The old Star Inn at Dunvegan which is to house the Glengarry Museum is this week being moved back on its lot to provide a front lawn. Items more suitable to display outdoors will be exhibited on this lawn.

The museum is slowly but steadily acquiring a wide variety of articles from the homes of Glengarry and one this week is loaned by Cyril and Charles MacDonnell of the Apple Hill area. It consists of sidearm sword and epaulet worn during the War of 1812 by their great grandfather, Major Allan Bhan MacDonnell.

An officer in the Glengarry Fencibles, he came to Glengarry with the U.E. Loyalists from the Mohawk Valley of New York State. He settled on lots 1 and 2 of the 14th Concession, Indian Lands, north of Apple Hill.

The pistol dates back possibly 200 years and is the flintlock, muzzle-loading type. The dress sword has lost its scabbard but still gives evidence that it was once a worthy weapon.

The funeral was held this morning to St. Anthony's Church and cemetery, Apple Hill.

Ontario Weeklies Convention Rated Most Successful

Rated one of the best conventions in its history, the annual gathering of members of the Ontario Weekly Newspapers Association brought 216 delegates to the Chateau Laurier, Ottawa, last weekend. The editor of this newspaper presided in his capacity as president of OWNA and at the closing banquet, Saturday, turned over the gavel of office to Herb Campbell, editor of the Dutton Advance.

Highlights of the convention were the luncheon Friday in the Parliamentary Restaurant of the House of Commons when the delegates were guests of their MP's; and the visit to Rideau Hall when the group was entertained by Governor-General and Madame Vanier.

The convention opened Thursday evening at a Sea Food party when the delegates were guests of the Dominion Brewers' Association. They were hosted at other receptions and dinners by Ottawa Gas Co., Imperial Oil Ltd., Canadian Bankers' Association, E. B. Eddy Co., and Ontario Hydro. W. Ross Strike, Q.C., new chairman of the HEPC, was the speaker at Hydro's Saturday luncheon.

Friday evening's entertainment was put on by Glengarry talent which included the piping of Connie Kippen Blaney of Maxville; songs by the Alexandria trio of Howard Morris, Dr. Bernard Villeneuve, and Ronald Macdonald, and Highland dances by a group from Mrs. Rae MacCulloch's school of dancing — Barbara and Kathleen Villeneuve, Gregory and Heather MacCulloch, Susan Kemp and Diane Levert. Gas Line To Hawkesbury Will Start Monday

Ottawa Gas intends to begin Monday the extension of its main line from Alexandria, through Vankleek Hill, to Hawkesbury, municipal officials have been informed.

The line now extends to the Carnation plant and it will underpass the CNR tracks, go westerly on Linsley street to Highway 34 and follow the apron of the road for the most part.

Majestic Contractors of Ottawa, have the contract and it is expected to be completed in about two months. Feeder services in Vankleek Hill will be installed later in the year.

OWRB To Help In Sewage Plans

The Ontario Water Resources Board will finance the remaining one-third of the cost of Alexandria's proposed sewage disposal plant, Mayor Simon reported to Town Council at Tuesday's meeting.

The mayor had been in Toronto last week conferring with Dr. Berry and the other members of the board and he reports they were most cooperative. They will take charge of planning in conjunction with the town's engineers on the project and OWRB will send one of its engineers here to select a site and estimate cost of the project.

The OWRB engineer will also look into plans for the town's improved water supply and will confer with the town's engineer before reporting to a joint meeting of Town Council and the PUC.

Mayor Simon interviewed Municipal Board officials regarding several by-laws and saw officers of the Canadian Underwriters' Association regarding lower fire insurance rates. The underwriters expect to considerably reduce business rates and lower residential to their minimum rate.

The sub-zero temperatures played havoc with many other plantings of flowers, tomatoes and other transplants. Alfalfa and clover were touched on the farm front, J. Y. Humphries, ag. rep., reports, but he thinks they will come back.

Help Wanted For Lagging Drives

Organizers of the drives for funds with which to provide Glengarry with a museum and a pipe band are not too happy with the response to date. There have been many contributions to both causes, and these are appreciated. But many more are needed if the new band is to be properly equipped, if the Historical Society is to be able to prepare a fitting home for its museum pieces.

Most disappointing phase, according to one of the organizers, is the failure of so many resident Glengarrians to come through. Most of the donations to date have come from Glengarrians at a distance, he notes, adding the observation that there is not much hope of reaching the goal unless a whole lot of area residents give their financial support.

It has seemed to us in other such drives that many resident Glengarrians appear content to let their kin away from home carry the load. This should not be, and perhaps a lot of intending donors are but awaiting the summer flow of milk cheques to send in their donations.

