## Martintown Block And Greenfield Area Home Destroyed By Fire In Last Days Of 1970

A drive for funds has been established to aid a Greenfield area couple who lost their home by fire and a benefit dance is planned for the owner of a business block at Martintown who lost heavily in the destruction of his property on the last day of 1970.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy McDonnell of Greenfield, were attending the funeral of a friend at 3 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 29th, when their 4th Kenyon home was destroyed. They lost all personal possessions and furnishings including what Mr. McDonnell describes as the finest collection of Glengarry songs extant.

Larry Lafave who recently moved from Martintown to Cornwall estimates his loss at \$35,000, only partly covered by insurance, in the destruction of the old Robertson block which he had recently modernized.

The Dec. 31st blaze which erupted at 5 a.m. left 10 people homeless and destroyed the restaurant operated by Mrs. Eva Lemieux as well as the area office of Eastern Breeders Inc. Losing all their personal effects and furnishings were Mr. and Mrs. Archie Willard and two children, Mr. and Mrs. Roger Demerchant and three children and Mrs. Lemieux. A large quantity of semen was lost in the office of Eastern Breeders.

Mr. and Mrs. McDonnell had just emerged from St. Catherine's Church following the funeral mass of Mrs. J. Isabel MacDonald when they were informed their home

was on fire. They have six adult children, all living away, but their son Neil who was home for Christmas holidays summoned Alexandria fire brigade.

Flames had engulfed the home by the time firemen arrived and the loss was complete. A veteran piper, Mr. McDonnell lost not only his song collection but his pipes and several other collections he prized highly. There was insurance on the home.

Louis Bray of Green Valley, with whom Mr. McDonnell is associated at Menard Construction, has loaned his personal house trailer which is now set up on the McDonnell property. Neighbors and friends have set up a benefit fund and donations may be left or sent to the Alexandria branch of the Royal Bank. J. Daniel MacDonald and Hugh McDougald are co-chairmen.

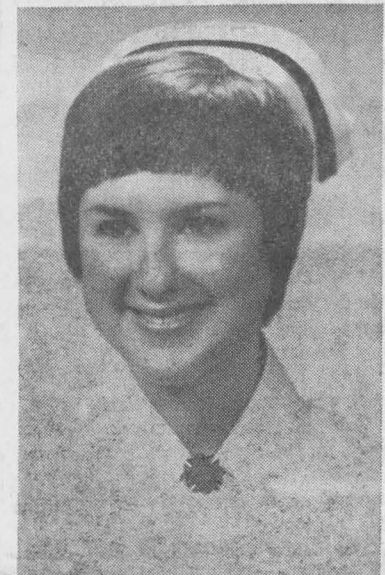
A benefit dance is being held at the Bonnie Glen Pavilion, Friday, Jan. 15th, in aid of Larry Lafave, who lost heavily in the destruction of his block at Martintown. His loss was only partially covered by insurance.

Martintown and Williamstown fire brigades battled the blaze which was discovered at 5 a.m. Dec. 31st. A babysitter in the adjacent home of Mrs. Elias Kitts noticed the fire and turned in the alarm. Firemen fought the blaze for four hours but could not save the two-storey brick structure which was built 112 years ago by Duncan Robertson and had been completely modernized.

## St. Eugene Branch Robbed Again

For the second time in three months, the St. Eugene branch of the Bank of Montreal was hit by robbers Dec. 23rd. Two masked men armed with rifles took all the available cash, some \$9,000 in the latest robbery.

The same branch was hit in late September when \$24,000 was taken. Police arrested one of two robbers on that occasion.

## Lost Complete Herd Of Holsteins

Heavy loss, including a complete herd of 65 Holsteins, was suffered by William H. Van Den Oetelaar, 9th Lancaster, when his barn was destroyed by fire Wednesday morning. The loss included his bulk tank, milk house, pump, a new Ford tractor, corn picker and wagons.

One bull managed to get loose but lost to the flames were 65 head including 45 milkers and 20 heifers.

