Second Call To Fire On A Train

It was the second such unusual call for an area fire brigade in two weeks. The Maxville brigade recently turned out in the early hours of the morning to douse fire in one car of a CNR freight train pasing through.

The burning diesel Tuesday night was the second engine on a 96-car train running east from Smiths Falls. The train was one mile and a half east of Green Valley when the crew noticed the blaze and notified Smiths Falls. The train was ordered back to Green Valley and Alexandria firemen were called to fight the blaze about 8.30 p.m.

The flames were quickly under control but not before an estimated \$10,000 damage had been done to the Boston & Maine diesel. The hot steel steamed for an hour and firemen remained at the scene until they were certain there was no more fire.

No Satisfaction On 417 Highway

A delegation from Kenyon and Caledonia Townships was in Toronto last week to discuss additional access to the new 417 highway but it reportedly received no encouragement from Highways Minister Gomme.

Land will be secured to provide later access north of McCrimmon when traffic warrants but present plans for the new thruway call for access only north of Maxville and at the intersection with Highway 34, four miles east of McCrimmon. The Minister reportedly was firm in his stand against provision of access at Dunvegan or McCrim-

New Regulations On Snowmobiles

New provincial regulations covering the use of snowmobiles restrict their operation on roads or highways to persons holding a motor vehicle drivers licence, Police Chief Sylvio Cleroux reminds. Formerly anyone could operate a motorized sled on public roads but the new restrictions against nonlicenced drivers even cover the crossing of a public road.

Another new regulation makes it mandatory to report to police every collision on or off a highway which results in injury to any person or in damage to property ,exceeding \$200, of any person other than the owner and driver. Chief Cleroux also reminds Alexandria drivers that a town by-law restricts indiscriminate use of

snow sleds. They can be used in going to and from a certain point but within rather vague limits. The anti-noise by-law can be used. too, when complaints of excessive noise after 11 p.m. are received by police.

Only two complaints of excessive noise were reported by police over the first snowy weekend.

by the federal government to benefit from a program of industrial incentive grants. Cornwall and the counties of Stormont and Prescott are other Ontario areas to be included according to the announcement last Thursday night by Finance Minister Benson.

Presenting a special winter budget, Mr. Benson said that Stormont, Glengarry and Prescott Counties, along with the southwestern part of Quebec and including Montreal, would form the new region.

"Certain important amendments to the Regional Development Incentives Act will be proposed," Mr. Benson explained.

"If they are approved by parliament, they will be followed by the designation of a new region within which a special system of capital incentive grants will be applied to encourage new private investment. The development incentives will be available within this new area for a specific time period. We believe they will bring to more rapid fruition many investment projects which would not otherwise be likely to materialize for some time."

Regional Economic Expansion Minister Jean Marchand said that as soon as the new bill is approved by parliament, it is his intention to designate a new region as eligible for special private invest-

Under the amending legislation, the department of regional economic expansion expects to spend an additional \$130 million during the next three or four years to accelerate and intensify economic development.

Of this, departmental officials estimate that \$100 million would be spent in the proposed new Montreal region.

This expenditure is expected to generate new private investment of \$650 million over-all with most of it - \$500 million - coming within the boundaries of the new region centred on Montreal.

Expectation is that this new capital spending would create an estimated 30,000 new jobs. The lion's share, once again, would go to the new Montreal region. Officials estimate that it would draw some 22,500.

These are jobs created directly by the anticipated new private investment.

Departmental experts say that in a spin-off effect, three new jobs would result indirectly for every two created directly.

Jean Marchand intends to designate a new region as eligible for special private investment incentives.

To be centred on Montreal, the new region will comprise all of southwestern Quebec that still remains undesignated and will spill across the border to include Stormont, Glengarry and Prescott. The department of regional economic expansion expects to spend \$130 million during the next three years to accelerate economic development in the region and this sum is expected to generate \$650 million in new private in-

This capital spending is seen capable of providing some 22,500 new jobs in the region and departmental experts expect the spin-off effect would be three new jobs resulting indirectly from every two created directly.

Sounds promising for Glengarry, doesn't it? And yet we find ourself a doubting Thomas who will not be counting on this new incentive plan to bring new industry to this county until new plants are actually in production.

Perhaps we have become too cynical where politicians and government bureaucrats are concerned. As we see it, Mr. Marchand's department of regional economic expansion will be putting up the money incentive and so it will have a lot of influence on where the recipient new industries takes root. We recall the same Mr. Ottawa and Toronto.

No Access Makes No Sense

donia Township councils got nowhere last of the area it transects. It is meant to proweek when it journeyed to Toronto to plead vide fast transit between Ottawa and Montwith the Highways Minister for access to new Highway 417. As we hear it, Mr. Gomme would countenance no changes in the planning of his engineers who are providing access north of Maxville and again at the Glengarry-Prescott border where Highway 34 will be intersected by the new thruway.

