

Glengarry Memorial Fund-Raising Campaign To Be Held Week Of October 10th

The fund-raising campaign of Glengarry Memorial Hospital will be held the week of October 10th, members of the special committee decided Tuesday. The drive had originally been scheduled for this month but was postponed until after the hectic holiday period.

Minimum objective of the drive will be \$200,000, needed to clear an indebtedness carried over from the building and equipping of the hospital. This will put the hospital in a better financial position to consider future expansion.

Wilfred Menard of Green Valley, is general chairman of the drive and Tuesday's meeting was held at his cottage on Lake St. Francis. Among those present were Board Chairman Lloyd McHugh and Hospital Administrator Eric Gale.

Joint chairmen of the house to house canvass, C. Campbell Fraser and Denis Ethier outlined plans they have formulated for coverage of the county. Two joint directors will be selected for each of the seven municipalities and they in turn will name joint captains for each polling subdivision. The captains will appoint canvassers to cover their areas, each team of

two to have a maximum of ten contacts to make.

Lloyd McHugh and Jean Paul Touchette were named joint chairmen of the special names committee which will contact industries and other potentially large donors.

There was discussion on publicity plans and it was decided a special office should be opened in Alexandria during the period of the drive to centralize organization and handle the paper work. Donations will be accepted both in cash and pledges over a period of years.

Administrator "Eric Gale reported hospital beds are at a premium and that day to day operations are running smoothly. In connection with the fund-raising campaign he pointed out that every hospital is community-sponsored. While major capital expenditures are met in part by government grants and cost of operation is now largely covered by the Ontario Hospitals Commission, there remain hospital costs which still must be met by the community at large.

Directors for each municipality are to be selected this week and they will be called to a meeting next Tuesday night to further organization of the drive.

Health Unit Nurses To Walk Off Job Unless Counties Council Negotiates

Some 30 public health nurses in Halton County and the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry will cease work on September 12th unless their Boards of Health will agree to negotiate.

Letters of resignation giving one month's notice were received last week by the employers, Ontario-Halton County Health Unit at Milton, and United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Health Unit, Cornwall.

Lloyd B. Sharpe, director of employment relations for the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario, said Monday the resignations were necessary to bring attention to the nursing profession's need for collective bargaining.

"We are having to use power to get the bargaining unit we want. This is distasteful but if it is necessary, we must use it," he said.

The Nurses' Association Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Health Unit was officially organized on April 7, 1966. Although the government had announced that Section 89 was to be repealed, the nurses decided not to apply for certification under the Labour Relations Act but to work for voluntary recognition.

In June, the two county nurses' association decided to work together. The President of each group and one other nurse constitute their negotiating committees: Halton County, Mrs. Flora I. Hesson and Miss Sarah L. Thorton, both of Oakville; Stormont-Dundas-Glengarry, Mrs. Eleanor MacLean of Finch, and Miss Millicent Maguire of Cornwall.

Miss Doris E. Gibney, Assistant Executive of the Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario, announced Monday that the nurses' professional organization is grey listing two employers of nurses in Ontario—Halton County Health Unit, Milton, and United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Health Unit at Cornwall. A substantial majority of the nurses employed in these Health Units resigned on August 11, 1966, giving their employers one month's notice.

Board Of Health Makes Statement

The Board of Health of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry has received notice of resignation from the following nurses employed by it: Fay MacKenzie, Marta Vent, Clara Mattice, Marjorie Urquhart, Jean McIntosh, Emilene Dion, Marlene Hough, Eleanor MacLean, Melicent Maguire, Marguerite Gregoire, Elizabeth Rose and Carolyn Vanhorne.

The Board regrets very much that these nurses have seen fit to take this action as this leaves the Board with three nurses, including the Supervisor. Undoubtedly, this will result in the Board having to curtail its Public Health Service.

The Board met Aug. 18, and after discussing the matter at some length, decided to defer any action until its next regular meeting which will be held early in September.

The Board feels that the salaries now being paid to the nurses are generous and above the Provincial average. The minimum salary for a graduate nurse is \$5,000.00, and the maximum is \$6,250.00. The average salary paid to the nurses is \$5,246.00. In addition to the salaries, the nurses receive the following benefits, 50% of which is paid for by the employer: Hospital Services, Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System Pension Plan, Group Insurance, and Physicians' Services.