Mr. Oetelaar reports the fire erupted about 7.45 a.m. some 20 minutes after he had returned to the house after completing the chores. Heavy smoke prevented him from reaching the herd.

Alexandria fire brigade was called and the firemen were able to save three-quarters of the silo with its corn content. A hen house and pig pen were also kept from the flames.

The farm was previously owned by Arcade Trotter Alexandria.

The loss is reported partially covered by insurance.

## December Snow Four Feet Deep

Snow fell on 17 days in December, to a depth of 48 inches, reports George Hambleton, weather observer at Dalhousie Mills. This compares with only a 26-inch fall last December and a mere 2 1/2 inches in November 1970.

Total snowfall in 1970 was 100 inches, about average, but almost twice the 57 inches that fell on Glengarry in 1969. Heavier snows in 1970 were counterbalanced by below average rains which were seven inches less than normal.

December's coldest day was on the 22nd when the mercury dropped to -37 degrees. The high for the month was Dec. 1st's 52 degrees. These compared with a low of -23 in December '69 and a high of 39.

There was a variation of 127 degrees during 1970 with the high at 90 degrees and the low hitting -37. Mean temperature for the year was below normal with -30 or lower readings on four days of 1970.

## Expect To Save Leg Of Farm Youth

Doctors at Hotel Dieu, Cornwall, hope to save the right leg of Rickie Van der Byl, 15, of Lochiel, seriously injured in a farm accident, Monday.

Rickie's leg was drawn into the power take-off on the elevator while corn was being loaded into wagons. His brother Adrian, 16, managed to stop the tractor and the youth was rushed to Glengarry Memorial Hospital, here, for emergency treatment. He was later transferred to Hotel Dieu.

Rickie is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Van der Byl of Lochiel.

Predeceased by her husband, Allan MacDonald, she is survived by two daughters, Edna, Mrs. Adrien Filion of Alexandria and Joann, Mrs. Glendon McDonnell of Greenfield, and by one son, Keith of Westport. Six grandchildren also survive.

## Inaugural Meeting Of Council To Ask For Location Of Driver Examiner In Alexandria

### Wants All Streets Paved In 1971

"In 1971 I would like all streets in Alexandria to be paved", declared Mayor J. P. Touchette in outlining his hopes and aspirations to council in his inaugural address. "This is a question of justice and fairness", he added.

Having been granted the privilege of federal incentives, I would like our new industrial chairman to announce the acquisition of four new medium-sized industries, was his second aspiration.

Another recommendation of the mayor is that the size of council be cut to five or seven members from the present nine. This will be discussed later, he declared.

Our Main Street paving and storm sewer project will commence May 1st, he announced, and Mayor Touchette will recommend that one street be redone each year, starting in 1972.

He outlined the various projects now underway or to be commenced including the enlargement of sewage lagoons, improvement of the filtration plant, the library, youth centre complex, the new fire hall and dismantling or sale of the old one.

Paying warm tribute to those members of last year's council who were retiring, he asked for harmony on the new council. "Working together as one we can guide our fair town to new heights of prosperity, he concluded.

## Businessman's Death In Snowmobile Accident Marred New Year's Here

Business manager at Glengarry Memorial Hospital and co-owner with his wife of the Prince & Princess Boutique, here, Leonel Beaupre met a tragic death at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon on Highway 34, south of the Brown House.

Mr. Beaupre, 36, was struck by a car and instantly killed when he jumped from a snowmobile on which he was a passenger. Police surmise Mr. Beaupre fell off or tried to jump to safety as the snowmobile emerged from the 4th Con. Charlottetown side road.

He was standing in the north lane when hit by the oncoming car driven by Germain Sauve, 44, of North Lancaster.

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He married Lyse Marleau of St. Bernardin, who survives with the two children. Also mourning his loss are his mother, one brother Roland of St. Raphael's and two half brothers, Gerard Latreille, Lancaster and Fernand Latreille, Montreal.

