Collin. One voter who had not been given the customary ride to the poll was not so favorable to the idea. She found several candidates grouped at the entrance to the hall and thought they were more interested in seeing who

conveyed whom to the voting booths than in getting out the vote themselves. The turnout was not large, some 63 per cent of the 1,686 eligible voters, but much better than in municipalities voting only for school trustees. Bruno Massie New Reeve Of Alexandria Only Seven Voted For Trustee In Maxville

Bruno Massie was elected reeve of Alexandria and five new councillors will be on the new board as a result of Monday's voting here.

Only incumbent of seven seeking the six councillor posts, Ronald MacDonald was returned with Martin Clement, Jacques Joly, Laurier Lefebvre, Andy Menard and Arthur Laporte. Trailing was Norman Laperle.

In a vote for Separate School representative on the County Board of Education that was notable for a small vote turnout, Jean V. Guindon, Apple Hill, eked out a 20-vote victory over Arcade Trotter, Alexandria. Most of those ballots were cast in Alexandria, the response of Separate School supporters in Kenyon, Lochiel and Maxville being very light.

The lack of interest was most notable in Maxville where only seven ratepayers went to the polls. Six voted for Guindon and only one for Trotter. No votes were cast in two Kenyon polls where 95 votes represented only 19 per cent of ratepayers.

The voter interest was not up to par in Alexandria, either, but more

nearly normal as 63 per cent of the 1,686 eligible voters cast ballots.

Reeve-elect Massie received 705 votes to finish well ahead of his opponent, incumbent Councillor Raymond Ouellette who received the backing of 318 votes.

In the vote for councillor, Martin Clement led with 592 votes. Postmaster Jacques Joly had 533, Ronald MacDonald 502, Laurier Lefebvre 471, Andy Menard 408 and Arthur Laporte 392. Norman Laperle trailed with 275 votes.

Making up the 1971-72 council with those successful Monday will be Mayor Jean Paul Touchette and Deputy-Reeve Marcel Ranger both of whom received acclamations.

The vote for Area 2 Separate School trustee on the County Board finished with Guindon at 619, Trotter at 599 votes. Both were members of the present board and the election followed a revision of the representation boundaries leaving both men in Area 2 which elects only one trustee.

The vote in Alexandria was notably heavy in the south poll where Reeve-elect Massie garnered almost half of his vote total.

Lochiel Resident Struck By Truck

John Joseph McCormick, 64, of Lochiel, is reported making progress in Hotel Dieu, Cornwall, where he is being treated for injuries suffered in a traffic mishap Tuesday.

Mr. McCormick suffered a fractured shoulder and broken ribs when struck by a panel truck as he crossed the road in front of his home at Lochiel, about 11 a.m. Tuesday. Slippery road conditions were responsible for the accident according to the police report. Driver of the truck was Leo Guindon of Alexandria.

The injured man was treated at Glengarry Memorial Hospital before being conveyed to Hotel Dieu.

Second Call To Fire On A Train

Alexandria firemen were called to Green Valley Tuesday night to control a blaze on a CPR diesel engine.

It was the second such unusual call for an area fire brigade in two weeks. The Maxville brigade recently turned out in the early hours of the morning to douse fire in one car of a CNR freight train passing through.

The burning diesel Tuesday night was the second engine on a 96-car train running east from Smiths Falls. The train was one mile and a half east of Green Valley when the crew noticed the blaze and notified Smiths Falls. The train was ordered back to Green Valley and Alexandria firemen were called to fight the blaze about 8:30 p.m.

The flames were quickly under control but not before an estimated \$10,000 damage had been done to the Boston & Maine diesel. The hot steel steamed for an hour and firemen remained at the scene until they were certain there was no more fire.

The brigade was also called out Saturday afternoon when a faulty fuse panel box shorted in the apartment occupied by Mrs. John Cameron in the Hope & Touchette apartments at 40 Derby St. Fire had started in the wall but was quickly controlled and damage was minor.

Former Diocesan Priest Died

A member of the diocesan clergy until illness forced his retirement, Rev. Bernard Pion died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Hartford, Conn., on Saturday. He was 49.

