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Char-Lan High School Girls Injured In Fall While Decorating Gym

Three girl students at Char-Lan District High School were injured, one seriously, in a fall to the gym floor, Tuesday night, while engaged in decorating for a Christmas dance.

Rhona McDowell, head girl in the school, was most seriously injured in the fall. She suffered a broken pelvis, cracked ribs and head injuries but is reported in improved condition in Hotel Dieu, Cornwall, where she was rushed. She is a daughter of Allan E. McDowell of

Williamstown, secretary-treasurer of the Char-Lan school board.

Linda MacDonald and Audrey Grant were also conveyed to hospital but their injuries were of a less serious nature and Linda was allowed to return home.

A fourth girl involved in the fall, Linda Gordon, escaped injury.

The girls were reportedly standing on a metal scaffolding when it over-balanced plunging them to the floor.

A Champion's Plow For The Glengarry Museum

One of Glengarry's top plowmen of a generation ago, John M. Fisher of Bainsville, has donated his National gang plow to the Glengarry Museum at Dunvegan. Clarence and Carman MacMillan, earlier this month delivered the plow to the museum facilities and Mrs. MacMillan, chairman of publicity for the Glengarry Historical Society, supplies a record of accomplishments of Mr. Fisher and his plow.

Taken from the October 15, 1926, issue of the Massey-Harris News, published at Toronto, the article is entitled "Glengarry Ploughman". It followed on Mr. Fisher's winning of the T. H. Lennox Cup for best two-farrow plowing at Niagara Falls in that same year.

We quote: "The Massey-Harris No. 8 National Gang Plow and Mr. John M. Fisher of Bainsville, Ont., have established a fine record for outstanding performance at plowing matches in the East.

With this plow Mr. Fisher has won no less than 20 prizes, among which was the Gold Medal at St. Anne's, Que., in 1920 for the best plowed land over all other plows. Mr. Fisher and the Massey-Harris No. 8 National Gang Plow have never been defeated at a Provincial Match, they having taken first place at every Provincial Match in which they competed.

Sale Of Glengarry Telephone Co. Ended Almost 60 Years Of Area Service

Almost 60 years of service by first the Glengarry Co-operative, and after 1917 by the Glengarry Telephone Co. Limited ceased in 1966 when the Company was sold to the Bell Telephone of Canada. J. J. McCormick, manager, has provided us with this brief review of Glengarry Telephone.

The first meeting was held in the Town Hall, Alexandria, June 4, 1907.

The first president was Peter Chisholm, who was connected with the Company till 1942; M. J. Morris was secretary-treasurer and manager; J. J. McMillan, McCrimmon and Dr. K. A. McLennan made up the Board.

By October of that year there were two circuits with a total of 10 telephones receiving service. The first office was in the Morris Bros. store at Lochiel. In 1913 Robert Hay took over as secretary and management with Peter Chisholm still president. At that time the office was supposed to operate from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. week days and 9 to 10 a.m. and 3 to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

In 1915 W. J. McKinnon took over as manager with continuous 24-hour service, a position he held till 1942 when J. J. McCormick became manager. He held the post until the sale of the Company this year. (Continued on Page 12)

Midnight Masses To Usher In Christmas In Both Local Parishes

Pontifical mass will be offered by His Excellency Bishop J. Aurele Plourde, DD, Apostolic Administrator of the diocese, in St. Fintan's Cathedral at midnight Christmas Eve. The rector, Msgr. D. A. Kerr will be high priest and Rev. Rhea Lebrun will be deacon of the mass.

Bishop Plourde will preach and there will be congregational singing, including Christmas hymns.

Masses will be at the regular Sunday hours on Christmas day in St. Fintan's—at 8 a.m., 10 a.m. and 4.30 p.m.

In Sacred Heart Church the midnight mass at Christmas will be sung by the pastor, Msgr. Cyrille Contant, assisted by Rev. Rhea Bisailon. There will be congregational singing of Christmas hymns in French, led by Rev. Paul Lapierre, and Hubert Contant will sing as a solo "Minuit Chretien". Paul E. Viau will be at the organ.

There will be no afternoon mass in Sacred Heart Church on Christmas but regular morning masses will be at 7, 8, 10 and 11.15 a.m.

