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Golf Club Secures Services Of Veteran Pro To Build Greens And Give Lessons

Directors of the Glengarry Golf and Country Club are hopeful they will have a nine-hole course complete with good temporary greens by early July. And one of Canada's best-known golf professionals of an earlier day is to give lessons in the game to budding golfers.

Ben Kerr, of Ottawa, will spend the summer on the local course, advising on lay-out and building of greens; as well as teaching the fine points of the game to those who would improve their golf or start off on the right foot.

Mr. Kerr visited the course on Friday and despite the soggy underfooting and unpleasantly cold weather he returned on Sunday to study the set-up further. He is enthusiastic as to the possibilities the site affords and predicts Alexandria will boast a golf lay-out that will be the envy of many larger centres.

He gave the directors much worthwhile advice on work that is to get underway at once and he promised playable greens would be provided in minimum time, and at a minimum of cost. Mr. Kerr will spend the four months from June

1st to September's end on the local course and his advice will be on tap through May if needed.

A native of Scotland, who has been active in Canadian golf circles since he arrived in this country in 1926, Mr. Kerr is a Life Member of the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association. He has built such well-known courses as Cataracqui, at Kingston; the Ridgewood Club, at Saint John, N.B., and several others. Among those at which he has served as club pro is the McKellar Club of Ottawa, where he was the last golfer to break par, with a 69, before it was turned into a public housing development.

The only Canadian golfer ever to win the U.S. Amateur championship, Sandy Somerville, of London, Ont., once took lessons from Mr. Kerr. Both his sons have followed him into the golfing world as professionals. Alastair was club pro. at Hawkesbury's Abenaki course until last fall. This spring he moves to the Beaconsfield Club at Montreal, where he will be first assistant pro. to Bill Kerr, and teaching and playing pro.

Mr. Kerr is not only a veteran of

the game of golf. He served both in World Wars I and II.

At a meeting Monday night, local golfers were informed of the acquisition of Mr. Kerr's services. The club has also secured some 25 sets of golf clubs for rental or sale, in addition to carts and other equipment. These were bought at a bargain price and will ensure an adequate supply for beginning golfers who have not their own equipment.

Plans were discussed for an all-out membership drive which will make possible a complete nine-hole course by early summer. One hundred additional charter members are to be sought and playing fees were set for the season at \$35 for a charter member; \$10 for his wife and \$5 for a school-age child. Green fees will be \$1.50 for a casual visitor; \$1 for charter members who are not regular players. Charter members will have club house privileges whether or not they play.

Plans were also discussed for the first annual Charter Night dance to be held May 11th at the Bonnie Glen, on the eve of the start of play for this season.

Father Weir is a son of the late Dan Weir of Greenfield, and his wife, the former Margaret McDonald of Lot 9 in the 4th Lancaster. Jack Weir of Cornwall, is an uncle, and Father Weir has many cousins in the county.

On April 25th he will celebrate his jubilee with a Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving in his parish church at 5:30 p.m. His Eminence, Albert Gregory Cardinal Meyer will preside at the Mass.

Extra Train To Montreal Will Stop Here Starting April 30th

A full day in Montreal for shopping or visiting will be available after next weekend when the fast morning train from Ottawa will stop at Alexandria at 8:36, DST, each morning except Sunday. The train makes only one other stop, a very brief one at Coteau, and the new service will provide at least 12 hours in the city between early and late trains.

In making the announcement CNR Agent J. M. Langlois noted that Alexandrians will now have available four trains daily to Montreal and three to Ottawa.

With the switch to Daylight Saving Time there will be several minor changes in train arrivals

Native Of Lochiel Died In Minnesota

Railway Crossing Signal Lights For Moose Creek And Glen Robertson

Flashing light signals will be installed at railway crossings at Moose Creek, Winchester and Glen Robertson as a result of action taken at the closing session of United Counties council Thursday of last week.

IT'S OUR OPINION

Easter, At Last

Easter will be doubly welcome this year because of the lateness of its coming. It has been a long Spring and a rather nasty one through these days of April when too many reminders of winter remained.

It is probably not always the case, but Easter seems to bring with it the definite change in the season. Spring is never really sprung until the Resurrection morn brings

its promise of re-awakening life in the vegetable world and on the business front.

Now the lenten season is over, another winter is behind us. The everyday pace of life will quicken on the farm and in the town. Ahead are the best days of the year.

May you enjoy this Easter holiday and the summer that now seems closer.

Organized Crime Is Well Entrenched

Organized crime has gained quite a foothold in Ontario's larger cities and their environs, evidence already unearthed by the Royal Commission on Crime makes clear. The international gambling syndicates apparently are well entrenched in many centres and they appear to be well protected by venal politicians and officials in high government positions.

