

## New Party To Have Candidate; Grits, Tories Active As Election Machinery Starts To Roll

At least a three-cornered fight in Glengarry - Prescott is promised for the federal election to be held June 18th.

Meeting here last night, supporters of the New Democratic Party organized a slate of officers and decided a candidate should be selected next week. The choice will be between Rene Benoit, of Glen Gordon, and Gordon Dewar, of Ottawa, a native of Glen Sandfield, who are informed.

Glengarry - Prescott Progressive Conservatives hold their nominating convention in Hawkesbury next Wednesday evening, when it is expected Osie Villeneuve, M.P., will be the unanimous choice of the meeting.

In other activity last night, Glengarry Liberals met in Alexander Hall, here, to re-organize a Young Liberals Club on the provincial riding basis. We understand a similar club is to be organized in Prescott County in support of Mr. Ethier's candidature.

Rene Latreille, of Martintown, was elected president of the New Democratic Party Riding Association for Glengarry - Prescott at a meeting held here last night. Most of the executive are from the front of the county but the slate has powers to add to its numbers as

others are enrolled in North Glengarry and Prescott.

Both Mr. Benoit, who had previously been reported selected as candidate, and Gordon Dewar, of Ottawa, announced their willingness to run and a decision will be made next week prior to the meeting May 7th, in Cornwall, when NDP Leader Tommy Douglas, is to visit the riding.

Several members of the Stormont NDP party were on hand to aid in organization, among them Mrs. Frank E. Ball, a possible candidate in Stormont.

## Barn Lost In Moose Creek Fire

Loss estimated at \$7,000 was caused Monday when a late morning fire destroyed a large frame barn owned by Maurice Bray of Moose Creek. Also lost was machinery stored in the building.

Machinery was owned by Elie Bray.

Although Mrs. Bray was in the farmhouse only 100 feet from the burning barn the fire was first sighted by Mrs. Raymond Seguin.

"It looked like a burst of flame coming from the barn all at once", reported Mrs. Seguin, who called the Moose Creek telephone operator.

Members of the Moose Creek volunteer brigade were called to the scene and the Maxville fire department brought a pumper. By the time the pumper reached the burning building, walls had already begun to fall.

Realizing attempts to save the barn would be futile, firemen sprayed grass near the building and poured water onto the house.

Observers feel if the wind had been blowing towards the farm house it could easily have caught fire.

The barn and contents were partially insured. There were no cattle kept in the building.

## Alberta Pioneer J.D. MacGillivray 101 Years Old

Still spry and active, John Darroch MacGillivray, Alberta pioneer and first mayor of Ponoka, celebrated his 101st birthday on Monday, April 23rd. Now a resident of Edmonton, Mr. MacGillivray returned to Fawcett where a year ago he had celebrated his 100th birthday with family and friends.

Born at lot 25 - 7th Lochiel, April 23rd, 1861, he is a brother-in-law of Donald John MacGillivray of Kirk Hill.

Mr. MacGillivray farmed at Fawcett, 165 miles north of Edmonton, from 1933 to 1950, when he retired. His birthday party was sponsored by the Ladies' Community Club at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Nellie Guyett.

Also attending were two other daughters, Mrs. Mary Thompson, Grande Prairie, and Mrs. Della Freebury, 10417 149 St., Edmonton, and two sons, J. D. MacGillivray, Fort St. John, B.C., and Murdoch MacGillivray, 10736 108 St., Edmonton.

Born at Kirk Hill, Mr. MacGillivray went to Madison, South Dakota, in 1880.

He returned to Kirk Hill to marry in 1893 and came West with his wife in 1901 to settle in Ponoka.

He opened a furniture and undertaking business in Ponoka. He went into business in Stettler for a short time, but returned to Ponoka in 1907.

He began farming near New Brigid, 150 miles east of Calgary, in 1911 when he moved to the Fawcett district. He moved to Edmonton in 1959.

Still spry and active, he takes walks and reads the newspapers avidly.

