Retired Postmaster At Dalkeith Feted At Glen Sandfield Party

Alex N. McLeod, postmaster at Dalkeith, was hailed as a community leader at a party held in his honor at Glen Sandfield Hall to mark his retirement after some 17 years of service.

The hall was filled to capacity as Mr. McLeod was piped in by Donald Angus McLennan. The retiring postmaster was accompanied by John A. Fraser, postmaster at Glen Sandfield, and the members of the McLeod family, including Mr. McLeod's only grandchild, Judith Ann.

Mr. Fraser spoke of his association with the veteran postmaster over the past years and also told of Mr. McLeod's service from 1915 to 1919, in the First World War. After his return home, Mr. McLeod purchased the family farm and was a very successful farmer with an excellent herd of purebred Ayrshire cattle. In 1932 he sold the herd sire to Kemptville Agricultural School.

In 1944, Mr. McLeod became postmaster, serving in that capacity until the present. He was a son of the late Norman McLeod of Dalkeith.

Following a lunch, he was called to the platform, where Donald Angus McLennan read an address, and a well-filled purse was presented to the retiring postmaster.

Mr. McLeod replied fittingly and asked the co-operation of all for the new postmaster, J. K. Munroe.

Mr. McLeod's successor is a son of Dr. A. T. Munroe. He is secretary of Glengarry District High School Board and Lochiel Area Township School Board. With past banking experience, Mr. Munroe comes well qualified to fill the post.

Short addresses were given by John J. McCormick and Mrs. Neil Blair, testifying to Mr. McLeod's qualities. Mrs. Douglas MacMillan, accompanied by Mrs. Clarence MacMillan, sang "Jean McNeil", and "A Pal Good and True". Following the singing of "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow", the remainder of the evening was spent in dancing to the music of the Glen Orchestra.

Canadiens-Bound, Ralph MacSweyn Outstanding Player In Hockey Series

Signed this winter for a try-out with Montreal Canadiens' farm system, Ralph MacSweyn, of McCrimmon, received rare notices last weekend for his defensive play with an Ottawa team of juveniles at Milton, Ont.

Ottawa ACT Flyers went unbeaten in five games to win top spot in the Tri-County Juvenile Hockey tournament at Milton, Friday and Saturday. And MacSweyn received a trophy as the outstanding player in the two-day event in which some 350 players on 24 teams participated.

Ottawa captured the A class championship Saturday morning by trimming favored Toronto Marl-

boros, 4-0, then followed up by defeating B class champs, Brampton, 9-1, and earned the grand championship with a 8-1 win over Fergus C class winners, Saturday night.

A report of the game states "MacSweyn, who played almost every minute of each of Ottawa's three games on Saturday, and Watson (in the Ottawa nets) provided the defensive strength for the winners". Ralph also scored a goal.

The 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald MacSweyn, McCrimmon, Ralph was a standout in local junior hockey circles when signed by the Canadiens' organization this winter. He is to report at one of their training camps this Fall.

IT'S OUR OPINION

They Help Keep Glengarry To The Fore

Throughout its history Glengarry has been exporting many of its best people to every part of this nation. Early Glengarrymen were in the fur trade, in exploration, in the building of roads and rails. A later generation helped settle the prairies, while others were playing their part in uncovering the mineral wealth of the North.

Wherever they went, Glengarrymen of those early days seemed to gravitate to the top and local history in many of the younger cities and towns of the country records the key roles played in their progress by native sons of this county. Glengarry is still exporting most of its best brains, its most progressive youths, for want of opportunity at home. And they in turn are playing their part in national development.

We were reminded recently that Glengarry stock of another sort has played an important role in the development of this country. The recent election of J. Carlyle Watt, of Lancaster, as president of the Ayrshire Breeders' Association of Canada, is a reminder that generations of high quality purebred Ayrshires and Holsteins have gone from Glengarry farms through the years to fill the role of foundation stock for dairy herds right across the country, and across the line as well. They have helped tone up our nation's dairying industry and many of them have carried the name of Glengarry into the show-ring to add lustre to this old county.

A little belatedly we proffer congratulations to Mr. Watt on his elevation to the highest post in Canadian Ayrshire circles. Owner of Maple Crest Farm at Lancaster, and prominent among his fellow breeders over 30 years, Mr. Watt is recognized as a leading judge of Ayrshire cattle. He placed the classes at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto both in 1956 and 1959.

The important place Glengarry Ayrshire men play on the Canadian scene is reflected in the fact Mr. Watt is the third of our county breeders to hold the presidency of the national association in recent years. John McLennan, of Martintown, preceded him by a few years; and Donald Cumming, of Cumming Bros., Lancaster, held the presidency a decade ago.