Liberal leader John Wintermeyer seems to have been well justified in his demands for a government inquiry. Premier Roberts' protestations that there was no need for an investigation have already been proven unfounded on fact. Gambling, drug peddling, gangland style killings in the American crime syndicate style are not exclusive to Montreal. Toronto and other Ontario cities know them, too; and they must be rooted out if this Robert Government is not to become suspect. Certainly the department of the Attorney-General has looked anything

but good in testimony already introduced before the Commission.

Crime is costing Canada \$200,000,000 a year, according to RCMP Deputy Commissioner George McClelland. We don't know on what he bases his big, round estimate, but if that is the amount of taxes being missed on gambling income and other underworld activities it seems all of us are underwriting the gambling syndicates.

There is a more adverse effect that cannot be valued in dollars and cents, Mr. McClelland noted. That is the price we and our children pay in cynicism, lack of respect for law and order, and lack of belief in right for right's sake.

We in Ontario should not tolerate the crime syndicates that this Commission has shown to be already entrenched among us. We certainly should not tolerate this government if it does not act to weed them out.

All That's Needed Is Money And Time

We were more than a little unlucky in the weather we got on Friday, the 13th. Cloudy and cold it was, with a thin rain falling most of the day when it wasn't giving way to even thinner snow, squalling in on an unpleasantly cold wind out of the East.

It wasn't the weather to be even thinking of the golf season ahead; and yet there we were, last Friday, paying our first visit this year to the new Glengarry course. There we were in mid-afternoon, braving the buffeting of wind - driven snow, tramping almost ankle-deep in Spring run-off across acres that soon the sun will transform into firm fairways of good green grass.

The editor's feet were more than a bit wet; he was colder than he recalled feeling while curling in frigid February. But there was warmth in the words he was hearing from a veteran golfer who had chosen this stormy Friday the 13th to come and look over the lay-out.

That old pro was seeing possibilities in the Glengarry Golf and Country Club. That Old Country Scot has built several Canadian courses and local golfers have been angling for his services this summer. It was comforting, despite the cold, to see his eye quicken as he looked over the lay-out. It was warming to hear him remark on what could be done here, what might be required there. One was left with the impression that he looked forward to the challenge of transforming these acres into a going golf course. His services are to be available this summer; and his hire will be practically negligible. This veteran of the game of golf is less interested in money than in encouraging more people to enjoy the sport,

in seeing that they learn the fine points of the game.

He will not only oversee the building of good fairways and greens; but will give lessons to those who are interested enough to wish to start out on the right foot.

"You've got a good spot", was the way he put it, in his Old Country accent. "But remember, it takes money, and time, to build a good golf course", he warned. "Depending on the money you have to spend, you do as much this year as you can afford, putting first things first. The rest can wait until next year, or the year after next. The day will come, you'll have a real good golf course", he concluded.

Those words were encouraging, and warming on one of our colder Spring days. Local golf enthusiasts have the message. They have the right spot and all that is required now is time and money.

Time would be no object if they had ready cash to finish their fairways, build the greens, embellish their club house. The more money they can raise this Spring through charter memberships, the sooner they will realize their dream of a golf course in which Glengarry can take pride, and from which it can derive pleasure and healthful recreation. When finally winter's grip has been released, local golf addicts plan to double that first one hundred charter members signed up last year.

That was a good beginning. All that is needed now is more money and more time. Time comes naturally; and judging by the interest already shown, the needed charter memberships will be forthcoming.

Boasting the services of an experienced course builder this year our club should be well on its way.

The Law Is A Ass

It was one of Dickens' characters who put that thought into such picturesque phrase long before most of our present laws were legislated. Seems lawmakers in every generation are wont to act assine when it comes to framing and interpreting our statutes.

We were reminded of Mr. Bumble's observation when trying to make sense of that story on the new multi-million dollar harness horse racing plant that is planned south of Ottawa. Our interest was caught by the report that the new race course will operate on the charters of six long dormant riding clubs.

Among them is the Williamstown Driving Park Association which was incorporated in 1908. We are not old enough to recall that era and we have yet to meet up with any oldtimer who remembers attending races on the Williamstown track.

The pacers must at some time have been seen in action there, or there would not have been a charter. What gets us is the convincing that apparently has been done in reviving these long dormant charters so that the new track near Ottawa can operate without having to chance seeking a new charter by an act of Parliament. One rea-

son may be the fact the Member for Renfrew South heads the new raceway organization. As Mr. Baskin explains it, "we were not seeking political favors of that kind".