At New Year's there will be no midnight mass in either parish and the Sunday schedule of masses will be followed at St. Fintan's. In Sacred Heart Church, however, there will be no afternoon mass.

Manitoba Now Has Its Ombudsman

The Manitoba Government has given the people of that province a tangible Christmas present, an ombudsman who will be their protector against the injustices of other government officials. He is Canada's first such defender against ever-growing bureaucracy and the fact of his appointment suggests that Manitoba's civil service remains more civil than that of any other province or the Ottawa scene.

The bigger governments become the more frequently they tend to infringe on the private rights of the citizen. The more difficult it becomes for the individual to cut through the morass of red tape with which public officials enwrap their decisions, the more need there is for a public defender to whom Parliament or the Legislature has given authority enough to deal with injustice to the individual citizen.

The government at Ottawa has been toying with the idea of a federal ombudsman who would have the duty and authority to hear anyone's complaint against officialdom and set it right where justified. The Robarts' Government in Toronto, and other provincial Legislatures, also have debated such an appointment but Manitoba is the first to act.

There are provisions in the Manitoba legislation that might be improved when and if Premier Robarts sees the need for an ombudsman. In Manitoba the aggrieved citizen must lodge his complaint through his

representative in the Legislature. The member, in turn, will pass it on to the ombudsman and if a reasonable time elapses without any action the citizen may approach any other member of the Legislature.

This may save face for the representative but we prefer the system in Scandinavian countries, where the ombudsman came into being. There the citizen may go directly to the ombudsman with his complaint.

More serious in the Manitoba legislation is the passage that prevents the ombudsman from investigating matters covered by tribunals or quasi-judicial bodies. Perhaps he should steer clear of court decisions; but these are not courts. Frequently they are set up by government departments to hear appeals against their own actions. It is here that the citizen may be most likely to suffer an injustice.

Manitoba has taken the first step in providing a public defender against the decisions of ever-growing government bodies. For that Premier Roblin must be given credit.

If and when Premier Robarts, or Prime Minister Pearson at Ottawa, makes a similar appointment we trust the ombudsman will have power to cut through every department of government. We should be striving for a society in which no citizen feels aggrieved because of his treatment by public servants.

Satisfaction Guaranteed

If Christmas continues a very special time of the year much of that extra enjoyment must stem from the fact that this is a time for giving. Other holidays we may selfishly enjoy for the mere break from routine or the opportunity they may provide for change of scene or face.

Christmas gives us these, and gifts, too; tokens of affection which are warming. At no other time in the year can we expect our fellowmen to so show their spirit of goodwill as to light the outdoor darkness with welcoming, warming color.

This is a colorful face of Christmas we all enjoy, as we treasure more personal gifts. But the high point of this holiday comes not with the receiving, but the giving. It is in the giving that we reap a real sense of satisfaction and if you would relish this yuletide in a special way look with a generous glance beyond the circle of family and friends.

If you would like to get a bit of extra enjoyment out of this Christmas try broadening the horizon of your gift list. Without

too much seeking you may find some person, institution or family whose Christmas threatens to be bleak. It may be a solitary soul, a family group not even receiving the bare essentials from welfare, much less the toy that brings Christmas joy.

Service clubs and church groups catering to the needy at Christmas deserve your generous support. Contribute to these worthy causes by all means. But play Santa Claus yourself if you would know the true enjoyment Christmas offers us all. Look about you; if you see someone whose prospects for this yuletide seem less satisfactory than the average, add your personal touch. A smile or greeting may suffice; if there are children a trinket could teach you that the joy of Christmas is never to be seen as clearly as in the sparkling eyes of a child.

In the giving you will find that you have gained. This could be your best Christmas ever, if you but look about you and see that no one is being left out in the cold on this day that should be so filled with Christian love and warmth.

Parliament Keeps Losing Face

The government at Ottawa won another round last week in its almost continuous battle to have labor disputes settled without the actual necessity of using the power of legislation to end a strike. Air traffic controllers across Canada, due to quit their jobs on Tuesday and tie up all air traffic on the eve of Christmas, agreed late Friday to accept an average wage increase of 13 per cent offered by the government.