The largely attended funeral was held Tuesday at 3 p.m. from the Morris Funeral Home to Sacred Heart Church where the funeral mass was celebrated by Rev. Patrick Breton assisted by Rev. Claude Halle. Rev. Maurice Lariviere officiated at the graveside in St. Raphael's cemetery where the burial took place.

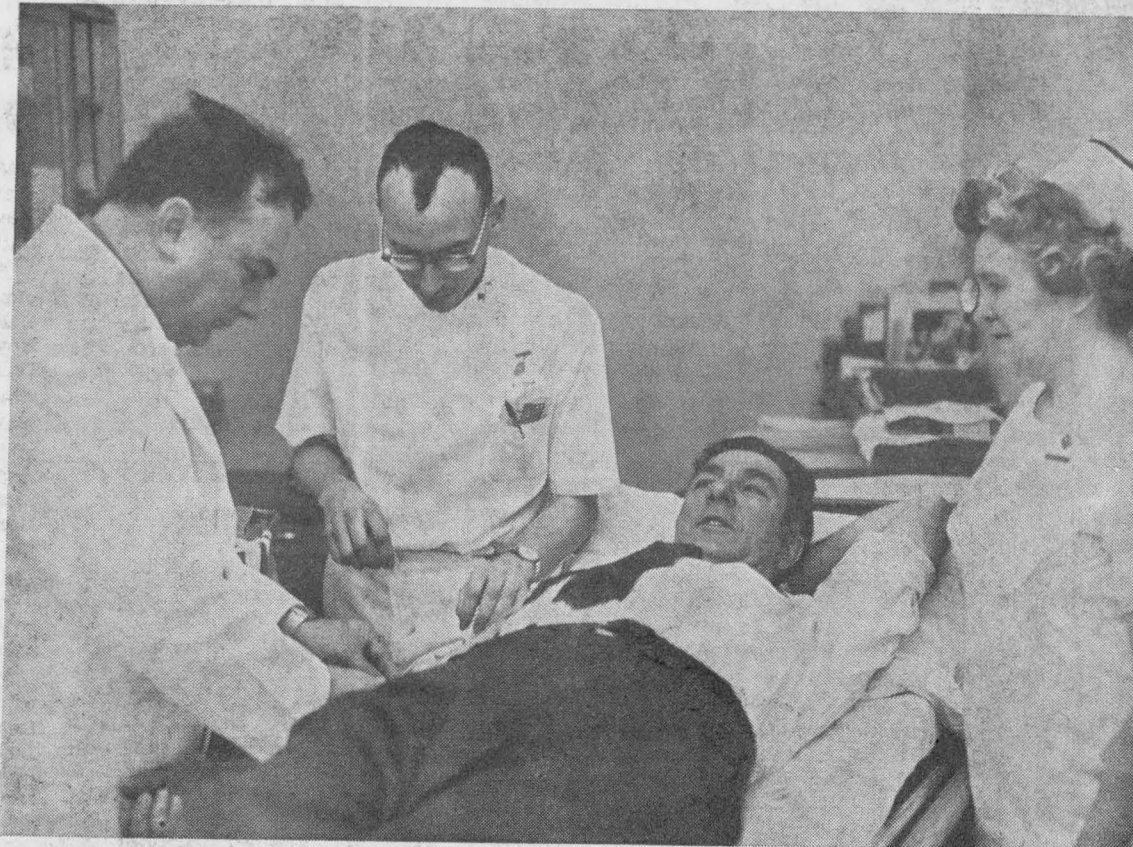

# EDITORIAL

## IT'S OUR OPINION

### We Have It Soft

Our Christmas gifts included the four volume History of the English-speaking Peoples by Winston Churchill and a week away from the office routine provided an opportunity to get into some worthwhile reading. That greatest of British statesmen boasted a pen as easy flowing as his oratory and his history promises a delightful excursion through the centuries of developing civilization right down to the close of the Victorian era.

Already we have travelled with Winston through his first book, the Birth of Britain and have seen the gradual evolution of Parliament as the ideal of individual liberty was wrung from absolute monarchies. The birth pangs were cruel and long lasting as successive invasions of Picts and Scots, the Vikings, the Roman Legions and the Normans ravaged the land and its Saxon serfs.