Mrs. MacGillivray died in 1954.

## Demonstration By Physics' Teacher Highly Praised

Lorne Whelan, science teacher at Glengarry - Alexandria District High School, won high praise at Toronto this week following a demonstration of electronic equipment he staged at the annual convention of Ontario Science Teachers.

Reported the Toronto Star: "The most complete display of electronic equipment ever assembled to teach Physics in High School was demonstrated by Lorne Whelan, teacher at Alexandria High School."

"This equipment was collected and made by Mr. Whelan, who is considered one of the best teachers in his field in the province."

"His demonstrations were lauded by University professors, inspectors and science teachers who met at Forest Hill Collegiate, Toronto, for the annual convention of the Ontario Science Teachers."

Mr. Whelan describes his self-made electronic gear as "aids in teaching Grade XIII Physics."

Associated with him in the demonstration was Paul Trudel of Eastview High School, a former principal of Vankleek Hill Collegiate. Mr. Trudel spoke on the Unit Equation, a mechanical method for reducing the mathematics in High School Physics. The method involves changing from British units to the metric system.

Clifford C. Hart, of Cornwall Collegiate, a member of the central executive, arranged the demonstrations by these area teachers.

# EDITORIALS

## As Glengarry - Prescott Goes

Desks thumped in the Commons last week and Members of Parliament of every party cheered as one when Prime Minister Diefenbaker at last made the long looked for announcement — June 18th is to be the federal election date. That happy demonstration of enthusiasm may not have been all joy at the prospect of once more going to the people. Some part of it may have been a sense of relief that the days of anxious waiting for the word were finally over.

A lot of those Members may be dreading that June 18th date, may be wondering if their days in the political field are now numbered. Their desk thumping when the Prime Minister announced the election date may be comparable to the sense of relief one of Castro's captives might feel following his court martial. When the date for his execution is announced he must feel some sense of relief to know an end of uncertainty as to his final fate.

In the political arena, that sense of uncertainty will remain right through the next fifty days and will steadily intensify as election day draws nearer. A lot of those Members who cheered lustily at word of the election may be anything but cheerful when the votes are counted on the night of June 18th. Some are certain to fall by the wayside; but they came through nobly in that demonstration of apparent faith in their parties' fortunes at the polls.

Ontario will be the key province in this election, according to political strategists.

If the Diefenbaker forces lose heavily to the Liberals here they probably will not be returned. But senior parties plan to concentrate most of their fire on the Ontario voter, we read, and we can get ready for the barrage. A bomb shelter, if you have one, might be a good place to sit out the approaching word blitz.

On the national scene, as on the Glengarry-Prescott front, it looks like the traditional two-party fight for power. Social Credit will probably take some seats in Alberta and B.C.; the Douglas - led New Party appears not to be going too far. Questions that may have to wait until June 18th for an answer — Has Diefenbaker lost his appeal among the electorate; can Liberal Leader Pearson project himself this time so as to win friends and influence people who voted Prog. Con. in 1958?

In Glengarry - Prescott it shapes up as a challenge, by a newcomer to the political scene, Viateur Ethier, Liberal, to the reign of Osie Villeneuve, Prog. Con. perennial. We have yet to see Mr. Benoit, who reportedly will represent the New Democratic Party. Social Credit is said to be planning to run a candidate in every Ontario riding, but the party faithful are scarce, in Glengarry at least. A far-out possibility, Raymond Bruneau, ex-M.P., is reported thinking of entering the fray as an independent.

We see the June 18th battle for ballots as a two-way fight in Glengarry-Prescott and in Ontario as a whole. As this riding goes so may go the province and the nation.

## Clean-Up Time Is Here

The Ontario Public Health Act calls on all property owners to clean up cellars, buildings, outbuildings, yards and premises before May 1st. That doesn't leave much time, in this late Spring of 1962, for action along these lines by householders who have not yet made a start.