He was born in Waterbury, Conn., a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Pion and came to the Alexandria diocese following his ordination in 1947. Father Pion served as curate at St. Columban's, Cornwall and as pastor at Glen Robertson, in addition to serving some years at the Retreat House here and as secretary to the bishop.

Seven brothers and eight sisters survive in addition to his father. Rev. Leo MacDonald represented Bishop Proulx at the funeral held Wednesday to St. Anne's Church, Waterbury. Other members of the diocesan clergy were also in attendance.

Twenty-one grandchildren and 29 great grandchildren also survive as do six sisters. They are Mrs. Napoleon Lefebvre, Amanda and Mrs. John Dunn, Lea, of Montreal; Miss Alcide Sauve and Mrs. Wilfrid Salomon, Bertha, of Glen Robertson; Mrs. Joe Mantha, Yvonne of Mattawa and Mrs. Stan Benoit, Florence of Val Morin.

The largely attended funeral was held Monday to St. Martin's of Tours Church and cemetery Glen Robertson. Rev. Kenneth Martin offered the funeral mass.

No Satisfaction On 417 Highway

A delegation from Kenyon and Caledonia Townships was in Toronto last week to discuss additional access to the new 417 highway but it reportedly received no encouragement from Highways Minister Gomme.

Land will be secured to provide later access north of McCrimmon when traffic warrants but present plans for the new thruway call for access only north of Maxville and at the intersection with Highway 34, four miles east of McCrimmon. The Minister reportedly was firm in his stand against provision of access at Dunvegan or McCrimmon.

Included in the delegation were Reeve George Methot of Caledonia, Reeve Albert Faubert and Deputy-Reeve John A. MacLennan of Kenyon, Fraser Campbell, Maxville and Leslie Clark, Dunvegan, representing the Federation of Agriculture.

Register As Engineers

Cornwall and Maxville men were among some 522 new members who were registered by the Council of Association of Professional Engineers of Ontario. Pasquale Vincelli of 697 Hamilton Crescent, and Ross C. McIntosh of RR1, Maxville, will be able to use the initials "P.Eng." after their name.

New Regulations On Snowmobiles

New provincial regulations covering the use of snowmobiles restrict their operation on roads or highways to persons holding a motor vehicle drivers licence. Police Chief Sylvio Cleroux reminds. Formerly anyone could operate a motorized sled on public roads but the new restrictions against non-licensed drivers even cover the crossing of a public road.

Another new regulation makes it mandatory to report to police every collision on or off a highway which results in injury to any person or in damage to property exceeding \$200, of any person other than the owner and driver.

Chief Cleroux also reminds Alexandria drivers that a town by-law restricts indiscriminate use of snow sleds. They can be used in going to and from a certain point but within rather vague limits. The anti-noise by-law can be used, too, when complaints of excessive noise after 11 p.m. are received by police.

Only two complaints of excessive noise were reported by police over the first snowy weekend.

Santa Claus Visits K of C Sunday Will Return Week Before Christmas

will have treats for all the young fry.

Southwestern Quebec that still remains undesignated, including the cities of Montreal and Hull, will spill across the Ontario border to include the counties of Stormont, Glengarry and Prescott in the southeastern corner of that province.

Under the amending legislation, the department of regional economic expansion expects to spend an additional \$130 million during the next three or four years to accelerate and intensify economic development.

Of this, departmental officials estimate that \$100 million would be spent in the proposed new Montreal region.

This expenditure is expected to generate new private investment of \$650 million over-all with most of it — \$500 million — coming within the boundaries of the new region centred on Montreal.

Expectation is that this new capital spending would create an estimated 30,000 new jobs. The lion's share, once again, would go to the new Montreal region. Officials estimate that it would draw some 22,500.

These are jobs created directly by the anticipated new private investment.

Departmental experts say that in a spin-off effect, three new jobs would result indirectly for every two created directly.

Other population centres located in the proposed new region are Sorel and Valleyfield in Quebec, and Cornwall.

Sale Of Apple Hill Dairy May Result In Expansion Of Plant

The sale of Apple Hill Dairy last week to J. M. Schneider Limited of Kitchener, could result in expansion of the present plant and the production of other than cheese items there. The Schneider firm reportedly wanted the plant to supply its expanding cheese market but it has purchased an adjoining six acres of land and long range plans could see its Eastern Ontario market for meats and processed foods also supplied from a larger plant at Apple Hill.