As with the Ayrshire breed in Glengarry, so have the Holstein men supplied breeding stock to the rest of the country, indeed to the continent and beyond. And our breeders have played a key part in raising herd standards. Though unfortunate enough to be resident in Stormont, rather than in Glengarry, Marland Murray, of Martintown, is even now a member of the national executive of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada.

Glengarry continues to furnish many of its finest people to the betterment of the nation as a whole. But they also serve who play out their lives in their native county; as witness the role our purebred dairymen are playing on the national scene.

Every Extra Year Of Schooling Pays Dividends

High School students next week will be starting the last term of the present school year and their approach to it may spell the difference between success and failure in the June examinations.

Promotion to a higher grade carries the encouragement to spend at least another year in school. Failure often results in an early end of education, especially in the case of boys, who may be anxious to quit the classroom for a job.

But jobs are not as easy to find in these days of high unemployment and it is becoming ever more evident that the higher one's education, the more certain it is that one will find and keep a good-paying job. More than 65 percent of the perennially unemployed, it is estimated, have no more than a grade school education and have not learned a trade. College graduates are seldom if ever without employment.

Parents who are worried about the school record of their teen-agers or who are having trouble keeping them in school might be well advised to take the dollar and cents approach in arguing the need for higher education. They might quote these statistics from an Institute of Life Insurance study to convince Bill or Jane that higher education pays rich dividends—

"Every year of high school adds \$16,000 to lifetime earnings. Each year of college adds an extra \$25,000 to these earnings.

Not Only South Africa Has A Color Bar

Canada's Prime Minister has been cast in the role of champion of human rights since the Prime Ministers' Conference in London when the Union of South Africa withdrew from membership in the British Commonwealth of Nations. Whether rightly reported or not, Mr. Diefenbaker is said to have played a decisive part behind the scenes in moving the Conference to condemn the South African government's policy of apartheid.

Matters of high level diplomacy are usually content to leave with the diplomats. We don't like South Africa's suppression of the individual rights of non-whites and if we were more familiar with the racial problem in that country we might even react just as Prime Minister Diefenbaker reportedly did at the Prime Ministers' Conference.

But we cannot reconcile Mr. Diefenbaker's role as the White Knight of the racially oppressed with the news, less than one week later, that his own government was forcibly separating a mother from her child.

Two days after our Prime Minister landed at Uplands Airport from this London Conference, a Chinese woman emplaned there for Hong Kong. She said goodbye to her father, a prosperous Ottawa food merchant, and to her two and one-half year old child, born while she was "visiting" in Canada, and so a Canadian citizen because of the fortunate fact of his birth here.

She was being deported after two years

of determined effort by the high brass of the Immigration Department because she came here as a visitor, and her age and color made it unlawful for her to stay as an immigrant. She goes to rejoin her husband and other children in Hong Kong, leaving her baby behind, undoubtedly because of her conviction he will have the chance for a better life in Canada than he could possibly have in crowded Hong Kong.

We can guess that baby was born in Canada because Mrs. Louie hoped to be able to have her husband and other children join her here after the fait accompli. But that hope was smothered in red tape.

The only Chinese allowed into this country as immigrants are those relatives of Canadian citizens or Chinese admitted here for permanent residence. Only husbands, wives and unmarried children under 21 are allowed in. If Mrs. Louie had not been married, had been 19 rather than 29, she might have stayed. But our Immigration laws said she was here illegally and must be deported, even though her father might have the means to bring her family here and pay their way to Canadian integration.

How reconcile Mr. Diefenbaker's concern with the cruel racial laws of South Africa, even to forcing its withdrawal from the Commonwealth, when his own government had two years in which to alter its own laws in favor of Mrs. Louie — but retained the role of the oppressor?

Not even Christian charity is permitted to seep through Ottawa's red tape.

Friday, April 7th, 1911

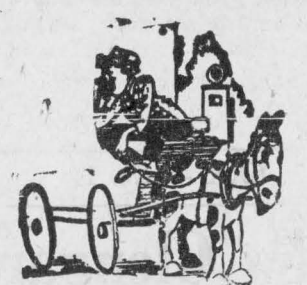

PROBLEM OF SPRING

In Spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love, according to the poets. Could be those fancies aren't the exclusive property of youth; but one item we adults appear to turn our thoughts to is dogs. And it isn't exactly our love for man's best friend that's being thought on.

