup making through the years.

To mourn he leaves one brother, Joseph and two sisters: Marie Anne and Emilia Cardinal, all on the home farm.

The body rested at Alexandria Funeral Home from where the funeral was held at 10.30 this morning to Sacred Heart Church and cemetery.

George Shepherd Died Suddenly In Toronto

Owner of the White Rock Motel and a lifelong resident of Alexandria, George Shepherd died of a heart attack early last week in Toronto where he had been recuperating from a previous attack. He was 47.

Mr. Shepherd was staying at the apartment of a sister, now holidaying in Europe, and his body was not discovered until Friday evening. He had recently spent three weeks in hospital following a heart attack. Word of his death came as a shock to family and friends here.

George William Shepherd was born in Alexandria, a son of the late George W. Shepherd and his wife, Rosabelle Smith. For many years he was associated with his brother Louis in the trucking business and later in the automobile sales agency. Last year he completed erection of the White Rock Motel on Main Street North.

An ardent hunter and fishing enthusiast Mr. Shepherd was a supporter of all types of sport and other community activities. He was a member of the official board of Alexandria United Church, a member of the local LOL and active in Conservative party circles.

Surviving are his wife, the former Maebelle MacKinnon of Dunvegan, two sons and two daughters: George Jr., at Banff for the summer months; Rhea, with the Forestry Department in Northern Ontario; Dora Dawn and Ainslie, at home.

One brother and two sisters also survive: Louis of Alexandria, Misses Dora and Pearl Shepherd of Toronto, now on a tour of Europe.

A private funeral service was held at 2 o'clock Wednesday, conducted by Rev. L. S. Woolfrey. Interment was in the United Church cemetery here.

Cornwall Assessor Killed, Two Injured In Crash Near Charlottenburgh Park

A Cornwall man was fatally injured and an elderly Kansas City couple seriously hurt in a Saturday afternoon crash between a car and house-trailer on Highway 2 near Charlottenburgh Park.

Dead is Adolphe Tessier, 51, a Cornwall assessor and father of two. In satisfactory condition at Cornwall General Hospital are Milo Ewald, 66, and his 61-year-old wife, Ruth, of Kansas City, Kansas.

Ontario Provincial Police at Lancaster said Mr. Tessier was alone in his westbound car when it swerved and collided head-on with the Ewald car and house-trailer unit. The accident occurred shortly after 4 p.m.

The vehicle locked in the centre of the highway on impact, just west of the entrance to Charlottenburgh Park.

The cause of the accident is under investigation by Cpl. A. K. McBain of the Lancaster OPP detachment.

Mr. Ewald was treated for internal injuries and his wife for a dislocated hip.

Three Hurt, Cars Wrecked In Crash

All were admitted to Glengarry Memorial Hospital, but released after treatment by Dr. Yvon Bourdeau.

Police reported both cars were total losses. Const. Hubert Major investigated.

The 19th annual Glengarry Highland Games was another smashing success Saturday at Maxville, drawing the usual capacity crowd and 29 of North America's finest pipe bands.

The massed bands never played better in the opinion of the thousands who stayed on for the grand finale shortly after 7 o'clock of a fine summer day.

For the City of Toronto band it was the wind-up of a most successful day as that band marched off with the Gardner trophy, representing the championship of North America, as well as top place in the Slow March competition, open to all bands. Champion band in the 1964 Games, the Toronto unit had been displaced last year by the Worcester Kilts but they put on a peak performance Saturday to regain top spot.

Taking honors in the Class B competition was the St. Andrew's Junior Pipe Band of Detroit. Canadian General Electric Pipe Band of Peterborough, had the best drum corps and the drum-major contest was won by John Williams of Glasgow, Scotland, who headed the visiting Knightswood Community Association Juvenile Pipe Band.

That band and its entertainers had staged the pre-Games show on Friday night and it was reported the best yet, both in quality of entertainment and in attendance. Some 1200 were in the stands Friday with a full moon adding brilliance to the performance of the band, the Scottish country dancers and soloists.

An innovation this year was the post-Games dance and entertainment in the show hall Saturday night. It proved so popular many had to enjoy the music of Johnny Forrest and the Glengarry violinists from outdoors.

Much of Saturday's crowd came early and by 11 a.m. most of the bands and many thousands of people were on the grounds. They came from many countries and

states of the Union as well as from all the Canadian provinces. In the afternoon mob milling behind the grandstand might be seen a turbaned Sikh from India, a former NHL hockey star named Carl Brewer, a lot of familiar Glengarry faces.

They came early and a lot of people left in early afternoon to be replaced by thousands more pouring in to witness the massed bands in their evening finale.

Tommy Douglas, national leader of the New Democratic Party, was right on schedule to open the Games shortly after 1 p.m. A native of Glasgow he was happy to welcome the first pipe band Scotland has sent to the Glengarry Games and he was well versed on the history of this county and its heritage in his brief opening talk.

In the official party were Mrs. Douglas, Games President Leslie Clark and Mrs. Clark, Games chairman Angus H. MacDonell and Mrs. MacDonell, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Aitken of Martintown.