Such a government edict should hardly be necessary, one would think. Most people itch at this time of year to get out on lawn and garden, to rake up and remove winter's sorry-looking debris and to ready flower beds for the new season of growth.

But there are some, it seems, who take no pride in beautifying their surroundings; who remain oblivious to their own eye-sores or are too lethargic to do anything in the line of improvement.

It is primarily to them that the Board of Trade makes its pitch in sponsoring a townwide Clean-Up, Fix-Up, Paint-Up campaign in early May. It is a community promotion to repair the ravages of winter and make Alexandria attractive in the eyes not only of its citizenry but of the many visitors and transient tourists who will be here through the summer months. Not only is it suggested we clean-up, we are asked to keep our properties attractive through the months ahead, that we may leave a favorable impression with those who may be seeing Alexandria for the first time.

After all has been tidied up there is still the daily dose of litter to be contended with. This age of packaging makes litter a real

problem and it is one that we in Alexandria have yet to solve. Once we have become litter-conscious, accustomed to using the litter cans rather than the street for our refuse, we can hope for the day when passing motorists will refrain from using car windows for jet-setting kleenex, cigarette boxes, candy wrappers and such.

The litter bug is still with us, but even more reprehensible is the householder in town or country who strews his garbage in roadside ditches rather than carry it to the nearest dump. Scarcely credible are the reports that some residents of towns and villages which boast municipal dumps will make a special mission into the countryside to unload their potato peels and empty cans on the road allowance or even on private property. Implausible you would say; and yet we have heard on good authority of such instances.

Alexandria has its own dumping ground and that is where its garbage and winter's debris should go. The countryside has its own Farmstead Improvement competition designed to make Glengarry's rural setting more attractive and we in the urban areas should be happy to mesh our Clean-Up campaign with that in the townships rather than mess up theirs.

May will be with us early next week. Let's all get behind our rejuvenated Board of Trade's campaign to make our town more attractive; and to keep it that way.

## Pave All Streets In One Program

Our side streets seem to have taken a worse beating than usual this Spring and even a patching project could be costly.

The mayor of a town in Western Ontario has a suggestion for his municipality that may merit study by our Council. He suggests that all of the streets of the town be paved in one year's program and that the cost be met by debentures spread over a ten-year period.

It is not fair, in his opinion, that rate-payers on streets that are not paved should be contributing to the paving of other streets. By surfacing all streets in one program, he adds, costs might be reduced and maintenance costs would also be lower. The only increase in costs would be in the carrying charges on the debentures and this mayor feels savings in maintenance would cover this factor.

Even if the program resulted in an increase in costs, the town would have a proper street job completed. But this mayor feels annual payments of principal and interest on a debenture would not amount to any more than the present year-to-year program of rebuilding and maintaining his town's streets.

It may not be possible under the present

provincial road grant system to embark on any such program. As we understand it the province pays 50 per cent of a municipality's road costs up to a fixed maximum expenditure. But might not this be negotiated on a ten-year basis with Queen's Park. That 50 per cent grant on the overall cost could be applied over the ten years in meeting the debenture payments.

Certainly some such scheme is needed if we are ever to boast side streets that are adequately surfaced to cope with today's traffic. Seldom in any year can Council's road allotment finance the rebuilding of even one street. Instead, we must be content with patching that often does not hold up through the summer.

Each Spring the potholes become more numerous and eventually there may not even be money enough to patch all the holes.

The present program of street maintenance leaves something to be desired. Would not Alexandria, or any other town, be more attractive with all its streets paved from walk to walk?

Ratepayers who live on dusty, bumpy back streets would go for it, certainly. Town Council might well consider whether such a paving program would be possible here.