That does not make sense to us and we imagine a lot of people in Glengarry and Caledonia are left wondering what motivates the Highways Department . Why is it so oblivious to the thinking of area residents who should be in a position to enjoy any conveniences or benefits provided by a thruway cut through their land?

The extension of Highway 34 at Mc-Crimmon is the obvious location for access to the new 417 and yet it is being ignored in favor of the intersection point some four miles east. For most residents of the county wishing to use the new highway to Ottawa eight miles will have been added to their journey. For some there will be an alternative route by way of Highway 43 to Monkland where the new 318 will funnel them onto 417.

Whether or not there is access at Mc-Crimmon, motorists will be able to get to and from Ottawa faster on the new highway. That is not the point we are belaboring. It is our view that a new road should Queen's Park.

Pricing Themselves Out Of Members

Canadian National Railways is planning still further downgrading of its passenger service on the Montreal-Ottawa run. Effective February 1, 1971, four conventional coach trains will be removed from service between the two cities and replaced by railliners, according to a news report released by leaders of three railway unions in Ot-

The change would include cutting meals from the train service on our line and the substitution of snack-and-beverage service. The jobs of 23 members of one union and six members of another would be lost in the change-over and this accounts for the written notice given the unions last week. Their collective agreement with CN calls for 90 days notice prior to any change involving the loss of employment. It was receipt of this notice that prompted the union leaders to call a press conference early last week and make public the railway's intent to switch to rail-liners.

They are asking Ottawa to fight against this further downgrading of service and we hope Alexandria officialdom will also protest. There appears little hope the steady attrition of railway service will be stopped much short of complete disappearance of passenger travel and yet we should be doing everything possible to reverse this trend. Our midway location between the two cities on the CNR line remains an asset to our town and Alexandria is the loser each time railway service further deteriorates.

Count us among those who discount the CNR's plans for rail-liner service and yet we find it more than a bit ironic to be lining up under the banner of these leaders of the railway locals at Ottawa. They are primarily responsible for this move to cut out meals in favor of snack bars on trains. 

Thank you for your editorial on bookmobile service, that made music to our ears. As I am about to leave for Holland, because of illness of my mother, I cannot go into great detail about our preparations for the Alexandria library. Although everything depends on the County Library Board, that will be appointed at the first meeting of county council in 1971, we are already collecting books for your library.

The new board will have to approve financial details regarding the space in the post office and will also have to lay down general policy rules for the operation of its library branches. All that cannot be done overnight.

As you pointed out to your readers, the county will not levy for library purposes in 1971, but there is a good chance that the Department of Education will approve a special subsidy for SD&G. As soon as this money is secured we will be able to go ahead in Alexhas also been conditionally secur-

From existing book stock we shall be able to give Alexandria and Maxville a start, but we expect that the real growth will have to wait until 1972, with its first county levy.

The Deadly "Toy"

Smiths Falls Record-News

Last winter produced further evidence of the hazards involved in the operation of snowmobiles on public thoroughfares. Of the 93 Canadian snowmobile enthusiasts who died in accidents, 47 died as the result of collisions with motor vehicles. Twenty-two of the fatalities occurred on municipal roads, 21 on secondary roads and four on main highways.

These statistics emphasize the warning of the snowmobile manufacturers that the machines are not designed for highway use. On snow, where the skis and tracks of the machine can bite in, control is comparatively easy. On ice-covered or hardpacked snow surfaces, found on most roadways where it is possible to operate a snowmobile, the machines are very difficult to control in all aspects of their operation. At high speed they become practically uncontrollable. The second major aspect of the snowmobile which makes it dangerous to operate on roadways is its size.

Last winter the death toll from accidents involving snowmobiles increased by 50 per cent. Predicted high sales of motorized snow vehicles indicate the possibility of a further increase in casualties this winter unless operators exercise greater care. The snowmobile is not a toy, but far too many Canadians continue to treat it as such.

The Ontario Government has revised regulations within the Motorized Snow Vehicle Act further to restrict indiscriminate use of public thoroughfares by snowmobile operators. Municipal governments have been given wider powers of control within their jurisdictions. In addition, it is now mandatory for the operator of a snowmobile to possess a valid motor vehicle operator's licence.

Strictly-enforced laws should help, but the best means of reducing the number of snowmobile accidents and fatalities occurring on public thoroughfares each winter is the snowmobile operators themselves. In this regard snowmobile clubs must assume greater responsibility. With the right equipment and the proper mental attitude on the part of the individual, the snowmobile can add a great deal of fun to the winter months. There is no valid reason why it should be the cause of injury and death, or an instrument of harrassment.