As some 26 pipe bands mustered on the infield for the opening appearance of the massed bands the St. Andrews Junior band of Detroit came forward to play a lament for its late Pipe-Major, Walter Reese, who had made many appearances at Maxville. "The Flowers of the Forest" was a solemn tribute to his memory.

Then "General" Grant of CFRA took over the mike as MC for an afternoon of band competitions, track and field, highland dancing finals — a full day of colorful activity unrivaled anywhere.

As one visitor from Scotland put it: "This is undoubtedly the biggest one-day Games put on anywhere in the world." As one bandsman expressed it: "Until your band has competed at Maxville you have no rating."

That about sums up the success of the 19th annual Glengarry Highland Games.

EDITORIAL

IT'S OUR OPINION

If Not, Why Not?

Alexandria's Police Commission apparently is finding it difficult to come up with a new police chief, if one is to judge by the time it is taking to fill the vacancy here.

The good ones are hard to find in view of the demanding nature of small-town policing and an editorial in The Ottawa Journal is apropos of the situation here:

"A man who spent 10 years as a London bobby and another 11 as an RCAF military policeman has resigned in disgust after four months as police chief of the Ontario village of Frankford. Chief William Hockley complained of the difficulty of dealing with 'young hoodlums' who could be the sons of his neighbors. He also said he was told to go easy on traffic tickets because they were bad for business."

"The problems of the small-town policeman are nothing new. The generally low pay, long hours and frequently odd-jobs nature of the work have meant a high turnover in such policemen."

"But better salaries and working conditions, needed as they are in many villages, would not remove the pressure a policeman in a small community faces working among people he knows well or comes to know well. Not even the super-human western sheriffs such as the one portrayed by Mr. Gary Cooper in the film 'High Noon' would find policing a modern small town a cinch."

"Ontario should be grateful that there

are so many small-community policemen who perform their trying duties with honor, tact and ability. They are the answer to the over-simplified argument that the provincial police had best take over law enforcement in every small community."

"Turning village protection entirely over to provincial policemen with responsibility for a wide area is not the best solution. The good village policeman with a thorough knowledge of his own community offers a form of protection that provincial policemen can not give. And the local man's knowledge can be of great help to outside police agencies called in on major cases."

"Life would be easier for small-town 'lawmen' — and big-town ones too, for that matter — if more citizens would remember that the best policeman is one who knows that his neighbors will support him in his duty."

We agree with The Journal editor that turning over the policing duties of a town to the provincial police is not the answer. It has been tried here before and found unsatisfactory.

Not too many men combine policing experience with that blend of firmness and good nature which Ed Dupuis displayed in more than a decade when Alexandria knew few if any problems in its policing. We are left wondering if the Commission has sought to re-engage him. And if not, why not?

No Editorials Next Week

The weekend ahead has a special allure for this pen pusher. There will be no scrambling for ideas on which to base an editorial, no need to get down to filling this column, a task which seems to become more taxing as each summer weekend succeeds the last.

Next week is holiday time at the News, there will be no paper to print and so no editorial writing will be called for until an entire seven days and nights have sprinted by.

No one has ever explained to us why it should demand so much more of one to write editorials during these months of summer than on a winter weekend. That is the case and we have a suspicion the heat has something to do with it, drying one's well of ideas and lowering the level of one's initiative. Perhaps also inhibiting the writer is the thought that it's summer and people aren't going to bother reading anything he puts so laboriously into print anyway. So why bother belaboring one's limited brain matter and pushing a reluctant pen across paper?

A Depressing Forecast

A study of highway planning for Eastern Ontario reached our desk last week. A perusal of its one hundred pages of text and charts provide a clear picture of what our highway network will resemble in 1985 and the departmental reasoning that prompts that planning.

A report on planning for 1985 traffic needs was issued some months ago and it included a projected freeway south of the Ottawa River running from Ottawa to a link-up with Highway 17 at the Quebec border. The freeway would run east from Casselman, passing north of McCrimmon and south of Vankleek Hill. A new collector highway would run north from Cornwall to link up with the freeway at Casselman.

Little, if any, highway improvement is envisaged for Glengarry between now and 1985. Collector highways 34 and 43 are considered adequate to meet the expected modest increase in traffic and Highway 2 is seen as a scenic route which can be made to serve with reduced speed limits. The stretch of No. 2 east from Lancaster to the Quebec border would be returned to the counties' road system.

Adequate our highways may appear in the eyes of highways' engineers and yet this study includes a report on accident experience during 1962, '63 and '64 which suggests nothing of the sort. One of the most accident-prone stretches of highway in Eastern Ontario through those years was the nine miles of Highway 34 connecting Alexandria and the Brown House. The average rate of accidents for all Eastern Ontario highways was 2.6 per million vehicle miles. The stretch south of Alexandria

rated between 5.1 and 9.0 reportable accidents, at least twice the area average. Between Alexandria and Vankleek Hill the rate was also above-average, between 3.1 and 4.0.