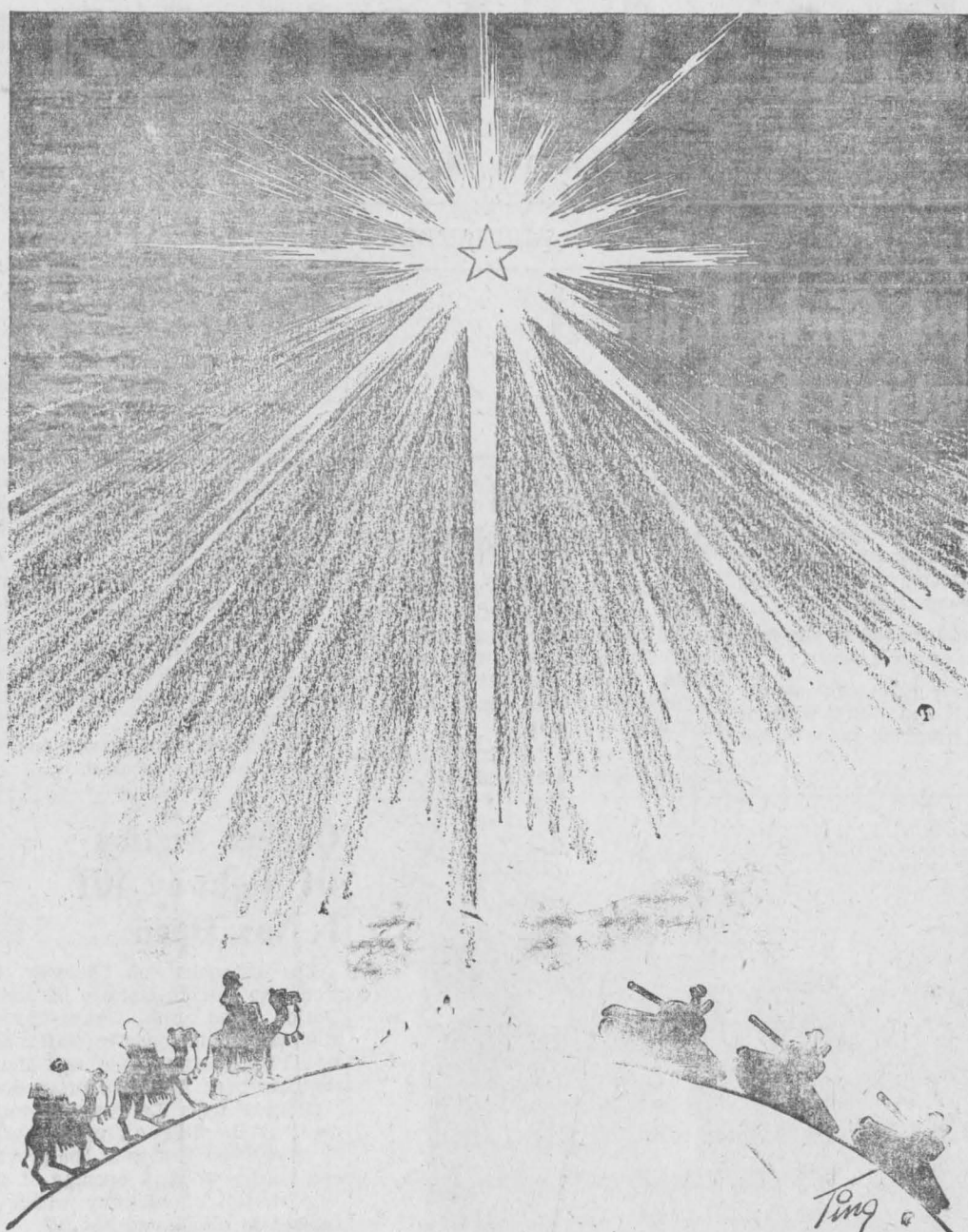
There will be no strike. Thousands of Canadians who had planned to fly home for Christmas will be able to do so if those plans have not already been revised because of the uncertainty of the strike threat.

The government has emerged in little more than a week with two such settlements and in doing so has further tarnished the image of Parliament. In its negotiations with the air traffic controllers, as with Montreal's mail truck drivers the previous week, government was countenancing blackmail at its most blatant and in doing so was

cheapening itself.

On the eve of Confederation's centennial year one is left wondering if the role of Canada's federal government was intended to be merely that of a mediator in labor disputes, most of them involving public employees. The last six months have seen a succession of such crises, in each one of which Parliament has become involved to the exclusion of almost any other public business. Each time government has muddled through with a compromise settlement that has added considerably to the public payroll and has encouraged other groups to take their turn at the trough.