The War of the Roses, pitting York against Lancaster in the 15th century, was but a continuation of carnage in those strife-torn centuries during which the English people were pawns in power struggles between factions contesting the throne. Through all this bloodshed and battling for power Churchill traces the slow but steady growth of responsible government and English Common Law. What evolved then is now basic throughout the English-speaking world.

We look forward to his recording of the history of four more centuries in the

three remaining books for his Birth of Britain has already provided a calmer perspective from which to view the modern scene. Such a reminder of the primitive, strife-torn world from which our modern society has evolved leaves one more conscious of how fortunate we are to be living in this day and age.

Creature comforts were few, even for kings, a few centuries ago. Security was unknown for serf or commoner who relied on the charity of their liege lords for food and shelter. Those who held positions of power knew it only as long as their strong sword arms could protect them. King or cardinal could lose his head to the chopping block at any moment depending on the course of intrigue in the struggles for power.

There was no security for life or limb, much less for tenure of property before responsible government evolved through those tempestuous centuries in England. The realization of this form of government we inherited, should make us zealous to preserve it for generations to come. Churchill's history of the English-speaking peoples has already reminded this reader how fortunate he is to be entering the new year 1971 in this country called Canada. Our problems are puny, our comforts and conveniences a paradise we would not trade for the crown of Henry or Richard.

May you, too, relish the advantages we enjoy, right through this new year.

### Is There Chance Of Change?

Ontario will be going to the polls in this year of 1971, it seems almost certain. Premier John Robarts announced his decision to resign in early December and a new leader of the Conservative Party in Ontario will be chosen February 12th at Toronto to take over the reins of power now in Conservative hands over a period of 27 years. There is little doubt but that the new Party leader will call an election in early or late summer.

More than a quarter-century of government by one Party under a succession of leaders is inordinately long and far from healthy. This wealthiest province of Canada has continued steady growth, it is true; but progress seems inevitable for Ontario and there is no knowing how much better or worse we would now be had there been a few housecleanings at Queen's Park over those 27 years.

Education Minister William Davis apparently has the inside track in the leadership race and political prognosticators see him donning the mantle of leadership to succeed Mr. Robarts as Premier of this province. We doubt he has made many friends or admirers in rural Ontario through his education portfolio and if Mr. Davis leads the Conservative Party into an election there is the possibility of Liberal gains where the farm vote still has strength.

If Liberal Leader Robert Nixon is capable of mounting a campaign that will appeal to the concessions and the new NDP Leader, Stephen Lewis makes gains in urban ridings there could be in prospect a minority government with any one of the three parties in the driver's seat. That might be a good thing for a Legislature too long under the thumb of one Party.

### It Could Have Been Worse

As is our custom at the beginning of a new year we have glanced over the 1970 News file in order to assess the year just past as it affected the Glengarry scene. As usual the news was both good and bad. Happy and sad reports were carried in our columns.

One of the saddest stories reported the loss by fire of historic St. Raphael's Church in August. In the category of bad news might also be listed the ban on commercial fishing in the St. Lawrence that disrupted the livelihood of fishermen and marina operators along the Lake St. Francis front. In the same area cottagers on Stanley Island and Tree Haven had their summer spoiled through the militant occupancy of St. Regis Indians intent on reclaiming islands they feel are part of their reservation.

Year-end also brought the news the CNR planned further curtailment of local service, with removal of agents at Maxville and Alexandria and the substitution of railiners for most of its passenger trains on the Ottawa-Montreal run. Announcement that the See of Alexandria would be removed to Cornwall was also a blow to Alexandria where an entire block is diocesan property.

Each issue inevitably carried its quota of obituary reports as death continued to take its toll of the older generation. Death by accident had its tragic victims too, but there was a heartening drop in traffic fatalities. Of the dozen who died by accident only six were highway deaths and injuries suffered in traffic appeared to be fewer, too. Perhaps the threat of the breathalyzer was a factor in cutting the highway toll.