June is Dairy Month, a feature of which is the June set-aside to finance the Dairy Farmers of Canada promotion of their products. If you have not already contributed to the Museum fund or that for the new pipe band why not decide now to set aside something out of your next milk cheque for one or both of these worthy causes.

His Works Live After Him

Glengarry got a lot of publicity at last week's convention of the Ontario Weekly Newspapers Association in Ottawa. The sponsoring Eastern Ontario editors made it a Glengarry convention due to the fact the editor of this paper was serving as president of O.W.N.A.

Each person present wore the tartan of McDonell of Glengarry (specially brought in from Scotland) on his or her identification badge; the host editors sported Glengarries; a piper was on hand to pipe the president into the Chateau Laurier while the TV camera whirled. On Friday night the entertainment was provided by Glengarry talent, Piper Connie Kippen Blaney, highland dancers from the Rae MacCulloch School, and the Alexandria trio.

The show was a smash hit, we later learned, and the Glengarry Highland Games no doubt will receive reams of publicity from this fine sampling of area talent, in the convention write-ups of the many editors present. There was more than one reminder from the rostrum that a hundred pipers and a' will be seen and heard at Maxville on August 5th.

Warning it was to be thus cast in the role of "The man from Glengarry" and when a gift copy of the new pocket edition of that book was presented him the editor reflected

that Ralph Connor's writings have not only lived after him. They helped provide Glengarry with a special aura that has not faded from the minds of those who long ago enjoyed his books. The Physical face of Glengarry has changed radically from the picture a century ago that is presented in those Connor novels; the Gaelic tongue is seldom now heard, and French now is the second language. But in the minds of many of our countrymen the Glengarry scene remains something special.

What other county could inspire a like theme for a weeklies' convention? What sentiment would be engendered by picturing an O.W.N.A. president as "The man from Prince Edward", or "The man from Huron". The latter might envisage a redskin.

By no means do we mean to discount the early history of other parts of this province in such a reference. Rather do we seek to emphasize the contribution Ralph Connor made to glamorizing our County of Glengarry.

Happy we are to see his novels being re-issued in pocket-book form. We will enjoy reading them again and we see a whole new generation of Canadians becoming familiar with that privileged person who happens to be a man from Glengarry.

They Can't Say Enough Against It

One of the chief topics of discussion when editors met at the weeklies' convention in Ottawa, last weekend, was the new three percent sales tax the province intends to introduce in September. We heard nothing nice said about this new imposition and if Premier Frost had polled the opinions of these weekly editors he would have found them 100 percent against the new tax.

They have been of that conviction since the tax was first thought of. Most weekly editors operate small businesses with limited bookkeeping staffs. One of their greatest trials is the role of unpaid tax collector in which the federal government has cast them. They must now collect 11 percent sales tax on every piece of job printing they turn out; are called on to deduct income tax from their employees' wages and purchase unemployment insurance stamps.

Detailed records must be kept of each operation and the tax moneys must be remitted monthly by a specified date or the unpaid collector can expect to pay a \$10 fine, at least to the income tax department. We are even expected to pay postage when remitting these tax dollars we have been ordered to collect without recompense.

The sales tax is the most unpopular of all with printers because often it is their own money they are remitting. That 11 percent tax must be paid on every job produced in our shops, even on those bad accounts that we never get paid for. If we write off \$300 in bad debts in a year we have the dismaying knowledge that that work brought us in not a cent and that, as well, we have been forced to pay the federal treasury another \$33 of our own money.

Another feature of the Sales Tax unpopular with printers is the clause that relieves from collection of the tax any printer who grosses less than \$3,000 a year. They see this as government subsidizing of hole-in-the-wall printers who can under-quote them and thus leave the customer with the impression he is being over-charged by those who must collect and remit the tax.

Now, the weekly editor who also does job printing is to be called upon to keep another set of records for the provincial government and he must gouge some 15 cents out of his customers on every dollar of job printing they order. He already knows from experience that they resent this added impost and he is at times left with the feeling that some of them think he is pocketing this added profit.

At last week's convention of the editors learned that the new provincial sales tax will be imposed not only on the job price but on the federal sales tax as well. This they see as totally unfair and one does not have to be a statistician to realize the provincial sales tax of 3 percent will in reality be almost 4 percent through the use of this device. A printing job we quote at \$20 now costs the customer \$22.20 when the federal sales tax is added. A further 3 percent provincial tax would add 60 cents, we thought. But it will mount to 67 cents if the new tax is figured after the federal tax has been added.