The average salary for Public Health Nurses in this Health Unit in 1966 was \$3,142.00 per annum. The average salary effective in 1966 is \$5,246.00.

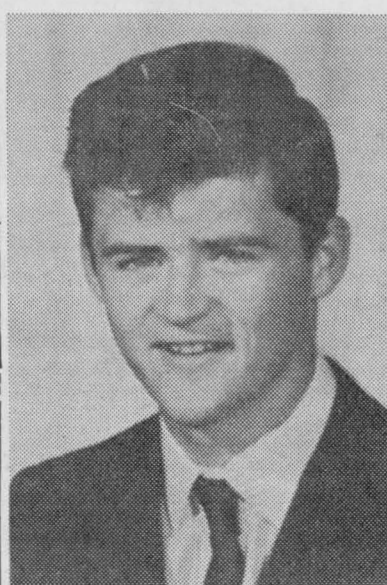
Escaped Serious Injury

Board To Hear Square C Appeal Of Assessment

Town Council has been advised by the Ontario Municipal Board that the appeal of the assessment of Square C Textiles will be heard by Board representatives in Cornwall on September 29th. The local industry had unsuccessfully appealed its heavy assessment to the Counties Board of Revision and then to the Counties Judge. The OMB is its court of last resort.

Claude Filion and B. Rosenblum, who is supervising construction of the new Stedmans store requested council, at Tuesday's meeting, to grant an exemption to the request of Fire Chief Albert Lauzon. In his fire inspector capacity, Mr. Lauzon had requested Stedmans to extend the south wall of its new store three feet above the adjacent Filion building in conformity with fire-wall regulations.

Mr. Filion pointed out that this would block windows and doors on the north wall of his building and he requested an exemption from council. While feeling the fire chief's request was quite in order, council passed the needed exemption.

Martin Clement, who is developing his acreage west of Main Street South offered to construct 1100 lineal feet of a 66-foot wide extension of the west boundary road by providing four feet of fill at a cost of \$5 a lineal foot. He pointed out that this road is required to give

access to the area south of Clement Street which will be used for residential and commercial purposes.

Kenyon Reeve Albert Faubert was also present and he declared his belief Kenyon Council would be willing to share the cost on a 50-50 basis because the road would serve both municipalities. He offered to arrange a joint meeting of the two councils to inspect the area before a final decision was reached.

Angus R. MacDonell and Lionel Aubin were present on behalf of the local Legion Branch to request the usual exemption from taxes for 1966. They requested council to give consideration to passing a by-law granting the exemption for a ten-year period as permitted by the Municipal Act. Council authorized the Clerk to prepare such a by-law.

The boundary roads maintenance agreement between Kenyon and Alexandria was approved and will be forwarded to Kenyon Council for processing.

On recommendation of the fire and light committee the PUC will be asked to proceed with installation of five lights on the east boundary road, south of Lochiel Street.

The clerk was instructed to advise parks personnel that the summer employment program will end August 31st. No supervision at the beach is planned after that date.

IT'S OUR OPINION

The School Plant Is Productive

An important plateau on the road to education has been attained by 34 students at Glengarry District High School. They have met in mortal combat with that monstrous Grade XIII bugbear and have earned the honours graduating diploma from the local school.

Now they will be leaving home, many of them in search of still higher learning, others to seek a place in the world of business. Some will be preparing themselves to be teachers or nurses, no doubt.

All are to be congratulated for having stuck it out through these restless teenage years. The teaching staff rates commendation, too, from the fact that thirty-four of the thirty-nine Grade XIII students eligible for the graduation diploma have been successful. There were sixty-four trying Upper School exams at the local school but many were taking only a few of the eleven subjects this year.

The school produced no Ontario Scholars this year, but several students had averages close to the required eighty per cent in eight subjects. Their fine showing should serve as an impetus to the new Grade XIII class starting in September, as well as to students in the lower grades.

The mere fact that sixty-four students were writing Grade XIII exams last June at Glengarry District High points up the new

emphasis on higher education and seems a justification for the board of trustees' planning for another large addition to the school plant. Children are staying in school longer and they are being offered a much wider field of learning than this writer's generation knew. In those days one stuck through Grade XIII only if one was university-bound. If there was no such goal the drop-outs started in Grade IX and gained momentum through the higher grades.