### TWENTY YEARS AGO

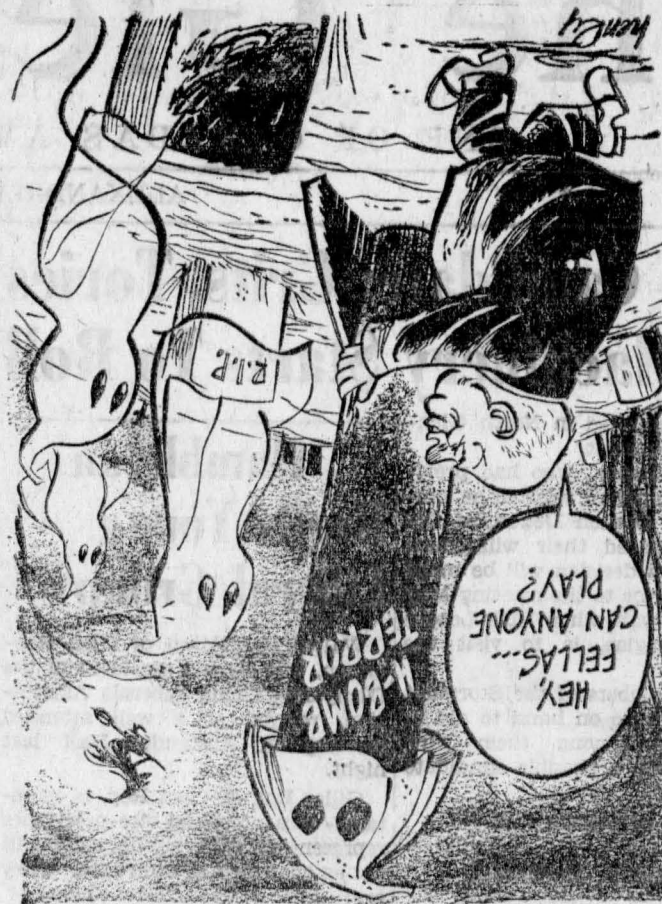
Friday, April 24th, 1942

## Concerned In Saskatchewan

A delegation representing a number of communities in the southern part of the province, is reported to have recently met with the government with the dispute between the doctors and the government over the medical care plan and the fact there appears to be no indication of an agreement between the two groups.

Concern is heightened when many of these communities, presently short on doctor services, may be without it at all, if the doctors, as some have indicated, leave the province, due to the attitude taken by the government.

It certainly will be a catastrophe if, by attempting to bring in a prepaid, government sponsored, medical care scheme that, through disagreement, there is an exodus of doctors from the province, thereby reducing availability of doctor service to a lesser degree than it is now available in many parts of the province.

The government, through legislation, may be able to force the doctors to accept such a plan, but they certainly cannot prevent the members of the medical profession from leaving the province. And attempts to offset such a movement by a mass enlistment from other countries will not be looked on too kindly. As we have said before, the relationship between doctor and patient is truly a personal thing, developed through confidence. Is it to be shattered by the squabble now existing?

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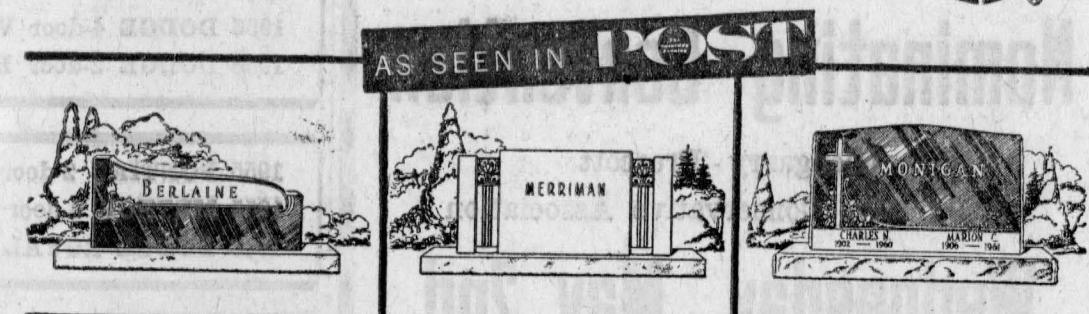