The editors see in this but another evidence of political connivance with a view to fooling the voter, the consumers of printing who will be called on to pay this tax. They also foresee more time spent in figuring how much tax to charge; and more possibility of error; when they will be expected to make good.

When is a 3 percent sales tax not a 3 percent sales tax, they would ask Premier Frost? And if he is honest he would have to answer, "when it is a sliding tax that may amount to 3½ percent on larger orders".

They also see as totally unjustified a provincial sales tax that taxes money already collected as federal sales tax. Double taxation is bad enough; but when taxes are taxed again they see no end to the growing burden.

OWNA directors on Saturday decided to protest strongly to Premier Frost on this imposition of a sales tax. They realize the tax is inevitable, but they want to be on record as disapproving it, and they want to emphasize to Mr. Frost how unjust they find this one provision in his legislation that will be taxing money already collected for the federal treasury.

Speed The Census Taker

Thirty-four census enumerators today start out on the task of visiting every Glengarry home and business place to complete the decennial census in this county. Their's is a big task involving many questions on many subjects, each of which is asked for a purpose.

Each has been briefed on his work, each is sworn to secrecy and the Bureau of Statistics assures you information sought is for statistical purposes only.

Another Attempt At Bribery

(The Letter-Review)

Latest proposal of the New Socialist Party, which is bringing out its political platform on the instalment plan, is to increase the old-age pension to \$75 a month and to make it payable, without a means test, to everyone on his reaching the age of 65.

Canadians have been deluded before by attempts of politicians to bribe them with their own money, which is why the welfare-state philosophy has become such a prominent feature of national life. It is difficult to imagine that many of them would be stupid enough to be taken in by this bribe. After all, they have seen taxes, direct and indirect, steadily rising with each new scheme for redistribution of earnings and savings. It should be obvious to them by now, and they have been frequently told, that the only money that a government can spend or give away must be taken from the taxpayers.

The socialist proposal to increase the amount of pension and lower the benefit age is really a proposal to increase taxes drastically. On the basis of the numbers of Canadians shown by the Canada Year Book to be in the age-groups affected, the cost of the increase alone would be more than \$600,000,000 a year, or almost as much as the annual collections of Dominion sales tax. This cost is probably understated, for it does not take into account the increased costs of administration, or the fact that the number of citizens over 65 has increased since 1956, the latest year for which the breakdown of the population into age groups is available.

Are Canadians ready to vote for a party that promises to increase the Dominion sales tax from ten to twenty per cent, or to increase income taxes or other imposts to the point where they will yield the required extra revenue? The socialist platform states, with reference to this and other plans it has for redistributing taxpayers' incomes: "All these plans will provide for automatic adjustments in payments as productivity or living costs rise." If the socialists should come to power, it is unlikely that productivity would increase, but living costs certainly would.

The Assembly opens in Knox Church, Toronto, Wednesday, June 7th.

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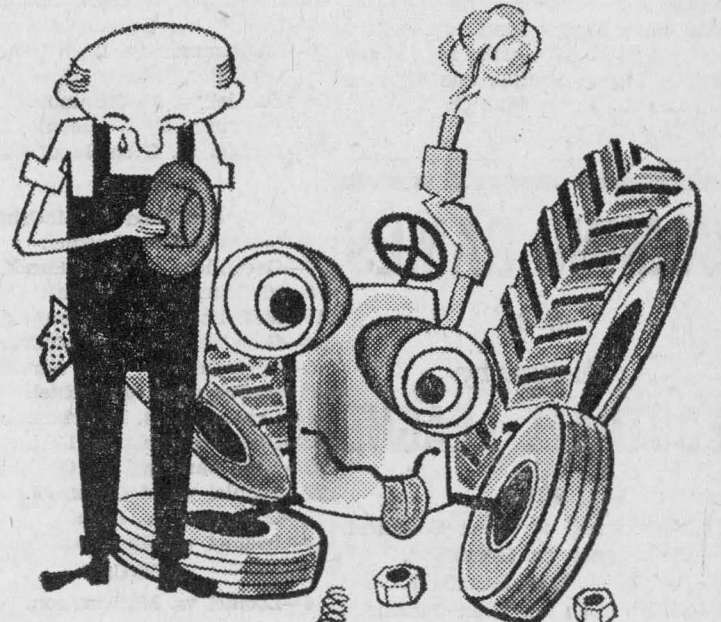