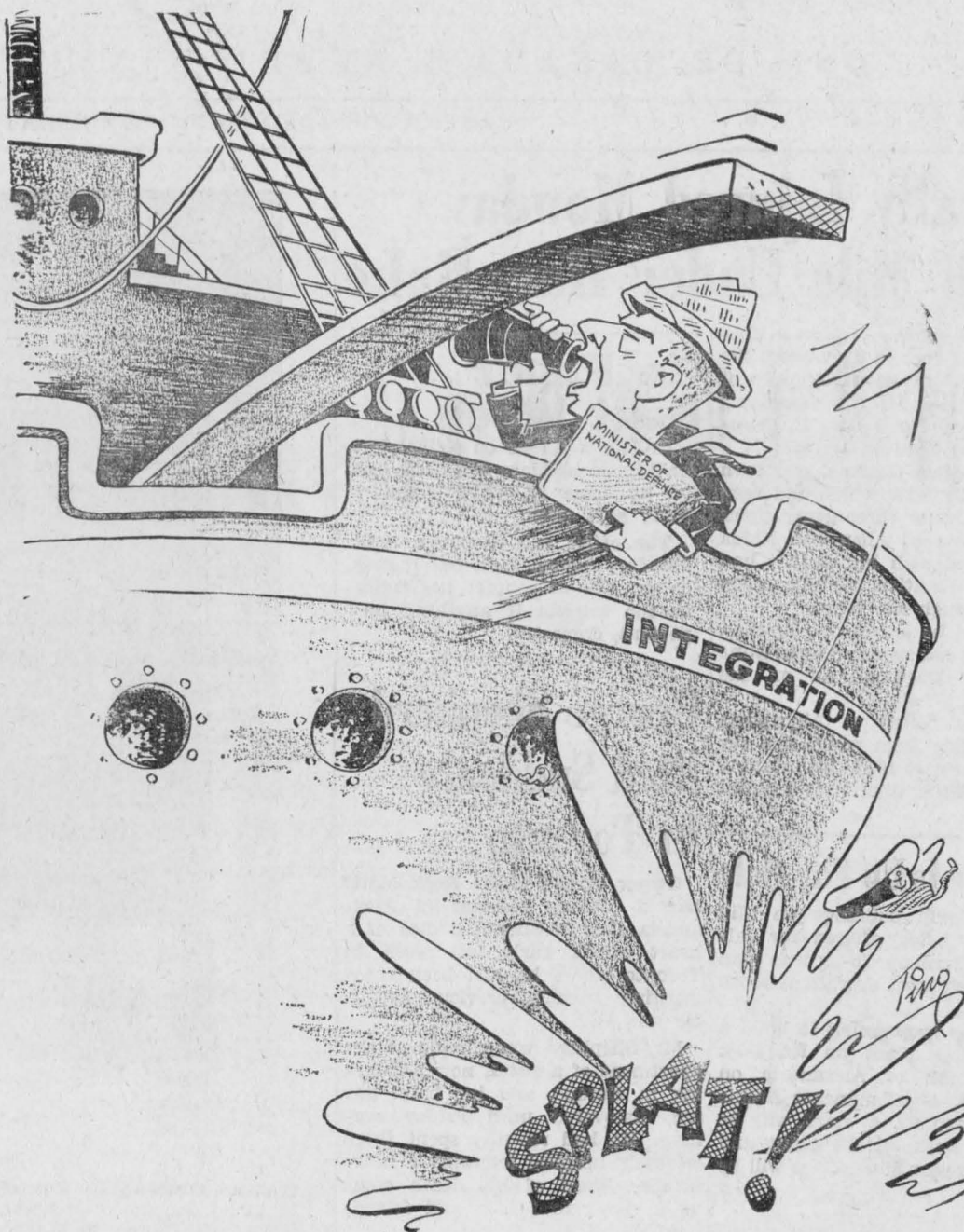
Since that study was made the warning light at the Brown House has been the only improvement and it seems none can be expected in the next decade at least. There is no mention in the study, for example, of a diversion of the junction of 34 and 43 beyond our town limits. This is something we should not have to wait ten years for.

The study contains a comparison of 1963 land use, population and employment with what is expected for Eastern Ontario in 1985. Rather disappointing we found this forecast of future growth which indicates only Ottawa, Cornwall and Seaway Valley will benefit to any extent from industrialization. Alexandria and Hawkesbury are expected to show some expansion but most towns in these Eastern counties are given no hope of progress and the area will remain predominantly agricultural.

Ontario's highway planners, it seems, are entirely unimpressed with the Eastern Ontario Development Association's glowing promise of a "golden triangle" of industrialization in this neck of the province.

Glengarry and most other counties of Eastern Ontario must be content to remain in a semi-depressed economic position compared with other areas of southern Ontario, it would seem. The highways and roads we have are good enough as they are. Some \$77,000,000 will be spent by the department in Eastern Ontario over the next decade. All of it will go to improving the links between the cities.