All parties in Ottawa's minority Parliament would gain a measure of public respect if they showed enough gumption to outlaw all strikes involving public employees. Until they do the politicians will continue to lose face as they appease the organized, at the expense of every taxpayer.

Robertson, Conservative, lost by a margin of 268 votes. — "Cause of death, unknown", is the verdict of a Coroner's jury investigating the finding of a human skeleton in a Third Lochiel swamp recently. The remains have been almost certainly identified as those of Miss Catherine Boush of Montreal, whose relatives at one time lived in the vicinity. Finding of a man's silver watch at the scene has added another angle, but efforts of the Elgin Co. to trace the watch ended in Toronto. — H. Deagle, Ottawa Street, this week received a handsome new piano, the sale being made by Prof. Mulhern. — There is a fuel famine at the power house and as a result the electric light is shut off when the "powers that be" so decided each evening. Sometimes it is 11 o'clock, more often 10 o'clock.

By-law No. 192 of the Municipal Corporation of Alexandria, authorizing the council to borrow \$6,000 for additions and improvements to our water works system, was voted on, Saturday, and carried by a majority of 52. — Messrs. Hugh Munro and John McIntosh of the firm of Munro & McIntosh Co., have decided to utilize the steam of their engine for heating their respective residences. Pipes connect the engine with radiators in the houses and thus an even temperature is kept up all day. By-law No. 64 of the Village of Maxville will be voted on next Tuesday, the adoption of the by-law meaning the repeal of the local option by-law which has been in force there for the past three years.

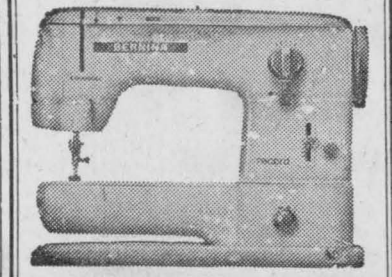

Seek Better Library Facilities At Avonmore

In a strong bid to improve library facilities here, Avonmore residents have petitioned Roxborough Township council to establish a public library under the Public Libraries Act.

The move is spurred by knowledge that all assets of "association libraries" will become the property of the regional library co-operative on Jan. 1 unless township council passes a needed by-law to form a township public library board.

The Avonmore Public Library association is an associate library with more than 2,000 books. Unless a by-law is passed, the local association will lose its government grant and regional library privileges.

It is now possible for small libraries to accept gifts of reference collections, valued from \$350. The villages of Moose Creek and Monkland also could receive such gifts if the by-law is passed.

A bookmobile service is expected to be available in the near future for small libraries. At present, 100 pocket books now may be had on loan, in both English and French, from the Ottawa Public Library. A borrower may request any book, from any source library, through the local library.

The Roxborough Junior Farmer's Association plans to buy former SS No. 12 public school at Moose Creek, and operate it as a library building.