The Alexandria High we knew in pre-depression days had a total enrolment of less than one hundred and its Grade XIII did well to keep five students smart enough and economically able to contemplate a university course.

This is a different day, with a new emphasis on higher learning and an entirely new approach by higher echelons of government to the proposition of providing equal opportunities for all to prepare themselves for this age of automation and specialization.

We who pay the shot in heavy school taxes sometimes wonder if government is not overdoing this business of school plant. There is comfort though, in seeing an increasing number of our young attaining education heights that were beyond our reach.

What A Summer We're Enjoying

Glengarry's farmers have so much hay they don't know what to do with the excess. It's a complete switch from a year ago when drought seared our pastures and winter feed for cattle had to be brought in at sky-high prices.

This summer of 1966 hasn't been the wettest we can remember, but the refreshing rains came when they were most needed. Often they fell at night, as if timed by the clerk of the weather so as not to spoil attendance at a social or other event such as a scheduled game of golf.

We bring in that mention of golf merely to record the fact that our Glengarry Golf and Country Club is enjoying much the most successful season in its young history. Never have the fairways been so lush and green in mid-summer and we keep hearing from total strangers that this is one of the most challenging and prettiest lay-outs they've come across in all their years of golfing.

Don't take our word for it. Sam Dawson, from Pittsburgh, was out there Friday for a full day of 36 holes. He had to come back to Glengarry to see if the lay-out was as

fascinating as he had found it last year. He was, incidentally, visiting relatives; but that is only relative to the fact Sam thinks we have something special to lure the divot digger.

The golf course is drawing more and more Montrealers to Alexandria and this will be a record year for green fees, with which the one-day golfers enrich the club. Saturday set a new record when eighty-one visitors flooded onto the fairways to create an unusually crowded condition. Many of these no doubt dropped a few dollars downtown, too.

It's been a good summer down on the farm, and down on the golf course. Until we took up cow-pasture pool we'd never been so attuned to the farmers' need for rain and sun; those requisites for lush meadows and fairways.

The farmer no doubt looks forward to as fine a fall as he can complete his harvest and get his plowing done. The golfer, too, is hoping for weather warm enough to let him enjoy plowing up the occasional sod through September, and maybe even into November.

Grey Listing We Do Not Like

Just about everybody is looking for more income with which to keep pace with the rising cost of living so we should not be too surprised that even our public health nurses are adopting the strike weapon. It's the thing to do these days and why should this branch of the public service have qualms about walking off the job when others have gone so far as to cripple a province's hospital services in their insistence on having their collective demands met.

We are in no position to arbitrate this dispute and we have no opinion on whether the nurses are justified in their walk-out or the counties board of health has a case to argue. Actually we hear so little of the activities of the board of health we are left wondering if the health of United Counties residents will be seriously impaired by a curtailment of these services should the stalemate continue.

From the literature reaching our desk we gather that the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario is making a move to enrol the province's public health nurses under its protective wing. Perhaps other Ontario counties have already recognized this union, or mayhap the boards of health in Halton and these United Counties are the first to be pressured. We wouldn't know how the dispute reached our own doorstep.

We do see a similarity between this Registered Nurses Association and the powerful union of Ontario teachers that is also only nominally an "association". The nurses are using that grey listing technique that has proven such an effective instrument for blackmail with school boards. If the trustees are not co-operative, they get no teachers for the new term. Without teachers their schools are inoperable and so the Ontario Teachers Union, or whatever it's officially known as, reaps the benefits of Britannia's

old methods, divide and rule.

This is out and out blackmail and this we cannot approve, even though it is now the modus operandi of all unions. Organized Labor has been permitted to use every conceivable weapon to gain its ends and the white collar class has not been slow to see that only in unions is their strength enough to impress today's politicians.

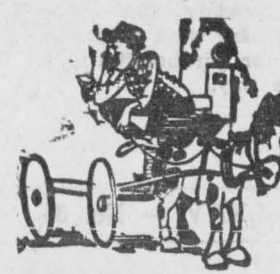
Whether they be recognized unions, federations of teachers, associations of nurses, or whatever the name, they should not have the power to infringe individual liberties. This unions are doing with the closed shop which forces a man to pay union dues or lose his job. This is wrong and so is the pink slip or the grey slip that blacklists a board of trustees or a board of health depriving them of all available sources of supply.