So the new raceway took the tortuous course of digging out long somnolent charters, of finding shareholders still live enough to furnish their consent to the transfer of racing activity to the new track. Only those Associations chartered prior to March 12th, 1912, were eligible and an "order of revival" had to be issued where they had long been dormant.

When the new Rideau-Carleton Raceway opens in September, the old Williamstown Driving Park Association, and the other five charters which have been revived, will be able to stage a series of 14-day meets one after the other. That adds up to 84 nights of operation for Rideau - Carleton Raceway under these long obsolete charters.

If Dickens was still around he might find a bit assine a law that permits a Williamstown Driving Park Association, dead half a century or so, to stage 14 days of racing on an Ottawa course. With none of the parimutuel profits accruing to Williamstown, we presume.

One wonders why; especially does a Rambling Reporter, who has been slowed down to a ramble because he ruined his feet on those selfsame courts. 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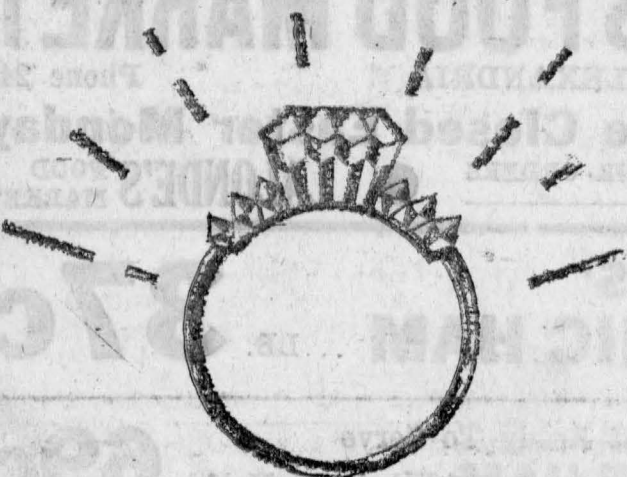
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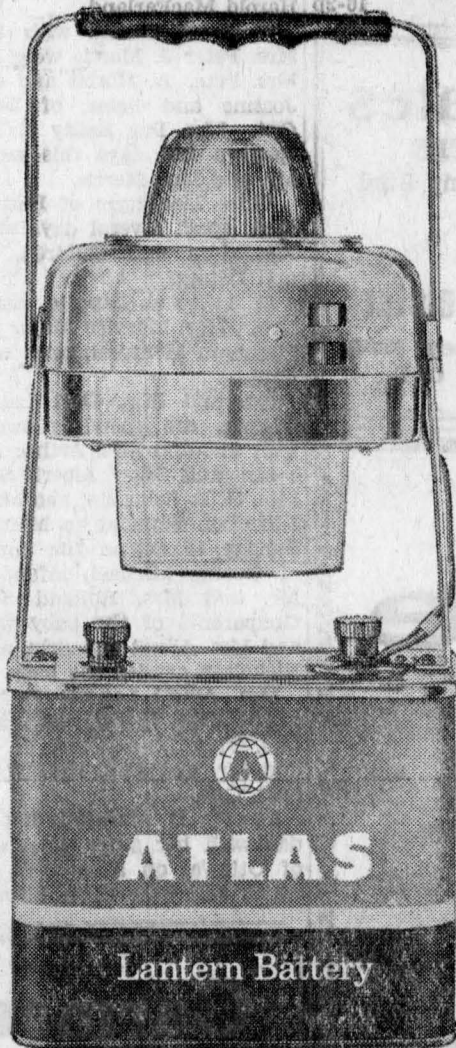
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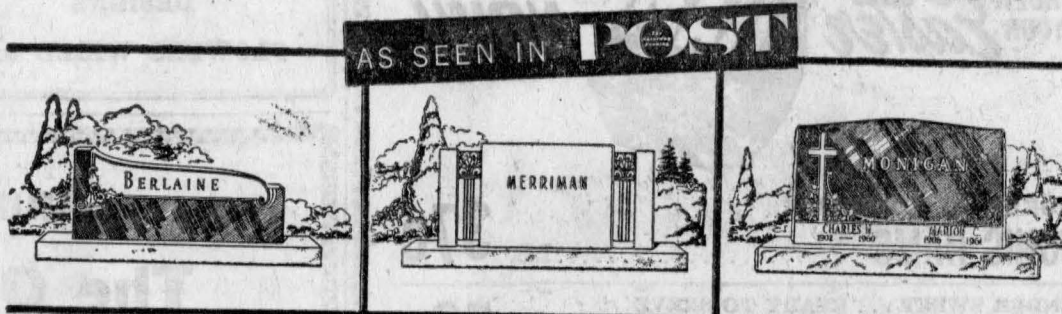