The inclusion of Glengarry in the federal government's new job incentive region is also seen as

a possible factor prompting the Schneider firm to enlarge its operation at Apple Hill.

Purchase of the plant was completed last Thursday at Cornwall and Apple Hill Dairy Co. will continue to operate the plant until Jan. 1st when the Schneider interests take over. The present capacity of the plant is five million pounds of cheese annually and the new owners may be aiming for higher production goals. They market other cheese products as well as the cheddar now produced at Apple Hill.

A native of Alexandria, Donald Gormley, is associated with the Schneider Company and he has been in the area completing plans for the January take over from Jean V. Guindon and other shareholders. The purchase included a 190 acre farm in the Apple Hill area and a two-vehicle garage in the village.

13 New Homes Here This Year

New building in Alexandria this year was valued at \$564,850, some \$50,000 more than in 1969. Almost half the total, though, consisted of civic projects, \$240,000 to increase capacity of the water filtration plant, now in progress, and the new fire hall on Kenyon St. W.

Building Inspector Michel Samson reports permits were issued for 13 new homes to cost \$189,000, additions to residences \$37,500 and repairs or additions to commercial enterprises \$332,300.

Among new commercial building the \$35,000 Caisse Populaire office is nearing completion, corner of Main and Victoria and the new Alexandria Cleaners plant of Royal Gareau on Main St. South.

New Lancaster Doctor Purchases Home

Dr. Donald Conway who comes to Lancaster in April to set up a medical practice has purchased a home east of the village. Mrs. Conway was here last week from Esterhazy, Sask., and completed purchase of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hector Bird on the service road east of Lancaster, adjacent to Glengarry Park.

They will take possession in the spring.

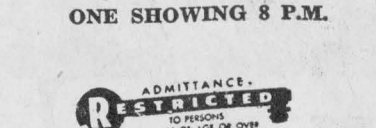

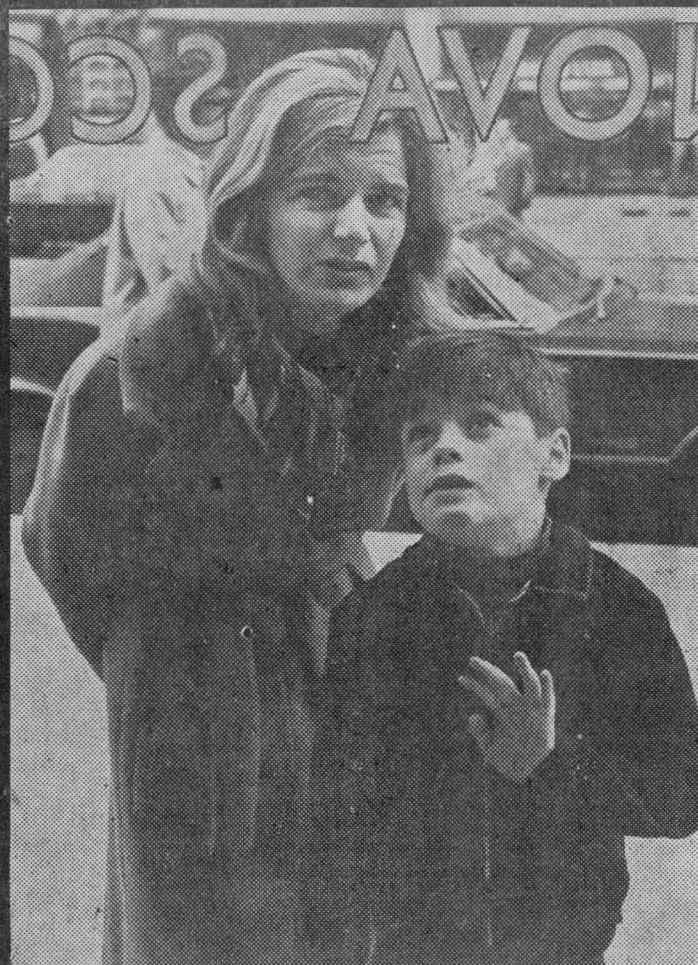