A new approach to labor legislation is badly needed and there must be some curbs to the use of the strike weapon if we are not to know complete chaos. There is no indication that our senior governments see the need, or that they would have the intestinal fortitude to dare the labor vote even given a situation where strikes were paralyzing the nation's business. We are close to that point now.

All residents of these United Counties have an interest in this latest strike of public health nurses. Director, Employment Relations, Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario, sent letters on behalf of both of the two county Nurses' Associations to their respective Boards of Health asking that a series of meetings be initiated to negotiate salaries and working conditions. On June 28th a second letter was sent, reiterating the request. As no satisfactory reply was received from either Board, further letters were sent on July 12th, advising that a majority of the nurses had signed letters of resignation and repeating the request that negotiations be started, thus avoiding the necessity of mailing the letters of resignation. As neither Board offered to negotiate, the letters of resignation were mailed on August 11, 1966. Before they were mailed, the situation was reviewed with the Ontario Department of Health.

Miss Gibney stated that the Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario fully supports the nurses in their efforts to obtain recognition and negotiate an agreement. Nurses are asked not to accept employment in these Health Units until the situations are resolved, and any nurse who inadvertently does so will be approached by RNAO and advised that resignation would be appropriate. However, both the RNAO and the two county Nurses' Associations are hopeful that negotiations will begin before September 12th, the effective date of the resignations.

Wilfrid Major To Open Bulk Fertilizer Plant Next Week

When Mr. and Mrs. Wilfrid Major hold the opening of their bulk fertilizer warehouse at North Lancaster Wednesday, August 31st, their staff will be giving guided tours to customers, visitors suppliers and other dealers explaining to their customers the handling of bulk fertilizer.

This brand new bulk warehouse is a unique operation, which will prove a labor saving for their customers, and Mr. Major notes he will be able to give extra savings that were impossible with bagged fertilizer.

On August 17th, 1959, Wilfrid Major bought this feed mill from his uncle. It then consisted of a hammer mill, plate grinder and two 1-ton mixers operated by a gasoline engine. All the feed was at that time handled in bags with the help of one man and service of a 1947 two-ton truck.

Mr. Major is proud to point out that from the beginning he has been connected with the Shur-Gain Division of Canada Packers Ltd., who supply only the concentrates and formulas to produce a complete line of Shur-Gain feeds, proven under Canadian conditions at their research farm at Maple, Ont., north of Toronto.

In 1961 Mr. Major made available bulk feed as an added service to his customers and today 25 percent of his feed sales are bulk.

Mr. Major has not stood still and waited for business to come to him; but has tried to keep his plant abreast of the times.

In 1960 Wilfrid changed from gas to diesel power. In 1963 he remodelled the complete feed mill, making available four large storage bins for whole grains with 80 to 100 tons capacity, plus four bulk feed bins for complete feeds.

In 1965 the diesel was converted to electricity and an automatic weighing scale was added, plus a three-truck garage and repair shop.

This summer Mr. Major decided to further his services with erection of the Shur-Gain fertilizers warehouse which is the first of its kind in Glengarry County. He also has bulk truck scales and a 4-ton bulk fertilizer spreader which he will rent to his customers when they purchase bulk fertilizer. This is in addition to the bagged service that he has supplied since the beginning.

Mr. Major realizes the need for fertilizer usage in Glengarry County and points out that, an average of only 35 lbs. of fertilizer was applied to the county's tillable acreage last year. In comparison, Norfolk County in Western Ontario used around 600 lbs. per tillable acre. He also notes that Canadian usage is way below other countries; for example The Netherlands uses over 400 lbs. per tillable acre and Japan uses around 300 lbs. per tillable acre. There is a great need for increased fertility in Eastern Ontario, if we are going to compete with world wide agriculture, he feels.

Mr. Major is well qualified in his business. Raised on a farm in North Lancaster he had a sound agricultural background. With the assistance of his wife, Theresa, as book-keeper, and two happy children, he has seen his business grow from one