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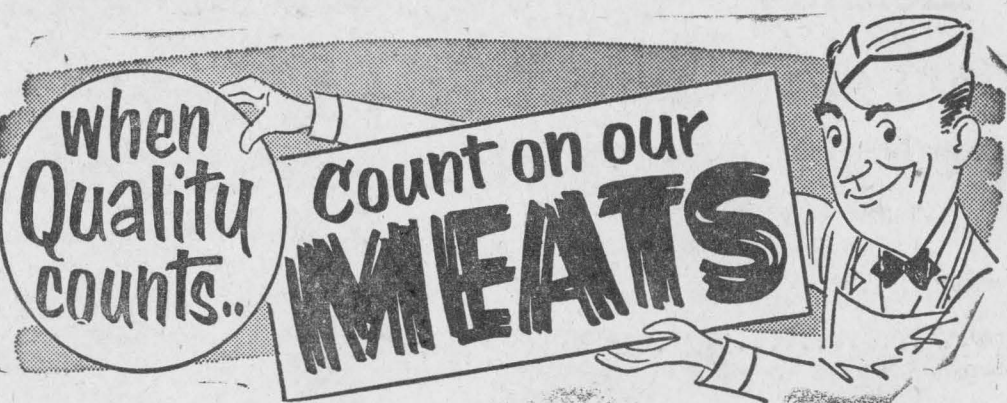

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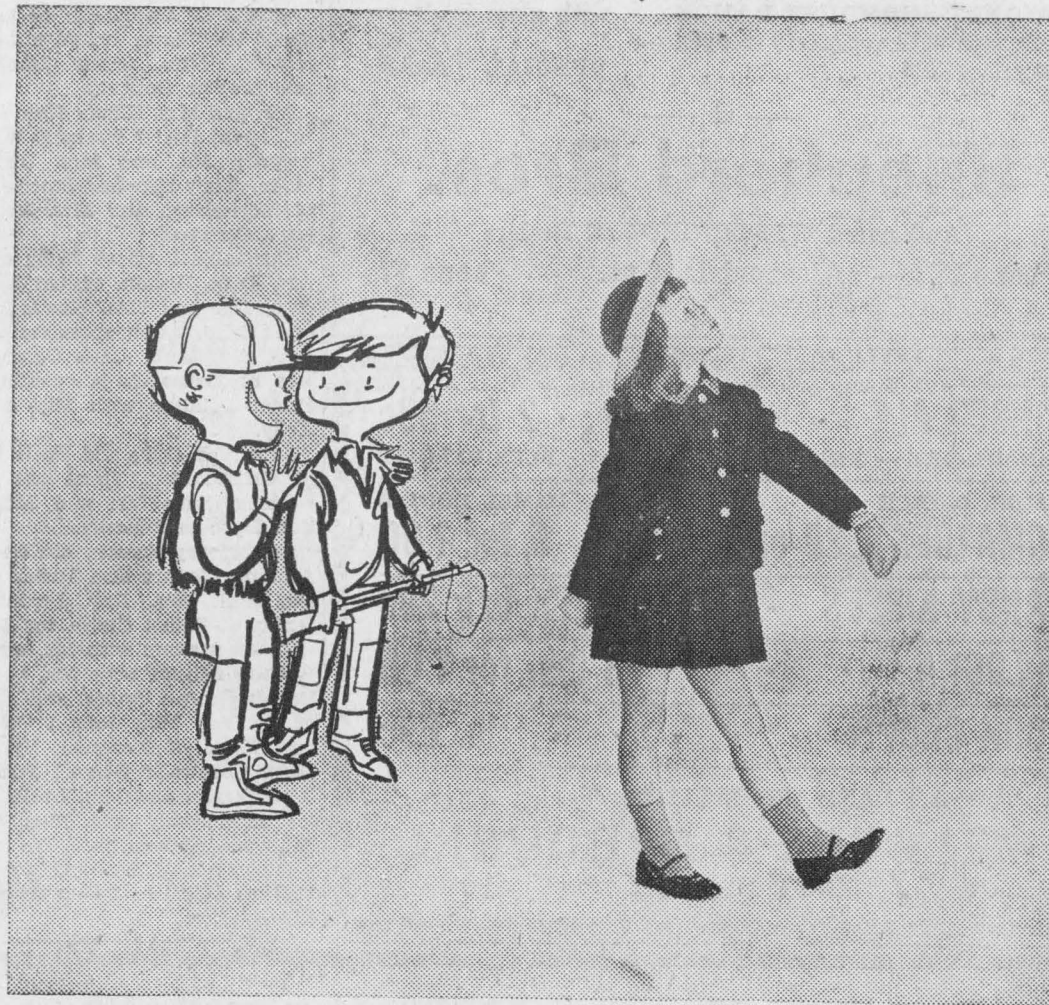

Owners of trucks are prohibited from carrying more than half the tonnage capacity of trucks or other vehicles on all township roads until such time as said roads are in a proper condition to warrant full capacity loads.