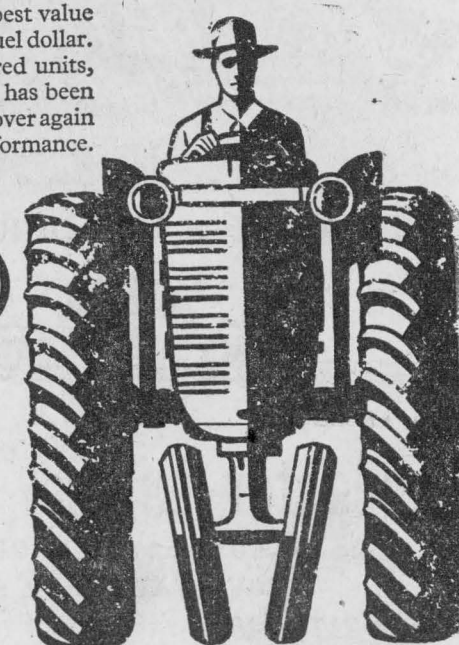

Miss M. Cleary New CWL President

The membership of the Alexandria diocesan council of the Catholic Women's League of Canada exceeds 1,100 according to reports given at this year's annual convention in Alexandria. There are over 150,000 members in this national organization today.

Mrs. John D. A. Macdonald, diocesan president, presided at the business sessions during the convention attended by Reverend directors, delegates and members of the 17 parish councils in the diocese.

The spiritual convener, Mrs. Wm. McGillis, pointed out to members present that abundant grace from Almighty God is received through closed retreats, and urged that every Catholic woman plan now to make such retreat during the coming year.

Scholarships have been established in 12 of the 17 parish councils within the diocese, reported Mrs. Wm. McLeod, education convener. 133 members had been taking part in study groups throughout the year and several subjects had been discussed, one of which was "The Christian Family Apostolate". It was suggested that parish councils endeavour to supply more books to school libraries. It was with interest that it was noted that in 1960 the CWL of Canada spent \$85,412 on education.

Mrs. Peter Manley, convener of citizenship and immigration, outlined to the members the allocation to date of funds donated by the members of the CWL of Canada for World Refugee year. \$15,000 had been donated for a hostel and training scheme in Trieste for the purpose of teaching home economics to young unaccompanied refugee women. After the completion of a six months course these young women can readily emigrate overseas. \$16,000 was allotted to Catholic Relief Services, Hong Kong, for the expansion of a day nursery and dispensary to care for refugee children. \$6,400 was donated to the Catholic Relief Services, India, to provide a mobile medical unit. The Alexandria diocesan council, as well as all other diocesan councils had helped in raising \$54,000 in 1960 for this very worthy cause.

The report, compiled by Mrs. K. McMillan, Social Action convener, showed that the CWL members had given assistance to the aged, the underprivileged, the sick and the unemployed. Great quantities of new and used clothing had been donated to the needy. Members had assisted in community drives — Community Chest, Red Cross; etc. The convener reminded the women of the tremendous good that could be accomplished by an organization of 150,000 women.

Reports on other conveners were given and discussed — radio, TV and film, Miss Florence Kennedy; resolutions, Mrs. Ed. Bryan; national magazine, Mrs. William Beehler; organization, Mrs. Edith Parisien; report forms, Mrs. R. H. Johnson; Our Lady's Missionaries, Mrs. H. T. Donihue; Girl Guides, Mrs. L. Warden; finance, Mrs. Angus Tessier; and Press and publicity, Miss M. Cleary.

Prayers were offered for the repose of the soul of Rev. Sister St. Christine, of Our Lady's Missionaries, who died recently. She was the daughter of Mrs. McIntosh and the late Dr. D. D. McIntosh, Alexandria.

Rev. M. J. O'Brien, diocesan director, commended the members for the work of the past and encouraged them to formulate plans for the future with particular emphasis on the spiritual and educational phases of League work.

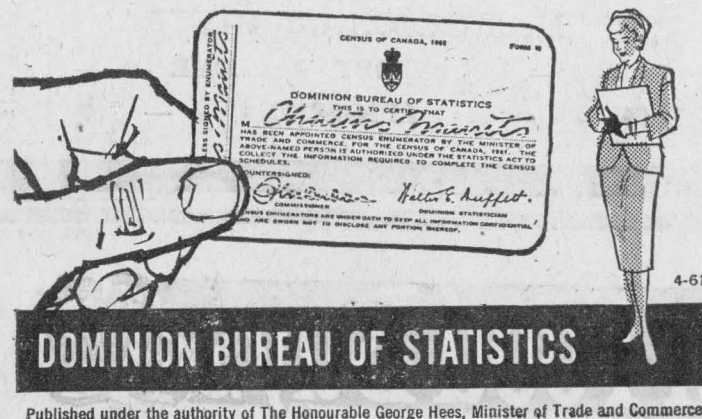