Offsetting the bad, surely the best news of the year was that received by an Alexandrian in Ottawa. Miss Claudette Larocque was the lucky winner of \$125,000 in Quebec's lottery. Another happy time was the gathering of friends of Father Ewen in August to mark his 60th year as a priest.

Good news at Apple Hill was the arrival of its new doctor to occupy a new medical clinic and there was the promise of employment in the purchase of Apple Hill Dairy by the J. M. Schneider Co. Ltd. of Kitchener. Lancaster gained a twice-weekly dentist and the promise of a doctor in April. The village also gained a stay of execution when the Ontario Department of Highways promised to re-study its plan to cut off Main Street traffic in building a railway by-pass.

Business may not have been booming in Alexandria but we were fortunately free of much of the unemployment that plagued other areas of the province and country. Only 13 new homes were started in 1970 and

half of the spending on new construction was for civic projects. Now underway, the improvements to the filtration plant promise an adequate water supply this year and we can look forward to newly surfaced highway links on Main and Kenyon St. West in 1971.

We have a new Post Office and the old building is to be used for a library, police offices and to house the Drop-In Centre started last year. A new corps of majorettes made its first appearances and sparked a Lions Club Walkathon that earned \$3,000 in October. An Alexandria Horsemen's Association was formed as riding took on a rebirth and the Flying Club laid out a new landing field one mile east of town. Family Court sittings were started in Alexandria in March.

On the sport scene we got a kick out of our contribution to Ottawa Rough Riders, Ivan MacMillan, who made good with his field goals and converts. A strong McCrimmon team dominated senior soccer but 450 were playing the game, even more than a successful minor hockey set-up involved. Hockey reached its highest fan fervor in News Cup play when Glengarry was split across the middle in North-South competition that was uncommonly spirited.

On the business front demand continued strong for Glengarry property and the real estate market remained brisk. Hope & Touchette Developments topped off another busy year of buying and selling with the purchase of Menard Construction Ltd. at Green Valley. Georges Lanthier's Alexandria Bakery increased volume and extended its area west to Brockville while Glengarry Transport Ltd. continued its steady expansion. Maxville had plans for a new Post Office building.

Weatherwise Glengarry knew an unusually dry spring that cut the normal hay yield but a bountiful corn harvest was delayed by extra heavy rains in the fall. A warm, almost snowless November gave way to a wintry December of record snow falls. An average year for farmers was plagued by rising prices but there was some solace in the 25 per cent tax rebate on farm property granted by Queen's Park as the result of a threatened education tax strike.

If we can believe Prime Minister Trudeau's statement at year's end that "inflation has been licked", we should be entering this new year with some degree of confidence. Our warm good wishes go with you; and the hope that at the close of 1971 you may look back on a year that was better than the last.

The tragic death of an Alexandria man in a snowmobile accident over the weekend marred the holiday atmosphere and emphasized the hazards involved in operating snowmobiles on roads or streets. Father of two and a highly regarded citizen, Leonel Beaupre never returned from what was meant to be a delightful outing.

He was one of six who died in snowmobile accidents in Eastern Ontario over the holidays and all fatalities occurred on roads. More than 50 died during December across Canada while riding snow sleds and in most cases cars were involved.

The waste of his promising young life should point up the fact that snowmobiles are not designed for use on highways or streets. They travel at worm level but a much faster pace that leaves no visible safety zone for avoiding dangers ahead.

Government may have to ban these vehicles from all roads and streets. They can be a source of healthy family recreation and it would be preferable if all owners of snowmobiles decided to regulate themselves in the name of safety.

You and a thousand other residents of the area no doubt received this obnoxious piece of filminflammy in your Christmas mail and did not its honey-sweet tone leave you nauseous? "Watch your mailbox! We asked our computer who in the Alexandria area should be selected to receive 6 lucky numbers in the NEW 1971 Reader's Digest "Happy Times" sweepstake and it replied promptly."

