IT'S OUR OPINION

May You Know Success In '66

Memories of 1965 on the Glengarry scene will not all be pleasant. Its impact, in fact, is still being felt on the farm front and we can hope the year ahead will find the weatherman in a more kindly mood.

We have been reviewing that year in our file and are reminded how abnormal the weather was through all four seasons and what serious consequences resulted for farmers. The drought conditions of spring and summer followed a winter of light snowfalls and an unusually arid 1964. An already serious feed problem became critical in face of sunburned pastures and crop losses. Then came the rains of August to restore the grass and we were given too much of a good thing. The continuing downpours prevented harvesting of what crops there were.

Our New Year's wish for our farmer friends is that they may be blessed with normal weather conditions in 1966, a bountiful harvest and verdant pastures.

The adverse weather had less impact on our town and Alexandria's economy remained buoyant. There was steady employment, more job opportunities and con-

siderable new housing to accommodate a rising population. Our growing pains were not too acute, though there were complaints that rental increases were outstripping wage

Our town continued its slow but steady growth and with the national economy booming there seems every evidence that 1966 will see a continuance of that progress.

The dawn of a new year is an opportune time to express appreciation to members of town council, the Public Utilities Commission and the various school boards for the time and effort they have contributed to the community. Municipal administration undoubtedly is more demanding than it was a decade ago and not all of us are prepared to take on these added responsibilities.

If we might make one request of council it would be that it get on with the adoption of a comprehensive town plan so that our growth might be on a more orderly and farsighted basis.

Housewives As Pension Payers

Millions of Canadians this week start paying, more or less willingly, into Canada's new Pension Plan and the Vancouver Sun points out one ruling that should be scrapped. The reference is to the inclusion of some housewives as employers who must remit payments for their household help. Says the Sun editorial:

"It was anticipated that the complex Canada Pension Plan would be a tiger to administer and that is the way it's turning out. But the Revenue Department won't get much sympathy if it pulls many more pieces of classic bureaucratic nonsense such as the one which transforms housewives into pension-contributing employers.

"A regulation is no good at all if it invites, even demands, evasion, and if the time and bother and cost of policing it make the hoped-for returns meaningless. It is even less excusable if it's such a nuisance that it poisons the attitude of the people toward the massive social legislation of which it is a part.

"The Revenue Department has accomplished just this with its ruling that housewives who regularly hire a cleaning woman, baby-sitter or gardener, and pay them more than \$11.54 a week, must deduct 1.8 per cent of that pay for the Canada Pension Plan and contribute another 1.8 per cent themselves. Naturally, housewives all over the country are thoroughly annoyed at this governmental pettiness and are busily figuring out ways to get around it.

"And who can blame them? This is intrusion of government into the utility room and it will receive exactly the respect it deserves.

"Surely the responsible ministers, when they return to their desks from the sunny beaches, will promptly scrap this ruling and set the clerks to work at finding a less busy-body way of protecting the casual household worker. The Canada Pension Plans needs the best public relations it can get."

Give Them A Love Of Reading

One of Alexandria's few important comoungsters might almost overnight raise the intellectual standards of our people to a healthier plateau.

If Glengarry has more than its share of illiterates, if our educational standards are below the provincial norm, undoubtedly one of the principal reasons is our lack of public library facilities. Generations of young inquiring minds have been unable to develop the habit of going to books for information and satisfaction.

The Year To Change Stupid Laws

While the federal government is holding Royal Commissions and the provincial government has its Select Committee Hearings into this, that and the other thing, perhaps both had better take a good look at some of the stupid laws which exist and make a New Year's resolution to change them in 1966, suggests an editorial in The Rodney Mercury.

An example of what we mean appeared in daily papers recently.

"On the front page of one daily appeared the news that Quebec and Montreal policemen had captured 5,000,000 sweepstake tickets, valued at \$13,000,000. Yet on page eight of the same issue it was reported that \$7,882,292 had been bet on the horses at London Raceway during the 86-day race season. Can you imagine the stupidity that prevails here?


"The sweepstakes raise money for British and Irish hospitals, yet our federal government has made it an offence to sell 'sweeps' here. At the same time it and the provincial government make it lawful to bet on the ponies at our race tracks. Why

is one so wrong and the other right? "The answer is simple — the provincial

government's rake-off from London track bets amounted to \$472,937 this year, with the federal government getting some fringe benefits. Thus it is a matter of provincial and federal governments getting pay-offs which determine the legality of betting on the nags here or abroad.

"On the same front page of the same day's paper was another story about a Norfolk man being apprehended for operating a still and making 13 ounces of Christmas cheer. Yet recently the provincial government amended regulations making it legal for parents to give their teenagers alcohol. It is also legal to make wine, but refining the product one step further is illegal. Why? The man was making alcohol for his own use and police declared there was no intention on behalf of the distiller to sell his potion.



the same farm and get a stated wage, they are automatically covered, as is the Farm Employee.

Is there a charge to the Farm Employee for this? No. Farm employers provide this protection through assessments based on their 1966 payroll, payable in August.