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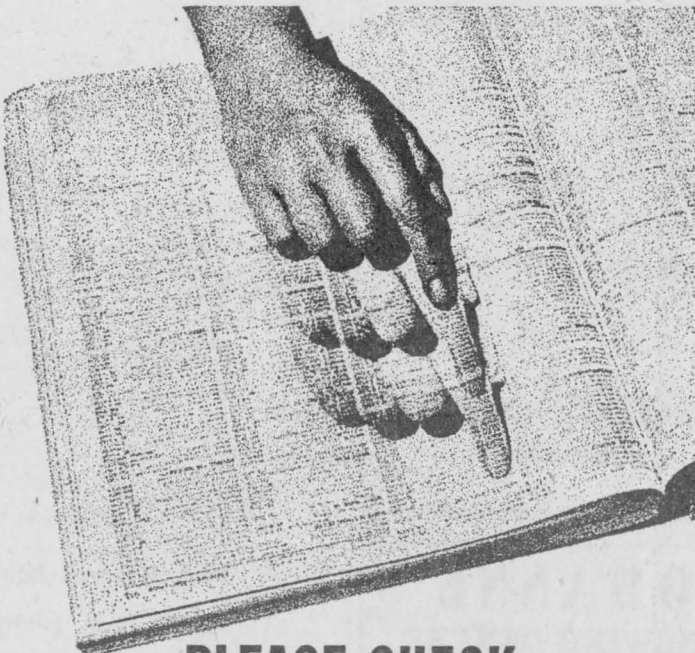
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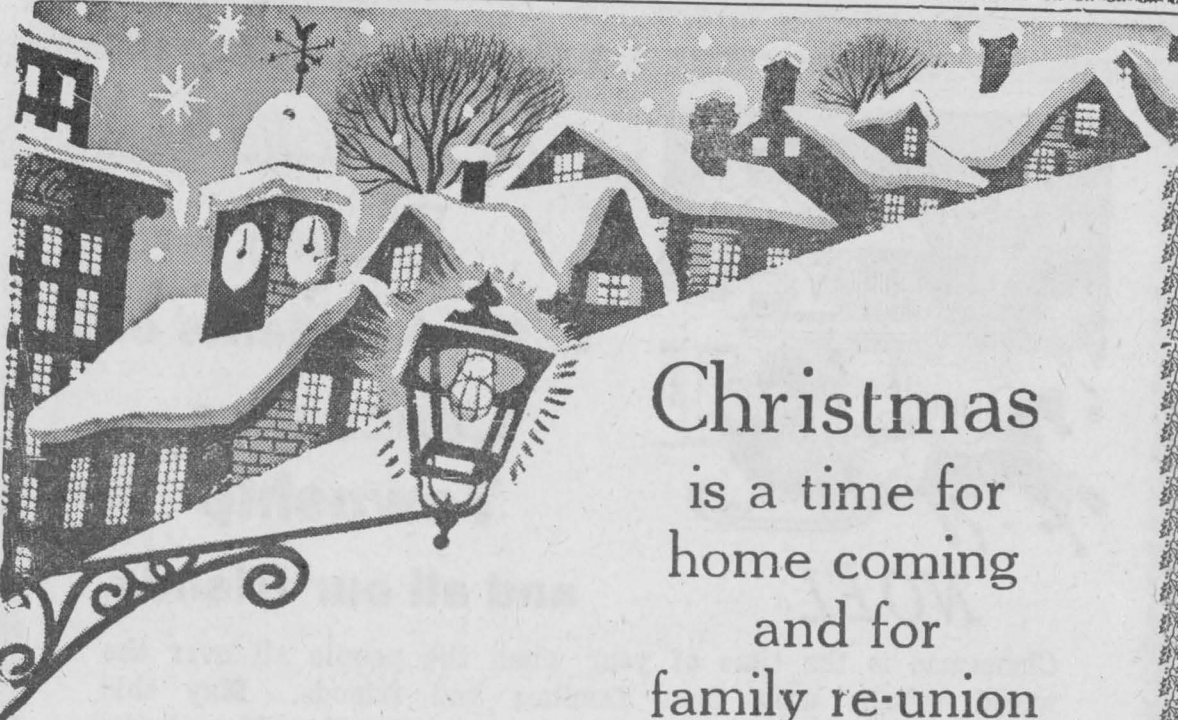

UNIQUE DECORATION

A unique Christmas decoration graces the decor, and adds charm to the entrance, of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Herb Graham on Maxville's Main Street South. It is a Della Robia Christmas Wreath from Boys Republic. This wreath-making began as a hobby in 1923 and it has grown into an important self-help industry through the years.

The wreath is a clockwise arrangement of pods and cones, foliage and flowers from various parts of the state of California.

At the conclusion of the Christmas season, Republic boys begin the collection and preparation of pods and cones for the next Della Robia Season. From below sea level in sun-flooded valleys to snow-capped mountains these boys gather the materials, to be dried, drilled and wired and then stored in great bins to await wreath-making time usually the first of December when the redwood foliage bases arrive from the north of San Francisco.

The clockwise arrangements are as follows: 12 o'clock, lotus pods and magnolia leaves; 1 o'clock, pine cones; 2 o'clock, Italian cyprus; 3 o'clock, teal; 4 o'clock, jacaranda pods; 5 o'clock, yucca; 6 o'clock, red winesap apples and lemons; 7 o'clock, flowering eucalyptus; 8

o'clock, eucalyptus; 9 o'clock, spiny liquidamber; 10 o'clock, cotton burs; and 11 o'clock, bottle tree pods from San Fernando Valley.