That friendly computer gave them our name and so we have 6 lucky numbers in our sweepstakes "bankbook". How corny can Reader's Digest get?

It's the Post Office or some other department of government that should be watching our mailbox and preventing such trash from reaching us. 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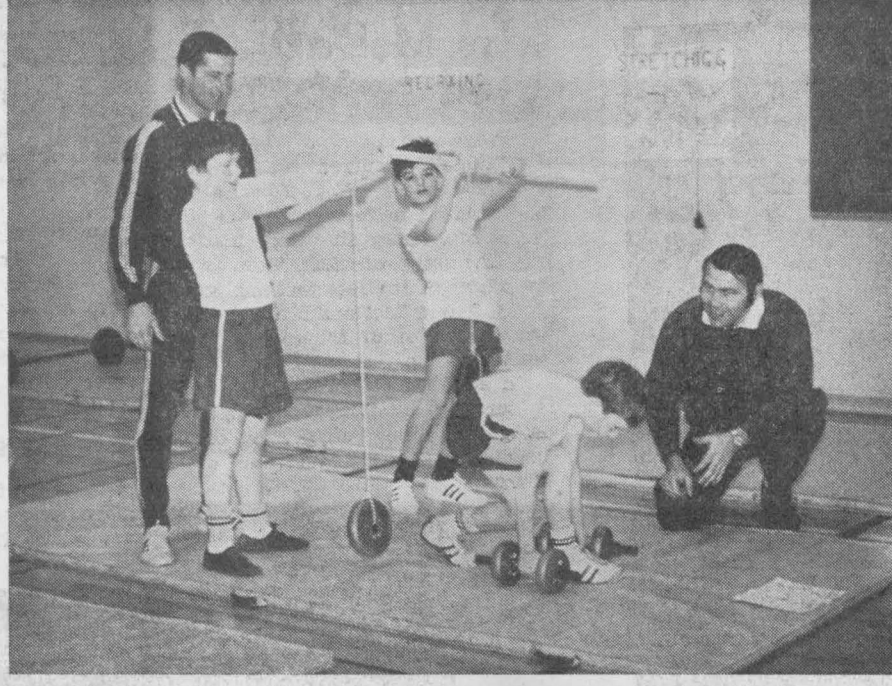
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## Hockey School Here Over Holidays Attended By 51 Young Enthusiasts

The first hockey school ever to be held in Alexandria and the only mid-winter school held in the Ottawa-Montreal area spanned the Christmas holiday here for 51 eager little hockey enthusiasts.

"A hockey school this time of year has distinct advantages over the summer type," said instructor Brian Gilmour, hockey coach of McGill Varsity. "The children are already playing hockey so are in condition, then they go back to

their teams and immediately put into practice what they have learned."

In addition to Coach Gilmour were Ken Ross, Assistant Varsity Coach at McGill; Paul Arsenault, head coach at St. George Williams University and Jean Yves Jeaurond, Physical Education Instructor at Glengarry District High School.

A native of this area, Mr. Gilmour expressed satisfaction at being able to give the children here a chance to get the same opportunities open to those who live in larger centres. He had worked during the year with the track coach of the French National Team and has adopted some of his training techniques, the ones used on the Russian and European hockey teams with more emphasis on the scientific aspects of the game and less on the rough concept.

The schedule ran from 8.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. with ice sessions held at the arena and the blackboard instruction, film viewing and gym exercises held at GDHS.

On the ice all the boys were taught the fundamentals, skating, puck control, shooting, passing and receiving, team play and strategy and the older ones spent more time on power plays, penalty killing, offensive and defensive responsibilities. In the gym they were put through a conditioning program to develop their muscles. Using gym equipment and bar bells they practised sit-ups, wrist rolls, agility run, rope climbing and about two dozen different types of exercises, each designed to develop a particular muscle. Here too they practised speed and accuracy, shooting pucks off a plywood base at a stationary and moving target.

"We tried to immerse the boys in hockey mentally and physically," claimed the instructors, "we selected a variety of activities to develop the individual skills and physical co-ordination necessary to develop hockey players; by having them concentrate on each skill we

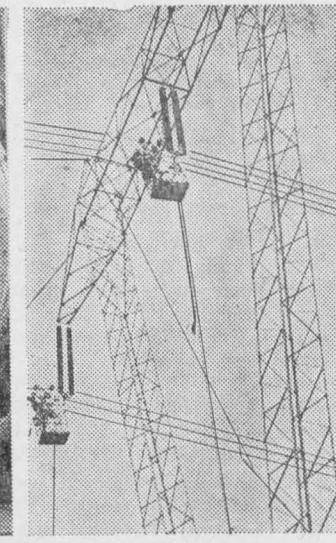
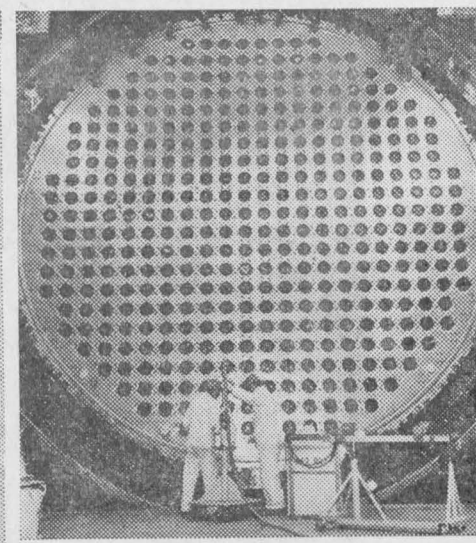

## BASIC HERDS

H. R. McGrogan, Canfarm Tax Consultant, suggests that the White Paper on Income Tax indicates that the Basic Herd concept will become obsolete. However, it states that the fair market value of an established basic herd at the beginning of the new system will be tax exempt. This means that when the herd is sold, the basic herd portion will be considered as a tax free inventory and will be deductible from the selling price. Because of this future tax saving, it is very important that every farmer who is eligible should have a basic herd established. Also, every farmer who has applied for a basic herd in prior years should make sure that his records and those of his District Taxation Office agree as to the number of basic herd animals.

If you have not yet established a basic herd, you should do it immediately. The time is fast approaching when your right to establish a basic herd will be lost.

## ESTABLISHING A BASIC HERD

The problem most farmers face when applying for a basic herd is to prove that they had "X" number of animals on hand at

the time they started in business or on January 1, 1947, if they were farming on that date. Some of the sources where this information may be obtained include purchase agreements, mortgages and chattel mortgages, wills and gifts, bank loan forms, National Livestock Records or Breeders Associations and Health of Animals Branch, Canada Department of Agriculture.

If it is not possible to establish accurate numbers of animals from the previous sources, the following information might help.

1. A letter from the Vet who looked after your animals during your first years in business.
2. The size of your farm and the stabling capacity of your barn.
3. A letter or affidavit from a neighbor who was familiar with your operations.

4. A Department of Health or City Milk Inspector's report for 1947 or subsequent years.

5. If in the year you started farming, you had a loss due to the purchase of animals and this loss was not absorbed by the other income of the year or by profits in subsequent years, you might be able to have this non-assessable loss year adjusted by deleting the

expense of the purchased animals. They would then qualify as basic herd animals.

When you have obtained as much information as possible, you should prepare a short summary of your farming operations, complete the basic herd application form, go to your District Taxation Office and discuss your case with an official there.

## DO NOT ATTACH THE APPLICATION FORM TO YOUR INCOME TAX RETURN

Even though you do not have any positive proof or your evidence is not very strong, you should take what you have to the District Taxation Office. You might not be given the number of animals you request but even if you established a basic herd of only 20 animals it would be very much worthwhile and would represent a substantial tax saving in the future.

A basic herd application form can be secured from your post office, District Taxation office or from the Dept. of Agriculture and Food, Alexandria, where we keep a few for convenience. There are only two basic questions to answer on a very simple form. The problem is to obtain proof of ownership and only the herd owner can do this.

We are concerned about some of the rather exorbitant fees some people have paid to persons representing themselves as tax authorities to perform this task and in the end, never really obtaining a basic herd. Remember you haven't a basic herd until you receive a letter granting same, for a definite number of animals, from your Taxation Office.

Much reading is like much eating — wholly useless without digestion!

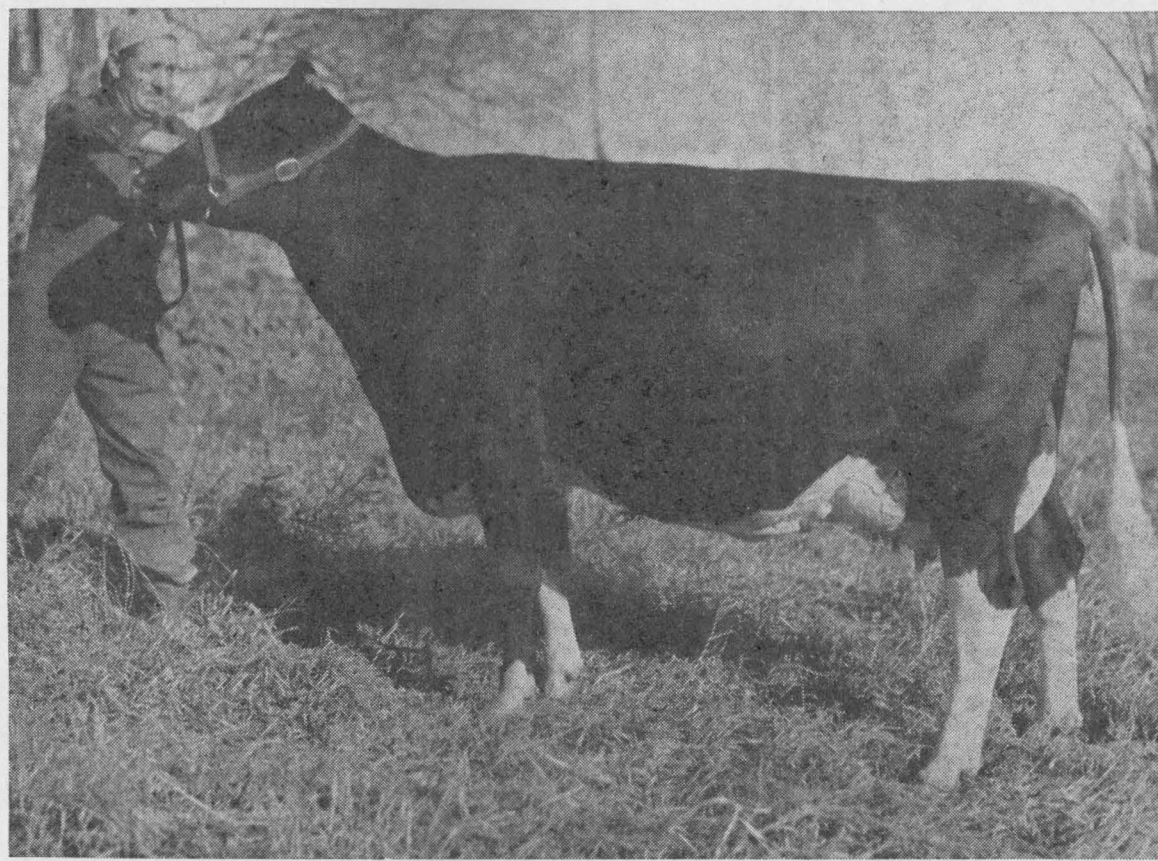

Co-Op Annual At Vankleek Hill  
Hears Sales Increased In 1970

The annual meeting of the United Co-operatives of Ontario, Glen-Pres Group was held on December 10, at the VCI. Cafeteria with seventy-five guests in attendance.

Following the welcoming address by Board chairman Murray Allen, the Councillor's report was given by Allan Barton, vice-chairman of the board and the manager's report by K. Claude Van Cleef.
